## **September Guest Speaker**

J. Michael Moore

**Curator for Lee Hall** Mansion and **Historic Endview** 

"Siege of the Warwick-Yorktown Line"



In March 1862, the Union Army of the Potomac arrived at Fort Monroe and Camp Butler for the much-anticipated advance up the Virginia Peninsula to the Confederate capital at Richmond. The Confederate Army of the Peninsula under Major General John B. Magruder blocked their advance with a twelve-mile line of fortifications that altered the course of the Civil War. Please join Historian J. Michael Moore for a lively discussion covering the civilians, commanders, and soldiers who participated in the Siege of the Warwick-Yorktown line.

J. Michael Moore is employed by the City of Newport News and serves as curator for Lee Hall Mansion and Historic Endview. Moore received a bachelor of arts in history from Christopher Newport University and a master of arts in history from Old Dominion University. During his tenure with the City, he has curated exhibits at several local historic sites, developed historic signage, and led battlefield tours in Maryland, North Carolina, Virginia, and West Virginia. Working with the Virginia Department of Historic Resources, he has placed Causey's Mill, Endview Plantation, Lee's Mill, and Whitaker's Mill on the National Register of Historic Places. In addition, Michael is a popular lecturer for CNU's LifeLong Learning Society. Moore has co-authored two books - The Peninsula Campaign of 1862: A Military Analysis in 2005 and Yorktown's Civil War Siege: Drums Along the Warwick in 2012. In addition, he has served as the editor and photographic editor for twelve books and written articles for Virginia Cavalcade, North & South, Military Collector & Historian, and Mulberry Island Notes. In recognition of his work in public history, the Governor of Kentucky commissioned Moore a Kentucky Colonel in 2014. He is a Newport News native and resides in Historic Yorktown.




## **Confederate Gravesites**

Robert Benskin Richardson was born on December 15, 1831, in James City County. He was the second son of Henry Benskin Marshall Richardson and his wife Eliza Taylor Withers. The Richardsons owned Cloverdale, a large farm located on the south side of Ware Creek Road. Robert graduated from medical school, and by 1860, he was listed in the census as a physician living at Cloverdale with his mother and several siblings.

The James City Artillery was originally raised as Company H, 32<sup>nd</sup> Virginia Infantry in Williamsburg on May 16, 1861. Dr. Richardson enlisted in this company on the day that it was formed. Company H was incorporated into the 1<sup>st</sup> Virginia Artillery in September 1861. He was present on all rolls until November and December 1861, when he was absent on leave to go home. He was promoted to 1<sup>st</sup> Sergeant on May 12, 1862, and to Assistant Surgeon on June 4, 1862.




By October 1863, he had transferred to the 10<sup>th</sup> Battalion, Virginia Heavy Artillery. Numerous supply requests have been found for fodder, grain and hay for his one horse after this transfer. Much of his time was spent at Chaffin's farm near Richmond. For much of 1864, he was in charge of the 10th Virginia Artillery hospital and requested supplies for the hospital throughout his time there. He was appointed Senior Surgeon on February 10, 1865.


Sometime after the end of the war, Dr. Richardson moved to Allensville, Todd County, Kentucky where he was listed as a physician in the 1870 census. He returned to James City County long enough to marry Harriett Hankins, one of the daughters of George and Mary Hankins, on March 11, 1873. Dr. and Mrs. Richardson were listed as residents of Allensville, Kentucky in the 1880 census. However, the Richardsons did return to Virginia before Dr. Richardson's death for his obituary stated that he died at Marlbrook in James City County, the Hankins family home, adjacent to Hickory Neck Church. He was buried in the Hankins family cemetery at Marlbrook.

When a portion of the farmland was purchased for the Stonehouse Elementary School, the family cemetery was located on that tract. In 1998, the family graves were moved to the Christian Services Cemetery, a part of Marlbrook that adjoined the Hickory Neck Church land. This five-acre parcel was later donated to Hickory Neck, and the Hankins/Richardson graves are now considered to be in the church graveyard.






