Nature Next Door

Quietly concealed between Route 206 and Lake Iliff Road is the hidden gem of Andover -- Kittatinny Valley State Park (KVSP). Since 1994 residents and visitors have been able to enjoy the plethora of outdoor entertainment and activities at this state park facility.

This history of KVSP dates all the way back to the retreat of the Wisconsin Ice Sheet over 17,000 years ago, wherein the glacier's meltwaters filled in a chain of steep-sided kettle ponds in the Kittatinny Valley.

More recent history of the park includes the abandonment of Sussex County's railroads when automobile travel expanded. Progress also led to landowner Frederick Hussey III purchasing 350 acres and constructing an airstrip in 1957. The Hussey family owned Aeroflex Corporation which became named Lake Aeroflex that we know today. Lake Aeroflex is the deepest natural lake in New Jersey, measuring 110 feet deep. New Jersey State Law prohibits swimming in Lake Aeroflex, but fishing is allowed. The lake houses many trout and even salmon stocked by the New Jersey Division of Fish and Wildlife.

When Mr. Hussey and his wife died, the land and buildings were sold to Joseph LoRe, a prominent manufacturer. After his death, LoRe's wife had the property extensively logged for high quality wood. This subsequently left an expansive network of logging trails, which eventually provided the future hiking paths we enjoy today.

In 1994, the Green Acres program of New Jersey
Department of Environmental Protection purchased the 948
acres of land and created KVSP. The NJ Forest Fire Service took
over the operation of Aeroflex Andover Airport. Today, KVSP
encompasses the rights-of-way of three rail-trails (Paulinskill
Valley Trail, Sussex Branch Trail, and Great Valley Rail-Trail),
former Cedar Lake Horse Farm in Blairstown, three lime kilns
in Hamburg, a Lenape rock shelter in Franklin, and the former
Mt. Paul Monastery in Sparta, totalling almost 6,000 acres.

KVSP's Natural Resource Interpretive Specialist, Lynn Groves, presents educational programs and the services and events of the park. Lynn was hired in 1999 but her career path began long ago when her parents bought her a birdfeeder and the Peterson Field Guide to Eastern Birds for her thirteenth





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birthday. The rest, she says, is history. Quoting Robert Frost's famous poem, Lynn says taking the road "less traveled by" has made all the difference. Lynn enjoys introducing visitors of all ages to the Great Outdoors and sharing in their nature discoveries. Lynn received her B.S. in Natural Resource Management from Rutgers University and is a member of Sussex County Chamber of Commerce Board of Trustees and Trails Partnership Steering Committee, as well as the Co-chair of the Sussex County Chamber of Commerce Tourism Committee.

The Chamber is vital to KVSP's operations, securing and providing grants and materials. They produce maps and wayfinders and panels on the trails. Lynn not only loves her job, she realizes the importance of the park to our community: "I can see the benefits people receive from it." To her, it's "more than just a job." It's not difficult to see why KVSP was voted "Best Place to Hike in Sussex County" by the NJ.com readers. The park is "dedicated to excellence in the stewardship of the State's rich and diverse historic, cultural, recreational and natural resources for the benefit of present and future generations." And their motto couldn't be more accurate: KVSP: Discover What You've Been Missing!
