Keynote Speech by Dr. Florencia Monge

Delivered at the HWC Virtual Meet & Greet, September 23, 2020

Good afternoon everyone and thank you for having me. I would like to take a moment to congratulate all of the scholarship recipients. We are so proud of you. You all have come along way. I would also like to welcome you to the Hispanic women's council if this is your first time. I hope you find what I found here which is a community of wise women that want success for you and have tools to help you.

I am Florencia Monge and I am honored to have been invited to speak to you at this reception. I want to use this opportunity to share my story with you a little bit, and I hope to serve as some source of inspiration, maybe a resource, a point of reference, something that will help you move towards your professional goals.

So, a little bit about myself – you know I find this question a little bit funny but something that seems to be pretty commonly asked, more recently in my medical school interview, and it's like well what do I say, how much time do I have, but I think I have an answer that aligns with how I want to be seen. I am a Latina, I am a mother, a wife, a daughter, an academic, a scientist, and now a medical student.

A Latina – one of the greatest benefits from being a recipient of this HWC scholarship has been the mentorship. I have been Dr. Victoria Sanchez's and Dr. Romero-Leggott's mentee for a couple of years now, and I am so thankful to them. Beyond their professional accolades, which I am in awe of, it is through conversations with them that I have embraced that. I didn't shy away from it before, I wasn't ashamed, but I felt that my Mexican culture seemed to bump into my identify as a scientist. Some of my colleagues eat/breathe/sleep science and they're great scientists, and I'm sure they're happy in their personal life too, but I can't do that. I have a mom that calls me and invites me for dinner 3-4 times a week, and I want to go to dinner. I like to spend time with them. This does not make me a less competent scientist, a less successful professional. Being "dependent' on your family like this didn't make a less successful "adult." They [Dr. Sanchez and Dr. Romero-Leggott] allowed me to see that they are like this too and their careers are amazing! You just learn to work a little differently, move things around and prioritize.

I'm a new mom – all I have on that is that It takes a village to raise a kid and guess what – I have a village, because culturally that's how we are too. Three weeks after my daughter was born, I started studying for the MCAT and 3 weeks after that I went back to work to finish up projects preparing for graduation. Having my family around, and a community of women that share these cultural views with me, has been so helpful in relieving some of the stress that accompanies these events. It's not enough to just know someone far away that does it or maybe is even a little more separated culturally than you, it's just harder to share, at least it was for me.

I'm a wife, a daughter, and a sister too. I mean I keep these in my introduction because I can't separate those from who I am. Granted I know different introductions ask for different versions of you but you catch my drift, I can't separate the scientist, the doctor, from the mom, or the daughter that speaks with her parents almost every day.

I'm a scientist and a medical student. I defended my dissertation in July, and I started medical school two weeks after. I decided to switch career paths because I have to ask myself — what do I want to leave behind and where can my skills be most beneficial. I do love research, its exhilarating and frustrating but rewarding. However, I feel that as a physican I can help my community more. I think the doctor's office, the hospital are very vulnerable places and, if its hard to comfortable, I think there could be some barriers in treatment.

At this specific point in my life/academic/professional journey I do feel like things are going well, but this did not come at a free cost, or stress-free, nor did I do this alone. Dr. Sanchez has also helped me to recognize that if I don't speak for myself, other people wont either, and in the professional, male-dominated fields in which I find myself, this is a skill I am still working on.

I am grateful for the opportunities that I have had that have led me here, but in line with my last comment, I continue to reach for my professional goals because I have learned to take advantage of opportunities. I have made connections and surrounded myself with people who look out for me with professional/personal advice, praise, with constructive criticism, with resources.

You are now part of this group that has all of this for you, so I am happy that this scholarship can relieve some of the financial burden. That is a great help, but also I urge you to take advantage of the mentoring sessions. It may change as you progress from undergraduate to graduate or professional but the great thing is these women can help you throughout! They have the knowledge, the experience, the resources. I definitely could not have done this or continue doing this without my family and communities like this one.

You know this is a weird time for everyone. I think politically things are chaotic, there's a historical pandemic going on and, I don't meant to make this sound as a call to arms, but ... maybe I do.. I'm just so inspired every time I'm at the HWC receptions because you are all doing so many great things that I just want to remind you to be strong in your cultural identify, be a strong woman, be a strong student, be a strong professional. Take criticism when you need it and from who you need it, but don't let other people's expectations define if you're a good mom, good student, good scientist, good writer, good doctor, 'good Mexican' – don't. You're here, you know what you're doing, keep working hard.

Learn to ask for help, learn to take advantage of opportunities, learn to advocate for yourself. I'm asking for a lot and this is exhausting, trust me I know, so lastly, don't forget about learning to take care of yourself.

Again, thank you for having me. As I said, I am always so inspired to be here and now so honored to have been invited to speak to you. Congratulations on all of your accomplishments!


Monique Gallegos, BS Biology/Spanish

In Memoriam

Raquel Velásquez passed away on October 16, 2020. She was a loyal member of HWC for many years and is featured in our book, *Mujeres Valerosas*. Her daughter, Dr. Diane Torres-Velásquez, has also been an active member of HWC and served a term on the HWC board. We send Diane and her siblings, Cathy Coffey, Dr. Linda Renner and Michael Torres, our deepest condolences.

Raquel was a life-long learner, had big dreams, and pursued them with passion. She grew up in San Antonio, Texas. Starting at the age of five, her grandmother took her to Mexico every summer where they traveled across the countryside in a horse-drawn coach—her love for exploration was born. A year after high school, she married and started a family and in 1962 moved to Albuquerque. She worked as a secretary at a military base and spent many weekends, children in tow, exploring the pueblos and

small villages in Northern New Mexico. At age 41, her children were off to college and it was time for her to pursue her own dream of going to law school. She studied sociology, graduated with honors, and was offered a fellowship to pursue a doctorate at the University of Texas. She would not be diverted from her goal of attending law school, and she graduated from the UNM School of Law.

Raquel built a rewarding career in law, initially as an assistant district attorney, then as a public defender and finally settling into the field of child support enforcement. Raquel also founded a Mexican dance group at UNM (when she was an undergraduate student). Later the dance group was given the distinction by the Governor of being named the official *Ballet Folklorico de Nuevo Mexico*. A life well lived and inspiring to us all.

These past four years have been quite busy, but I can honestly say I have done the majority of things I set out to do in college. One of those things I was able to achieve was regaining my heritage. I have always known where I came from and the importance of my culture, but I never truly

knew who I was. Hispanic is a label that was given to us, it is not necessarily a term that we identify with. Being Hispanic means that a part of us descended from Spain, but it does not acknowledge other parts of our blood line and who we actually are as a people. Being a part of the Hispanic Women's Council (HWC) allowed me to explore those roots that we ourselves and others have denied us. Finding groups that revolve around Hispanics are hard to find but finding a group that revolves around Hispanic women is rare and fulfilling. My HWC mentor, Leila Flores-Duenas, assisted me in not only finding my path in life, but also showed me how strong Hispanic women can be.


2020 Masquerade Ball "Alternative" Fundraiser **Beats Expectations!**
