BASHAW REGIONAL COMMUNITY INITIATIVE -RURAL ALBERTA WELLNESS INITIATIVE

An important part of BDSS success is the work completed surrounding community development. We believe in progressive thinking, pro-active planning, and choose to conduct meetings, special projects, and advocacy that brings benefit not only to the Bashaw Region, but also to other rural areas in Alberta.

In 2023, we partnered with the Alberta Government and the Civil Societies Branch to conduct a pilot project to promote the Bashaw Regional Wellness Hub, as well as offer support to 2 other communities in Alberta to pilot the duplication of this community development and collaboration work.

This project supports the development of partnerships focusing on Regional Wellness within Rural Alberta. Partners work together to implement innovative Wellness Strategies that will promote individual and rural community sustainability, well-being, and success.

Partner communities to the project are Vilna and Stettler. We also brought in the expertise of Unstoppable Conversations to conduct initial community discovery sessions. The work continued with the development of Vilna Wellness Team, and the Circle of Services in Stettler. Vilna has continued to develop their team and enhance true collaboration at the team level. Stettler continues to facilitate discussions at their Circle of Services, as well as they have launched Navigation services, and other innovative programs.

This project will continue through 2024.



As a rural model for serving locally, wrap-around services help to reduce barriers and promote personal health and community well-being. Collaborative partnerships with individuals, agencies and organizations both inside and outside the community form the pillars of this work.

Services are offered in a region comprising of Alix, Bashaw, Buffalo Lake Estates, Donalda, Dorenlee, Edberg, Ferintosh, Meeting Creek, Mirror, Pelican Point and Tees. Bashaw is a natural hub in the geographic area and the Village of Alix is the second largest center. These communities are a part of a broad vision to bring responsive and accessible programs and services to a rural population.

WELLNESS NAVIGATION

Overview:

The Navigation Program continues its commitment to assisting individuals, and families facing various hardships, empowering them to become more capable and independent. We also try to provide them with a service where they are left with a feeling of hope, compassion, support, that is done with empathy and understanding. Since taking on the navigation role I have quickly learned how many individuals and families in our community are struggling or facing hardships in various ways. There is not one case or story that is the same and each provides different levels of support and resources.

Financial Struggles:

Many clients are facing severe financial constraints, limiting their access to basic needs like housing and food security.


I have met with a handful of clients educating them on budgeting, saving, and managing debt. I have successfully seen a couple of them make major progress with their overspending, eliminate their debt and establish savings.

The food bank is constantly being utilized and vouchers to our local Thrift Store for basic items like clothing or kitchen supplies have been handed out numerous times.

Mental Health Challenges:

A significant number of clients are struggling with mental health issues, affecting their ability to function effectively in daily life. Dedicated mental health professionals were recommended to provide counseling and support when needed. We also helped individuals access government supports in various circumstances.




Housing Insecurity:

We have lots of Clients that have faced unstable housing situations, some completely homeless leading to increased stress and insecurity in other aspects of their lives. Some of the support we were able to provide to various individuals was helping them find and settle into a place, acquiring new ID's, completing their taxes, providing food security, accessing government supports, and mental health support when needed.

The Navigation Program remains committed to addressing the multifaceted challenges faced by clients, promoting their autonomy and resilience. The program continues to witness positive transformations, empowering clients to overcome hardships and lead more independent lives. Seeing how some of our clients arrived in our program to witnessing how they have been able to make positive changes to help them move on with their future is the most rewarding feeling and makes me want to keep doing the best job I can to support any individual that arrives needing help and support. I believe what we do here is making a huge impact on the needs of individuals in our community and surrounding communities. I look forward to continuing my career here at Bashaw & District Support Services.

FAMILY AND COMMUNITY WELLNESS

Overview:

Our role at Bashaw School is supported by the Family Wellness Worker, Lori Miller, in the capacity of emotional and social supports, programming and any other additional services required by bridging the Bashaw & Area Community Resource Centre's offerings, as needed. Students are able to grow and explore new opportunities. Her work includes:

- Visiting approximately 6 students per day, at school receiving one on one support. That would be 1092 visits per school year.
- Lunch wellness group- Thursdays at lunch for 40 min at around 20 lunch time gathering's. This involved 3-6 students per gathering.
- Sr Drama- 28 students at approximately 4000 hours of time for production and learning time for the students as a group.
- Jr Drama involved the junior high students on a trimester rotation basis throughout the school year for approximately 2000 hrs of learning time.
- Roots Of Empathy was 2 classes with 2 baby families at 2 hours per week through 8 months of the school year.
- And throughout the day at school there are several check ins with students on an informal base in the hallways, varying daily in numbers..



GENERATIONS DAYCARE

Early Programs Manager, Marci Albers maintained the centres daily operations and licensing standards with the support of the alternate director, Taylor Hiron. We work hard to maintain this high quality standard for the children, staff, families, and community.

The first half of the year showed consistent enrollment with steady numbers. July and August did not bring a huge change in numbers. September was our slowest month with only 30 children attending. The majority of our children are enrolled full time while in previous years many of the children were attending part time or attending casually. We still have a waitlist for children needing care.

The new affordability grant has helped to keep our numbers consistent. The grant is available to all families regardless of income as long as children attend a minimum of 50 hours. The vast majority of our children are under 3 years old. We have mainly full time children, 100 or more hours on a consistent basis. In previous years we had a large group of children that were only attending part time. The affordability grant has made it possible for families to access our program with less financial burden.

The staff turn around for 2023 was average. We finished 2023 with an exciting team of 5: Miss Marci, Miss Taylor, Miss Terri, Miss Jessi, and our new hire, Miss Brittany.

We said farewell to Miss Janelle. Miss Sheila is always willing to step in as a relief staff when needed. Each educator brings a uniqueness that adds to the quality of our dynamic team. We are extremely fortunate to have this wonderful group of educators providing care within our community.

In August we began taking a group of children to Bashaw Meadows. We are grateful to have Iris B. as a partner to help facilitate these inter-generational social gatherings. Due to some pesky germs, we did not visit in November or December. We will be continuing our monthly trips to visit the residents!

















BASHAW & DISTRICT PRESCHOOL


Program Facilitator Marci Albers ended the 2022-2023 year with Mrs. Sheila Seale as the classroom assistant. We hosted 27 children total in the morning and afternoon classes.

The children enjoyed many events including a Valentine's Day party, building Leprechaun traps, Easter egg hunting, a glow in the dark party, and our year end celebration. The church was packed for our celebration!

We again chose to start at the beginning of October rather than a September start date. October brings many new faces for the 2023 -2024 yr.

We are facilitating 2 classes again this year as enrollment is even higher than the previous year. We have 14 children in the morning class and 16 children enrolled in the afternoon at the beginning of October. One more child joined each of our classes in November bringing our count to 15 and 17 children for a total of 32 smiling faces!

Some of our fall and early winter highlights were our Halloween Party and Remembrance Day. The children made poppies and learned the significant meaning of November 11th and the importance of poppies. We had a teddy bear picnic with snacks and hot chocolate and a Christmas party that included an indoor pretend snowball fight! The children were by far the winners! We had the opportunity to return to Bashaw Meadows for one visit in the fall before the germs hit us full force. It was such an exciting day for all generations to gather again!



Mrs. Hunter was always an important feature in our classroom. She provided story time to both classes and popped in for regular visits. It was important that we continued to build relationships within our community. We were fortunate to have her as another champion of early literacy in our program. She will be missed by all of the children and staff.









HOME SUPPORT

Eligible for FCSS Funding, but not FCSS funded at this time. The Home Support program was provided to 38 clients by three part time staff members. In total our Home Support workers provided 733.25 hours for the year 2023 and 363 visits. Program advertising continued through the monthly Community Connections newsletter and word of mouth.

COMMUNITY NEEDS

While the majority of clients were seniors, others with health and/or mobility issues are able to receive Home Support. For the senior clients, having someone caring spend a few hours with them in their homes on a weekly or bi-weekly basis meant that they could stay independently in their own homes.

HOW ARE WE MAKING A DIFFERENCE?

100% are satisfied with the service provided by BDSS Home Support.

MEALS ON WHEELS

This program serves individuals in the community who have difficulty preparing their own meals. Clients are mostly seniors, but may also include those who have suffered accidents or illness and are unable to care of themselves for a period of time.

COMMUNITY NEED

Meals on Wheels is an essential service. During 2023, 14 people received meals three times weekly. This year 1,560 meals were delivered to those who may not have had the ability to take care of all meals themselves.

COMMUNITY PARTICIPATION/PARTNERSHIPS

This program benefits from the coordination of volunteers to deliver meals along with our staff and sometimes the summer students who completed most of the delivery. During 2023, 2 dedicated volunteers supported these efforts.

A partnership with the Bashaw Meadows also exists, as they prepare the nutritious meals that we deliver.

COMMENTS:

The majority of our Meals on Wheels clients are very satisfied and appreciative of everything, considering the cost and the complete meal they receive each day. "Get tired of cooking and this helps."

HEALTHY AGING ALBERTA

Healthy Aging Alberta (HAA) focuses on developing a coordinated sector in Alberta by bringing together community-based organizations around a common framework for action, with a focus on identifying and addressing priority areas related to healthy aging in the community. Healthy Aging Alberta is a rich network of community-based senior serving organizations and allies across our province united by a shared vision: to make Alberta one of the best places in the world to grow older.

BDSS is a successful applicant under the Community and Home Support funding program. With this funding, we pursue the work of:

- 1) Assisted Transportation
- 2) Enhanced Home Support Services to include:

Companion for medical visits, and liaison with families as per client requests, Social Visits (Friendly Visiting), Social Outings, Yard Maintenance and Snow Removal, Menu Planning and Preparation

3) System Navigation and Supported Referrals

Special addition to this project is to work together with Camrose and District Support Services to discover opportunities for integrated Rural Supports. This pilot project is in place until March, 2025, and serves the Bashaw region as defined by RCMP boundaries.

2023 Milestones included:

- 1) Developed, launched, and coordinate assisted transportation to medical appointments.
- 2) Hired Healthy Aging Facilitator (Debbie Zembal) to facilitate intake assessments, develop individualized care plans, and coordinate services for clients.
- 3) Hired additional Home support workers (Kirsten Nugent, Andrea Hildebrand) to support enhanced service delivery.
- 4) Delivered Navigation services (Carrie Domstad, Natasha Larkin) and supported referrals.
- 5) Cultivated new partnerships to support HAA project.
- 6) Attended Healthy Aging Alberta Provincial Summit.
- 7)Initiated Bashaw Regional Wellness Project Primary Care Hub model to ensure existing primary care remains, and to build partnerships with new Health Care service models.

Bashaw & District Food Bank


Bashaw & District Support Services organizes and administers the Bashaw & District Food Bank, which offers nutritional services to those in need.

FUEL FOR SCHOOL RURAL NUTRITION INITIATIVE

Bashaw & District Support Services was successful in securing funds from the Alberta Government for School Nutrition. Approved funding was to support the development of a regional network to develop and sustain local school programs within the Bashaw area.

The Fuel for School Rural Nutrition Initiative served the schools of Mecca Glen, Alix, Donalda and Bashaw. The overall outcome was to provide universal access to quality food within each school.

We created a regional school nutrition hub that has representation from all the schools, as well as community partners. This hub focused on the effectiveness, efficiencies, and reliability of nutritious foods. Through this partnership, universal access to food was offered at all schools - there was no requirement for students to participate.

The regional hub negotiated cost savings and cultivated partnerships, shared personnel to manage price watching, ordering, delivery, site safety assessment and remediation, shared storage space, and more. This pilot demonstrated the true example of collaboration and the profound impact of working together.

Together, the hub also assessed volunteer/worker effectiveness/retention, as well as shared in a marketing plan with the vision of building volunteers from within the region (both individuals and corporations) as well as awareness for garnering donations.

2023 Milestones:

- * Hired Regional Coordinator Amanda Lyle
- * Established Regional Committee and conducted regular meetings
- * Food Purchasing
- * Food Storage intended to be local as well as regional (school based)/centralized (Bashaw CRC)
- * Food Prep and Delivery (Running the Programs)
- * Volunteer Training (ie Food Safety Certification, orientations)

2023 Outcomes:


- * 748 children on average were fed daily by this pilot program.
- * Portion cost averaged \$2.58, lower than the provincial average of \$5/portion




Bashaw Bus Society

The Bashaw bus continues to run in Bashaw every Tuesday, as well as the Camrose trips every other Thursday. BDSS staff were busy with bookings, monitoring drivers and making sure that we are meeting the requirements from Alberta Transportation. The Bus was also being utilized through Charter trips, for medical appointments, shopping trips and seniors field trips in partnership with Bashaw Meadows.

*The numbers are higher under Bashaw trips passengers for the months of August, September, October and December because the daycare and preschool kids rode the bus to go to the Meadows to visit the seniors.

TRANSPORTATION

This Program was officially advertised to the public in December of 2023, but we started driving senior clients to their medical appointments under this

program in the spring of 2023. May 25th was our very first client, driven to St. Mary's Hospital in Camrose. Transportation is provided for clients 50 and up in Bashaw and surrounding areas. Eligible clients are folks who do not drive and do not have any other alternative drivers.

Our hours of operations are Monday to Friday from 9-4 pm. Rides must be booked at least 36 hours ahead of time to properly secure a driver. We currently have 8 volunteer drivers on our list and our BDSS staff covers on occasions and on an emergency basis. The trips are fully subsidized at this time, so there's no cost for the clients. Many seniors in the community and the surrounding area are taking advantage of this wonderful program,

We acquired the Elks Van in the spring of 2022. The van can accommodate up to 15 passengers. It's been a good addition to our transportation program. The rental fees are \$50 for half a day and \$100 for a full day. It has not been used a lot in the winter time, but it is popular in the spring and summer for weddings, BYC and adult field trips and for community members personal use.

ADMINISTRATIVE SERVICES

The administrative services of BDSS include the day-to-day operation of the programs and services including programming, financial records, payroll, accounting and communication tools such as the Community Connections newsletter, website and social media. During 2023 the newly adopted image, the Bashaw and Area Community Resource Centre, stengthened. The goal and overall purpose is to represent the collective efforts of all organizations apart of serving the Bashaw & Area population within our facility. Additionally, the administration and program staff provide information and referral services for the whole community, for any area of need or concern.

TARGET POPULATION

These services are available to the whole community. Community members see Bashaw & District Support Services as a place of support. If they don't know where to go- they go to Bashaw and Area Community Resource Centre. Community members call or drop in for any and all questions or concerns.

COMMUNITY NEED

Statistics and tracking information indicate that the community has a high need for support services in the areas of mental health, social supports, transportation in and out of town (doctor's appointment and other support options) and one-on-one counseling. The administration staff does their best to provide service or referrals to families and individuals in need. During 2023, 4.287 opportunities arose to assist clients between January and December.

OBJECTIVES

To create, develop and maintain services that have been identified as needed. The community will be able to communicate with external agencies with accurate and detailed assessments of need. As a rural community, Bashaw will have services equal to those offered by larger centers.

COMMUNITY SUPPORTS

Community supports include many services on a walk-in basis. These services include (but are not limited to): assistance with photocopying, faxing, technology supports, general information about the community, assistance to fill out paperwork and forms, as well as assisting community members in finding resources and assisting them to access these resources.





The board and staff of Bashaw District Support Services are committed to building the community. They actively participate in meetings and events to build resources and programs that meet the social needs of all citizens within the community.
















EMERGENCY SOCIAL SERVICES
