BASHAW REGIONAL COMMUNITY WELLNESS INITIATIVE

Moving a community to a place where people are healthy, safe and cared for takes a concerted effort. The Bashaw Regional Community Wellness Initiative began in 2017, when leaders in the Bashaw community recognized that waiting for solutions to the challenges faced by their rural community was not an option.

The initiative started with assessing needs, risk factors, analysis of the demographics and community assets in the region. Efforts focused across the same region served by the Bashaw RCMP detachment. This area includes towns, villages and a rural population bordered by four counties. It comprises of Alix, Bashaw, Buffalo Lake Estates, Donalda, Dorenlee, Edberg, Ferintosh, Meeting Creek, Mirror, Pelican Point and Tees. Bashaw is a natural hub in the geographic area and the Village of Alix is the second largest center. These communities are a part of a broad vision to bring responsive and accessible programs and services to a rural population.

In 2018, the Bashaw Community Wellness Team was created in order to better meet the needs of individuals and families. This team includes BDSS, Bashaw Adult Learning, Bashaw RCMP, Bashaw United Church and Bashaw School.

To continue to develop and build capacity, early in 2020 the Alix Mirror Wellness Supports Society and the Alix Community Wellness Team were established; in 2021, a new office opened in Donalda, AB, to further expand services in the region. As a rural model for serving locally, wrap-around services help to reduce barriers and promote personal health and community well-being. Collaborative partnerships with individuals, agencies and organizations both inside and outside the community form the pillars of this work.

Each Community Wellness Team is committed to serving their community. They meet regularly to ensure that needs are being met and to brainstorm possible solutions to ongoing challenges. The services provided include: Resource Navigation, Information and Referral and One-on-One Support.

Services are offered throughout the region in Alix, at the Alix and Area Community Resource Centre; in Bashaw, at the Bashaw & Area Community Resource Centre; and in Donalda, at an office in the Village Complex.

WELLNESS NAVIGATION

As the Navigation Lead, I have been able to continue the experience of working with individuals and clients. The Navigation program continues to help support individuals and families by providing them with a service that is compassionate and is done with empathy and understanding – and it truly works. The Navigation program is proud to say that each individual and family is supported on a basis that 'each story is a new one, and any door is the right door'. This year has been another busy one. We are seeing a few trends this year that has taken a fair bit of our time to support. Here are a few key areas that our team has been busy working on:

- We have had a lot of seniors come in for support. Having two rental options
 for seniors in our small community has led to our office having more senior
 clients. We have been busy with continuing to offer assistance for seniors who
 need to navigate their government benefits. This service is crucial for our local
 seniors as many of them do not have any other support in our area. It can be
 very overwhelming and disheartening for many of them, so to have us be able
 to support their journey is also crucial for their mental wellbeing.
- We have also had an up-flux of senior's dealing with housing issues. We have supported some this year with locating and settling into a new home for them to live. We have had one client in particular, that we have completed walking them through the process of dealing with the courts on an eviction they were trying to complete for 2 years on one of their properties. What our office was able to do for him, saved him literally thousands of dollars. Again, it was also the mental health of the client that we supported.
- We have also supported seniors with estate issues. Dealing with the courts and government can be a long tiring process. We are able to give them a little direction but most importantly, hope.
- We have also noticed an up-flux of seniors with complicated health issues and no doctor or transportation to get them to their appointments. We have had to personally drive quite a few. This is one area that our team has been focusing on. Our Directors are working behind the scenes to find a long-term solution to this vast local problem.
- Food security has been on the rise as well. More seniors are utilizing our Food Bank this year.

- In addition to working with the seniors directly, we have also been supporting some of their family members through our process to give them the capacity to carry on the care. IE: setting up online CRA accounts so their caregivers will be able to access important CRA documents that are needed to apply for benefits during the year.
- Another demographic that we have seen an uptake of services needed is with young single adults. Male and Female. Two cases in particular took quite some time to support. Both were homeless and both referred to our centre individually. We were able to get them each separate emergent housing at some of our hotels in our area. We were able to support each of them with acquiring new ID, taxes, food security and most importantly mental health support. Finding them a safe secure place to sleep was only the tip of the iceberg but proved to be quite challenging. Over the period of around 4 months, we helped a young sick man leave his life of homelessness, help get him ongoing funding and most importantly we were able to get him an assessment for his mental health completed. Now he has a diagnosis, medication, a safe home to live in and HOPE. He knows that we are here to help guide him through his journey, but that he had to put in the work. Because he knew that he has a team behind him, he is doing this work for himself.
- This year we were able to see a few of our clients that came to us in turmoil, able to move on with their future in very positive ways. This makes all the work we also rewarding!
- With our partnership with the school, we were able to support some families with mental health help, food security as well as some programs for the adults and children. Working together with other community resources helps us complete wrapping full services around family's needs.
- We had an amazing first year of our Kid's Camps this year. We were able to bring our local kids and the kids from Donalda for an awesome few days of fun, learning and community building activities because they are their own little community within Bashaw. We need them know that we as adults are here to support them now and into the future.
- I had the pleasure of working with Carrie Pearson for part of the year. It was an absolute pleasure to show a former board member and community member how my position works. She was an asset to the role for many reasons.
- As the Christmas season approached we saw an increase of need within our communities we serve. Once again we showed through action that we truly care about the needs of all of our community members. Our team provided the annual Christmas Angel Tree of Giving at our office. Once again our community stepped up to the challenge of making sure that everyone who was in need had a wonderful Christmas filled with a beautiful meal and personalized presents for each family member.

• Our annual Christmas Family Ball was a huge success this year. Many families participated in a magical night filled with fun and memories.

So as you can see, our office has been busy serving our community and beyond this year. There are many more ways that we add a positive impact on our community. We have worked well together for the past few years and have all been adaptable to the many issues that we face weekly.

You will notice that I used the word WE a lot. That is because this position is a team position. It takes all of us in the office to continue to meet the needs of our community and beyond.

Thanks for all your support, and I look forward to another wonderful year with our organization.

FAMILY AND COMMUNITY WELLNESS

I have to say we have had a really good year! Let me explain...

We still had kids and families needing wellness support for a variety of reasons and we still served a large number of our youth and younger students. That has not changed and I am grateful we were able to support or be a bridge to supports.

2022 was a great year based on the fact that there was less restriction on how we provided supports. The last few years created some barriers that meant we had to find ways to reach out and connect. Finding new ways is always a valuable learning experience but not always the best or easiest way to support and connect.

This last year felt normal and allowed for an ease in the connections. The conversations were not interrupted with masks. The stringent protocol of sanitizing the space and furniture between people gave more opportunity to spend longer periods of time with students.

This last year had my days full with students needing wellness support. I saw some students in a regular time slot throughout each semester. These regular spots would take a couple of spots daily.

The other spots available were left for students that I would connect with in my day moving about the school and checking in with them. Other connections were made with teachers and staff requesting a check in with students they had noticed that may need the contact or connection.

There was also 2 periods a day that were spent creating with the Jr and Sr Drama students. This is also a valuable way to create important connections for wellness. The drama programs are an outlet for creative growth and a great sense of belonging. We work through many challenges and eventually create something that provides growth in letting go fears and hurdles that can hold us back. The growth in this is achieved at each students own pace and discovery. It's one of the most rewarding things to witness as it really does then belong to each person as an individual and as a group achievement.

Each week I am also in collaborative discussion with our schools wellness team. This consisted of the FSLW (Family School Liaison Worker), the administrative team and myself. We would identify where care may be needed within an individual or group and create a connection or possibility for that care.

I was also able to work with the Battle River Mental Health Wellness Coach in the same capacity but in a regular class room setting. These classes are supported through tailored programming specific to each group.

The great collaborative models we have in our community and district also work beautifully in our school with great supports and systems in place to bring as much care and programming to our students in many unique ways. This includes wellness in areas of mental health, emotional care and physical needs being met through nutrition. It also includes bridges to the many other care systems within our community, as well as a reach outside of our community should there be a need.

I want you to know we are relevant and needed. We have the capacity to create change in peoples lives that can make a difference to an individual and a family situation. We do it by being present and the powerful collaborative models that have been created. Thank you so much for your part in this. Your part matters and you definitely make a difference.

GENERATIONS DAYCARE

Director Marci Albers maintained the centres daily operations and licensing standards. We work hard to maintain this high quality standard for the children, staff, families and community.

The first half of the year showed lower enrollment with steady numbers. July was slower as typical and August showed a small rise in returning children. September brought many new and returning faces. The majority of our children are enrolled full time while in previous years many of the children were attending part time or casually. We have had to switch to a priority based intake as we have accumulated a large waitlist for child care. The last quarter of the year showed significant growth to our program.

The new affordability grant came into effect in January. It provides up to \$635 per child that is paid directly to our centre.

The staff turn around for 2022 was minimal. We finished 2022 with an exciting team of 6: Miss Marci, Miss Taylor, Miss Terri, newly acquired staff are Miss Jessi and Miss Janelle. We said farewell to Miss Hanna after 3 years in September. Miss Sheila is always willing to step in as a relief staff when needed. Each educator brings a uniqueness that adds to the quality of our dynamic team. We are extremely fortunate to have this wonderful group of educators providing care within our community.

Their hard work and dedication is always noticed and appreciated.

BASHAW & DISTRICT PRESCHOOL

Program Facilitator Marci Albers ended the 2021-2022 year with Mrs. Sheila Seale as the classroom assistant. We hosted 10 children in the morning and 13 in the afternoon.

The children enjoyed many events including a Valentine's Day party, building Leprechaun traps, Easter egg hunting, a glow in the dark party and our year end celebration. The church was packed for our celebration! It was such an epic event after not having the ability to celebrate the children in the previous years! The feeling of community and sense of togetherness was unforgettable.

We again chose to start at the beginning of October rather than a September start date. October brings many new faces for the 2022 -2023 year. Sheila Seale has returned to our classroom for another year of fun!

We are facilitating 2 classes again this year as enrollment is higher than the previous year. We have 10 children in the morning class and 17 children enrolled in the afternoon.

Some of our fall and early winter highlights were our Halloween Party and Remembrance Day. The children made poppies and learned the significant meaning of November 11th and the importance of poppies.

Mrs. Hunter is always an important feature in our classroom. She provides story time to both classes on Thursdays. It is important that we continue to build relationships within our community. We are fortunate to have her and the Library as neighbours!

HOME SUPPORT

Eligible for FCSS Funding, but not FCSS funded at this time. The Home Support program was provided to 37 clients by three part time staff members. We are averaging about 23 clients a month. In total our Home Support workers provided 975 hours for the year 2022. Approximately 81 hours each month. Program advertising continued through the monthly Community Connections newsletter and word of mouth.

COMMUNITY NEEDS

While the majority of clients were seniors, others with health and/or mobility issues are able to receive Home Support. For the senior clients, having someone caring spend a few hours with them in their homes on a weekly or bi-weekly basis meant that they could stay independently in their own homes.

HOW ARE WE MAKING A DIFFERENCE?

100% are satisfied with the service provided by BDSS Home Support.

100% are comfortable having the Home Support worker in their home and felt the worker handled all their equipment with care.

MEALS ON WHEELS

This program serves individuals in the community who have difficulty preparing their own meals. Clients are mostly seniors, but may also include those who have suffered accidents or illness and are unable to care of themselves for a period of time.

COMMUNITY NEED

Meals on Wheels is an essential service. In the fall of 2022 our numbers increased up to 13 people receiving meals three times weekly. This year 894 meals were delivered to those who may not have had the ability to take care of all meals themselves.

COMMUNITY PARTICIPATION/PARTNERSHIPS

In the past, this program requires the coordination of volunteers to deliver meals. Due to COVID19 Pandemic, we haven't used the community volunteer drivers for the last three years except for one very dedicated volunteer who's been helping us deliver meals one day a week. She's been a great help to the program since then. Our staff and sometimes the summer students did most of the delivery. A partnership with the Bashaw Meadows also exists as they prepare the nutritious meals that we deliver.

COMMENTS:

The majority of our Meals on Wheels clients are very satisfied and appreciative of everything, considering the cost and the complete meal they receive each day.

BASHAW & DISTRICT FOOD BANK

Bashaw & District Support Services organizes and administers the Bashaw & District Food Bank, which offers nutritional services to those in need.

Households- 269, Children (0-17)- 151, Adults (18+)- 288, Seniors (65+)- 81

COMMUNITY SUPPORT/ PARTICIPATION

Our community generously supports the food bank throughout the year with either monetary donations or can goods, etc. A local Hutterite colony donated fresh potatoes, carrots, peanuts and frozen corn this year. We also have a dedicated member of the community who donates fresh produce from his garden each month or as needed. We received a donation of more than 200 lbs. of beef from the Ponoka Food Bank. We also received a whole cow already butchered and wrapped from a generous member of the Bashaw & Area community. Food Banks Alberta continued to support with all they have to offer.



ADMINISTRATIVE SERVICES

The administrative services of BDSS include the day-to-day operation of the programs and services including programming, financial records, payroll, accounting and communication tools such as the Community Connections newsletter, website and social media. During 2022 efforts continued to adopt the new image, the Bashaw and Area Community Resource Centre. The goal and overall purpose is to represent the collective efforts of all organizations apart of serving the Bashaw & Area population within our facility. Additionally, the administration and program staff provide information and referral services for the whole community, for any area of need or concern a family or individual may encounter.

TARGET POPULATION

These services are available to the whole community. Community members see Bashaw & District Support Services as a place of support. If they don't know where to go- they go to Bashaw and Area Community Resource Centre. Community members call or drop in for any and all questions or concerns.

COMMUNITY NEED

Statistics and tracking information indicate that the community has a high need for support services in the areas of mental health, social supports, transportation in and out of town (doctor's appointment and other support options) and one-on-one counseling. The administration staff does their best to provide service or referrals to families and individuals in need. During 2022, 3650 opportunities arose to assist clients between January and December.

OBJECTIVES

To create, develop and maintain services that have been identified as needed. The community will be able to communicate with external agencies with accurate and detailed assessments of need. As a rural community, Bashaw will have services equal to those offered by larger centers.


COMMUNITY SUPPORTS

SPECIAL PROJECTS 2022

Fall of 2022 brought some exciting news that ignited special projects. These projects were:

- 1) Healthy Aging Alberta to expand current Home Support Services to include enriched and new programming to support Healthy Aging in Alberta. Our areas of priority are: Enriched Home Support & Navigation Services, Transportation to Appointments and Special Social Outings.
- 2) Fuel for School Rural Nutrition to support development of a regional network to develop and sustain local school programs within the Bashaw area. The Fuel for School Rural Nutrition Initiative serves the schools of Mecca Glen, Alix, Donalda and Bashaw. The program is intended to provide universal access to quality food within each school.

These projects are multi-year projects, and include the connection between rural community partners within our region, and in neighbouring areas. We are excited to see what 2023 brings with these projects.

EMERGENCY SOCIAL SERVICES

BDSS maintained it's role as Emergency Social Services Coordinator, prepared to serve the community in the event of any local or global disaster. In addition to local readiness, our team also serves as call out members for any Provincial Disaster needing manpower in operating Reception and Recovery Centres.

2022 saw the lifting of many Pandemic restrictions. BDSS was able to determine which programs created or enriched during the pandemic, to keep and which programs gear down and move into inactive status. All Mental Health Supports, Extended Learning Program, and enriched Food Bank services (including Donalda) remained intact and operating.

VOLUNTEER SERVICES

BDSS encourages, promotes and coordinates volunteer events within the community. Our community flourishes on volunteerism. Every year, BDSS hosts a community Volunteer Appreciation event. In 2021, due to COVID-19, we were unable to organize a Volunteer Appreciation Event. We hope that in 2023, we are once again able to host an event to show the volunteers in our community how much they are appreciated. There is approximately 32 volunteer service organizations in Bashaw.

COMMUNITY PARTICIPATION/ PARTNERSHIPS

In our organization, volunteerism is essential to provide many of the services we offer: Meals on Wheels, Santa's Anonymous, Bashaw Food Bank, Bashaw Bus, Roots of Empathy, Preschool, Generations Daycare, Early Literacy Projects, Extended Learning Program, Summer Programs and of course the BDSS Board itself. As a community, we are truly grateful to our Volunteers! We would like to acknowledge members of our wonderful volunteer board, who this year continued to be strong pillars of support to our staff despite the many challenges faced.

TOOLS FOR SCHOOL

Tools for School is a program which BDSS has adopted to help community children in need by providing support to their learning and development.
