

Carson Hudson Williamsburg Historian

"Stories of Williamsburg during the WBTS"

Along with the Army of Tennessee order regarding horses that were unfit for duty we have donated 8 significant items to the Swem historical archive in 2020.



Camp 2095 Donates Fund to Save Williamsburg Battlefield

"THE RAVINE"


Twenty-nine (29) acres of key Williamsburg battlefield land can be saved. The bloodiest action of the battle took place in and around the ravine on May 5, 1862. The tract of land, as indicated on the map, has been optioned for purchase by the American Battlefield Trust.

The parcel will cost \$2,743,000. Grants through the A.B.T. have provided a \$220 to \$1 match. That means interested local parties only have to raise \$12,500 to save this key land for posterity.

Adjutant Parsons is forwarding a check to the A.B.T. that includes a \$250 donation from our Camp plus \$765 in cash donations that individual camp members submitted with their dues. Other camp members have contributed \$620 direct on the A.B.T. website. **This is a total Camp contribution of \$1,635** or over 13% of the total. This equals \$359,700 with the matching funds. A great start!

Other donations are coming in. Ken will send a second check later in the year.

A family group of a mother and her two sons, living in Williamsburg, were enumerated in the 1850 census. Mary A. Bowry, age 38, was a warden at the Eastern Lunatic Asylum, and her husband, Robert B. Bowry, seems to have died before the census was taken. Their older son, Robert B. Bowry [Jr.] was born about 1839/1840, and their younger son, Bushrod Washington Bowry was born on September 30, 1844. Little is known of Robert's early life. However, a catalog for the Williamsburg Military School for 1853 has survived and it listed Bushrod Bowry among the local students enrolled. "This school had a primary department, and middle department, extending over a period of four years. The cadets wore a blue uniform with a cap on which were the letters W.M.S." (Virginia Gazette. June 10, 1899). It should be noted here that Bushrod Bowry was the person who had the catalog and supplied it to the newspaper for the article to be written.

In 1860, the two brothers were living together in Williamsburg, and Robert's occupation was listed as a mechanic. Robert Bowry enlisted as a private in Company C, (Williamsburg Junior Guard), 32nd Virginia Infantry, in Williamsburg, on April 28, 1861. He was promoted to 2nd Corporal, and he transferred to Cosnahan's Battery, (James City Artillery), on May 12, 1862. He was wounded in action on July 2nd and was hospitalized in General Hospital #21, Richmond, during the Seven Days Campaign. He was present on all rolls through June 30, 1863, and was furloughed on August 31, 1863. He was sick in October but was present on the remaining rolls through December 1864. He had extensive hospital stays throughout the war which may account for no further service.

Robert Bowry's life after the war is sketchy. He was paid for work on the Main Building at the College of William and Mary in 1867. He was not found in the 1870 census, but he did appear in Williamsburg in 1880, and was listed as a forty-one year old carpenter. He was married to Lucinda, a thirty year old retail grocer, and Robert's two year old step son, John Laws, was living with them. So far, no further record has been found for Robert Bowry. He does not appear in the 1900 census and may have died prior to that time. His final resting place remains a mystery.

Bushrod Bowry followed in his brother's footsteps. He, too, enlisted as a private in Company C, 32nd Virginia Infantry, on April 28, 1861, and transferred to the James City Artillery on June 25, 1862. He was discharged on July 31, 1862, by reason of expiration of term of service. The next item in his service records indicates that on April 1, 1864, he enlisted in Company A, 38th Battalion, Virginia Light Artillery. He was in the hospital several times in Richmond over the next few months, but he was present on the rosters from November 1864, through February 1865, where his records end. However, he was paroled at Burkeville, Virginia, between April 14 - 17, 1865, and probably returned to Williamsburg soon after that.

In 1870, Bushrod Bowry was living by himself in Williamsburg serving as a warden at the asylum. Around 1875, he became the owner of the City Hotel which was located on part of the present day site of Chowing's Tavern. This large, two story building with a dome faced the Court House Green. Bushrod married Imogene Lively, daughter of Charles and Jane E. Lively of Williamsburg. They, and two sons, Charles B. born in 1874, and James Leonard, born in 1879, were living on Duke of Gloucester Street in 1880, and Bushrod was listed as a landlord. Moses R. Harrell, Jr., sheriff, was among his tenants (Picket Lines, January 2012). Eventually, a daughter, Imogene Lively Bowry, born in 1884, completed the family.

By 1900, Bushrod Bowry had sold the hotel and was working as an attendant at the asylum. He and two of his children were living on Ireland Street. By 1910, he was living on College Landing Road (present day South Henry Street), and he was listed as a night watchman at the asylum.

Bushrod W. Bowry died on December 13, 1913. Cemetery records confirm that he is buried at Cedar Grove Cemetery in an unmarked grave.
