#### **Cover Picture**

Our cover shows the Chichester Market Cross, a Grade I listed building which stands at the intersection of the city's four principal streets.

It is believed to have been built in 1501 by Bishop Edward Story, to replace an earlier wooden construction. The Bishop allowed poor peasants, with only a few vegetables or eggs to sell, to trade without paying a toll provided they could stand under the cross. Bishop Story died in 1503 and left £25 a year in his will for the Cross's upkeep.

The current Cross is an eight-sided structure made of Caen stone, a popular building material of the time, and has a central column supported by eight flying buttresses. Around the base of the column is a low stone seating area with a stone-paved floor.

In 1724, Lady Farrington paid for clocks to be added on three sides, the fourth side marking her gift with an inscription. Three clocks were not popular and in 1746, they were replaced with four new dials. The clocks currently in situ were installed in 1904 and are now powered by electricity.

The Cross ceased to serve its original purpose in 1808, when the increased population of the city meant a more extensive market area was required and a large market house was built nearby.

#### Dear Friends,

As I preached at Pentecost, the church must be brave enough to speak the language of the common age, to allow the Gospel message of hope, love and peace to reach out into ever larger areas. This can sometimes mean facing challenges.

We offer our congratulations and prayers to Rev. Ian Couchman who will be accepted into Full Connexion and ordained this year at Conference. At the service he will hear the words: "this ministry will make great demands upon you and upon those close to you, yet in all this, the Holy Spirit will sustain you by his grace". These words are echoed in our covenant service each year. The Holy Spirit is our constant helper and guide.

As we give thanks for the past, let's look to the future with hope, anticipation and joy. (continued over...)

If you are looking to the future and wonder what it holds for you, may you be aware of the Holy Spirit guiding your thoughts and direction. # We continue to hold Ukraine in our prayers in light of the ongoing conflict.

We pray that refugees may find safe places to stay, and that they will find a heartfelt, compassionate welcome wherever they



have fled. We pray especially for those people still in Ukraine who cannot flee, for example those with disabilities or the elderly. Lord, protect them from the senseless violence, and help the aid agencies in Ukraine to provide them with essential supplies, such as food and clean water.

We ask for healing for those who are wounded or are suffering from trauma; and comfort for those who are grieving.

We pray for those in positions of leadership on both sides. That they will be filled with compassion, wisdom, calm and a strong desire for peace. We pray too for world leaders, that they will balance their responses to the injustice of the invasion by seeking ways to build bridges, de-escalate tensions, and restore global security.



Lord, may your church in the Ukraine, Russia, the wider region and indeed the world be a voice for peace; may they find the resources they need to help the vulnerable, whilst being vocal and persistent against aggression and injustice. May they be a beacon of light, bringing a message of love and hope in the midst of the darkness.

We pray for those suffering indirectly from the war; for those seeing a significant rise in their cost of living, from food to fuel. We ask that food and fuel prices will stabilise, and that provision will be made for economically poorer countries, that are always disproportionately affected by such shocks.

Above all, Lord, we pray for a swift end to the violence - swifter than anyone expects or hopes for. Equip those trying to find diplomatic solutions leading to lasting peace, so that people who have fled will be able to return home, and that what has been destroyed will be rebuilt. Give strength to individuals and organisations in Ukraine, Russia and the region who are working for peace at local, national and regional levels.

# Christians Against Poverty (CAP) provides free debt help and local community groups across the UK.

CAP is a free service, run with local churches, providing practical and emotional support and showing people in debt that there is always hope.



With a small donation and a great deal of faith, John

Kirkby started CAP in 1996. He believed God was calling him to sacrifice his career in finance and use his knowledge of the industry to help the poor.

His faith adventure led him to people overcome by debt; parents who couldn't feed their children, families facing eviction and desperate people living in fear and without hope. He used his expertise to negotiate with creditors, establish budgets and offer a lifeline to those trapped in debt.

John knew that people all over the country were struggling in the same way and he began looking to replicate the work across the UK. With the vital ingredients of a church to partner with, a passionate person to be trained as a debt counsellor and the faith that God would provide, four new CAP centres were opened at the end of 1998. Since then, CAP has rapidly grown its debt centre network and expanded its services to tackle the causes of debt and poverty too.

### **NOTES TO NOTE!**

Time to check your purses and wallets! **On 30 September** old-style paper £20 and £50 notes (over £17bn remain in circulation) will cease

to be legal tender and you won't be able to spend them in shops, although you will be able to deposit them into your account. The new notes feature the artist JMW Turner on the £20 and mathematician Alan Turing on the £50.

Despite cash usage falling sharply during the pandemic, cash still accounts for around 17% of all payments, making it the second most-popular way to pay after debit cards.

Family tensions are pretty normal. But resolving them is tricky. Rebekah's methods certainly left a lot to be desired.

We don't know for sure why Rebekah tricked husband Isaac into giving the family headship to Jacob the youngest, rather than the elder son Esau. It may have been in reaction to Isaac's favouring of Esau, or because Esau was rebellious and Rebekah had lost her patience with him.

Whatever the reason, there's no hint that she prayerfully placed her son's lives into God's hands. Instead, she used manipulation and deception to try and shape her family's future according to what made sense to her vivid imagination.

Her actions ripped the family apart. She may have got her own way, but she was forced to send Jacob running for his life.

Family tensions are a given. Peaceful, united resolutions are not. Rebekah shows us the tragedy of trying to force our own agendas. We can end up destroying the very thing we're trying to save.

# FAMOUS CHRISTIANS Iohn Glenn

Sixty years ago, on 20 February 1962, John Glenn became the first American astronaut to orbit the Earth. He made three orbits, lasting almost five hours, in the space capsule Friendship 7, which



he named himself. These orbits made the Presbyterian Christian a hero and a household name.

John Glenn represented Ohio as a Democratic senator for 25 years from 1974, and returned to space in 1998 aboard the space shuttle Discovery, making him at the time the oldest person (at 77) to fly in space. That mission's main aim was to study the effects of space flight on older people.

He later said: "To see (Earth) laid out like that only strengthens my beliefs. Could this have just happened? Was it an accident that a bunch of flotsam and jetsam suddenly started making these orbits of their own accord? I can't believe that. This was a definite plan. This is one big thing in space that shows me there is a God. Some power put all this in orbit and keeps it there."

Glenn became an elder in the Presbyterian Church USA and attended the National Presbyterian Church as a member of Congress. "I'm a Presbyterian, a Protestant Presbyterian, and I take my religion seriously as a matter of fact," he once said.

John Glenn died in 2016, aged 95.


Unfortunately, he couldn't quite recall their names, so he said: "Will those wanting to get married please come to the front?"

Ukrainian and Russian.

We have all watched with horror the unfolding war in Ukraine and we have been truly heartbroken by the human suffering and atrocities we are seeing every day on our TV screens.

Humanitarian aid is, thankfully, now reaching Ukraine, as are Bibles from the Bible Society team in Ukraine. Despite bombs and missiles raining down on them, and having to drive over rugaed terrain as roads and bridges are bombed-out, aid workers are getting through to areas of great need. People in towns outside Kyiv have been asking for bread, but also Bibles as they know that God's word can be a comfort in troubled times, even though many have not had a Bible before. In some towns, especially Mariupol, but also Borodianka and Bucha. the devastation is total. There is no electricity, natural gas or water and people are cooking on fires just to survive. Ukraine, which gained independence from the Soviet Union in 1991, is over 2.5 times the size of the UK with a population of over 43m, although many millions have fled the country and many more are displaced from their homes. Ukraine (the name comes from the Slavic 'ukraina', meaning 'borderland') is a strongly Christian country with over 70% identifying as Christians. Bible society is not only working in Ukraine, but also in the UK, handing out Bibles and resources to refugees in both

Pray for Ukraine. Pray first and foremost that this terrible and unnecessary war will end soon, and that humanitarian aid, in whatever form it arrives, may truly be able to meet the greatest needs.

Pray also that, through the distribution of God's word, the people of Ukraine may have hope and a light in the darkness, and that their resolve will help the country to a better place to face the future, whatever it may hold.

Pray lastly for the children of Ukraine, that they may grow up in a land free from the horrors of war where God's words of peace and justice prevail over human suffering.

# A JOURNEY THROUGH THE BIBLE

# 1 Samuel

Do you sometimes feel like you know better than God? Do you get tired of having to be different? Does it feel like God's ways are less exciting than everyone else's?



In 1 Samuel, God's people felt that way too. They were fed up with their Judges; they wanted a king like all the other nations. God knew they were really saying they no longer wanted Him to be King. But He gave them what they wanted anyway: King Saul, the tallest, handsomest man in the land and good king material.

Maybe not. This book traces his downward spiral from jealousy into madness and just plain evil. Saul didn't start out a bad guy, but he made poor decisions, thinking he knew better than God.

Meanwhile, enter one of the Bible's biggest heroes: David, the shepherd boy who would become Israel's greatest ever king! His life is a thrilling tale of bravery, close shaves and killing giants. But what really made David so different was being "a man after God's own heart".

Follow the stories of Saul and David and discover that, in the end, there are only two ways to live in this world: for God or as god. And only one ends well.



# **SMARTEN UP YOUR HOME!**

Any home can be a smart home. It's the powerful connections that make it smart. But just what is a "smart home"?

Well, an official definition of "smart home" doesn't exist. Smart home technology is still in its infancy, and even among those who have adopted it, one smart home can look very different from another, depending on the number and type of smart devices in the home. At its very core, a smart home is probably best defined as a living area with connected technology meant to enhance the home. This could include lights, plugs, doorbells, locks or voice assistants like Google Assistant and Alexa.

Smart thermostats can actually programme themselves and save you more money than they cost to buy. Through artificial intelligence, a smart thermostat will learn when you tend to leave home, when you return, and what your preferred temperature is in the winter and summer. Then,



all on its own, it will start controlling the temperature of your house based on that information. Teaching it is as simple as changing the temperature when you feel the need.



Most people who are home a lot probably don't need one, though, and would benefit more from **smart lights** and plugs which offer Voice Control and more. These require no installation knowledge. Light bulbs come in a range of colours that you can change as required. But you'll need one for every light you want to make smart, which means the cost can add up quickly.

Smart switches and outlets replace your existing traditional light switches and outlets, and you will likely need specialist help to install. A smart light switch can cost the same as a smart light bulb or two but controls many or all lights in a room, usually with integrated voice assistant control.

Smart outlets and smart plugs generally have the same features (automation, voice assistant, and energy monitoring). Simply plug into an outlet, then plug a device into it. No wiring is necessary.

With a **smart door lock**, you can grant PIN or app access to your lock and revoke it when it isn't needed anymore. Installation isn't much more difficult than replacing a standard lock. **Smart doorbells** are more tricky to install, but will give you video when movement, such as someone approaching the door, is detected. Between the doorbell and the lock, you'll be able to see who is at your house and, if appropriate, grant access remotely, say to a family member who's dropped by while you're out.

Then, with a **voice assistant**, you can pull your various devices together to make them work in collaboration. That means you can control a whole room or whole house of devices and create automation routines that take care of things for you.



If you frequently forget to turn off the lights or lock a door before you leave, you can set up a daily routine to solve the problem. Much like a smart home hub, every device connected to your voice assistant can be controlled from a single app.

Some might say that nobody needs to talk to a house to control lights, but there's something magical about the first time you have your hands full of groceries, and you speak to turn on the kitchen lights! Afterwards, you may never go back!

While smart home devices cost some money, so do other household purchases you don't really need, such as floor rugs and decorations. The question should always be whether the cost is worth what you get out of it. Do the cost/benefit maths. A starter smart home can be put together for less than £300 and more importantly, you don't have to buy everything at once.

Start with a single voice assistant, then sprinkle in a light bulb or two. Build your smart home up over time, and you won't feel the bite of the cost so much.

Nearly every smart home is different, and that's no surprise because homes themselves are very different. Whether you live in a small flat or a mansion, you can connect your living space to a network and gain new control of your home. At the end of the day, a smart home is whatever you want it to be.

# **KENYA CONNECTION** (supporting Shauri Yako)

Hello Friends,

It has been a time of ups and downs in Shauri Yako – I have great and good news that a Welsh charity has funded some of Beth's work in schools and helped with the sewing and distribution of sanitary pads! It took a lot of pressure off Beth for the immediate care of young people.

However the charity is very strictly administered in that it will only allow Beth to use the funds to pay for school places, food and materials for pads to give away. The money cannot be used to fund anything that will enable people to earn money, and Beth's control of it is limited.

There is a significant difference in how this charity works and the funding we provide thanks to your generosity. Our fund focuses on providing sustainable help - machines, material, goats, chickens, seed, practical training - things that will enable Beth's community to eventually be self-sufficient, just as Christian Aid has always advocated.

Two weeks ago, a toilet collapsed with a woman inside. It was not one of our toilets, but a shoddy, badly dug one. The woman was rescued, but the community became at risk of disease from the water supply becoming contaminated. Children who don't have a toilet to use quickly spread disease, often cholera, which has an impact on the whole community.

Money was sent to build a new toilet, but Peter, the man who builds them, was attacked and robbed recently. He was beaten with his own hammer and needed hospital treatment. He has lost his tools, money, phone and even his shoes.

The urgency to build a new toilet grows every day. Peter will slowly recover, but needs his tools to be replaced so he can work once his head and hand have healed. If you can, please help us save the community from disease and a good man and his family from destitution.

Finally, as many of you will know, I am moving away from Sussex this summer. I'm going to miss you all terribly - this lovely community has been a family to me, and I hope to stay connected through visits and the Internet. Next time I will write an update on all we have achieved together since the Support for Shauri Yako began. Thank you so much for all your love and concern, help and prayers for our wider family in Kenya. Please contact me if you want to know more about any of the projects.

# 2 July 2022 "Centenarians"

Worthing developed as a high class seaside resort and spa town following the visit of Princess Amelia, the daughter of George III, who, in 1798, spent five months here partaking of sea baths whilst recovering from an injured knee. The health benefits



of the town possibly contributed to the longevity of some of the centenarian residents buried in the cemetery, although it is interesting to note that Henry Irvine, who died in 1920, aged 101 was the only male.

This tour features some centenarian ladies including Emma Louise Rooke, who, at 107, was the oldest person to have been buried in the cemetery and at the time of her death was the oldest woman in England.

# 6 August 2022 "The workhouse"

Following a day's hard labour stone-cracking or getting up rocks fit for burning into lime, and then returning for a monotonous meal including mouldy bread, eaten whilst wearing the same shirt for six weeks and the same pair of socks for ten weeks, does not sound very appealing.

Had it been your misfortune to live in East Preston Workhouse in the late 1800's, this could have been your lot in life.

We shall be hearing about some of the inmates such as Benjamin Russell, who on more than one occasion was brought up in custody on a charge of being found unlawfully drunk, or Ellen Sophia Clarke, who following a reasonably comfortable start in life descended in a downward spiral in her later years, until she eventually died in the workhouse.
