What is a PCO or PC?



A PCO or a PC

- Is the conduit of information to and from the citizens and the party,
- votes for party leadership to determine the direction of the local, county and state party,
- can determine which candidates your party will support for local, state and national elections.
- Conducts Presidential Caucuses every 4 years.
- can inspire better voter turnout. Many elections are lost by very slim margins.
- Every elected position from the least to the greatest can be influenced by citizens and the PCOs and PCs that inform them.

- A PCO, whether elected or appointed, lives in and represents their own precinct. Most PCOs are elected, but they can also be appointed if none file for the election.
- A PC represent a precinct they do not live in. PCs have the same rights and responsibilities as elected or appointed PCOs.
- A PCO/PCs can be appointed by the county chair under advise and consent of the Legislative District (LD) Chair.
- Appointments can be made year-round until the election of the even-year reorganization.
- Appointments cannot happen until after the biennial reorganization meeting normally in December after even year elections.

- You must be a registered voter in the state.
- Secretary of State must have your current address on file. (to check contact: vote.wa.gov)
- You are 18 or you will be 18 by August Primary date of the current year.
- And you must declare to be a member of the Republican Party.

- The application process can take up to as 2 weeks for verification and vetting. Once completed you will be notified.
- Just as with declarations of candidacy for any elected office your information is subject to open public records requests and requirements.
