



Virginia Ramming *Cumberland*



On March 8, 1862, the C.S. Ironclad Virginia rammed the U.S.S. Cumberland in her starboard side. The only gun on the Virginia that could be brought to bear as she attacked and rammed was the bow gun. Those are the two major items of erroneous artistic license taken in the design on the postcard. There are others. It is still a great tidbit of history. This postcard was sent to Hal Hardaway's grandmother in 1907.

Confederate Gravesites

For the last two months, this column has been devoted to Richardson men from James City County who served in the Confederate army. There are more. John C. Richardson, born about 1798, owned land that adjoined "Alabama," the Whitaker farm at the northwest corner of present day Croaker and Ware Creek Roads. He had at least two sons and four daughters.

Eldridge A. Richardson was born about 1835. In 1850, he was a fifteen-year-old youth living on his father's farm. In 1860, now twenty-five years old, Eldrige was a merchant living in James City County in the household of William Deal who was in the oystering business. Eldridge did own personal property at this time.

Eldridge Richardson enrolled at Burnt Ordinary in Company H, 32nd Virginia Infantry, on May 16, 1861, and mustered in, in Williamsburg. He was present on their rolls through August of that year and, after that, he was present on all rolls of the James City Artillery through December 1864. He deserted and entered Federal lines at Yorktown and took the oath on January 20, 1865. He was described as 5 feet, 10 ³/₄ inches tall, dark complexion, black hair, hazel eyes, and a resident of James City County at that time.

By 1870, Eldridge Richardson had married Martha (maiden name unknown) and his occupation was listed as "waterman." In 1880, this couple was still living in the Stonehouse district of James City County. They had four daughters and one son by this time, and Eldridge was now listed as a "sailor." Ultimately, Eldridge and Martha had twelve children with only five surviving in 1900. Eldrige died sometime between the 1880 and 1900 censuses. Martha Richardson and three of their daughters were living in Newport News in 1900. Eldridge's burial place is another mystery.

Eldridge Richardson's younger brother, Harman E. Richardson, was born about 1840 and was listed in his father, John C. Richardson's household in 1850 and 1860. He enrolled at Burnt Ordinary and mustered into Company H, 32nd Virginia Infantry, as a private, in Williamsburg on May 16, 1861. He was present on the July and August rolls. He remained with this company and became its bugler when it transferred to become the James City Artillery in the fall of 1861. He was present on all rolls through October 1863. He transferred to Young's Battery (Company C) on December 26, 1863.

Harman Richardson was taken prisoner on June 15, 1864, at Petersburg, Virginia, and he was sent to Elmira, New York on July 28th. He died as a prisoner of war on November 26, 1864, of typhoid pneumonia and was buried in grave #567, section 9, Woodlawn Cemetery, Elmira, New York.

Over the years we have written about other Richardson men who stepped forward for the Confederate cause. And several Richardson women married men who served. Among these men, there were the Lawson, Pitts and Moore veterans which we have chronicled earlier. All of our Gravesite articles are archived on our website going back to 2008.

Bill Harrison grew up exploring the woods and waterways of Hampton Roads. While enrolled in Newport News High School, he played football and wrote a winning essay that entitled him to a six-week trip to the Scandinavian countries and also another trip to the New York World's Fair in 1939. After graduating in 1941, Bill entered The College of William and Mary. When World War II began, he transferred to Duke University to enroll in the Navy College Training Program and was commissioned a 2nd Lieutenant in the U.S. Marine Corp. He served honorably in both World War II and the Korean Conflict, returned to William and Mary, and completed his degree in Political Science.

Bill Harrison married Betty Nicholson in 1950, and they lived in Blacksburg, Virginia while Bill earned a degree in Mechanical Engineering from Virginia Tech. They moved first to Richmond, where Bill began his career with Seaboard Air Line Railroad, and then to Jacksonville, Florida where they remained for 35 years until his retirement. Bill was instrumental in developing the first environmental program for CSX railroad.

Bill was a longtime avid sailor. After retirement, Bill and Betty moved to a home on the Chickahominy River with their sailboat, the *Sanderling*, docked at water's edge, ready to enjoy sunsets on the local waterways. Bill became a charter member (November 18, 2005) of our James City Cavalry Camp, Sons of Confederate Veterans. He had the special distinction of being a *real* Confederate grandson, meaning that he was the first son of the first son of a soldier who actually served in the Confederate Army! Considering that the war ended 158 years ago, this is remarkable.

Bill's grandfather, Thomas Randolph Harrison, the oldest son of William Mortimer Harrison and his wife, Caroline Rivers Lambert, was born in Richmond on January 10, 1842. He was a student at The College of William and Mary from 1858 to 1860. At Yorktown, on July 14, 1861, he enlisted as a private in the 2nd Company, Richmond Howitzers. This company became Company K, 1st Regiment, Virginia Artillery. On October 3, 1862, Harrison transferred as a private to Company F, 18th Virginia Infantry. From then through December 1864, he served as a courier at General Pickett's headquarters.

After the war, Thomas Harrison settled into farming in Charles City County. On June 20, 1885, he married Gertrude R. Strachan and they had two children, Emily Randolph, born in 1889, and William Mortimer born in 1892 (Bill's father). Thomas Harrison died in 1920, and was interred at Westover Church in Charles City County.

We are thankful that our camp could share the life of this remarkable man, Bill Harrison. We extend our sincere sympathy to Bill's wife, Betty, and to his daughter and son-in-law, Susan and Darr Barshis. It has been a great privilege to know a *Real Confederate Grandson*!






Oakwood Restoration Funding


Oakwood Cemetery was created early in the WBTS to accommodate the dead from the battles around Richmond including Seven Pines, Mechanicsville, Gaines' Mill, Savage's Station, White Oak Swamp, Frayser's Farm (Glendale) and Malvern Hill. Following September 1, 1862, most of the dead would come from Chimborazo and the other hospitals on the eastern side of Richmond. Some 16,128 Confederate dead are interred at Costs of landscaping alone are Oakwood. daunting and a plea was sent out by the Oakwood SCV Committee to help with a shortfall of some \$18,000. After our September meeting we sent a check for \$630 of which \$400 was from the Cavalry treasury. Additionally, some \$700 has been forwarded by other Cavalry members. Thanks to all of you for your quick response to this need.



"Sword over Richmond: An Eyewitness History of McClellan's Peninsula Campaign" by Richard Wheeler




Lee's Last Campaign" By Clifford Dowdey
