SPOTLIGHT

Cover Picture

Our cover shows a field of poppies at sunset. During the First World War, previously beautiful countryside was blasted, bombed and fought over, again and again. The landscape swiftly turned to fields of mud: bleak and barren where little or nothing could grow.

But out of this devastation the delicate but resilient bright red Flanders poppies grew and flourished in their thousands.

Inspired by the now-famous poem "In Flanders Fields", Moina Michael, American War Secretary, bought poppies to sell to raise money for Servicemen in need after WWI. This was then adopted by The Royal British Legion 100 years ago.

Interestingly, leaves did not originally appear on the poppies. In 1960 a leaf was introduced as it was the practice to make poppy sprays of five silk poppies tied to seven pieces of green fern. By 1984 demand for them had grown to 12 million a year, but it wasn't until 1995 that poppies were sold with leaves included.

The parts of the poppy you buy from the British Legion can all be recycled, and they are working to remove all single-use plastics in the future. As an alternative to a paper poppy, why not buy a durable enamel poppy pin? But whatever poppy symbol you choose, and however you wear it, please wear it with pride.

Worthing Mental Health Awareness Week Carol's Report

It was wonderful to welcome 42 groups, charities and organisations as well as the Mayor and Sir Peter Bottomley MP to

Offington for Worthing Mental Health Awareness Week.



One of the highlights for me was the wonderful key note speaker, Tanya from Championing Youth Minds. Aged just 20, Tanya held us spellbound as she described her own mental health challenges; the loss to suicide of a former schoolfriend and the lack of relevant and engaging resources and information for young people.

I thoroughly enjoyed the Dementia Afternoon Tea (which was open to everyone) and it was good to see members of the lunch club, two community 'stay active' groups, our community police officer and others enjoy a quiz, cream tea (donated by Piglets Pantry) and singing.

Martine from Cycall spoke about the facilities and opportunities for friendship, fresh air and gentle exercise on the specially adapted bikes available at Cycall's base at Brooklands.

Turning Tides' Hidden and Hunted exhibition was set up in church on 1st Oct, just ahead of WMHAW. These photos were taken by six women without homes and show the raw reality of their daily challenges for survival.

We were so privileged to have Janie, mental health and trauma specialist, describe the stories behind some of these photos.

Carl Walker, a community psychologist, set up Worthing Food Foundation and he spoke about the links between food insecurities and mental health. This organisation aims to remove some of the stigma around using a food bank by being self-referral, placing orders by phone rather than queueing up, and home deliveries.

Worthing Mental Health Awareness Week could not happen without the prayerful and practical support of Offington Park Church, and I am immensely grateful to those who helped with refreshments, by talking to visitors, attending the talks, and by moving furniture. In particular I am grateful to the amazing Tech-Team, and our very own Kevin.

SAVE ENERGY — SAVE THE PLANET

With the punishing rises in wholesale gas prices over recent months, we will all notice the increase in our energy bills. Get more from the energy you pay for with these simple, everyday actions that will help you increase your energy efficiency, lower your home's carbon footprint and save money on your monthly bills.



Fill 'er up: Half-load settings on washing machines save very little energy, so they're much less efficient per garment compared to a full load. Do fewer (but fuller) wash loads instead.

Choose wisely: Glass or ceramic ovenware retains heat better than metal. The same is true for cast-iron pans. Copper-bottomed pans heat more quickly than stainless steel ones.

Keep it clean: Extractor fans and tumble driers often have filters that get clogged up with fluff or grease making them run less efficiently – give them a quick clean for best results.

Get set for Eco: On your dishwasher or boiler, the eco setting heats water more slowly, using less energy. You get the same result, it just takes a little longer.

Stock up: Keep your fridge too empty and you waste energy cooling the air; keep it too full and it could stop air circulating. Aim to keep it about 75% full to maximise efficiency.

Stand off: Unless switched off at the wall, appliances like your TV continue to use energy, costing the average UK home £35 per year. There are now clever apps that allow you to switch off the TV with just a tap. No more reaching behind the telly!

Outside - now!: Where you can, dry your laundry outside. Tumble driers are still one of the most energy-hungry appliances we can own. If you can't dry outside for whatever reason, try a heated indoor airer

instead – they use much less energy than a dryer. **Don't fill 'er up:** If we all filled our kettle just to

the level we need, we could save up to a third of the energy we have been using. By boiling filled

kettles, the UK wastes £68 million worth of energy every year!

Be easily LED: Traditional bulbs are extremely inefficient. Switch to modern LEDs, which are very efficient and also last longer, so are less wasteful too. You can now get Smart LED bulbs which can help you save even more energy as you can switch them on and off remotely. **Shower less:** No, we mean take shorter showers! This will save both water and the energy needed to heat it. Think about installing a lowflow showerhead too, to save even more of the wet stuff.

Turn it down: With today's effective washing machine detergents, there's often no need to wash clothes any higher than 30°C – clean clothes, energy saved, job done! **Frost warning:** Avoid wasting energy by planning in advance and defrosting food in the fridge or at room temperature rather than in a microwave.



Free of charge: Unplug all your chargers! Across the country, people are unnecessarily over-charging mobiles, MP3 players, and laptops. Keep an eye out, and unplug your device as soon as it's fully charged. This easy habit will save energy and prolong the battery life, as well as saving around £60 a year on electricity bills.

Don't let your light shine: Try dimming your smartphone screen and switching off background apps, as well as switching data and Bluetooth off when not needed. This will save the batteries and be less distracting. It'll make the phone last longer between charges too. You only live twice: Before you automatically chuck clothes in the laundry basket, stop and think if it could go longer between washes even just be worn twice. Obviously, this doesn't work for undies or inner layers, but jeans, jumpers and skirts don't need to be washed every single time they're worn.

Keep a lid on it: Keep your saucepans covered when you're cooking so the heat remains in the pan and your food cooks more guickly. It's hot in there: It's tempting to open the oven door to check on dinner, but this wastes energy by letting heat out unnecessarily. Keep your oven door clean and check food through the glass instead. Macro the micro: If you can, use the guicker microwave rather than the oven or stove to save energy. It's worth considering a slow cooker too, as they're one of the most energy-efficient kitchen appliances.

JET-PROPELLED CUBS

A fantastic day of Kart Racing

The red lights flashed with the warning siren as the carts gently rolled up to the starting line. The yellow lights flashed, the grip tightened on the push handles, and the driver's hands squeezed the rope ready for the horn to sound and the light to go green.



Like a shot the karts rocketed off the line and the parents roared in support of their team's kart. Round the first corner and the inside team built a gap on the other team. Through to the next straight and into the next corner where the gap narrowed as the team moved to the outside lane. Within seconds the karts hurtled towards the chequered flag and the finish line.

This was the first year at the "Supreme Championships" and our 10th Worthing Cubs' entry 'Blade Runner' ran amazingly well throughout. We split into two teams (the organisers arranged to lend us a kart) and the Cubs worked out their teams for the day; the drivers and engines and how they would change or stay the same for each race. 



It's up to you to monitor new freebies on offer. When you want to offer something, you just post an offer message to the group page. You can list everything from Etch-A-Sketches to espresso makers and designer sofas to dungarees. These sites aren't just sources of freebies – they're recycling communities, so they can be a great way to give away something you no longer want or need and help needy or single-parent families save cash too.

well as kitting up for nothing, there's the environmental benefit of saving unwanted possessions being flung into landfill sites. Freecycle and Freegle

You'll be amazed at what's willingly taken - old magazine collections, spare carpets or even **EMPTY** paint pots. Amongst the grotty, moth-bitten junk, there's also top-quality unused stuff from pianos to surf boards to boats! It's true - one man's junk is another's treasure. Office clear-outs or emigrating families are rich sources, but most commonly available are big 'n' bulky items that are tough to take to charity shops or the tip – like sofas, computer desks, fridges, freezers and baby buggies.

FANTASTIC PLASTIC: Don't just reuse plastic bags – sell them! With the charge for single-use carrier bags now up to 10p, it's a no-brainer reusing old plastic bags or taking your own bags with you. But, unlikely as it may sound, both Morrison and Ocado will actually pay you to take used plastic bags off your hands when you shop online. Morrison will only accept its own bags, but will give you 10p for each bag deducted from the cost of your current order. The bags from that order can't be returned until the next one, however. Ocado will give you 10p for each Ocado bag but they will still recycle bags from any supermarket (up to a maximum of 99 per order). Returned bags are recycled into new ones – so plastic waste is reduced and money is saved in one fell swoop.

Pray too, that with the right support and theological training, church leaders will feel empowered to share their faith.


