"Ten Reasons for Secession -One Reason for War"

Join Les in an introspective look at the choices our ancestors had to make when faced with a hostile federal government determined to eliminate their rights as citizens. Les will explore ten reasons for their making the decision to secede from that government and the one reason which led to war with it.

Les Updike is the 2^{nd} Lt. Cmdr. of the General James Longstreet Camp #1247 in Richmond.

His interest in things Confederate are not tactical or battle related. He prefers to study the underlying social, legal, economic, and religious issues involved. Tonight's topic is the latest of 8 subjects on which he has made presentations to various SCV and UDC groups.

Les is most noted in SCV circles as the author of his poem "Tis For You, Dear Sir!" which he often recites at Confederate Grave Marker dedication ceremonies, and other appropriate occasions. Les is a U.S. Navy veteran and a retired electronic technician from AT&T with 38 years' service.

R. E. Lee A Biography by Douglas Southall Freeman, Volume IV Chapter XII – Two Decisions

"One day," it has been recorded by Colonel Clement Sullivane, aide to Custis Lee, "all visitors were turned away, generals and statesmen, high and low alike, with the statement that General Lee had such an arrearage of correspondence that he must dispatch it, and he had given instructions during the day to excuse him to all visitors. I was seated at a window in the parlor only a few feet from the door; and as the windows and doors were all open, I could see and hear all that passed. By and by a tall, ragged Confederate soldier, with his left arm in a sling, came up the steps and was met at the door by Custis Lee. He asked to see General Lee. 'I am sorry,' replied Custis, giving him the familiar explanation. The soldier hesitated a moment and then said that he belonged to Hood's Texas brigade, that he had followed General Lee for four years, that he was about to set off and walk to Texas, and he had hoped before he left to shake his old commander by the hand and bid him good-bye; but if he couldn't, he couldn't, and it could not be helped, and with this he turned away and went down the steps. Custis Lee hesitated a few moments and then called to the soldier to come back, that possibly General Lee would make an exception in his case, and he would see. So he ushered him into the parlor and went off upstairs. I offered the old soldier a seat and entered into a friendly conversation with him about his Presently I heard the stately step of General Robert E. Lee, descending the stairway. As we both arose on his entrance into the room, he bowed gravely to me and then advanced to the Texan, with his hand extended. The poor fellow grasped it, looked General Lee straight in the eye, struggled to say something, but choked and could not, and, wringing Lee's hand, he dropped it as he burst into tears; then covering his face with his arm, he turned away and walked out of the room and the house. General Lee gazed after him for a few moments with emotion, and then, again gravely bowing to me, he left the room and returned upstairs. Not a single word was spoken during the meeting by any of the three participants. . ."

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CONFEDERATE ANGESTOR

Bridget M. Grimes was born in 1849 in Roundstone, County Galway, on the west coast of She was the youngest daughter of Mortimer Grimes and Barbara Grimes (King). In 1860 her mother, Barbara Grimes and sister Elizabeth were servants living with the Royster family of the Royster & Brothers Tobacco Company. Barbara and three daughter immigrated sometime during the 1850s. The family lived in a residence on 7th and Cary Street in downtown Richmond.

At age 14 Bridget, along with many other young girls and young boys, was employed in Department # 6 of the Confederate States Laboratory on Brown's Island. The laboratory was responsible for the manufacture of both breech-loading and pistol ammunition. The facility was located on the island, in the James River, for safety reasons.

On March 13, 1863 a huge explosion tore half of the 100' long building down. "Operatives were killed, wounded, thrown into the air or upon the A huge fire engulfed the scene. initial death toll was 31 women and 2 men with an additional 25 women and 5 men wounded. Many of the wounded were badly burned. Richmond Enquirer noted that "some of the unfortunate girls were burnt from head to foot, others were burned in the face and eyes; some had an arm or leg divested of flesh and skin, others were bleeding with wounds received from the falling timbers and violent concussions . . ." The dreadfully burned, including Bridget, were taken to General Hospital #2 on the corner of Cary and 7th streets.

Bridget died on March 23rd after eleven days of suffering. Her obituary in the *Richmond Dispatch* recorded that, "Bridget M. Grimes died on Monday the 23rd, at Hospital #2 of burns received at the explosion of the Laboratory,

Bridget M. daughter of Mrs. Barbara Grimes in her 14th year.

In the death of this young girl, her circles of friends have lost a bright ornament. She was gifted with beauty of body and mind and possessed of a loving disposition, which won her the devotion of an immense number of friends. During the eleven long days of her excruciating suffering her priest and doctor were untiring in attention. She died in implicit faith in the Holy Catholic Church. Her friends and the family are invited to attend her funeral this (Tuesday) afternoon, at 3 o'clock from her mother's residence on Cary near 7th street."

Bridget is buried in the same unmarked grave with her mother, Barbara, who passed in 1877, at Mount Calvary cemetery in Richmond. Bridget's tragic death has yet to be recognized by those that have memorialized the other young victims of this tragic event. After 150 years, Bridget and her sacrifice to the cause will no longer be forgotten.




"The Official Military Atlas of the Civil War" Maj. George Davis, U.S. Army, 1983, New York, hard cover/large format, 300 pages
