Springhill Avenue has already become a very busy thoroughfare. Questions linger regarding how continuous changes will change the character of the community. Businesses are sure to bring more traffic flow, safety issues, and additional noise.

This community has seen major changes throughout the years. The history of Sand Town is not documented under any historical registers. However, there are living descendants of the Sand Town residents (former slaves who sought a better life and built a community for their children to carry on) are still living in the Springhill/Knowles Street vicinity. They are hopeful that the rezoning committee will take their concerns to heart and reconsider rezoning the area from residential to business.
