During the summer of 1864. Richmond and Petersburg were under siege by the Army of the Potomac. In an effort to break the siege, the 48th Pennsylvania, composed of mostly miners, proposed to dig a mine under the Confederate defenses. Work was completed by 23 July, despite minimal support from senior leaders. The explosion occurred on the 30th with 8000 lbs. of black powder. It was a monumental explosion, causing great destruction and disorientation in the Confederate lines, but the infantry assault was delayed, and the Crater became a death trap for the Union troops.

Compatriot Watkins was born in Richmond and raised on a farm in western Hanover County. He received his bachelor's degree in history and political science from Virginia Commonwealth University. He then spent tours with the U.S. Navy and Reserve as well as retiring from the U.S. Army Reserve, served in various police departments, and served as an interpretive park ranger and historic weapons supervisor. Currently, he reenacts as the Captain of Company C, 12th Virginia Infantry. He is married to the former Elizabeth Lynn Barnes of Roanoke (Big Lick), Virginia; and they have two grown children, two grown step-children, and two stepgrandchildren.

Commander's Comments

I just finished reading *Hidden Figures*. This book is a history of women scientists, engineers and computers at Langley from 1948 through the Apollo space program. The term 'computer' refers to human (female) mathematicians. Many of the 'computers' went on to earn scientific and engineering degrees while at Langley. Our own Jean Clark Keating (FOC) was part of the program and one of those female scientists. From pages 159 and 160 I provide the following quote.

"In 1959, six of Langley's female employees — Lucille Coltrane, Jean Clark Keating, Katherine Cullie Speegle, Ruth Whitman, Emily Stephens Mueller and Dorothy Lee — assembled around a table in a Langley office to sit for a group photo, their elegant, well-made suits amplifying the confidence in their gaze. "Women Scientists," the photographer labeled the picture, though the particulars of the occasion would be lost to the passage of time. They had rated inclusion in the photograph because of some combination of rank, research contributions, and general esteem in the eyes of their bosses. Five of the six women in the photo working in PARD [Pilotless Aircraft Research Division]." (They worked in rockets and rocket flight)

Dorothy Lee was a 'computer,' she would earn her engineering degree while at Langley, and would go on to do years of research on the principles of aerodynamic heating. All of these women, and many more, are just some of the unseen people (very, very intelligent minds) that created the pathway for success in Mercury, Gemini and Apollo. Long before FOC Jean Keating was a breeder of champion Papillons, she was a scientist employed at Langley helping to drive the success of our space program. I like to think that she took some of those 'computers' (both white and black) under her wing and helped them become engineers and scientists.

Confederate Gravesites

William Brown Thompson Christian was born on February 12, 1836, in Charles City County. His parents were Turner and Susan Marston Christian. The family had moved to Williamsburg before the 1850 census was taken. At that time, Turner Christian was serving as Clerk of Court, but he had died before the 1860 census was taken. William Christian was then living with his mother and two younger sisters. His occupation was listed as "D. M. E. D. Va." He does not appear on the alumni lists for the College of William and Mary, so we are without a clue about his educational background.


William Christian enlisted in Company C, 32nd Virginia Infantry, on April 21, 1861, in Williamsburg as 3rd Sergeant. He was appointed 2nd Sergeant on May 12, 1862, but was reduced to private on December 1st of that year. Christian was absent due to sickness frequently: February 12-March 3, Seminary Hospital, Williamsburg; July 3-17 and September 4-28, General Hospital Number 21, Richmond; all in 1862. He was furloughed on September 27th, November 1st and again on December 22, 1862 through April 1, 1863, where he was at Howard's Grove Hospital suffering from a hernia for much of this time.

He was promoted to hospital steward on April 1, 1863, and assigned to duty in Richmond Hospital Number 10. He was discharged from Company C on August 3, 1863 due to his new assignment. He was described at that time as 5'8", light complexion, light hair, blue eyes, occupation Clerk.

On December 14, 1864, he married Jane Sophia Gilliam (1842-1920) in Richmond. Jane was the daughter of Lt. Colonel James Skelton Gilliam, Company C, 9th Virginia Infantry, and his wife, Catherine Birchett. The Gilliams were from Chesterfield County. William Christian was captured at the hospital in Richmond on April 3, 1865, and paroled there on April 16th or 18th. The records give both dates.

By 1870, William and Jane Christian were living at Bellefonte Township in Nottaway County, Virginia. William was a hotel keeper there and they had three young children. Jane's father was a retail dry goods merchant living very near the Christians. By 1880, the Christians had relocated to Williamsburg and were living on Francis Street. Two more children had joined the household and William's occupation was listed as a laborer.

William Christian died on January 21, 1891. His brief obituary stated that he was the clerk of the Williamsburg City Council at the time of his death and that he had held that position for several years. In her widow's pension application in 1910, Jane Christian stated that he had died of consumption contracted from exposure during the war. William Christian was buried in the graveyard at Bruton Parish Church beside his mother and later, his wife.




Joe Sanderson routs the leaves with a HD leaf blower at Cowles-Spencer. Bring on the heavy artillery!




