WHAT IS LEAD?

Lead is a highly toxic heavy metal that produces a range of adverse health effects, particularly in young children. Lead dust is of particular concern as it is often undetected and easily absorbed. Lead paint used on the interior and exterior of homes was banned in the U.S. in 1978. However, it is estimated that about 75% of homes built before 1978 still contain some lead paint

ABOUT OUR EFFORTS

- On three consecutive Saturdays September 21, September 27 and October 5 ten teenagers knocked on 1169 doors and had 294 conversations. They also spent two hours passing out information and talked to 45 people at Party on the Pavement. RIC's work on educating the community about lear poisoning began more than three years ago and has included distributing literature at community events such as Juneteenth and school carnivals, making presentations to churches and organizations such as Rotary and AAUW, and distributing information through day care facilities and food banks

Message from the Executive Director of WISDOM

2025 is going to be yet another very important year for WISDOM and for Wisconsin. For starters, it is WISDOM's 25th Anniversary! (RIC and MICAH in Milwaukee are two solid building blocks that existed before, and upon which WISDOM was built.)

In 2025, Wisconsin will need to make some big decisions, like: "Will we build a new prison?" It has become very clear the prisons in Waupun and Green Bay are unsafe, unhealthy and way past their useful lifespans. (The Milwaukee Secure Detention Facility, though it is newer, belongs in that category as well.) There are many "leaders" in our state rushing to call for us to immediately commit \$500 million to build a new prison to replace them. We believe that it will be faster and more effective to use this opportunity to take the commonsense measures needed to reduce the prison population. This can be done safely, by doing things like reducing the number of crimeless revocations, where people get sent back to prison for technical violations of parole supervision. We could not only save the \$500 million cost of a new prison; we could save \$100 million per year in operating costs.

The billion-dollar decision about how to close the prisons that need to be closed will depend on how active and vocal we all are.

The coming year is a time when our state will make many other decisions: "How we will treat the immigrants and refugees among us? Will we protect our natural environment or sacrifice it to outside business interests? Will we re-build a more robust Transit system in Wisconsin, or will we allow it to continue to deteriorate?

Every WISDOM member organization made great efforts to get people out to vote in 2024, and we'll do it again for the important elections coming up in April, 2025. But, democracy doesn't end with the election. We are already making plans for **Madison Action Day, on April 10, 2025** – a day to celebrate our values, and to remind our elected officials of those things we talked with them about before they were elected!

2025 will also be a year for us to organize and strengthen our organizations. Simply put; to meet our great hopes and visions, we're going to need a lot more people! We'll be spending time around the state in 2025 doing one-on-ones, inviting new people to join our community, training new people to take on leadership roles.

We've done amazing things in the past 25 years. In the grand scheme of things, that was an excellent first step. We need to build the community that will take the next big step in the coming 25 years.

2024 has been a tough year for a number of us in leadership roles in the Racine Interfaith Coalition. Thank you all for your patience, prayers, and good wishes as we have continued to heal physically and emotionally.

We have continued to experience very positive efforts from our 5 task forces: Education, Environmental Justice, Transformational Justice, Immigration, and TUTV (Turn Up The Vote)! You will read about their continuing efforts on the Task Force pages in this book.

This being a presidential election year, it was all hands on deck for TUTV! Volunteers from other task forces, the community, and even neighboring states gave of their time generously to canvass, table, drive, pack literature, stuff bags, make phone calls, drop signs, etc. under the leadership of Chairman Rich Glasenapp.

A few 2024 RIC highlights include adding two Congregations to our Affiliates list; we welcome you! Our Love & Justice Breakfast saw a large gathering of clergy and members. Vigil numbers saw a significant decrease after peaking at 21 last year, we have only needed to do three thus far this year. We believe this has been largely the result of Racine's Violence Prevention and Community Safety Programs. Our office has been blessed to have James, Diana, and Gregory working with us this year through SER National. SER is funded by the U.S. Department of Labor (DOL) to operate the Senior Community Service Employment Program (SCSEP), focusing on mature workers' training and employment needs. SCSEP supplied us with several thousands of hours of work free of charge in 2024!

Looking ahead, watch for information on our 2025 Love & Justice Breakfast in February, Madison Action Day in April, and RIC's 1st Summer Golf Outing Fundraiser.

We offer our Congratulations and Happy Anniversary to Wisdom Celebrating 25 years in 2025! Also thank you to all those who have supported our fundraising efforts and given generously to see that our work continues. Employees and volunteers alike have kept us going when the going got tough!

The Immigration Task Force has been helping immigrants achieve stability in the Racine community. Our work has

been centered around three main areas this year: housing, medical care, and legal assistance.

It is difficult for people without social security numbers to apply for housing. Landlords want to see some kind of government paperwork to assure them of economic stability. Since immigrants lack this paperwork, finding housing is particularly challenging.

A Venezuelan couple found a flat in Racine that could house eight family members, five of which had just migrated from Venezuela. The five family members made a treacherous journey through the jungles and several countries to cross from Mexico into Texas, then traveled to Racine where other family members live. The landlord of the flat did not follow landlord/tenant requirements, refused to give them a lease, and tried to trick them into paying bills for which they were not responsible. When difficulties arose, the landlord threatened to immediately throw them out of the flat and tied his dog to their door to intimidate them. Luckily, a member of the family found a landlord that did not require a social security number while other family members found housing with relatives. Through negotiations, we got the landlord to agree to give them 12 hours to vacate. Family members worked throughout the night and managed to get their belongings out of the flat in time to avoid further conflict with the landlord.

Another family got housing through their employer. When housing costs escalated, the landlord continued to raise the rent until it was an amount they could not afford. The family had to find affordable housing elsewhere.

Another Venezuelan asylum seeker obtained a short-term employment Visa to the United States, and due to the hardships being experienced in his home country, decided to stay in the United States. This man had a tough time finding work, lost his job and apartment in another city, and was taken to the homeless shelter in Racine by a friend. This man is very resourceful and has found employment in Racine. The task force helped him move into a low cost apartment this Fall.

Another immigrant was sharing rent with a family member in Racine when he was cheated out of his rent money and was left owing two months of rent, he couldn't afford. He became homeless. Task Force members helped him straighten out his issues. He moved into a tiny studio apartment this Fall. Racine St. Vincent de Paul Society helped the above immigrants obtain and transport furniture and kitchen supplies.

The Task Force worked with the Health Care Network, and the Ascension All Saint's Hospital CommunityCare Program. These programs have provided extensive health services to for immigrants.

Lastly, our Immigration Legal Services office has been operating for over a year offering assistance with immigration applications including medical waivers, DACA renewals and citizenship applications at a sliding scale cost to the community. They have combined with ELCA Outreach Center in Kenosha to become accredited and start the process there as well. So far, they have had 51 consultations helping people with various legal paperwork. Turn Up the Vote Task Force Richard Glasenapp Chair

The goal of the Turn Up the Vote Task Force (TUTV) has always been to reach out to eligible Racine voters to be sure they are registered and informed before elections. Our ultimate goal is to work toward the election of people who reflect our values. We believe that one of the most effective ways to increase voter participation is to educate and inform voters regarding the role and function of various levels of government and to encourage reflection on how the policies of candidates will impact the daily lives of voters and their families. We created documents, in English and Spanish, giving reasons to vote and highlighting important election dates.

Task Force members distributed information with specific steps for voter registration indicating documents needed to register. Information regarding this year's constitutional amendments was included. We also included information highlighting the work of all 5 RIC Task Forces and invited participation. Various methods were used to Turn Up the Vote: door-to-door canvassing in targeted neighborhoods, setting up tables in various business locations, mailing postcards, and social media posts. An enthusiastic contingent of driver volunteers provided 58 rides to the DMV and the polls on Election Day in November. Eleven canvasses and tabling efforts reached several thousand voters despite the challenges of weather. 1100 postcards were written and sent. Our volunteers had a presence at The Party on the Pavement, Hispanic Heritage Day, and Juneteenth Celebrations, and gave presentations at two senior apartments and the Friendship Club House.

None of this would have been possible without the generosity, enthusiasm, and energy of the volunteers who assisted in countless ways. Thanks to the businesses and organizations who hosted our volunteers at tables to help us in this work. Thank you to high school teachers and students who shared service time with us in literature preparation. We were especially grateful for the friendship and time of volunteers who offered to join us from Milwaukee and Illinois. Each of you knows who you are - THANK YOU for giving your time to this important work. We have a long way to go to ensure every eligible person is actually able to vote. Please consider joining our Turn Up the Vote Task Force. Together we can make a difference!!

RIC's Transformational Justice Task Force (TJTF) is working to address mass incarceration and racial disparities in the criminal legal system in Racine and the state of Wisconsin. Specifically, we are observing select court hearings in the Racine County Circuit Court system and collecting data. We are focused on understanding the disparities in the assigning of bail amounts, the factors that impact sentencing, and the use of diversionary programs to avoid incarceration as they relate to people of different racial/ethnic backgrounds.

In 2025 we are planning to present our most recent findings based upon our last year of court observations.

Lead-Free Ambassador Project: To ensure that more children will be tested for lead poisoning, 10 high school students and 5 drivers were trained to canvass Racine neighborhoods where homes were more likely to have lead paint or pipes. The youth ambassadors reached 1,169 households, told them about the dangers of lead poisoning, and left a packet of information encouraging parents of young children to get their youngsters tested.

The youth ambassadors gained valuable employment skills such as public speaking, teamwork, and dependability during their three weekends of employment. The project will continue into 2025; anyone interested in helping with this program is encouraged to contact the RIC office.

Season of Creation: "To Hope and Act with Creation" was the theme of the 2024 Season of Creation celebration. Clergy from eleven local congregations led an ecumenical prayer service at Siena Center on September 24th, celebrating our care for Earth. Participants at the event signed letters urging our government leaders to promote the Fossil Fuel Non-Proliferation Treaty as an important effort to reduce the leading cause of climate change.


Food Waste Composting Program: In collaboration with the Racine Dominican Laudato Si' Action Team, a pilot food waste composting program was initiated at North Pointe United Methodist Church on April 20, 2024. As participation grew, a second drop-off site was opened in July at Christ Church United Methodist. In its first eight months, the program has diverted more than 6,700 lbs. of food waste from going to landfills; this not only reduces methane gas that contributes to climate change, but saves taxpayer money in tipping fees as trash is dumped in landfills. The pilot program has been very successful; new and renewal registrations are now being taken for 2025; contact the RIC office or your church for a registration form. The annual participation fee for this program is \$25 per household.

Advocating for the Indigenous and the Poor: Members of the Task Force participated in efforts to relieve the energy burden of impoverished communities by opposing the WE Energies proposed 18% increase in utility charges. Although the vast majority of participants at the public hearing objected to the rate increase, the Public Service Commission voted to allow WE Energies to impose a 14% increase. This is an unjust burden for many poor families who have to choose between food and heat/light.

We also collaborated with the Sierra Club in a letter-writing campaign to the DNR asking for a more comprehensive environmental impact study related to the Enbridge Line 5 oil pipeline. This activity was done in solidarity with the Indigenous Peoples of Northern Wisconsin whose homelands and way of life are being threatened by big oil.

The RIC Education Task Force is charged with identifying educational issues in the community and acting on them. Meetings this year have focused on creating a profile of educational needs in Racine. Outstanding speakers have helped color this picture.

Superintendent Soren Gajewski shared RUSD's Strategic Plan. He noted that Racine has had stronger gains in early literacy than any other district in the state. Additionally, task force members learned of the enormous need for a centralized Bi-lingual program to maximize the availability of teachers with bi-lingual skills.

The Racine County Human Services staff indicated that 200 drug deaths have occurred since 2020, many related to fentanyl. Updates were provided on the cutting-edge addiction center that will be built on Taylor Avenue and the youth mental health facility on 3 Mile Road. Youth and violence prevention data were shared. Encouraging statistics were shared indicating that Racine has had one murder by gun this year, compared to 11 last year. City and county programs working in tandem have helped reduce this scourge.

Please join the Education Task Force on January 9, 2025, at 10 AM at the RIC office to hear Superintendent Gajewski speak about the possibility of a referendum to offset budget cuts in education. The February 2025 meeting will ask members to focus on the priority actions of the Task Force in response to Superintendent Gajewski's presentation and all background information. (No January meeting)

Racine Interfaith Coalition's history started 31 years ago



The Racine Interfaith Coalition was formed 31 years ago to enlist faith-based organizations in Racine to work for social justice, especially on behalf of those without wealth and power. According to Sister Jeanne Kimler, local lawyer Stephanie Lazzeroni saw the need for working with others in faith and talked to her pastor, Mark McDonough of Covenant Presbyterian Church. To learn more about organizing faith communities, the two of them attended a Milwaukee Inner City Congregations Allied for Hope (MICAH) meeting where they met MICAH's Lead Organizer, Ana Garcia-Ashley, who later became the first organizer for RIC.

Eventually, leaders from about twenty congregations assembled to consider how their churches could combat racism, poverty, violence and other problems confronting Racine. Late in 1994, Lazzeroni and McDonough also arranged a meeting at the Siena Center with the Gamaliel Foundation where they and others saw a presentation about organizing faith-based communities. After that meeting, RIC became affiliated with Gamaliel.

News of the fledgling body spread quickly throughout the community and the Racine Interfaith Coalition was born. From 1993 to 1995, RIC's main thrust was to enlist as many faith-based organizations as possible. Between 1994 and 1996, RIC grew from 10 members to 15 and has grown since to include 27 congregations. During this time of rapid growth, RIC was able to hire an organizer to help direct the activities and recruit new members. Today, RIC has five active task forces, staffed by dozens of volunteers from local congregations and the community, who are working every day to fulfill the organization's original mission.

In January of 2000, RIC came together with organizations in Milwaukee (MICAH) and Kenosha (CUSH) to form the WISDOM network. Since that time, WISDOM has expanded to Beloit/Janesville (JOB), the Fox Cities (ESTHER), Green Bay (JOSHUA), Manitowoc (RUTH), Waukesha County (SOPHIA), Eau Claire (JONAH), Wausau (NAOMI), Madison (MOSES), and the Menominee Reservation (Menikanaehkem).
