Past Commander David Ware:

The Spiritual Cause and Effect of the War to Prevent Southern Independence

European immigrants settled in America in areas suited to their lifestyles and world views. Our ancestors settled in the South because the area provided the best conditions for them to live and raise a family, providing for themselves with the fruits of creation garnered from fertile land and bountiful water. People did this in all regions of the continent. The Northern colonies became entrenched in the doctrine of progress and expansion while the South settled into agriculture and subsistence. These cultures have a set of values and world views that are distinct and pronounced. What we have today is a product of the northern Yankee industrialist/expansionist doctrine pretty much extended into every corner of the nation and being extended into all parts of the Earth as well. The theme runs like this: The idea is to make as much money as possible and spend as little as possible. "As much" and "as little" have no terms or limits. On a micro level the individual is on an endless quest for more, on a macro level, the nation state is on an endless quest for markets and raw materials to exploit in order to sustain the doctrine of the nation's

culture. The nation and the individuals who make it up become parasitic, feeding on fellow citizens of the nation and the world.

In days of yore, our ancestors were those being fed upon. Their culture was mainly one of sustenance, with the goal of providing home and food for the family and community. The North regarded our region as a colonial state to provide it with a source for raw materials for its factories, a market for its manufactured goods and the chief source of the nation's tax revenue to promote the infrastructure needed to expand its doctrine of progress.

In 1860, the Southern states were paying some 80% of the Federal till. This, in itself, would have been an important reason for war on both sides. After the war, the North continued its domination of the South as a colonial dependent but expanded its doctrine of progress in our region, indoctrinating our people to leave their farms, go to cities and towns and take up the mantle of the expansionist/progressive system.

Our land and culture have been pretty much destroyed. Our banks, media, schools, churches, insurance companies, stores and places of employment are all chiefly owned and controlled by Northern interests where propaganda and political correctness take precedence over facts, the community and empirical evidence. Our region provides a far disproportionate share of cannon fodder for expansionist/imperialist wars of aggression fought to placate the banking/warfare/welfare interests that are now ruling this country. Our region has been overrun by Northern hordes who have sold their houses "up North" to buy cheaper houses "down South." Many of these invaders have brought their puritan "holier-than-thou-this-is-how-we do-it-up-North" belief system into the political process bringing us a new wave of carpetbaggers and scalawag's intent on destroying what little is left of our land and culture in the name of the "future." JAMES CITY COUNTY CONFEDERATE GRAVESITES

The largest concentration of Confederate graves in James City County is located at Olive Branch Christian Church. We have already looked at the lives of many of these men and their families. This month, we will look at the life of George Washington Otey. Based on the 1900 census, he was born in August 1830 in James City County. Marriage records indicate that his parents were George W. and Elizabeth Otey. Little is known of his early life until the 1850 census when Washington Otey, age 20; his wife Christiana, age 18; and their one year old son, George were living in the Burnt ordinary section of the county. By 1860, this couple had a total of five children in their household and George was farming.

Like his neighbors, George answered the call at the outbreak of the war. He enlisted in Williamsburg on June 22, 1861 into Company F, Lee Artillery. This unit was originally a part of the 32nd Virginia Infantry, but it was separated and became a part of the 1st Regiment Virginia Infantry on September 12, 1861. William Robertson Garrett of Williamsburg was the captain of this company. Scant records of Otey's service indicate that he was absent, sick in hospital on October 31, 1861, and that he was discharged on February 18, 1862. How or where Otey fared for the balance of the war is unknown. His pension application submitted in 1903 stated that he served for twelve months.

The 1870 census listed George and Christiana Otey with five children again in their household. However, two daughters on the 1860 census were missing and two young sons had been born in 1862 and 1868. Two more sons were born to George and Christiana around 1873 and 1875. Christiana died in the middle of that decade, for on October 28, 1878, George married Savannah Glazebrook, daughter of Joseph and Mary Glazebrook of New Kent County. Savannah was twenty-seven years old at the time of this union and had a daughter born in September 1879. At least two more children were born before Savannah's untimely death.

The James City County Death Record shows that Savannah died on August 22, 1887 as a result of child birth. George then married Georgia Anna Filbates (Philbates) on June 5, 1889. Also of New Kent County, Georgia was the daughter of Edward and Mary Hicks Filbates and was 28 years old at the time of her marriage. George Otey had five more children by his third wife. Though the records are not complete, George had at least fifteen children by his three wives.

George Washington Otey died on November 10, 1908, survived by his third wife. His obituary stated that he was a miller for many years at Piggott's Mill (known later as Fenton's Mill), and that he lived near the mill. His pension application stated that he had resided at Fenton's Mill for seventy- three years. If this is true, George had grown up and lived with his three wives and their children in the same area for all of his life. Georgia Filbates Otey is buried next to her husband and two of their sons and spouses are buried nearby.
