

April Guest Speaker

Michael Block

"Lee and Jackson before Cedar Mountain"



Although McClellan had been forced away from Richmond by July 4, 1862, a new threat from Pope's 40,000 man Army of Virginia was preparing to strike south. Lee once again unleashed Stonewall Jackson to protect the rail junction at Gordonsville, gateway to the Valley and the breadbasket for Virginia. The resulting action would be the Battle of Cedar Mountain. For Lee, commander of his army for just over a month, was facing two Federal armies, national level policy decisions and internal army infighting. Today we know the result, but how Lee maneuvered his forces and politics in July 1862 is the focus of Mike's presentation.

A life-long student of the War Between the States, Mike has been leading battlefield tours and lecturing for over two decades, focusing on events in Culpeper and Fauquier Counties. He is a past board member of the Friends of Cedar Mountain Battlefield and served on the Culpeper and Fauquier Counties Civil War Sesquicentennial Committees. He continues to volunteer for the Cedar Mountain and Fredericksburg tours. He authored his first book, "The Carnage was Fearful: The Battle of Cedar Mountain, August 9, 1862" which was published last January. Mike is also a contributor to Blue & Gray, Hallowed Ground and North and South magazines.

On May 1st, we will join the Williamsburg Chapter of the United Daughters of the Confederacy as they rededicate the local monument first dedicated on May 5, 1908, on the Palace Green. Now, after its fifth and hopefully final move, the monument is appropriately positioned at Fort Magruder. On May 6, 1908, the *Virginia Gazette* carried a front page, glowing report of the original festivities. Excerpts follow:

"MONUMENT UNVEILED - TUESDAY'S EVENT a SUCCESS

Amid the boom of cannon, the crash of martial music and the patriotic songs of little children, the monument to the Confederate dead of Williamsburg and James City county was successfully unveiled Tuesday in the presence of the largest assemblage ever seen in Williamsburg on such an occasion. There was not a hitch in the programme which was carried out almost to the letter.

The threatening weather kept many at home who otherwise would have come from a distance, but there was at least a thousand people arrayed around the shaft when the veil was drawn by the children designated. Practically every business place in town was closed during the exercises proper, and as the procession of ladies, school children and veterans marched upon the scene of the unveiling, bells were rung and cheers rended the air. All was enthusiasm and expectancy and the little city bore a holiday appearance.

The visiting veterans, forty survivors of the Fifteenth regiment of Richmond, Delegations from Charles City, York, Warwick, Hampton and Newport News, were met at the trains by the Daughters of the Confederacy, Magruder-Ewell Camp Confederate Veterans and Sons of Veterans with the Williamsburg band which played Dixie and other inspiring airs.

The line of march was formed at the courthouse and it was about eleven o'clock when Hon. John L. Mercer, master of ceremonies, called the assemblage to order and introduced Rev. H. T. Louthan, chaplain of the Sons of Veterans, who involved the Divine blessing in an impressive prayer. Mr. Mercer then introduced Mayor E. W. Warburton who welcomed the visitors on behalf of the Daughters of the Confederacy in a short but appropriate address. After the singing of Dixie by the school children, Miss Emily Hall recited the 'Conquered Banner' with splendid effect.

Then came the first orator of the day, Col. William Lamb, of Norfolk, who made the presentation speech. ... He began his address by reading a letter from a gentleman who was here after the battle of Williamsburg and who cared for the wounded in the impoverished hospitals, buried the dead, and afterwards had the bodies reinterred in Bruton churchyard. The theme of the oration was "Patriotism." In the course of his remarks, the orator declared that wars were necessary to discipline nations to make them strong and keep them from emasculation. Patriotism born of the blood red battlefield was the patriotism that made a nation strong. It was the patriotism born of the love of home, of wife and children, of country. The speaker declared the war of '61-'65 was a war for States Rights, and he was glad to see that the principle was growing stronger as evidenced by the recent supreme court decisions. The speaker paid eloquent tribute to the valor of the Confederate soldiers and to the wives and the daughters for their heroic sacrifices. The address was as chaste as it was eloquent and commanded the closet attention.

The veil was then drawn by Miss Trittie Cowles and Master Henry Moncure amid the boom of cannon and the crash of music. School children, the kindergartners in charge of their teacher, Miss Murphy, captured the hearts of the assemblage, and Misses Davis and Stillwell, with the Model school carrying Confederate flags and wearing the colors assembled around the monument distributing flowers during the unveiling. A salute from 'Old Spotswood' and 'Fitzhugh Lee,' two treasured cannon, gave a martial appearance to the occasion.

Judge D. G. Tyler introduced Capt. John Lamb who was the orator to receive the monument. Capt. Lamb gave a history of and paid tributes to the Peninsula military organizations [James City Heavy Artillery, Williamsburg Junior Guards of the 32nd Virginia Infantry, and the James City Cavalry]. In these he said were enlisted most of the men of Williamsburg and vicinity. They were attached to the 3rd Regiment which was organized by Major John B. Hood, afterward Gen. Hood.

At the close of Capt. Lamb's address, the old veterans crowded around him and Col. Lamb to shake their hands in hearty congratulations. The old veterans were in a happy frame of mind, swapped jokes and had a good time generally.

Tickets to the luncheon given by the Daughters of the Confederacy were then distributed and soon all were busy gratifying their appetites, already sharpening by the bracing spring breezes."

Let us rally in the memory of the first dedication and join in the rededication at Fort Magruder!






Please bring lawn chairs for seating and wear appropriate shoes for walking inside a WBTS fortification.






