

ALL GRUMPS TO THE MILL

A group of us Grumpy Old Men had the chance at High Salvington recently to get intimate with large pieces of wood in the shape of a working windmill - the only one left in the Worthing area out of seven working mills in the 1800's.





Today this mill stands as a testament to the soundness of the original engineering and the dedication of a team of skilled craftsmen who have recently virtually rebuilt the mill.

Flour, as we know, is an essential food ingredient; the miller knew this and was considered by many to be a good catch for a husband. He was wealthy and the chances were that he would die young (but hopefully happy?!) through breathing the dusty air inside the mill.

Organic flour is still ground and sold at the mill, but the number of houses now surrounding the mill means that there is less wind availability, and the shortage of trained millers also means supply is limited. One of the worst scenarios for the miller is a strong wind, under which the brake can't stop the sails. Consequently, the sails turn so fast that the wooden bearings overheat and the mill burns down.

Next to the mill is the granary with its base raised off the ground on mushroom shaped straddle stones to provide air circulation under the building to keep the grain dry and of course to prevent rats getting in.

The cafe was opened especially, offering us very reasonably priced drinks

and delicious homemade cake. The mill is open the first and third Sundays of the month with different visiting attractions in the grounds.

In August the Grumpies had a private tour of Broadwater Cemetery, courtesy of the Friends of Broadwater and Worthing Cemetery. We





story of a road worker who was crushed by a steamroller wheel (a wheel is on the grave) as well as the gruesome tale of one of Worthing's first murders in around 1899.

It sounds odd to say you've had a great time visiting the cemetery, but we did! John was

very knowledgeable and there is a wealth of history to be explored amongst the 25,000 occupants. Go along to one of the Cemetery Tours (they're all different) and see for yourselves. We're prepared to bet that you won't be disappointed.

Remembering Joan Way

Joan died on 21 July and on 8 August we had a thanksgiving for her life at Offington Park. Joan is remembered here by her friend of over 80 years, Audrey Garnett:



Joan and I became friends in our first term at High School when we were 11 years old. I rather admired her as she was taller than most of us, good at most sports and she had learned to swim. We started spending Saturday afternoons together, either at her house or mine - but tea at Joan's was the more exciting! Her family were chair manufacturers and the factory wasn't far from the house. Joan had free admission in the days before Health and Safety had ever been thought of, and she showed me various fun things we could do in the workshop. The most exciting was swinging on the hoist used to take the finished chairs down to the ground floor! Outside there was a stream where Joan would paddle and pick up baby frogs.

At school Joan was a diligent student, never missing any tasks. She was very good at Latin which requires a logical brain and throughout her school life she was always top in maths. Joan only told me later in life that her mother suffered frequent mental health problems, and that she had to nurse her and do most of the cooking. This must have been very hard, but she never complained. When I look back on my school days with Joan I am aware of her high moral standards. We had a difficult school life because it took place during the six years of the Second World War. But I remember Joan as always being cheerful and she could tackle problems in a practical and resourceful manner. She was always totally honest and never involved in anything underhand. That was true of her adult life too. She was always a woman of the highest integrity.

Joan always regretted the fact that she had been an only child. After Michael was born she worried a lot that he would have the same fate, but she was richly blessed and justifiably proud of her three fine sons. Her happiness was complete when Lizzie was born and she and Ted had a grandchild.

Throughout her life Joan loved swimming. She was a very good swimmer and it was a great joy for her when they moved to Worthing and she could cycle to the beach for a good long swim in the sea.

In later years we had serious discussions about religion and I know she never lost her faith. She was a very modest person and I had to remind her more than once that to get a first in Maths from the University of London was a great achievement. It was my very good fortune that I met Joan at Wycombe High School.

Goodbye Joan. I thank you for the privilege of being able to call you my best friend for the past 80 years. Audrey Garnett

Joy Barnes also recalls:

For many of us, our memories of Joan started when she and Ted moved to Offington Park from Byfleet and quickly settled into church life. Being good at figures, Joan was called on by several groups to help with their accounts – women's groups, Network and the Scout Group to name just a few. She was an amazing pastoral visitor (although I think she thought otherwise) and I was lucky to have her as my visitor for several years. I greatly valued her care and concern and listening ear. She used her gardening skills to help maintain the church garden and she and Ted opened their own lovely garden on several occasions for coffee mornings and cream teas to raise funds for charities.

She and Ted worked well together and have had a wonderful marriage for the past 67 years. They loved walking and cycling, and Joan chose Psalm 121 to be read at the service. This speaks of a powerful God who created all we see around us, and yet who also knew and watched over each one of us.

One of the hymns Joan also chose for her service ends like this: 'Tis Jesus the first and the last, whose Spirit shall guide us safe home. We'll praise him for all that is past and trust him for all that's to come.'





This is the beginning of a new day. God has given me this day to use as I will. I can waste it, or grow in its light and be of service to others. But what I do with this day is important, because I have exchanged a day of my life for it. When tomorrow comes, today will be gone forever. I hope I will not regret the price I paid for it.

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Worthing Mental Health Awareness Week October 7 – 12 2019

Worthing Mental Health Awareness Week (WMHAW) is almost upon us again. Although some details are still being finalised, I know



that we are being blessed, and that our prayers are being answered.

Worthing Samaritans, who are celebrating 50 years of listening in Worthing, have given a generous donation towards WMHAW's costs. They will help with promoting WMHAW through their own contacts and will be on hand during the week itself to offer emotional support. This year the Samaritans' celebratory logo will be on the WMHAW banner with the statement that WMHAW is 'supported by Worthing Samaritans'.

The launch is on Monday 7 October with the Mayor, and this will be followed by a presentation from Safe In Sussex. On Monday evening, Dr Rick Fraser, Medical Director of Sussex Partnership NHS Foundation Trust, will give a talk on how psychiatrists arrive at their diagnoses.

On Wednesday 9 October, there is Mental Health First Aid Training** and various workshops will run throughout the week. As ever, there will be a Film Night and a Concert on Friday 11 October.

As a church, Offington is a member of the Worthing Dementia Action Alliance, and we are committed to making our church, and our community, fully inclusive and dementia friendly. I want therefore to draw special attention to events on the afternoon of Tuesday 8 October:

- A local 'living well with dementia' group, who call themselves 'Worthing Town Cryers' will show how their insights and personal experience is used to improve services for those with dementia, but also benefits the general population; *followed by*
- 2. A 'pop-up' Dementia Cafe where we have a 'cream tea'. Hazel will be providing some beautiful music to create a gentle atmosphere and Ric Gray will demonstrate how his 'Sing a Song and Smile' sessions can be used as Cognitive Stimulation Therapy; *this is followed by*
- The Worthing Dementia Action Alliance, with an Admiral Nurse as guest speaker. Please note that there are <u>no</u> Admiral Nurses in this part of West Sussex, yet we have a high number of people living with dementia, and carers who are emotionally and physically exhausted.

We also have groups and organisations joining us for the first time this year. The programme will be published on social media and will be available from the church. Information will also be sent to local press and radio.

As ever, I am grateful for the tolerance of those who find their usual routines in the church disrupted by WMHAW. I ask not only for your forbearance, but for your prayers - that the planning falls into place, that the various speakers are blessed, and that those who attend find a safe space, a welcome, and a sense of peace and hope.

I would value your help with 'meeting and greeting', with making and serving refreshments (especially Monday to Wednesday), with the AV and associated technology. I would also value your general presence if you are able to drop in. All the events are open to everyone.

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"Now is the time" March for Climate Change (26 June 2019) Report

Together we put our faith in action and made history! Leaders of the major faiths and none, plus 12,000 others

from across the UK lobbied over 350 MPs calling for urgent action to address the climate emergency. This was the biggest mass lobby on climate Westminster has ever seen and it enabled previously unconnected people

living within the same constituencies to join together for the same issue.

MP's were invited to leave the cocoon of parliament to see the strength of feeling and meet their constituents. Both Tim Loughton and Peter Bottomley met the marchers.

One of the marchers was our own Romy Petts. She told Spotlight:

Chris Lance had told us about this march which was supported by Christian Aid. Carol Goode, Meg Hoskins and I joined Chris (he kept us in order!?) on 26 June at West Worthing station where we caught the earliest "cheap rate" train to Victoria. Although our plan was to catch a bus to Westminster, we were advised to walk as there were long delays. We also planned to attend a discussion at noon, and then go to a specific point on the Thames to meet our local MPs.

We arrived at Church House at 12 noon for the start of the forum between various religious leaders, chaired by Rowan Williams. We expected it to be packed to capacity, but were surprised to find only a handful of people seated looking at a blank screen. We gradually established (whilst eating our packed lunch in comfort) that the strong 'march of witness' had been very delayed and the discussion finally began just as we had to get up and rush to

meet our MPs some distance away.

On route to our meeting point we passed people bearing placards from WWF, CAFOD, Woodland Trust, Friends of the Earth, and lots of other organisations all desperate to get the



powers that be to do something to stop global warming. Banners were thrust in our hands as we arrived at our destination.





I was with the group waiting for Tim Loughton and the others in our group were waiting to see Peter Bottomley. Tim came out to meet us and was excellent. Obviously, he was keen to do all he could and said he felt that climate change was the biggest threat to us all. I was very impressed with his interest in a children's group on Climate Change which he had set up in Worthing.

At 2 o'clock we were all encouraged to make as much noise as we could manage. I wielded a very elderly football rattle which made quite a racket! Carol had brought whistles and Meg a tambourine. The overall din,



although short in length, was very impressive.

The others told me that Sir Peter hadn't shown up, but several emails from Chris had elicited his agreement to "probably be able to meet us at the House of Commons at 3 o'clock." Those waiting to see him were not amused but most agreed we would trudge over to Portcullis House and talk to him there.

In my opinion he was patronising, rather rude and showed very little interest in any of the questions we were finally allowed to put to him, having had to endure his reading a long report which we didn't want to hear.

As it was by then too late to catch the last cheap train before the peak charges kicked in (and as we were with Chris) we found somewhere to eat a brilliant little café with delicious cakes at very reasonable prices and a choice of good coffees.

We then made our way to St. James' Park and killed time by ambling around people-watching and resting weary legs while watching wildfowl in the lake.

On the train home we told those unfortunate enough to sit near us of our adventure and our reasons for going and demonstrating.



They seemed to be in agreement with us, so maybe.....just maybewe changed their minds.
