### **September Guest Speaker**

**Doug Crenshaw** President of the **Richmond Civil War** Roundtable

"The Battle of Glendale -Lee's Lost Opportunity "



It is our pleasure to be joined by Doug Crenshaw who will recount stories from his book about the battle of Glendale / Frayser's Farm. On June 30, 1862, Confederate forces under Robert E. Lee had an opportunity to deal a crushing blow to George McClellan's Union forces as they retreated toward the James River. Doug will give us a blow by blow account of the battle and the lost opportunity to cripple the rear portion of the Union army.

Doug studied history at Randolph-Macon and the University of Richmond. He is President of the Richmond Civil War Roundtable, a board member of the Richmond Battlefield Association, a volunteer for the Richmond National Battlefield Park, a tour leader, speaker and author.

### **Confederate Gravesites**

Continuing our saga of the Davis brothers, Joshua A. Davis was born on April 18, 1834, in Williamsburg. About 1858, he married Lauretta Edwina Tilledge, daughter of Coleman R. and Mary A. S. Tilledge of James City County. When the 1860 census was taken, Joshua, a mechanic, his wife, and their first son, Leonard Henley Davis, were living in Williamsburg. A daughter, Mary Jane joined the family in 1861.


Joshua Davis enlisted in Company C, 32<sup>nd</sup> Virginia Infantry, in Williamsburg, on April 28, 1861. The muster roll indicated that he was wounded in action at Malvern Hill, but the hospital records show that he was admitted on June 29, 1862. That would perhaps indicate a wound at Savage Station. He was present on all rolls except he was absent due to wounds July 1 through November 28, 1862, detailed to Fort Clifton May 1, to July 1, 1863, and absent due to sickness July 24 to August 20, 1863, but he had been granted a furlough on August 1<sup>st</sup>.

Joshua Davis transferred to Company B (James City Artillery) on February 20, 1864. He was detailed as a wheelwright and carpenter on March 4<sup>th</sup> and detailed to the Engineer Corps on October 5<sup>th</sup> by Lt. Col. Howard. His service record ended there, but at some point he did return to Williamsburg, and he and Lauretta had another son, William Lee Davis, born in1865. Lauretta Davis died on July 12, 1867, and was buried in Cedar Grove Cemetery.

In 1870, Joshua Davis, his three children, and his mother-in-law were living in Williamsburg and he was listed in the census as a wheelwright. At some time during this decade, he married as his second wife, Laura L. (last name not yet determined). Toward the latter part of the 1870s, the family moved to Portsmouth, Virginia. By 1880, Joshua, his wife, Laura L., and his son William were living on Lincoln Street, and he continued to practice his trade as a wheelwright. Joshua A. Davis died on July 3, 1899, and was buried in Oak Grove Cemetery in Portsmouth, Virginia.
