

February Guest Speaker

Duff Porter III Naval Historian

"Gosport Shipyard -Up to 1862"



Mr. Porter will discuss the Gosport Shipyard from its beginning to include period ordnance. Central to his discussion will be the conversion of the USS Merrimack to CSS Virginia and the battle of Hampton Roads, March 8-9 1862.

Duff Porter III was born in Portsmouth, Va. during WWII and educated in Portsmouth Schools. A graduate of Norfolk Naval Shipyard Apprentice School, Duff developed an early interest in ships, and began a lifelong study of RMS Titanic. He is a self taught WW2 historian and lectures about shipbuilding in the USA during that war. Duff retired from NNSY in 1999 where he was both the official and an official Command Historian. He is married to Anne Bowen, also from Portsmouth, and the couple have two children.

CIVILIAN GLIMPSES OF THE WAR YEARS

In addition to numerous letters written by soldiers to the families back home, we also have access to letters and diaries written and maintained by civilians that shed light on life on the Peninsula during the war. John T. Martin (1809-1881), a James City County native, opened a school on Forge Road and boarded with the Beal family. The family has often said that, "He came in the house, hung up his hat and never left." He did, in fact, marry their daughter Sarah in 1836 and eventually took ownership of their farm. His house still stands today on Forge Road about a quarter mile west of the fire station. He maintained a farm journal from 1845 until his death in 1881. The original journal is now at the Library of Virginia. The following are excerpts from this journal:

Nov. 11, 1861 – The Southern ports are being blockaded by the Lincoln Government, it could not be forgotten. There is a Civil War now raging between the Free and the Slave States of this Country. It began about the 18th of April last and some great battles have been fought in all of which the South has been victorious. Coffee is now selling for 56 cents a pound, Salt \$12 a sack and sugar 15 to 25 cents a pound. Bacon from 20 to 24 cents per lb., Molasses 75 cents per gallon.

Feb. 28, 1862 – Fast day by Proclamation of the President of the Confederate States.

March 8, 1862 – We have a large army concentrating about Yorktown and are expecting a great battle any day.

May 5, 1862 - A rainy day and memorable on account of it being the day the battle was fought in Williamsburg in which several thousand of the

Southern troops encamped on the front part of my farm and in others [fields].

May 6, 1862 - A fine day and also a large number of troops encamped for the night in the same location killing our cattle, hogs and fowl.

May 8, 1862 – The Federal or Northern Army made their appearance in the neighborhood on their way to Richmond burning the roads, the woods, and the fences, stealing horses, breaking up furniture and running off many of the slaves. Great disturbance and ruin pervades the county.

Aug. 5, 1862 - ...We are now invaded by an unfeeling foe, perhaps one hundred cavalry horses are turned in my field of clover daily. My fruit trees pulled down and destroyed by the vile creatures!!

Aug. 17,1862 – The Yankees here in great numbers on their retreat from James River doing much damage to the citizens running of Negroes, stealing mules and horses, corn, oats, hogs, fowl, fruit and meal, and almost everything else.

Aug. 21, 1862 – The last of the Yankee pickets left here today.

Sept. 8, 1862 - ...About 350 of our cavalry went down to Williamsburg this morning. Killed and captured more than 100 Yankees and drove the balance some miles below the city. We lost 2 men, killed, 4-5 wounded and 4 taken prisoner. Gov. Campbell and a number of other officers were among the prisoners taken by us.






