March Guest Speaker

Mr. Chris Kolakowski

*“Civil War to
World War: The
MacArthurs and
the Buckners
Douglas”*



Douglas MacArthur and Simon Bolivar Buckner Jr. were prominent players in the Pacific War. Both men were influenced by their fathers - Arthur MacArthur, the "Boy Colonel" of the Union Army and Simon Bolivar Buckner, the last living Confederate lieutenant general. These men, and their roles in victory over Japan, thus became prominent parts of these Civil War veterans' legacies. This talk will discuss these four men, their relationships, and the marks they collectively made.

Christopher L. Kolakowski was born and raised in Fredericksburg, Va. He received his BA in History and Mass Communications from Emory & Henry College, and his MA in Public History from the State University of New York at Albany. Chris has spent his career interpreting and preserving American military history with the National Park Service, New York State government, the Rensselaer County (NY) Historical Society, the Civil War Preservation Trust, Kentucky State Parks, and the U.S. Army. He has published two books with the History Press: *The Civil War at Perryville: Battling For the Bluegrass* and *The Stones River and Tullahoma Campaign: This Army Does Not Retreat*. In September 2016, the U.S. Army published his volume on the 1862 Virginia Campaigns as part of its sesquicentennial series on the Civil War. Chris came to Norfolk having served as Director of the General George Patton Museum and Center of Leadership in Fort Knox, KY from 2009 to 2013. He became the MacArthur Memorial Director on September 16, 2013.

Civilian Glimpses of the War Years

(Contributed by Compatriot Fred Boelt)

We continue here with excerpts from the journals of John T. Martin:

Feb. 7, 1863 - ...The Yankees made a raid up from Williamsburg today and came in contact with some of our infantry and cavalry, who killed several Yankees and took 35 of them prisoners.

Feb. 27, 1863 – A day appointed by the President of the Confederate States for prayer and fasting before the Lord for his guidance in our struggle for independence.

April 2, 1863 - ...My son Enoch T. Martin is 21 years old today. He is now about 3 miles from Petersburg in camp and has not been home since the 5th of last May. He is in good health and weighs 170 lbs.*

April 15, 1863 – I went to Petersburg to see my son Enoch today. A rainy day.

June 14, 1863 – A fine rain this morning but nobody is planting their crops. The slaves are going off and the citizens are being arrested and running off with plunder. Without speedy intervention of Divine Providence, this section of the country will be ruined.

June 24, 1863 - ...Some 8-10 thousand Yankees past [sic] by here today on their way to Richmond to take it by storm. A group of many more passed up here a few days ago.

July 9, 1863 – More Yankees passed here today in retreat from White House to Yorktown. As generals past the house on the road they did do much damage to the citizens.

Aug. 26, 1863 - ...A large number of Yankee cavalry camped at the [Burnt] Ordinary last night.

Nov. 10, 1863 – A large foraging party of Yankees camped at Burnt Ordinary last night and this morning they brought in 3-4 horse wagons and loaded them with some of my best corn taking about 125 bushels, worth \$10 (?) per bushel.

Nov. 15, 1863 – The Yankees moved Mrs. Mary Piggott to Williamsburg**

Feb. 8, 1864 - ...The Yankees burnt up a quantity of fencing on the road in New Kent and James City Counties.

March 5, 1864 – The Yankees under Gen. Killpatrick made a raid through this section of the county taking all the corn and meat from the citizens and burning many houses and much fencing and dragging off cattle and horses. In short, almost ruining the people as they passed on to Williamsburg. They took 40 barrels of corn from me.

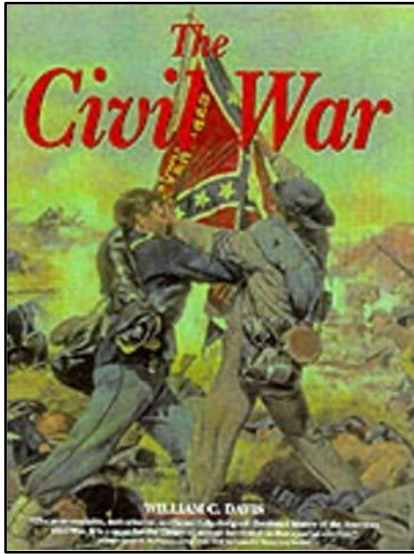
Feb. 10, 1865 – Observed a National Fast to implore the miracles of God.

April 3, 1865 – Richmond, the capitol of Va. and of the Confederate States of America was taken or occupied by the Yankees this morning and a large portion of the city was burnt from an explosion in the magazine. This event has spread gloom and great distress over the country! But no doubt the good hand of Providence will control all things for our ultimate good. May the Lord temper the wind of the shorn lamb.

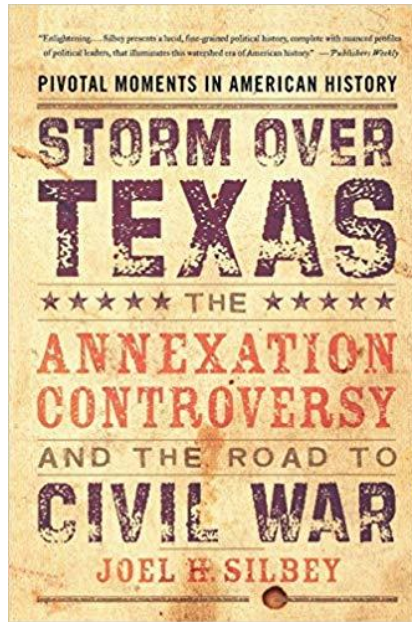
*Enoch Timothy Martin (1842-1920) served in Company B, 1st Virginia Artillery and is one of the veterans that we honor at James City Chapel Cemetery (see *Picket Lines* April 2009).

** Mary Piggott was the second wife of Nathaniel Piggott and sister of Lemuel Bowden, Union sympathizer who lived in Williamsburg. Mrs. Piggott and her daughters had been questioned in Richmond by the Confederates on suspicion of spying for the Union Army. Claiming to feel unsafe at their plantation “Farmville” [present day Norge], they requested to be allowed to move to Williamsburg.

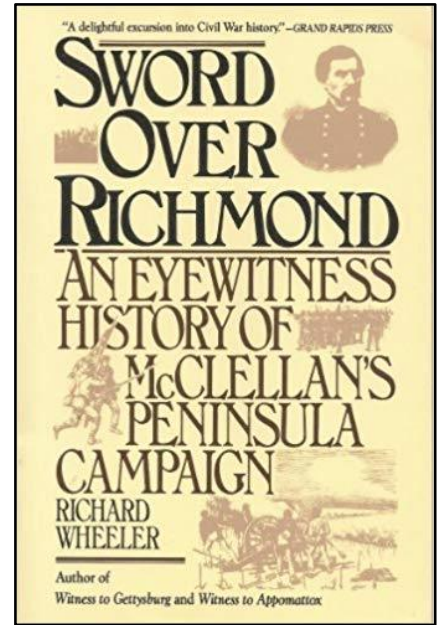

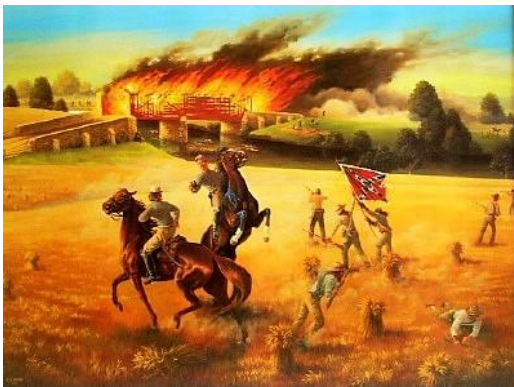
