We have identified assets, focused our vision and are developing dreams that will help us know how to move forward. Recently I met with a team of Christian business professionals from the Salem area that stands ready in the near future to assist us in key areas. God is doing some mighty exciting things indeed!

The atmosphere of anticipating God's plan was before the SLTP committee as we drilled down on our future aspirations. Then, news started coming to all of us about a strange type of new flu virus from a far part of our globe...and it spread to our shores in America. Stringent guidelines were placed on residents, families, visitors, vendors and staff. These are difficult to enforce because it restricts the flow of tender face-to-face interactions for all. We find ourselves today in the sixth week of self-isolation, and your prayers are greatly encouraged for safety, wisdom and protection.

As a church-based mission agency, we rely on revenue from outside of TRH. We are a non-profit organization that is sustained by compassionate sacrificial giving. When revenue drops, the most basic needs of our residents suffer. TRH pays for much of the food, water, electricity and repairs to dwellings of residents here. Your former pastor and his wife, Sunday school teacher, missionary, professor from the Christian college you attended...they may be here! You remember them and fondly recall how they gave of themselves so that you and others could grow in your faith and become the men and women you are in Christ today. These servants came to TRH to live out their days. Please don't forget us at TRH. Have your church place us in their missions list for separate financial gifts and continued monthly giving.

When the children of Israel came to the Red Sea, God had a plan. He has a plan for TRH as well. Our STLP has been paused to concentrate on urgent business before us. We hope, Lord willing, to pick up soon where we left off. Those exciting plans for the future are still to come. In the meantime, once the health threat has passed, I would love to come to your church and share the ministry of TRH with your congregation.

Mickey was born on August 4, 1925 in Los Angeles, California to Myrtle & John Henry Fink. After graduating high school, she attended LA City College for pre-nursing. She then moved to Eden, Oklahoma to attend Phillips University and lived with her brother for one year. After that, she moved to Oregon to attend Northwest Christian College and earned a Bachelor of Theology in 1947. Mickey moved to Portland to begin nurses' training, but put that on pause when she married her husband, Charles, in 1949. They moved into full time ministry in Villah, WA where her husband served as a pastor. During that time they had three children. They then moved to Boise, Idaho so Charles could teach at Boise Bible College. After two years, they moved back to San Jose, California and had their fourth child. Mickey eventually graduated from Pepperdine with a teaching degree and taught for 11 years. They also spent 36 years in the Philippines serving as Bible translators. When they retired in 2010, they moved back to California. In 2014, Mickey wrote a book called A Joyful Life In God's Hands. Charles died November 17, 2017, and shortly after, Mickey moved to her current residence at Turner Retirement Homes.

In 1954 he met Donna Sheeks, and they were married on September 18, 1955. Their daughter Shannon was born the next year. The year after that they moved to Richmond, California where Marlowe began work for DAP and retired 36 years later. He had only three careers: On the farm, with the Air Force and then DAP. In 2002, Marlowe and Donna moved to Turner, Oregon and built a home on Cedar Street. Marlowe loved the outdoors and working with his hands. He was a steady, reliable, hard-working man with simple wants.

Lucille Telfer (1938-2020)

Lucille was born to Earl and Maxine (Inman) Sawyer on March 13, 1938 in Tyrone, Missouri and graduated from Houston High School in 1956. She met Raymond A. Telfer in Houston while he was stationed at Fort Leonard Wood, Missouri. She moved to Prineville, Oregon by way of the railroad train in 1957. She and Raymond were married on March 17, 1957. The two moved to Turner, Oregon in 2005. Lucille was a very active member of her church: she was a deaconess, Sunday school teacher and loved helping out in the nursery. She enjoyed helping out with the Oregon Christian Convention and the Food Bank. She spent her last days with family by her side. Pandemic did not catch TRH by surprise

It is no mistake that one of the trustees on the TRH Board is a first responder in our community, our administrator was a former hospital chaplain, and our nursing care coordinator has served our residents for 19 years. For times such as these, our wise God placed the very people in leadership who were prepared for the task and listened to His prompting. Putting first the safety of our most vulnerable residents was (and remains) simply, second nature. "Right steps, right now" was our marching cadence before anyone coined the phrase.

"We have been proactive about the severity of this pandemic sweeping across America from the very beginning," noted Gary Taylor, Administrator, in a recent letter to the TRH community.

Early in the battle, safety protocols were set in place. Taylor quickly established contact with local, state and national health authorities in order to make sound decisions and call for the required changes to be put in place. "That's why my nights were so restless," he remembers about the process. Many emails, phone calls and texts passed among Taylor, Trustee Jon Remy and Assistant Administrator Kendra Flora. Times of prayer in the office, in homes and through church fellowship groups were plentiful.

On March 12, just a day after the Coronavirus was declared to be a pandemic, medical screening was required of all visitors to the Residential Care Facility (RCF) and common grounds, including Independent residents doing business or frequenting the dining hall. All calendar activities, including shopping trips, were canceled.

By March 16, lock-down procedures were put in place to protect our RCF residents. No outside visitors were allowed, and employees/volunteers had to be screened before reporting for duty. In addition, the dining hall was closed, requiring meals to be delivered to rooms. When "30 Days to Slow the Spread" was called for by President Trump and the COVID-19 taskforce of the White House, TRH again responded with additional measures to safeguard residents. As of April 2, only medically screened care staff had access to residents. The TRH administrative office building was closed while staff remained available by phone to coordinate needed services.

Work behaviors and protocols were changing by the day and continue to do so in order to keep our residents safe.

In the midst of it, Misty Struble, Care Coordinator, describes her staff as "fantastic" and goes on to say, "There seem to be changes every day, and they just roll with it—doing the best for themselves, their coworkers and for the residents."

Ruth Wood, RCF resident, is content with her care, even if isolated. "We have good staff that will cover for one another and are very diligent. I am thankful for water and heat and food!"

Shirley Smith, Independent resident, recently called the office to say she's grateful for the directives that have been put in place. As she sees it, "If other places had done the same, they wouldn't be in the trouble they're in!"

Jon Remy, Trustee and Turner Fire Chief as well as a first responder, gives this perspective: "This virus is coming, and it will go. God knows all about this virus...and He is clear with us. We are to fear not. We are treasured, and we will not go home to Heaven until the exact moment that God is ready to receive us."

In the meantime, as the pandemic runs its course, be assured that TRH staff will continue to do our best to take care of all our precious residents. The battle belongs to the Lord, and to Him be the glory!
