All members of the 18th, 7th and 37th N. Carolina were in Branch's Brigade at Hanover C. H. The wounded POWs were evacuated by water to Yorktown and either died enroute or died in the Yorktown hospitals. The 13th N. Carolina was in Colston's Brigade in the Yorktown defenses & Private Gordon was left behind in the withdrawal. Private Brett cannot be found, probably a spelling problem, but it appears likely he was also in Branch's Brigade.
