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CONFEDERATE GRAVESITES

Edwin Gilliam Booth was born on February 27, 1839, at "Shenstone," the family farm in Nottoway County, Virginia. His parents were Edwin G. Booth, Sr. and Sally Tanner Jones. His father was a prominent lawyer in Nottoway, and later was elected to the Virginia Legislature. Edwin, the son, attended a Latin school for boys at Charlotte Courthouse run by David Comfort, a Princeton graduate. He earned undergraduate degree at Hampden-Sydney in 1859, and was enrolled during the 1859-1860 term at the University of Virginia to study medicine. However, a typhoid fever intervened. enrolled recovered. he at the University of Pennsylvania, and received his Doctor of Medicine degree there in the spring of 1861.

Returning home, he enlisted as a private in Company E, "The Nottoway Cavalry," 3rd Virginia Cavalry, on May 27, 1862, at Nottoway Courthouse. His brother, Archer J. Booth, enlisted in the same company on July 22, 1862, but was killed in action at Mount Jackson, Virginia on November 22, 1864. Edwin served on the Peninsula during the early months of the war and was at the Battle of Big Bethel. He was detailed as a hospital steward in Richmond for the first three months of 1862. Thereafter, he transferred to the Confederate States Navy and served as an assistant surgeon. He was ordered to Norfolk and served on the gunboat, Beaufort. He was later ordered to report to Admiral Buchanan in Mobile Bay, who assigned him to be the assistant surgeon on the gunboat, Selma, which took an active part in the battle of Mobile Bay in August 1864. When the ship sank during the battle, Dr. Booth, along with the other officers, was taken prisoner and sent to Pensacola, Florida. Dr. Tyrone, a former classmate of Booth's in Philadelphia, now a Federal naval doctor, was instrument in seeing that Booth and the other Confederate officers were treated well while in Pensacola.

Booth was exchanged for a federal officer in Richmond and sent back to Mobile, which was evacuated a few months later. He was paroled several weeks after the surrender and had a difficult time getting back to Nottoway. He finally sailed on a transport from New Orleans with his servant. Not long after this, he went to Europe and met up with a

number of Confederate naval officers. He finally returned to his native county and practiced medicine there. Booth married Clara Haxall Thomson of Jefferson County, West Virginia, on October 17, 1870. They lived at "Shenstone" for the next fifteen years. He became very involved with the Democratic Party during Reconstruction, and served as party chairman in Nottoway for a number of years.

In 1883, Edwin Booth, Sr., bought Carter's Grove in James City County. He died there in 1886, and under the terms of his will, Edwin and Clara Booth and their seven children moved to Carter's Grove in 1887. Governor Lee appointed Dr. Booth to the Board of Visitors for the College of William and Mary in 1886, and he served in that capacity until 1906. The Booths were known for their gracious entertaining "in the old Virginia style" at "the Grove," and had many friends throughout eastern Virginia. They sold Carter's Grove in 1906 to Percival T. Bisland, stored much of their furniture at the Wythe House on Palace Green, and returned to Nottoway. After living in a boarding house there for several years, they returned to live at the Wythe House in Williamsburg. Edwin Gilliam Booth, Jr., died there on January 5, 1922. His funeral was held at Bruton Parish Church, and at the request of the family, the Magruder-Ewell Camp, Confederate Veterans, attended in a body. Burial followed in Cedar Grove Cemetery. His wife, who died on August 25, 1925, is interred there with him, as well as one of their daughters.
