### **Cover Picture**

Our cover shows Beachy Head Lighthouse, built to replace the 1834 Belle Tout Lighthouse on top of the cliffs at Beachy Head, which was often obscured by sea mists.

The new lighthouse was built under the direction of Sir Thomas Matthews, Trinity House Engineer-in-Chief. It is sited about 165m seawards from the base of the cliffs. A temporary cable car was installed for the transport of workers and stones to an iron ocean platform adjacent to the lighthouse and 3,660 tons of Cornish granite were used in the construction.

The 'light', a paraffin vapour burner, gave two white flashes every 20 seconds and was visible from 26 miles out to sea. The lighthouse also had an explosive fog signal (now discontinued), which sounded every five minutes in foggy weather. The lighthouse is now equipped with LED lighting technology. In 2010, Trinity House said it was leaving the lighthouse to return to its natural grey state, as the red and white stripes weren't necessary with advanced ship navigational technology. A campaign was launched to keep the red and white stripes and the £27,000 required was raised. The tower was repainted with five coats of paint in October 2011.

### Covid-19 Prayers for Others

Although the UK seems to be managing Covid now much more effectively, there are many countries still experiencing high infection and death rates, and many in our own country who still fear the future.

### For countries still experiencing 'waves'

We pray for countries that are still seeing Covid infections even after vaccination programmes. For New Zealand and Australia, experiencing new waves, and also for Brazil and the USA, both of whom have seen in excess of 500,000 deaths from Covid-19. We pray for the governments of those countries, that they will act responsibly towards their people and that the people themselves may understand their role in keeping Covid at bay.

### For long-term sufferers

We pray for those people who are experiencing a deterioration in health from 'long Covid'. We pray for their families as they face an uncertain and anxious future, and for the medical teams battling to understand and treat the symptoms of long Covid. This article was written by Anna G (daughter of Alan C) and originally published in August 2021 in a local community magazine for South Gloucestershire. It is a report, explanation and discussion on the subject of the Methodist Church's decision on same-sex marriage, which aims to inform and reassure anyone interested and perhaps concerned about the way forward.

### A MOMENTOUS DECISION

The recent momentous decision of the Methodist Conference to allow same -sex marriages to take place in its churches follows nearly 30 years of careful and thoughtful discussion, from grassroots congregations in local churches through to the higher organisational levels. It is felt that it is time to move towards being a truly inclusive Church in this way, fully welcoming and affirming all members of our community, and allowing equal marriage for



all, in the sight of God.

Of course most of us have not grown up with the idea of two brides or two grooms getting married, so the idea might still need getting used to. On the other hand, for an increasing number of especially younger people, it makes complete

sense; it allows two people of the same sex who truly love each other to be able to make this lifelong commitment to each other in church before God.

What if we disagree? - As Christians in the Methodist Church, our ministers and indeed all of us have a pastoral duty to care for all our members and adherents, regardless of their viewpoint. The Conference vote passed with 85% of delegates in favour, but some Methodists find the decision very difficult and there has been much care taken to ensure that there is still a way for everyone to remain a loved and valued part of the church. We have much still in common, and many other issues to concern ourselves with in doing Christ's work; eg: seeking justice and peace, and caregiving.

In practical terms, Methodist ministers and Church Councils will have the choice whether to opt-in to registration of the solemnisation of same-sex marriages, and the necessary legal paperwork will take some months at least, so there will not be any such weddings this summer.

As you may know, some Bible scholars interpret various parts of the Bible to say that homosexual relationships are sinful, while some totally disagree. (How to make sense of the 66 books of the Bible is another whole lengthy subject in itself).

However, given the limitations of translation and cultural context from a very different time, and editorial policies from centuries ago as to what was included, my personal view is to use the Bible as a very welcome guide on how to live the Christian life, but with a helping of prayerful common sense to try and understand what the words actually mean for us today.

That's not always easy. However, the central theme of Christianity - Jesus's commandment that we love one another - is pretty clear, and St Paul also provides an excellent definition of what love is and what it is not, in his letter to the Corinthians (1:13), a popular reading often used at weddings. Interestingly, Jesus is not recorded



as making any statement whatsoever on homosexuality.

In a few years' time we may wonder what all the fuss was about. When the Church of England first voted to ordain women priests in 1992 (Methodists followed in 1994), some objected at the time, but a generation later, it would be difficult to imagine these churches without the ministry of ordained women as well as men.

We have all lived through a horrible pandemic, which isn't over yet, and many of us have sadly lost family members or friends during this time. However this and the slower pace of lockdown, may have given us all a chance to reflect on our attitudes to our relationships.

If we are honest, what are any of us unsure about or even scared of? The LGBTIQA+ community, which may include you or people close to you, has been hurt for long enough.

### Isn't it time to do something about that?

# NAME THEM ONE BY ONE

It will often surprise you what the Lord has done.

Old age is difficult to cope with at the best of times, but especially if, like my husband Alan, you have Parkinson's. He has struggled with this disease for over 20 years now, but he has never let it get him down. It's ghastly to watch his struggle sometimes, but we both live by the words of that great hymn: trust and obey, for there's no other way.

I'm Alan's second wife. He lost his first wife in childbirth and sadly the baby also died. Then later, his older brother was killed on an Autobahn in Germany while they were holidaying together. At just 19, Alan had to arrange transportation of his brother's body back to England.

But God works His miracles! First, I was in hospital for three months during my first pregnancy and after our son Peter was born I suffered severe post-natal depression and had to have electrical treatment. But I got through it.

Second, as a teenager, Peter had a severe stammer, yet he is now an Anglican vicar in Hampshire with responsibility for two churches.

Third, we also have a beautiful daughter Louise who is a Senior Social Worker on a Mental Health Team. Peter is also a former Social Worker on Child Protection.

When life is hard, when sorrow fills our hearts, when we wonder if God is even there for us, we hold on tight to the knowledge that God's love is the bedrock for our faith and indeed for our very existence. His love, revealed most clearly in the cross of Christ, sustains us, encourages us, and enables us to trust Him to work his miracles - and even to rejoice in the midst of hard times. *Pauline D*



FBWC invite you to our next tour, postponed from last year, and the good news is that this time hot and cold drinks will be available, together with our usual delicious homemade cakes, for which a donation is appreciated.

We shall be hearing the stories of some of Worthing's traders, three of whom include: George Basson Hoskings, who in 1905 opened Worthing's first café -- Khongs Eastern Coffee Café at 8 South Street. He was a specialist dealer in tea and coffee and incorporated the sale of these within the café. The aroma of coffee emanating from the café enticed many customers in and was enjoyed by those waiting at the nearby bus stops or walking along the street.

Next: Harry Gosden, born in Tangmere, who had trained as a baker by the time he moved to Worthing in 1884. He started working at Knowles Bakery in Broadwater and worked his way up, eventually being appointed manager of the bakery. By 1900 he had entered partnership of the business with James Bushby Knowles. Later, after James's death, Harry took over the business himself.

Third: William Ernest Barker. He initially established a cycle business in Oxford Road. Barker had a very interesting hobby – wireless telegraphy. By 1911, he had set up two wires over his house and together with parts of bicycles from his shop, he made a crystal detector. Eventually, he was granted a licence to set up a wireless station. His son, William junior, took on the cycle business but also opened a shop in South Street, Tarring selling wirelesses & gramophone. Many of us will know the shop.

To hear more about these men and other local traders, please meet at the cemetery chapels at 10.50. It will be a very interesting tour and we look forward to seeing you there.

### FAREWELL FROM 'MARY IN THE OFFICE'

"Wait a minute, I've just got to answer the phone... right, now where was I?" "Oh, my goodness we've had loads of emails overnight." "Hello, lovely to see you" (someone's just come in)." Oh, it's the phone again.



Sometimes it feels like everything is happening at once! But would I have it any other way? Not really. As good as it was during lockdown to be able to just get on with my work (there had to be something good about lockdown), I really missed the interaction with other people from the church. This job is more than just a job; a place of work; employment. It's the people, and the people at Offington are really very friendly. I sometimes say I have 200 bosses, because I work for every one of you!

But the best bit is knowing that in doing this work I am also serving the Lord. I hope He thinks I'm doing a good job! I have loved being Church Administrator at OP. God really knew what he was doing when he planned this part of my life and led me to this place without me always realising it. When I think back nine years, to when I was being made redundant from a job that I hadn't always enjoyed, I wasn't sure then what direction I wanted to go. I didn't want a full time demanding job but I wasn't ready to give up working altogether.

I jumped at the chance, accepted, and was interviewed on the day after I had returned from Australia.

I couldn't have felt much worse! I was totally jetlagged and I really thought I'd messed up the entire interview, but I felt that at least I'd tried and I knew that I'd been given fair treatment. To my surprise and joy (there's been a lot of surprise and joy at OP!) I had a phone call from James offering me the job! I haven't looked back since that time. God just led me safely through all the stages of getting this job and He has led me every day since I've been here. Now, I believe He is telling me to take a rest.

Although there has been a lot of surprise, it hasn't always been joyful; there have been ups and downs, highs and lows, but I have always had the support of a good team of people around me. So I would like to say a heartfelt 'thank you' to my bosses - all 200 of you!

I hope it's not goodbye altogether, though. I'm very local, so I hope to see you in the area. I'll keep an eye out for future events and maybe I'll bump into you there. God bless all of you, you're a fantastic bunch of people. "Mary in the Office"

### **LESSONS FOR LIFE?**

### ENJOY HEAT OR ENJOY WHAT WE EAT? THIS COULD BE OUR CHOICE!

Fruit and veg farmers have been hard hit by extreme weather events over the past few years. Heavy rainfall in 2015 and 2016 flooded farmland and destroyed crops.



Summer heatwaves not only scorch us, but also farmland. The 2019 and 2020 heatwaves have caused devastating reductions in crop yields and high financial losses. The lack of water and extreme heat caused potato yields to drop by 20%, and allegedly left our beloved British chip more than one inch smaller! If events of this magnitude persist, some growers could potentially be put out of business.

### What does the future hold for British fruit and veg farmers?

If our emissions continue to increase, there is an increased chance of milder, wetter winters and hotter, drier summers, along with an increase in the frequency and intensity of extremes. Higher summer temperatures and reduced water availability in eastern and southern England (the country's biggest agricultural areas) could make current farming activities impossible, due to limited water supplies and dry soil.

A trend towards wetter winters is likely to introduce other problems such as soil compaction and erosion.

Changes to average temperatures and rainfall patterns will have a large impact on the agricultural industry — but the



real threat to farmers is the rise in extreme weather conditions. If warming continues at its current rate, heatwaves will become longer and more intense, and by 2050 could occur every other year. There is also a high chance of record-breaking rainfall hitting parts of England each winter, further increasing the risk to farmers operations and ultimately their livelihoods.

Make no mistake - this is a big deal. There is a real risk that the things we love, such as great British food, could be lost to climate change. We need to act. And we need to act fast.

### Can we save British fruit and veg?

The answer is yes, we can, but we must act as individuals as well as lobbying Governments and organisations, to pull together and start reducing our carbon emissions <u>today</u>.

Start shopping locally, or at least look for local produce and eat

seasonally. For example, tomatoes are widely grown in Sussex and we shouldn't be eating Spanish tomatoes which have travelled miles to our shops. These small acts reduce our food miles while supporting the local economy and most importantly assist our health.



Eat less meat. Beef and lamb are the biggest problems here - producing nearly 60% of UK agricultural emissions. For regular meat eaters, reducing our meat intake may feel quite daunting but we don't all have to become vegetarian overnight! Just eating a bit less red meat (for example, having meat-free Mondays) would make a huge difference. It's not about taking Draconian measures - its about looking sensibly at what we can do to help. There are lots of easy-to-make tasty, healthy alternatives to meat. We have to start somewhere!

Don't waste food. In the UK, a staggering £13m worth of edible food goes into the bin <u>every year</u>. This avoidable food waste generates 19 million tonnes of greenhouse gases over its lifetime. Preventing that pollution is equivalent to taking one in four cars off UK roads - a major win in terms of fewer emissions.

While there are many areas of food waste that we can't control, we can still be conscientious and sensible. We can all plan our meals to make maximum use of the quantities we may have to buy. We should all buy only what we need, store our produce properly and be clever with our preparation. Then we can all turn our homes into zero-food-waste zones.

As a country and as responsible members of society, we must step up and play our part, so we can ensure the delicious, healthy, home-grown produce we enjoy today is still available for generations to come.

### **FOG AND RESCUES**

Hello friends,

isn't it glorious to back in the church properly? I had a lovely day a Sunday or so ago, with Pam's beautiful service in the morning and Sue leading us in Café church in the evening. Lots of live music and a truly living message.

This month I have a quick update for you, thanking those who contributed to the toilet fund. We have now provided a fourth toilet in Beth's village. There's no picture of the finished article as yet, but do keep an eye on the board at church.

Many big towns in Kenya have a 'Shauri Yako', the slum or the poor part. Pictured right is the small child who unfortunately fell into the defunct toilet and needed rescuing. That was a traumatic moment.



The picture on the left is one of people who will benefit from the new loo – they send you greetings, love and thanks. Note from the picture the weather that Kenya is currently experiencing - thick fog and no sun. Quite unusual.

Needed next is a 5,000 litre water tank! Who knew that a giant plastic bucket could be so expensive?! This can be

filled with harvested rainwater, and saves using river water that needs fetching and isn't often very clean.

As you probably know, the average household in the UK uses 150 litres of water per person per day – quick showers use around 40 litres, less than baths (at 80 to 100 litres!). Washing machines use about 50 litres each time, so it all adds up. 5,000 litres of water will keep several Kenyan families going for two weeks or more.

And here's an interesting thing I found out – in Swahili, the name Shauri Yako literally means 'Carry your own cross' and is an expression meaning, 'your problem.' I'm so glad we can help them carry their cross, and lighten the burden a little as we walk together.

French-speaking Niger has a population of 23.6m, less than one-third of the UK, but occupies five times the area. Nine out of 10 adults in rural areas cannot read or write.

Whilst almost everyone is Muslim, there is usually respect for Christians. One lady told of an incident in which money was stolen by someone entrusted with it, and she was appointed to take over because she was a Christian and could be trusted. On another occasion, the same lady was going to church when she was stopped by guards—who let her through when they saw her Bible! That was answered prayer, as she'd not remembered her ID on that day!

Theological training among church leaders is low and this can be a big barrier to promoting the Christian faith. Please pray for Niger, a poor nation and a tough place to be. 
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### **WORTHING 4 REFUGEES UPDATE**

Good news!

The drop-in is for refugee and asylum-seeking families. It is a social space with food, games/activities for the children, information services and signposting to assistance organisations for adults.




We need drivers, befrienders, people willing to do activities with the children, people to help set up and take down, people to help in the kitchen with food (bring and share) and washing-up.

But did you know that over half of the world's languages have no scripture at all, and approximately 1.5 billion people do not have a full Bible in their own language?

Clearly, translation work is an ongoing, mammoth task. In 2020, despite the pandemic, over 707 million people were given access to God's word in their language. The world's first Sign Language Bible was completed in 2020 and in the same year over 46 languages received God's word for the first time. Now, over 5.7 billion people have access to scripture in their own tongue.

As we all attempt to rebuild and reimagine society in the light of Covid-19, think about the role scripture can play in helping people know more about God and his plans for their lives. Transaltions work is never-ending, just as our own language changes and some words become outdated, so it is across the world.

Recently I came across the story of a modern-day Good Samaritan whose act of great kindness shone like a light in the darkness.

Nigel Yehoshua, a 56-year-old Jewish electrician died on May 17 this year, as the result of a head injury sustained during the riots in Jerusalem.
