Dear Friends,

It might not come as a surprise that my letter this month is about **Remembering.** Earlier this month we hosted the week for mental health awareness, which, in one of the sessions, reminded us how to promote positive mental health. Carol organises an increasing number of groups to share their expertise, advice and help with us and also this year we were delighted with the generous way the Co-Op supported the event, offering refreshments and several meals throughout the week. Thank you to them.

Our memorial service to remember those who have died has just taken place. We lit candles, brought flowers, received a token to take home and shared memories as we had tea together.

The month of November is synonymous with remembering those who lost their lives through war. We will light candles, and use the poppy, both red and white, to remember the past and to pray for a peaceful future. This year we are intending to ask the community to help us by either coming and making a poppy, bringing their own, or both, to join in with the large poppy installation we are creating for the front gate.

We began this with the Stay and Play café. An opportunity to meet together over coffee and make a poppy. The first one took place in the church on 22 October and we had a good turnout. We will continue this with two more coffee mornings on 2 November and 3 November. Both of these will run from 10.30am -12.30pm. There will be symbolic poppies made in different ways from knitted to fabric and also recycling plastic bottles. I hope this installation will represent the different personalities of the individuals who lost their lives, and that you will join us as well as inviting others to come and be part of this important National Event.

We will of course be holding a parade service on Sunday 11 November. This will be marked in a special way this year, so please read the article written by David Gibbs to find out more about this.

All of the above has been, or will be, centred around offering food as we gather together. Hospitality plays an important part in the life of the church. A large part of our outreach to those who are homeless centres around giving and providing food. (continued on next page)

WHAT IS "CHURCH"? - AN HISTORICAL PERSPECTIVE

Adapted from an article seen in Trinity News and Views, Woking

The book of Acts tells us that thousands were added to the followers of Jesus after the first Pentecost. From then on, it naturally became more pressing to find places to gather for worship. In the early days it was possible sometimes to worship in synagogues since there were many things in common between the followers of Jesus and fellow Jews. But increasingly those who responded to the gospel came from other backgrounds, exacerbating the tension within the church.


Initially, the word church referred to the people. It took hundreds of years for church to become more associated with buildings, as the people constructed an expanding institutional framework in which to practise their Christian faith. The buildings erected by faithful Christians over the centuries have stood as a witness to the faith and commitment of the people, seeking to honour God in their beauty, scale and artefacts - often achieved only by sacrificial giving.

To the world at large, however, the more obvious legacy is the building, rather than the work of the people who caused it.

Churches are natural centres for art and community activities. Whilst the buildings offer much potential for Christian witness, it sometimes seems that the 'tail wags the dog' with the community activities being a substantial means of sustaining the church's presence.

Whether large or small, wherever they are located and whoever uses them, the purpose of the Church is surely still best expressed in the life and ministry of God's people. Our buildings are at best tools or resources to further our work. We have a natural attachment to our church through familiarity, heritage, sentiment, and sometimes a reluctance to face change.

However, as we continue to think about our future direction and the resources we need to deliver our mission, we must ensure that our relationship with our premises is truly reflective of the Church's calling.

Worthing Mental Health Awareness Week (WMHAW) A report and thanks from Carol

Thank you Offington Park for your prayers and practical support for Worthing Mental Health



Awareness Week. It was an amazing week with outcomes and blessings that I could not have foreseen.



The Launch on the Monday was well attended with the Mayor and Mayoress, Mayor's Chaplain, Tim Loughton MP, the Chairman of Adur Council, Councillors from Worthing Council and representatives from WSCC.

The biggest surprise of the day was receiving a message asking if the Navy Cadet Corps at Northbrook College could come as the theme for the Monday was Veterans and Mental Health. It was an absolute pleasure to welcome these young people to our church.

The week followed the usual mix of workshops and talks, and numbers were up on every session when compared with last year. More than 60 groups, charities or individuals ran workshops and/or had stalls or were involved in some way. Some of these were new-to-us groups such as *Care For Veterans, Forgotten Veterans UK, The Recovery Letters, Radio Respect* and *Olly's Future*.

On Wednesday 10 October (World Mental Health Day) we closed the Information Centre for a while in order to hold SafeTALK (suicide alertness) training. This was officially limited to 30 people, but we had 34 people, including Dawn, Ruth and Mike from Offington. It is, of course, my dream to see Worthing become a 'suicide-safer community'. Thanks are due to Joy and Angela who helped with the lunches for this important event.



One of the most amazing blessings was the link with the Co-Op. Cheryl is a 'Community Pioneer' and she helped out at WMHAW every single day from 9am - 5pm, way in excess of her 20-hour rota for that week. (cont. on p9)

WMHAW report (continued)

Cheryl secured a donation of £250 in stock, with permission to leave unused items in the church. This, with the generous donation of quiches, sausage rolls, etc. from Higgidy Pies meant that we were able to provide snacks on the Tuesday and lunches on the Wednesday, Thursday and Friday and there were still two fridges full, not to mention the boxes of tea, coffee, sugar and biscuits and the like.

Discreet headcounts at the beginning of sessions gave a conservative total of 534 by the end of the week, excluding the concert (132) and the coffee morning. We counted someone attending three different sessions as three attendances, rather than one person. We made no attempt to count the number of people who wanted information, or who just popped in.

None of this would have been possible without the generosity of Dawn and the Church in hosting this event. I am grateful to: Brian and the stewards; Mike and Alison for technical support; Mary in the Office; Ann for the Coffee Morning; all those who moved furniture; all those who made tea and coffee and those who attended the talks or simply came to sit alongside others.

Ringing for Peace Armistice 100

On 11 November 1918 the ringing of church bells erupted spontaneously across the country, as an outpouring of relief that four years of war had come to an end. At the time, bells were at the heart of the community, marking events of great significance and communicating to people long before modern technology connected us.

Many bell ringers had joined the war effort, and many lost their lives. Just after the war, the Central Council of Church Bell Ringers wrote to all bell towers to compile the Roll of Honour. At the time 1,100 men were reported as lost.



Recently the Council has been reviewing this list and has discovered a further 400 bell ringers who died in service.

On 11 November 2018, 100 years since Armistice, bells will ring out in unison from churches and cathedrals in villages, towns and cities across the country. Big Ben will also strike at 11am to mark the centenary.

Our fallen bell ringers came from all walks of life, as ringers still do today - from skilled workers to academics to business people. It is also good to note that today ringers are people of all ages.



Ringers are all united in wanting to ring out a message of peace around the world.

Offington Bells will be making their own musical tribute as they perform at the 10.30am Remembrance Service on 11 November.
