

### Last Month's Cover Picture

We have been asked about the bridge that featured on the cover of October's Spotlight. This unique rope bridge is at Carrick-a-Rede in County Antrim, Northern Ireland. It was built in 1755 to link the mainland to Carrick-a-Rede island, where fishermen used to catch salmon. It's a wobbly 66ft-long walk as the bridge is just 18in wide! If you're in the area, you can cross the bridge (owned by the National Trust) for just £7:00 (children £3.50).





When I heard a whisper that our Young People were going to conduct the Harvest Festival service I wondered what they would do. Would it be a hymn sandwich? Hardly. Would it be a conventional memory-lane job? No, too young for that. Would it be an easily-organised routine



service? I couldn't imagine that after seeing their amazing Service at Advent last year. But what I didn't expect was what we actually got.

First of all it was to be the culmination of a fortnight's collection of items for various charities, organised by Dawn, and would be called a "Har-Fest". A strange title but obviously a combination of Harvest and Festival.

On arriving at Church for the 10.30 Service the first thing we noticed was blank windowsills. No flower arrangements, just coloured cloth representing the four elements – earth, water, fire and air. Looking towards the front of the Church, there was the puppet stage in place. Strange for Harvest I thought, but this could be fun.

Woody welcomed us, and whilst a huge handmade jigsaw was built by the young people, Ben read the creation story to us using the Rhyming Bible.

Then it was found that a circular piece was missing from the jigsaw.

The Service continued with an *orangutan* (yes, really!) playing the drums - and then a whole ark full of animals appeared, with some human puppets singing 'Circle of Life' from The Lion King, bringing tears to many an eye. The song ended with the orangutan



passing the final piece of the jigsaw to Myeisha. This was the **earth** and when that piece was put in place the jigsaw formed a lovely collage of many different aspects of life. Clever and beautiful.

We were all invited to bring the filled bags for the homeless to the front, where they were carefully arranged. Emma thanked everyone for their response to the Harvest appeal - so many came, responding to the request, so well done Offington for taking on the challenge.

The Mayor spoke about her work and her involvement in the homeless charities as our Mayor and as a Christian.

Turning Tides and the Soup Kitchen representatives also told their stories.

This thought-provoking and challenging Service continued on the theme of God's World and what we were doing to it.

Theo explained about recycling with Myeisha (my word, does Theo know his stuff!) Then the young people destroyed the jigsaw.



Steph told us about her recent amazing trip to Ghana and how she now values *clean* water far more than before her trip. Charlotte and Ashley debated the benefits and dangers of fire very heatedly (sorry, couldn't resist that). Ben told us a great deal about wind.

On the subject of **wind**, we were quite taken aback when Ben introduced "I'm a Christian, get me out of here" and challenged some unfortunate people to eat crickets and other unexpected bugs. They are these insects with interesting facial grimaces.

Aaron led the Prayers. Towards the end of this uplifting and challenging Service we were all supposed to be given a small piece of jigsaw. But so many were there that we ran out! Praise His name! Whilst these tiny pieces were distributed the children re-built their jigsaw.



Existing families are doing well. The adults are taking





### WMHAW Report by Carol Barber

Once again I write to thank my Offington Church Family for all the support it has given to Worthing Mental Health Awareness Week (WMHAW).



This really couldn't happen without your generous

goodwill, prayers and practical support. The response to the various workshops, talks and activities which took place has been so positive. Nearly 650 people attended the more formal sessions, and hundreds more visited the Information Centre.

Sixty-one local groups and organisations were represented during the week, either by having a stall in the Information Centre or by leading a workshop or session. Eight of these groups were first time participants to the Week.

I'm often asked for the highlights of the Week, or the statistics surrounding it. There are the things that made this particular Week different....

This was the 7th WMHAW, but the first time a Minister at Offington was also Mayor's Chaplain. It was therefore an extra pleasure to see Dawn light the Peace Candle and lead us in prayer. It has been the WMHAW tradition that we hand the Week over to God before we invite the Mayor to declare it open!

The Samaritans, who are celebrating their 50th Anniversary of listening in Worthing, were in attendance all week ready to offer one-to-one support at Offington. There were several of these



chats throughout the Week. A rail passenger, travelling from Brighton to Chichester, left the train at Worthing in order to talk to a Samaritan at Offington. How wonderful that we were able to offer tea and cake and the use of the Quiet Room!

Jackie Farrell, from the National Tremor Foundation, gave a candid talk about the impact of Essential Tremor on mental wellbeing. Currently there is no local support group for this condition, but it is hoped that one will soon form. Please would you pray for the continuing success and development of this critical service.

There was a focus on dementia on the very busy Tuesday afternoon, with four separate dementia events on the programme. For the first time we held a pop-up Dementia Cafe with afternoon tea.

Over 60 people attended - those living with dementia, carers, professionals, plus members of the public and people from our Tuesday Lunch Club too. Hazel played her harp, Ric led a sing-a-long and Abigail offered nail polishes. There was singing, dancing, laughter and lots of cake!

Worthing Dementia Action Alliance held an Open Meeting where the role of Admiral Nurses in supporting those living with dementia was discussed. The meeting heard that Horsham area had six Admiral Nurses, but there are none at all in the Worthing area.

On the Wednesday, 27 people received training in Adult Mental Health Awareness. This was a four hour accredited course. Grants, and kindness from others, allowed us to provide a lunch for attendees.

World Mental Health Day (10 October) had the theme of suicide prevention. Ann Feloy,



a Worthing mum bereaved by suicide, spoke about the work of Olly's Future, a charity set up in memory of her son, Oliver, who died in Worthing in 2017. Much of the work of this charity has been in London and Horsham. By the end of the Week there were firm plans to support Ann who feels ready to expand her work into Worthing.

This year WMHAW received a support grant from Worthing Community Chest of up to £973. This is a significant sum, which although not all claimed, has certainly made a difference! The grant helped to provide a collection box in the foyer for donated goods to generate income for Worthing Community Chest. It will also fund training for Dawn and I so that we can develop our own skills, and learn more about other community groups and so develop networks as we sit on the panel which grants awards. We also had fabulous donations from local retailers which helped to feed everyone!

The new media system was wonderful. The ability to zoom in on a speaker, singer, or a bit of 'dad-dancing' was appreciated. Presenters and attendees alike found the side and back screens invaluable.

My gratitude goes to all involved throughout the Week, from supporting speakers, moving furniture, 'meeting and greeting', serving refreshments and lunches, or just sitting alongside those who needed information and a safe space. Not forgetting the wonderful Tech Team who were available at some long and unsociable hours! Thank you all.

# Come into my parlour (said the Mayor to the Grumps)



Last month, the Grumpies had the privilege of visiting the parlour of the Mayor of Worthing, Councillor Hazel Thorpe.

As part of the visit, the Grumpies saw the newly-refurbished Council Chamber, were told about the Borough Coat of Arms which bears the motto 'Ex Terra Copiam E Mari Salutem' (translated as 'from the land fullness, from the sea health'). We also heard about how the Mayor is chosen and the nature of the role.

The carpet in the central well of the Council Chamber is the original from 1933. Interestingly, we were told that the architect, Charles Cowles-Voysey, had hoped for a plaque to be



erected outside the building to acknowledge his work. After the Councillors at the time rejected his request, Voysey had the letters of his name

embroidered randomly into the carpet!



### Economy of Life - A Roadmap

This month, we are considering part II of the World Council of Churches document entitled 'Roadmap for Congregations, Communities, and Churches for an Economy of Life and Ecological Justice'.



Please consider carefully and prayerfully the key messages in these articles and be prepared to take action where appropriate. Not everyone can build a community-run, small-scale hydroelectric dam, for example, but the small everyday changes we can make by thinking before we do something can have significant knock-on effects.

### 2. Renewable Energy and Climate Protection

Monitor energy consumption and move towards renewable energies

"We monitor our energy consumption at least once a year and strive for a complete change to renewable energy."

The consumption of fossil fuel—based energy harms the climate, and is already leading to a vast destruction of livelihoods, the drowning of islands, conflict and war, and a growing group of climate refugees.



Communities such as ours, based in privileged countries, need to control the use of energy and to improve the energy efficiency of our buildings. Changing from conventional to eco-electricity (where possible) is an easy step, followed by installing solar panels.

As a worldwide communion in Christ, we could collaborate: ethical investments in one part of the world can provide access to renewables and improve living conditions in another.

Promote climate-friendly mobility

"We support climate-friendly and post fossil-fuel mobility."

This is highly dependent on our own situation, but we can help by, say, posting timetables for public transport and promoting it's use.

We can also encourage bicycle use (perhaps by offering secure bike parking or bike-sharing) and promoting car-sharing and minibus use for meetings, trips etc. We could even install charging points for electric cars! It matters less what we could do - what is important is what we actually do! Maybe it's time

to re-think how we live our daily life. As Ban Ki-moon (former Secretary-General of the United Nations) said: "We are the last generation that can fight climate change. We have a duty to act."

Deal with energy and materials consciously

"We deal with energy and materials with conscience and care."



Every time we consume something, we pay twice: for its cost and for the disposal of waste. The production of an item requires energy. Every waste of energy harms the environment and costs money that could be

used for beneficial projects. Therefore, energy efficiency and the way we use things are important. Sometimes small changes like duplex printing on recycled paper, avoiding plastic and styrofoam cups, or installing switchable electrical outlets can have a remarkable effect.


