Our cover picture is of Offington Park East Lodge, Broadwater, as it looked in 1906. The picture was painted by Hannah Belhadj, a member of our very own Paint! Art Club, from an old postcard.

Taken from the northern edge of Broadwater Green, this view shows Warren Road, centre right, which formed the north-eastern boundary of the ancient Offington Park.

The East Lodge, one of four, is typically Victorian and was extended in the 1850's by Thomas Gaisford, after whom several roads and the electoral ward are named.



After lunch, it was time to say 'Goodbye' and set off for home, in the knowledge that during these few days of 'Carols by Crowhurstlight', we




had celebrated our Lord's birth at a very deep level, and would be celebrating again with family and friends just a few days later!

SUSSEX COMMUNITY RAIL PARTNERSHIP

I've written in Spotlight before about the different levels of understanding people have when Eco is talked about. The widest-held

and most encompassing view is that God made us stewards of the Earth and all that's in it (i.e. God's creation).



In keeping with the theme of this generally wider understanding, the Eco group have sponsored a planter at Goring-by-Sea railway station. The photos really do not do it justice! It all looks rather colourless and drab in the winter, but come the spring what a change there will be.

The station planters were jointly maintained by Railtrack and the train operators (or whatever they are all called now). Currently the planter is maintained by the **Aldingbourne Trust** which exists to enable adults with disabilities to develop and live the life they want to live. A group of adults overseen by volunteers visit the local stations to look after the planters, for which they are given a small wage. The group travels by train, which is paid for by the local train operator.

On many levels this fits the Eco definition. People who would find it difficult to get employment are contributing to society and

given a wage, which makes them feel valued. The end result enhances the experience of people using the trains. And God's creation is given a foothold in an otherwise barren area.

Aldingbourne Trust is well worth a visit. It is situated on the north side of the A27 just after the Fontwell West roundabout. Look out for a brown sign and turn right at the first junction after Fontwell racecourse. There is much to see there and the site has a very good cafeteria and restaurant serving teas, coffees and delicious meals. 





JC's LITTLE NUGGETS

The Winchester Bible

Commissioned in 1171 by the Bishop of Winchester, it took many years for craftsmen and artists to create a holy and precious testimony to our Lord. The four volumes weigh 7lbs and with each page measuring 21 x 31 inches, it is the largest surviving 12th Century English Bible.

It needed the hides of 250 calves just for the base writing vellum! The artists illustrated the texts in red, orange black and yellow. Gold leaf was then applied, but more expensive was the ultramarine pigment ground from lapis lazuli brought from the land now called Afghanistan. The cost of this Bible would be in the millions of pounds in today's money. Restored in all its magnificence, the Bible can be seen on exhibition in Winchester Cathedral. What a story!

Traditional: at Offington this usually means a mixture of hymns, readings, prayers and a sermon

Junior Church: sessions for children and young people held in parallel after the first part of the service

Contemporary: explores different styles of worship generally using more modern music and media

Messy Church: worship through craft and activities, singing and stories plus a meal together

Breakfast Church: breakfast and worship then discussion, reflection & activities exploring the theme.

Youth: a service specifically designed for children and young people with their leaders and supporters.

Café: a more informal service held around tables with coffee/tea and cake. All-age: a familiar mix of songs, hymns, readings, prayers and thoughts designed for the whole Church.

5th **Sunday Afternoon:** with increasing numbers of baptisms we may need to use this slot for an extra service inviting the whole church to join in the worship and welcome.

Whilst children & young people are welcome at any and all of our services, there is at least one service each Sunday set up with children and young people specifically in mind. These are marked with a red asterisk.

LINK TO HOPE SHOEBOX APPEAL 2019

Last year the Link to Hope Shoebox appeal packed and delivered an amazing **37,400** shoeboxes!



Three groups from Offington helped in this mammoth task:

7-2-11 Youth club led by Gill Powell, the Senior Youth Club led by Ashley Bishop and Nick Skinner's Beta Housegroup. Also, our own Aaron C packed a phenomenal amount when the Explorers helped one evening. If you're a group leader, could your group help us in 2020? If so, please let me know.

Link to Hope (formerly Link Romania), for those that don't know, is a charity established in 1991 and based in Worthing. The charity helps to support the people of Eastern Europe: Moldova, Ukraine, Bulgaria - and Romania of course. Link to Hope works to advance many good causes in Eastern Europe with its charity shops, but their flagship event is the Shoebox Appeal.

Two types of shoeboxes are distributed, packed with suitable items: a family one and an elderly persons one. Occasionally, a shoebox may be damaged in transit - these are sent to the 'shoebox hospital' where yet more volunteers repack them for us.

Filled shoeboxes from all over the UK - from northern Scotland to Cornwall, west Wales to Kent and the Isle of Wight - are transported to Worthing, where they are sorted and packed by volunteer groups before being loaded onto trucks bound for Eastern Europe.

I work as Warehouse Manager during evenings and on Saturdays and help the many groups that give up their time to pack shoeboxes. They all say that

it is one of the best nights of their group's year and most come back year on year. They enjoy it because they know they are doing something worthwhile for people in other countries who have virtually nothing.



What staggers me is knowing that through this vast national network of supporters filling, and volunteers collecting, packing, loading and delivering shoeboxes from our Worthing warehouse, each family or elderly person receives a shoebox. This isn't going to change their lives or get them out of poverty, but it lets them know that someone, somewhere, loves them. That is surely the true message of Christmas.

One important aspect of discipleship is clear advocacy for just economy and creativity to organise a local supply out of respect for life. We are called to be transformative disciples, designing the present by coming from the future of the kingdom of God – sometimes "turning the world upside down." (Acts 17:6)

4. Economies of Life

Create spaces for moneyless interaction

"We want to open spaces for people to meet, regardless of their financial background."



In a world where daily life is more and more dominated by consumerism, and achievements are increasingly measured in terms of money, congregations can be a place of rest: a meeting point without the necessity of buying or paying for something, without judgment of ability to pay, without exclusion. This atmosphere of respect and trust can be the cradle of alternative forms of supply and mutual support.

Practice alternative economic models



"We want to strengthen alternative economies by showing a good example."

The beginning can be very simple: a shelf where people can deposit things they don't need anymore and others can take items for free. We can develop: a free

shop, second-hand shop, food-sharing-point, repair café, skills-exchange network, producer-consumer network, and much more.

The experience of organizing a part of your daily life with little or no money is wonderful and strengthens the community.

Practice 'just' finance

"We inform ourselves about life-giving forms of dealing with money and finance, and check what is practicable for us."

Churches often critique the destructive economy and at the same time empower it by thoughtless investment. Ethical investment, contracting, credit unions, different kinds of project financing....there are many good methods we can use in



favour of our communities and the world. Complementary currencies are growing worldwide and are a proven model to strengthen a region, including economically. Church-owned ethical banks could become something normal and contribute much more to a better world.
