Personal Pronouns

A pronoun is a word used in place of a noun. A subject pronoun can be the subject of a sentence. *I*, *you*, *he*, *she*, and *it* are subject pronouns. *I* found the ball. *You* found the ball. *He* found the ball. *She* found the ball. *It* is my favourite sport.



An object pronoun can be the object of a sentence. *Me*, *you*, *him*, *her*, and *it* are object pronouns. Matt gave the ball to *me*. Matt gave the ball to *you*. Matt gave the ball to *him*. Matt gave the ball to *her*. Matt threw *it*.

Possessive pronouns show possession. *My, mine, your, yours, his, her, hers,* and *its* are possessive pronouns. Anna gave *my* ball to Matt. Anna gave *mine* to Matt. (includes the word ball)

The plural forms of personal pronouns include:

Subject: we, you, they We/You/They found the ball.

Object: us, you, them Matt gave the ball to us/you/them.

Possessive: our, ours, your, yours, their, theirs

Matt gave our ball/ours/your ball/yours/their ball/theirs to Anna.
