"Forts Huger & Boykin"



This month our program deals with two Confederate forts that are geographically close to us. Namely, Fort Huger and Fort Boykin on the Southside of the James River. Our two expert speakers are from the Isle of Wight County Museum in Smithfield. One of the presenters has noted: "Be forewarned and advised that this history lesson will be narrated mainly from the Union perspective. Update on Powder Magazine Remains

I received an email from Dr. Eric Schweickart of the Colonial Williamsburg Department of Archaeology with an update. As you recall, DNA was extracted from 4 sets of remains in early March, 2024. The samples were drawn from the bone mass behind the ear. These samples were sent to the University of Connecticut Ancient DNA Laboratory. Eric advised in his August 6th email that they have four 'good' DNA samples. The lab now has to determine how complete each DNA chain is and if the sample allows them to begin the process of a search for a familial match. Of the 16 presumed most viable candidates only 5 of them are over 24 and offer a high probability of having any children. We are really hoping that each of the candidates had 8-10 brothers and sisters and that the next two generations continued to have large families. It increases our odds. The Archaeology Team will have an update meeting in a few months. Stay tuned to the Picket Lines for updates. Dr. Schweickart will be also presenting the program that he gave the Cavalry this past February in early 2025 to the Williamsburg Civil War Roundtable. The 2025 talk will be updated with everything they have learned in the past year.

Confederate Gravesites

A service record located for Chidley Wade indicates that he was a private in Company B, 115th Virginia Militia, during the Civil War. The local militia units were occasionally called out, and this may have been the case for Wade's brief participation in the Peninsula Campaign. As stated in the August issue of *Picket Lines*, he seems to have picked up his rifle and followed the troops toward the battle at Bethel in June 1861. The diary [in 1862] stated that he got cut off from the army. Undoubtedly, he may have again gotten caught up in the heat of the moment and marched up the peninsula with the army, or he may have been ordered out to serve with the militia.

Continuing here from Sarah Eliza Wade's diary, "The prisoners were carried out and put in an old bush tent (about thirty of them), some Negroes also. They could hardly all of them stand. Some of the prisoners complained about the Negroes being in there with them. The Negroes were then taken out but the white men made to stay until morning. They were then taken out and marched to Yorktown. They were put in a room and a guard placed over them. The food given them was coarse, but there was a plenty of it. They were kept in Yorktown several days when they were marched out again to Clarke's farm. They thought they were to be sent away this time, but luckily they were not. They were carried back to Yorktown where they were taken out to work and dig up torpedoes, according to McClellan's famous order to 'make the prisoners dig them up at their own peril.' Pa told the lieutenant that he would not do it. The lieutenant told him he would get another officer and make him do it. So he went and got another officer and marched Pa out to dig up torpedoes. After they carried him out he would not find a single torpedo. The officers had to find them and take the caps off before he would dig at all. He dug up four and they carried him back to prison. Some of the prisoners at length protested against being put to work, as it was against the rules of war and the officers stopped putting them to work.

Just a day or two before he [Pa] came home, some of the Yankees heard that he had gotten home, and that he intended to shoot the first one of them who interfered here (Negroes' news, I suppose), so a party of scoundrels took their guns and said they intended to come here and take him out of the house and kill him. This was heard at one of the neighbor's houses who got a Yankee lieutenant who was boarding there to come and prevent it if possible. He buckled on his sword and strutted over to see what was the matter. He found Pa was not at home, and after resting himself and abusing our soldiers, he departed. Luckily, the soldiers did not find the place or I suppose we would have had quite a sanguinary contest. They took the wrong road!

In a few days Pa was paroled and allowed to return to his family once more. Oh! How delighted we were to see him once more. In a little while most of the citizens, who were not in the army, returned to their homes, much to the joys of their families.

We were soon restored to quiet again. Most of the Negroes left their masters and went to Fortress Monroe. But we were not allowed to remain long in peace – the Yankees, not satisfied with taking from the citizens their Negroes and almost every means of subsistence, were keeping them in a continual state of uneasiness and anxiety about the safety of their persons and their lives. They were constantly arresting the people, searching their homes and taking away all the arms and means of defense which they had. The Negroes went armed, and backed by the Yankee soldiers, might plunder with impunity, and these were our constant fears by day and night."

As the spring of 1862 turned to summer, deprivation became the norm for the peninsula residents. This will be further documented in the October edition of the *Picket Lines*.

Matthew's Gun Carriage

In 1850 President Zachery Taylor gave 4 cannon to V.M.I. They were named Matthew, Mark, Luke and John. As a group they were known as "The Four Apostles." V.M.I. cadets were trained in artillery tactics and principles on these four guns by Professor T. J. Jackson. With the outbreak of the WBTS these four guns formed Capt. Pendleton's Company of the Rockbridge Artillery.










"The Civil War on the Virginia Peninsula" by John V. Quarstein
