





As a rural model for serving locally, wrap-around services help to reduce barriers and promote personal health and community well-being. Collaborative partnerships with individuals, agencies and organizations both inside and outside the community form the pillars of this work.

Services are offered in a region comprising of Alix, Bashaw, Buffalo Lake Estates, Donalda, Dorenlee, Edberg, Ferintosh, Meeting Creek, Mirror, Pelican Point and Tees. Bashaw is a natural hub in the geographic area and the Village of Alix is the second largest center. These communities are a part of a broad vision to bring responsive and accessible programs and services to a rural population.

#### A SHARED VISION FOR RURAL WELL-BEING


The power of community to create health is far greater than any physician, clinic or hospital. -Mark Hyman-

The Community Wellness Team is a partnership between many organizations in our community, managed by four pillars: Bashaw & District Support Services, Bashaw Adult Learning, Bashaw School and Bashaw RCMP. This Team also includes the Bashaw United Church and Bashaw Pharmasave. Formed in 2017, individuals from areas of education, advanced education, health, justice, social services, and spiritual represented the community sectors. The first goal was to improve access to care for our rural community and region by bringing together a network of social supports and services to create a wrap-around approach— offering system navigation, information & referral, and advocacy to reduce barriers to access and provide more resources and support for community members.

Over the past 18 months, the team has developed a collaborative healthcare model centred on team-based care to complete the work. This will bring together healthcare providers, social services, and community organizations to work closely to meet the needs of individuals and families. The primary goal is to ensure sustainability and long-term well-being. By encouraging collaboration and efficient use of resources, the model will ensure that healthcare services meet the community's evolving needs. The intent is to not only strengthen individual care but also promote the well-being of the entire region. Once most of the model's elements are ready, the team will share more details and opportunities to connect.

#### BASHAW REGIONAL COMMUNITY INITIATIVE -RURAL ALBERTA WELLNESS INITIATIVE

An important part of BDSS success is the work completed surrounding community development. We believe in progressive thinking, pro-active planning, and choose to conduct meetings, special projects, and advocacy that brings benefit not only to the Bashaw Region, but also to other rural areas in Alberta.

In 2023, we partnered with the Alberta Government and the Civil Societies Branch to conduct a pilot project to promote the Bashaw Regional Wellness Hub, as well as offer support to 2 other communities in Alberta to pilot the duplication of this community development and collaboration work.

This project supports the development of partnerships focusing on Regional Wellness within Rural Alberta. Partners work together to implement innovative Wellness Strategies that will promote individual and rural community sustainability, well-being, and success.

Partner communities to the project are Vilna and Stettler. We also brought in the expertise of Unstoppable Conversations to conduct initial community discovery sessions. The work continued with the development of Vilna Wellness Team, and the Circle of Services in Stettler. Vilna has continued to develop their team and enhance true collaboration at the team level. Stettler continues to facilitate discussions at their Circle of Services, as well as they have launched Navigation services, and other innovative programs.

This project continued through 2024.



#### WELLNESS NAVIGATION

The <u>Wellness Navigation Program</u> refers to a service or initiative designed to help individuals, particularly in underserved or marginalized communities, access resources and services in their local area. The goal of community navigation is to guide people through the complex web of services, programs, and opportunities that may be available to them, ensuring they can access support and care when needed. These programs focus on improving community well-being, especially for vulnerable populations, by facilitating connections to resources, services, and support networks. This program offers:

#### **Ongoing Support-**

Community navigators may serve as case managers, doing intakes and following up with individuals over time to ensure they are receiving the appropriate services and staying connected to necessary resources.

#### **Crisis Intervention:**

In some instances, community navigators may work in crisis situations, helping people navigate urgent needs such as homelessness, food insecurity, or medical emergencies.

#### **Service Education:**


Navigators often educate individuals on the various services and programs available to them. This could include understanding how to apply for government assistance programs, understanding their healthcare options, or how to access job training.

#### **Self-Sufficiency:**

The ultimate goal of many community navigation programs is to empower individuals to be self-sufficient, equipping them with the skills and knowledge to find and access services independently in the future.

#### **Building Partnerships**

Successful community navigation programs often rely on collaboration with local service providers, nonprofits, government agencies, and community organizations. These partnerships allow navigators to stay informed about available resources and make more effective referrals.

#### **Community Network**

Navigators often build a network of providers, creating a community of care that ensures individuals are not bounced from one service to another, improving efficiency and continuity of care.

<u>Healthy Aging Wellness Navigation</u> refers to programs designed to support older adults in accessing services and resources that promote physical, mental, and social well-being as they age. These programs focus on helping older adults maintain independence, health, and quality of life through personalized assistance.

#### **Key Elements**

- 1. Resource Access: Navigators connect older adults with healthcare services, long-term care options, financial assistance, transportation, social programs and more.
- 2. Personalized Support: Older adults receive individualized assessments and ongoing assistance to access the right resources based on their unique needs.
- 3. Health Promotion: Focuses on managing chronic conditions, preventive care, mental health support, and wellness programs.
- 4. Independence & Safety: Assistance with home modifications, mobility, and technology to ensure safety and independence.
- 5. Social Engagement: Helps combat isolation by connecting seniors with social activities, support groups, and community resources.
- 6. Financial & Legal Assistance: Support in managing finances, accessing government benefits, and legal guidance for aging-related issues.

#### Benefits

- Improved Quality of Life: Promotes physical, mental, and social well-being.
- Reduced Isolation: Increases social connections and engagement.
- Better Health Outcomes: Ensures access to healthcare and preventive services.
- Empowerment: Helps seniors make informed decisions about their health and lifestyle.


These programs create a support network that helps seniors thrive as they age, fostering independence, health, and community integration.

Benefits of Wellness Navigation Programs

- Improved Access to Services: Guides individuals to the services they need, community navigation programs reduce barriers to access, such as confusion, lack of knowledge, or difficulty navigating complex systems.
- Increased Community Well-Being: Improves the overall health and stability of the community, particularly for vulnerable populations.
- Enhanced Collaboration: Fosters collaboration between different service providers, these programs help create a more cohesive and coordinated system of care.
- Prevention of Crises: Addresses needs early and proactively, community navigation programs can help prevent individuals from falling into crisis situations, such as homelessness, poor health, or financial instability.

Wellness Navigation programs are designed to support individuals in finding and accessing essential resources within their communities. By offering personalized guidance and overcoming barriers, these programs play a critical role in promoting equity, improving outcomes, and enhancing the overall well-being of individuals and communities, particularly for those who are underserved or vulnerable. I have had the privilege of working with this amazing team in our beautiful community over the last year. I have taken some extensive training in financial empowerment as well as some Cultural Awareness training and I am excited to share my knowledge. Jackie, Debbie and I have managed to support many clients who come through our doors. Our knowledge base is growing with every new client. I look forward to continuing to serve Bashaw and area.

#### FAMILY AND COMMUNITY WELLNESS

2024 was a really enjoyable year with some great highlights. We have developed a culture of care within this community that shows up throughout our day. I see people and students helping one another during times that are good and times that are difficult. We have conflict and at times intentional and unintentional dismantling of care, as you do when humans are present. What I see that is such a beautiful sign of hope in watching students stand for one another in a positive supportive way. I see people standing for grace and care within our community as well. We will always have conflict and disagreements but the way we stand up for one another without the intention of attack and chaos is really powerful. It's those steps that are the change we see that creates so much freedom for people to collaborate in a way to allow space for possibility and growth. That is the road we are on and the road we bend with.

- Our Sr Drama students completed their production of Freaky Friday in June. We had 30 students participating on the stage and also tech crew doing lighting and sound. The students created the choreography that was full of rhythm and fun. They created full characters that were believable and full of humour and heart.
- The Jr Drama students completed a lively production of Elf in December. It was very well attended with the audience loving the energetic performances of these talented youth. We wound up with around 35 students participating both on the stage and as technical crew on lights and sound. The students also completed most of the choreography and really supported one another on stage as a phenomenal cast.
- In June we had baby celebrations for Roots Of Empathy for the grades one and two classes. We had two different families participate in these beautiful programs. Kane Wilson was our sweet grade one baby teacher along with his mother Ariel. Our grade two family was sweet baby Tatum Stone with his mom Samantha. The program is so immersive and both our moms were fantastic at answering the many many questions our students had as they observed our baby teachers.

- Our wellness program includes visits set up to support students with a
  variety of needs and concerns. The intention is to be available to listen and
  spend time with the students. We help with emotional well-being and
  support. We are also a bridge to supports with trained mental health
  specialists, educational connections, as well as a discovery to go through a
  students day in detail to see where extra support or understanding would
  be helpful. The wellness program can be that bridge that connects
  understanding between the educators and the students if a student is
  needing considerations for learning, like a quiet space or a helpful tool.
- I was also able to create a caring club with a small group of elementary students that met a lunch on Thursdays for part of the year. This was started from the request of a young student in grade four that was seeking connection with like minded youth. The idea was to talk about things that they care about or were struggling with. The group were avid listeners and provided great support. They could also choose to not participate with sharing and could just be there for each other.
- During the winter months I got to the school early and was able to supervise in the gym from 8AM- 8:25AM so that students could get out of the cold and be ready for the breakfast program. I usually had a group of about 10-14 participate.
- Finally, I had the great pleasure of working with and mentoring two
  practicum students that were both in University programs intending to work
  in a specialized way with youth in their respective fields. It was such a good
  experience as they both offered collaborative skills and each had a wonderful
  demeanour with students. They easily made connections and were valuable
  contributors to those they worked with.

#### GENERATIONS DAYCARE

Early Programs Manager, Marci Albers maintained the centres daily operations, licensing and AHS requirements. We strive to maintain high quality standards for the children, staff, families, and community.

The affordability grant has helped to keep our numbers consistent. There have been changes to the affordability grant but it is still available to all families regardless of income as long as children attend a minimum of 50 hours. Parents are required to pay a minimum of \$100.00 for 50-99 hours and \$217.50 for 100 hours or more. Subsidy still covers up to \$266.00 monthly for families with an income of below \$180 000.00, which leaves a very low portion (if any) to be paid by parents.

The majority of our children are enrolled full time, 100 hours and above, while in previous years many of the children were attending part time or attending casually. We still have a waitlist for children needing care. In previous years we had a large group of children that were only attending part time. We have almost no children that are registered as drop in only.

The staff turn around for 2024 was low. We finished 2024 with an exciting team of 6: Miss Marci, Miss Terri, Miss Jessi, Miss Brittany, Miss Janelle has returned and a new hire, Miss Emily Kohlman. Miss Taylor will return with her infant in March. Miss Sheila is always willing to step in as a relief staff when needed. Each educator brings a uniqueness that adds to the quality of our dynamic team. We are extremely fortunate to have this wonderful group of educators providing care within our community.



Like so many other projects in this community, the vision grew from playground replacement to a full revitalization of the outdoor space at Bashaw School. The Project won the Helping Hands Award from the volunteer nation wide organization, Let Them Be Kids.

It matched dollar for dollar with no cap. That along with sponsorship from 41 community members and partnering organizations, raised enough funds to build this 1st structure, as well as benches, picnic tables and fresh lines and hoops at basketball courts. Things like the benches are brought to you by the Ben & Kelly Wilson Family, Al Middleton and Candace Coborough Family, Bryan and Terri Gust Family, and the Neil and Roxanne Miller Family.

The committee knew that this space was special and that it needed to be given just the "right name"! A Facebook poll was put forth in the community, and the overwhelming response was that this area would be named in honor of a very special person who played an important part at Bashaw School, and in the Bashaw Community. And from there... the JOHN ROCK MEMORIAL PARK came to life. Comments about Mr. Rock included:

"He didn't treat us like students. We were his family and his friends."

"What a wonderful man!"

The name for the park is a perfect fit.

Phase 2 of the project was postponed, due to exciting news that Bashaw was being considered for a new school. The committee intentionally delayed any further progress as there was discussion on potentially moving the play structure, and anything else in the outdoor space. Fast forward to 2017.... Bashaw's new school is completed! And with that, the committees plans for Outdoor Classrooms were included in that. Next came Seacans for storage, and then another pause... no more work until ANOTHER new playground component was installed as part of the new School build.

Finally, here we are today. A completed play space, with benches, picnic tables, sidewalks, extra rocks to play on, trees for shade, shrubs and flowers to add some beauty and more. Thank you to ALL THE COMMUNITY for supporting this project and to those that put so much love and effort into bringing it to the community! This park is what we could all hope for.

It is a place for ANYONE of ANY AGE in the community to enjoy!


#### HEALTHY AGING ALBERTA

Healthy aging is about more than just maintaining our physical health over time. It is also about our mental and emotional health; our independence and quality of life; and our housing and financial security. It is about our ability to make connections with people, stay engaged in our communities, and feel like valued participants in society.

Healthy aging is about our ability to be resilient in the face of the increased frailty, decreased autonomy, and changing circumstances that are the realities many people face as we grow older. Community-based senior serving organizations across Alberta (including BDSS) support healthy aging through a wide variety of programs and services. BDSS and it's Healthy Aging partners understands and responds to the needs of our communities in ways that no one else can.

Bashaw & District Support Services is proud to partner with Healthy Aging Alberta and our Regional Partners to expand it's current Home Support Program to serve the entire RCMP region. It works with regional communities to ensure services are effective and accessible locally.





Expansion of services include:

- 1) Assisted transportation
- 2) Companion for medical visits, and liaison with families as per client requests
- 3) ) Social Visits (Friendly Visiting)
- 4) Social Outings
- 5) Yard Care Assistance
- 6) System Navigation and Supported Referrals
- 7) Menu Planning and Preparation


These activities are delivered thru our programs of Home Support, Navigation, and Transportation.

#### HOME SUPPORT

The Home Support Program has grown significantly over the past year. This is largely attributed to the supportive partnership with Healthy Aging Alberta. HAA's goal is to genuinely enable older adults to age well in their own communities.

The Home Support Program was provided to 42 clients by 5-6 part-time staff members plus 1 part-time Outreach Worker, (up from 3 part-time staff in 2023). As of Dec. 31, 2024 there were 4 active Home Support staff plus 1 Outreach Worker. In total our Home Support Workers service considerably expanded to provide 1332 hours for the year 2024, (up from 733.25 hours in 2023) and 624 visits, (up from 363 visits in 2023).

Program advertising continued through the monthly Community Connections newsletter, BDSS Staff & Navigator referrals and word of mouth.

#### MEALS ON WHEELS

This program serves those in the community who have difficulty preparing their own meals. Clients are mostly seniors, but may also include those who have suffered accidents or illness and are unable to care of themselves for a period of time.

#### **COMMUNITY NEED**

Meals on Wheels is an essential service. This year, 14 people received meals three times weekly. A total of 1,511 meals were delivered to those who may not have had the ability to take care of all meals themselves.

#### COMMUNITY PARTICIPATION/PARTNERSHIPS

This year we continued to receive help from our dedicated volunteer who has been helping us deliver meals one day a week. She's been a great help to the program since she started in 2023. Our staff and sometimes the summer students did most of the delivery.

A partnership with the Bashaw Meadows also exists as they prepare the nutritious meals that we deliver.

#### **COMMENTS:**

The majority of our Meals on Wheels clients are satisfied and appreciative of the cost and the quality of food they receive. They also appreciate all our delivery drivers for the friendly atmosphere they bring to their doors and the time they spent visiting with them, even if it's just for a minute or two.

# Bashaw Bus Society


The Bashaw bus continues to run in Bashaw every Tuesday, as well as the Camrose trips every other Thursday. Even though the Covid restrictions were lifted up, we continued to practice Covid protocols to protect our riders who are mostly vulnerable seniors.

BDSS staff were busy with bookings, monitoring drivers and making sure that we are meeting the requirements from Alberta Transportation. The Bus was also being utilized through Charter trips, for medical appointments, shopping trips, seniors field trips in partnership with Bashaw Meadows and BYC youth field trips.

#### TRANSPORTATION

This Program has served a lot of seniors in and around the Bashaw Community. It started in 2023 as a federally funded pilot project driving seniors to their medical appointments with no charge. All the clients we served were very grateful for the free services and all of our amazing volunteer drivers. We started with 11 drivers at the beginning of 2023 not including Debbie, Sarah and Sheila. When the funding ended in June of 2024, some of our drivers decided not to drive anymore because of the fuel cost and the wear and tear of their own vehicles. The seven drivers who stayed with us were very accommodating with our senior clients.

The Holliday Hauler joined our transportation fleet in May of 2024. It's been a great help transporting our seniors to their medical appointments. It was officially introduced to the public on November 8<sup>th</sup>, 2024. After the funding ended, we introduced new fee guidelines so we can continue to run this program.

#### ADMINISTRATIVE SERVICES

The administrative services of BDSS include the day-to-day operation of the programs and services including programming, financial records, payroll, accounting and communication tools such as the Community Connections newsletter, website and social media. During 2024 the adopted image, 'Bashaw and Area Community Resource Centre', continued to stengthen. The goal and overall purpose is to represent the collective efforts of all organizations apart of serving the Bashaw & Area population within our facility. Additionally, the administration and program staff provide information and referral services for the whole community, for any area of need or concern.

#### TARGET POPULATION

These services are available to the whole community. Community members see BDSS as a place of support. If they don't know where to go- they go to Bashaw and Area Community Resource Centre. Community members call or drop in for any and all questions or concerns.

#### **COMMUNITY NEED**

Statistics and tracking information indicate that the community has a high need for support services in the areas of mental health, social supports, transportation in and out of town (doctor's appointment and other support options) and one-on-one counseling. The administration staff does their best to provide service or referrals to families and individuals in need. During 2024, 8,947 opportunities arose to assist clients between January and December.

#### **OBJECTIVES**

To create, develop and maintain services that have been identified as needed. The community will be able to communicate with external agencies with accurate and detailed assessments of need. As a rural community, Bashaw will have services equal to those offered by larger centers.

#### **COMMUNITY SUPPORTS**

#### **Engagements:**

Community supports include many services on a walk-in basis. These services include (but are not limited to): assistance with photocopying, faxing, technology supports, general information about the community, assistance to fill out paperwork and forms, as well as assisting community members in finding resources and assisting them to access these resources.

The board and staff of Bashaw District Support Services are committed to building the community. They actively participate in meetings and events to build resources and programs that meet the social needs of all citizens within the community. Partnerships and community involvement, including but not limited to: Bashaw Community Wellness Team, Bashaw Chamber of Commerce, Bashaw Municipal Library, Bashaw Regional Health and Wellness Board, Bashaw Historical Society, Bashaw Adult Learning Council, Bashaw School, Bashaw Meadows, Bashaw RCMP, Alberta Health Services, Bashaw & District Food Bank, Bashaw Bus Society, Bashaw United Church, Healthy Families and Camrose Family Resource Centre.

#### **VOLUNTEER SERVICES**

BDSS encourages, promotes and coordinates volunteer events within the community. Our community flourishes on volunteerism. There is approximately 32 volunteer service organizations in Bashaw.

#### COMMUNITY PARTICIPATION/ PARTNERSHIPS

In our organization, volunteerism is essential to provide many of the services we offer: Meals on Wheels, Santa's Anonymous, Bashaw Food Bank, Bashaw Bus, Roots of Empathy, Preschool, Generations Daycare, Early Literacy Projects, Extended Learning Program, Summer Programs, fundraising events and of course the BDSS Board itself. As a community, we are truly grateful to our Volunteers! We would like to acknowledge members of our wonderful volunteer board, who continue to be strong pillars of support to our staff.

# EMERGENCY SOCIAL SERVICES

BDSS maintained it's role as Emergency Social Services Coordinator, prepared to serve the community in the event of any local or global disaster. In addition to local readiness, our team also serves as call out members for any Provincial Disaster needing manpower in operating Reception and Recovery Centres.

In 2024, we continued to develop our BDSS team by offering training and orientation. We also pursued planning meetings to update response plans.
