\$92.00 was donated to the Camp Treasury for the raffle of the three donations: "Civil War Williamsburg" Carson Hudson, Jr., 1997;



JAMES CITY CAVALRY CAMP CHARGE

PEACH PARK CEMETERY VISITATION

(By the Numbers 2008 thru 2012)

On March 15th, 2008 we had our first visitor to sign and date the guest book at Peach Park Cemetery. There had been ten entries before that person but they were not dated.

All guest register sign-ins will be counted as a family unit. That's because there are solo sign-ins but there are also sign-ins such as the Sims Family or the Lake Pirates or the Colonial Virginia Model A Ford Club (25 members) or the Tuesday Group – various Tidewater Cities and other groups whose numbers are unknown. Exact numbers cannot be determined but with 253 sign-ins plus the above mentioned groups, I would average 3 persons per sign-in. That's around 759 visitors to Peach Park from the time of it's restoration to the end of 2012.

The top five localities of guests signing the register are: Williamsburg (86 families), Toano (23 families), Lanexa (21 families), Newport News (6 families), and Richmond and Croaker (tied at 5 families each).

We had visitors from 32 different localities in Virginia.

Our first recorded out-of-state visitor was from Kalamazoo, Michigan.

Peach Park Visitors have come from 18 different states: Michigan, Georgia, Kentucky, Oklahoma, New York, Texas, Oregon, Indiana, North Carolina, Illinois, Pennsylvania, California, Alabama, Tennessee, Louisiana, West Virginia, Florida, and Virginia.

We have no received any known visitors from the Confederate States of South Carolina, Mississippi, Arkansas, or Missouri.

We got our first international visitors this summer. B. and N. Libby of London, Ontario, Canada stopped



by on August 22nd, 2012.

Our first guests at Peach Park of 2013 came on January 6^{th} .

What an amazing array of people, and the places they came from, to basically an unadvertised site.

Special thanks to Don Woolridge, Mike Garrett, Chris Hockaday, Scott Summerfield, and <u>all</u> others that have helped maintain Peach Park Cemetery, our only cemetery that is open to the public. And from the possitive comments in our guest register, the public has really enjoyed our efforts.

CONFEDERATE REMEMBRANCE DAY

This year, we will be returning to Olive Branch Christian Church (7643 Richmond Road) to hold our annual Confederate Remembrance Day service. We were there in 2010, but we have added a few more veterans to the list of those interred in this church graveyard. There are at least twenty-four veterans resting at Olive Branch. Additionally, there are five more veterans buried in the Hubbard Family Cemetery, located on the knoll to the left of the church driveway. These two burial grounds have the largest number of Confederate veterans interred in close proximity in all of James City County.

Olive Branch Church (Disciples of Christ) was organized in October 1833 at Hill Pleasant farm in present day Norge. A few years after this early beginning, Dr. Charles Miles Hubbard and his wife, Mary Henley Hubbard, donated a portion of their farm (present day Oakland) to the congregation for a church site. Around 1845, the front part of the present structure was completed.

During the Civil War, Union cavalrymen tore out the pews and flooring to be used for firewood, stabled their horses in the sanctuary, and used the gallery as a barracks for themselves. Windows were broken out and the communion silver disappeared. Church services continued through this period at the Farthing farm located on York River Road. In 1866, services were resumed at the church which had been restored. In 1917, the church received \$500 from the federal government in compensation for damages during the war. This money and other funds were used for the first addition to the sanctuary. If you look closely at the outside walls of the church, you can see the break in the brickwork where the addition was joined.

When Mary Henley Hubbard died in 1891, she stipulated in her will that the two acres adjacent to Olive Branch Church, where the

Henley/Hubbard Family Cemetery was located, should be maintained in perpetuity for the use of her descendants. This is still an active burial ground for her family.

This year on Remembrance Day, we honor the Confederate veterans who rest here from their labors:

George Fielding Clopton, Winder George Whiting Farthing, Pinkethman Taylor Garrett, Richard Minor Garrett, George Edward Geddy, George Geddy, William Francis Ward Hammond. Alexander Hamilton Hankins, Southey Savage Hankins, Winfield Scott Hankins, Richard Daniel Hicks (unmarked grave), George W. E. James, Robert Pryor James, Sr., John W. Minor, George George Washington Otey, A. C. (unmarked grave), Benjamin Henry Ratcliffe, George Thomas Ratcliffe, John R. Ratcliffe, George Eaton Richardson, Richard Taylor, William Benjamin Vaiden, Richard Harwood Whitaker, III; and Thomas Wynne.

There are five more veterans buried in the Hubbard Family Cemetery: Peter Trible Cowles, Charles William Miles Hubbard, James Filmer Hubbard, John William Hubbard, and George W. Tyree. Service rank and unit and vital statistics may be found for all of these men on our camp website. With the exception of Charles W. Hubbard. John R. Ratcliffe. and Harwood Whitaker, all of these men survived the war and returned to their homes and families in James City County. Comrades at Comrades at rest.
