Our cover picture is a Christmas Wreath. The wreath symbolises the strength of life overcoming the forces of winter.



The wreath was an early Roman and Greek symbol of victory. Soon it began to figure in Christianity, for when Jesus was crowned with thorny holly branches, the white berries changed to blood red. People began to use the symbolic wreath at Christmas time, and a lighted candle was placed in the centre of the wreath to remind people of Jesus, the light of the world, born on Christmas Day.

Evergreens were used in wreaths as a symbol of immortality, because the boughs would stay green when all else was brown and dead, and consequently were seen as a sign of enduring life heralding the return of spring and new vegetation.

Wishing you a Blessed and Peace-filled Christmas.



CHARLES WESLEY

Hark the herald-angels sing, Glory to the new-born King!



With over 150 of Charles Wesley's 6500 hymns in the Methodist hymnbook, everyone has their

favourite. This month we recall a much loved and much sung Christmas hymn as we take a closer look at his life and works.

Wesley was born very near to Christmas (18 December) in 1707 at Epworth, Lincolnshire, to the Anglican cleric and poet Samuel Wesley and his wife Susanna. He was Susanna's 18th child!

Wesley was educated at Oxford, where he formed the "Holy Club", a prayer group which was later joined by his brother John. After graduating with a Masters degree in classical languages and literature, Charles followed his father and brother into Anglican orders in 1735.

Despite their closeness, Charles and John did not always agree on questions relating to their beliefs. In particular, Charles was strongly opposed to the idea of a breach with the Church of England.

Wesley experienced a conversion on 21 May 1738. The reputed site of his conversion is marked by a blue plaque at 13, Little Britain. It says, "Adjoining this site stood the house of John Bray - scene of Charles Wesley's conversion by faith in Christ".

Wesley felt renewed strength to spread the Gospel to ordinary people and began to write the poetic hymns for which he would become known.

In 1739 he took to field preaching, with John, under the influence of George Whitefield, whose open-air preaching was already reaching great numbers of Bristol colliers.

In 1749, Charles married Sarah Gwynne, who accompanied him and John on their evangelistic journeys throughout Britain. Although Sarah and Charles made their home in Bristol, he travelled frequently between Bristol and London. Charles gave up field preaching and frequent travel due to illness in 1765. He settled and worked in the area around St Marylebone Parish Church. Then, in 1771, Charles obtained another house, in London, and moved into it that year with his elder son. By 1778 the whole family lived in London, where they remained until Charles' death. The Bristol house still stands and has been restored, but the London house was demolished.


Only three of the couple's nine children survived infancy. The six that died between 1753 and 1768 are all buried in Bristol, and there is a monument there, in a garden on the north side of the junction of Lewins Mead and The Haymarket.

Charles junior spent most of his career as the personal organist of the Royal Family, and Samuel became one of the world's most accomplished musicians and is often called "the English Mozart".

Wesley's conversion had a clear impact on his doctrine and is most notable in his hymns written after 1738. His hymns have had a significant influence not only on Methodism, but on modern theology as a whole. As a result of his enduring hymnody, the Gospel Music Association recognised his musical contributions to the art of gospel music in 1995 by listing his name in the Gospel Music Hall of Fame.

Charles Wesley died on 29 March 1788, aged 80, in London. Since he considered himself a member of the Church of England, he had requested to be buried as such, and is buried in the St Marylebone Parish Church graveyard (see picture).

On 24 May 2007, the tercentenary of Wesley's birth, was celebrated throughout England, even though Wesley was born in December. Aldersgate Day, as

It was a happy group which kept growing until we had to start meeting in the hall. We then had to expand to two days a week: Mondays as well as the original Wednesdays.

We now see the first little ones coming with their children, and if they have to work, the grandparents are bringing them. In fact that was just what I did.

Its the end of an era but we have to accept that life is different now.

RECYCLING AT CHRISTMAS

Hark! The Herald-Angels sing, Please recycle - do your thing!



Picture the scene: Christmas Day, 3:00pm. You can't see your carpet because everything below knee level is submerged in a sea of wrapping paper, discarded packaging and bits of pulled crackers. What to do with all that rubbish? Recycle and reuse, of course, using our helpful hints and crafty ideas!

CHRISTMAS WRAPPING PAPER

- Shred coloured wrapping paper to use as colourful light but protective packaging around future gifts.
- Use it to clean windows and leave them streak-free (but avoid using the shiny/plastic stuff)
- Thin paper-like wrap is great for origami or decoupage you can make crafty items and decorations for yourself or to give to friends for next Christmas.
- Use it to decorate dull notebooks.

CHRISTMAS CARDS

- Cut out a square or rectangle from the design to use as a gift tag for next year. Use pinking shears or cut out a wavy edged template to make them more interesting.
- Tall strips could be used for bookmarks.
- Make whole cards into small boxes to keep items such as erasers, paper clips or badges tidy.
- If you're crafty, with careful cutting out you can make a stencil or template to decorate next year's cards or gift boxes.

CHRISTMAS TREES

- Take your old tree to the tip or B&Q. They will shred them to make ground-cover. Or leave out for the recycling collection.
- Strip the needles to use as naturally pine scented pot pourri or to stuff pin cushions.
- Needles can also be used to restore balance in a compost heap. Needles are acidic so balance out alkaline things, like wood ash.
- Eat it! You can make some <u>Douglas Fir & Orange Blossom Butter</u> <u>Cookies</u>. Search for the recipe, or click on the hyperlink!


