On September 5, the U.S. Department of Education eliminated all three national Braille Training Grants under the 235E Demonstration Program. This decision directly affects Leader Dog clients and the future of braille literacy and the independence of people who are blind, DeafBlind or low vision — including many individuals we serve.

Without these programs:

- · Fewer professionals will be trained to teach braille.
- · Adults and children will lose access to essential literacy tools.
- · The braille literacy crisis will deepen across all age groups.

How You Can Help:

Key talking points you can use:

- Braille is literacy. Without it, people lose access to education, employment, and independence.
- This is not a budget issue—it's a policy decision that eliminates all federal braille training programs.

Let's stand together to protect braille literacy and ensure accessible education remains a reality for our Leader Dog clients and the blind community.



Growing Our Membership



My name is Terry Nickerson, and I am the new Volunteer Coordinator for Gentiva Hospice of Jefferson City. I'm reaching out to see if the Lions Club may know of any members or community individuals interested in volunteering with us.

We are currently seeking both Patient Care Volunteers and Administrative Volunteers:

- Patient Care Volunteers visit and offer support to hospice patients and their families. This may include reading, conversation, companionship, playing games, singing, or simply providing a comforting presence. Volunteers may also offer caregiver or family respite or assist with arts and crafts activities.
- Administrative Volunteers help in our office with tasks such as filing, organizing supplies, and other supportive duties that help our team provide the highest level of care.

Our volunteers are an essential part of our interdisciplinary hospice team, which includes nurses, doctors, social workers, spiritual care providers, and aides. Volunteers may also assist with special events such as memorial services and veteran recognition ceremonies for our patients and families.

Volunteer requirements include:

- Must be at least 18 years of age
- Background check, interview, fingerprinting, and urine drug test
- Completion of orientation training and competency testing
- (schedule is flexible)

If your members or community contacts would like to learn more about hospice care or the volunteer experience, I would be happy to provide additional information or host an informational session.

CATARACT-A-THON (CAT) COMES TO KANSAS CITY!

Fellow Lions and Friends, what wonderful news out of Kansas City. Many Lions (particularly PDG Mickey Beach) there have been encouraging UMKC residents to organize a Cataract-A-Thon like we have in Memphis. This is where many patients come to a location and receive free cataract surgery, basically, at no cost to patients and very little cost to Lions.

We have conducted CAT since 2017 and have provided over 150 patients with the miracle of restored sight.

What we need from you, especially all of you Lions in west Missouri, is to beat the bushes and find enough patients to make this first Missouri Cataract-A-Thon a huge success. These doctors cannot make the contacts and write up the applications...we need YOU to help with that. To that end I am attaching a Mid-South Lions sight application for you to copy and use.

Our financial guidelines are only 100% of poverty income, but this effort allows patients to make up to 200% of poverty income thus increasing the applicant pool significantly.

BUT WE CAN'T DO IT WITHOUT YOU!!!

Please make this a high priority in your community and let's make this work for everyone. And then maybe we can make this an annual event to help those in need on an even larger scale.



CHAMOIS

The Chamois Lions Club met for their regular monthly meeting on Monday evening, October 13, 2025 at the Chamois Community Center. Nine Lions and three guests were present for the dinner and business meeting. Guests included Lions District 26-M7 First Vice District Governor Lion Bruce Berger and Chamois City Clerk Meghan Birmingham in person and Chamois Mayor Marie Slusser via telephone.

Prior to the dinner, Lion President Jason Hilkerbaumer led the Chamois Lions in the Pledge of Allegiance and also offered the table prayer. The Ladies of St. Mary's Catholic Church served a delicious dinner of chili, cornbread, veggie tray, fruit, and cake for dessert.



Prior to the start of the business meeting, Lion President Hilkerbaumer introduced Lion Bruce Berger, who was visiting in his official capacity as First Vice District Governor. Lion Berger shared Lions Clubs International (LCI) President A. P. Singh's motto "Lead to Serve, Serve to Lead". Lion Berger reported on LCI's Vision 1.5 project to have 1.5 million Lions worldwide through efforts to charter new Lions Clubs, to strengthen existing clubs, and to focus on the retention of existing Lions members. Lion Berger also reported on the State of Missouri Lions' Long-Range Planning Committee's efforts to study how to operate the Missouri Lions State office either in a physical office or via employees working remotely and shared the dates of upcoming Lions meetings. Lions District 26-M7 will hold a Cabinet meeting on November 1, 2025 at the Missouri Lions State Office in Jefferson City, the Lions Mid-Winter Forum will be held on February 6-8, 2026, the Lions District 26-M7 Convention will be held on March 6-7, 2026, and the Missouri Lions State Convention will be held on April 24-26, 2026.

Lion President Hilkerbaumer presided at the business meeting and requested that the meeting agenda be approved. The Chamois Lions voted to approve the agenda. Copies of the minutes of the September 8, 2025 meeting had previously been distributed electronically by Lion Secretary Beth Sieg and paper copies were available for those Lions who prefer paper. The Chamois Lions voted to approve the minutes. In the absence of Lion Treasurer Nelson Sieg, paper copies of a financial report were distributed for the Chamois Lions general account and Building Co-Chairperson Lion Randy Thoenen presented an oral financial report for the Community Center. The Chamois Lions voted to approve the financial reports.

Lion First Vice President Hilkerbaumer called on Chamois Lions Club liaisons to other Chamois and Morrison civic groups for reports on the activities of those groups. Lion Melissa Arlen, who is the Mayor of the City of Morrison, and Lions Scott Mertz and Sean Hackmann, who are members of the Chamois Fire Department, were absent and thus there were no reports for those organizations. Lion Jeff Kormann, who is President of the Chamois Industrial Development Corporation (CIDC) and also a member of the Chamois Historic Preservation Commission (CHPC), reported for both organizations. The CIDC met on October 9, 2025 and heard a proposal from Michael J. Nolte for volunteers to undertake a restoration project for the cemeteries owned by the City of Chamois. These cemeteries include the City Cemetery, Oakland Cemetery, Stonner Cemetery, and the Black Cemetery. The CIDC will next meet on November 13, 2025. The CHPC will meet on October 15, 2025 and a focus for that group is to work with the City of Chamois to clear brush out of an alley near the Townley House and the barn. Guest Meghan Birmingham, who is the City Clerk for the City of Chamois, reported that the City has been contacted by the Cole County Historical Society's Military Restoration Group in regards to plans for that group to restore the grave of the last known Osage County Civil War veteran who is buried in the Black Cemetery. Ms. Birmingham also provided a brief review of Chamois Day. There are no final financial numbers yet, but the Chamois Day Advisory Committee has plans to meet.

Attendance at Chamois Day was very good with all concession stands selling out and there appeared to be numerous families participating in activities at the City Park. There are still Chamois Day T-shirts for sale. Lions Steve Duncan and Jeff Kormann, who are members of the Osage County Agritourism Council (OCAC), reported that the recent Farm to Table Dinner that was held on Saturday, September 27, 2025 was a huge success and that reservations for the Christmas Church Cookie Tour to be held on Friday, December 12, 2025 are selling fast. Finally, Lion Kormann reported briefly on the Missouri Community Betterment (MCB) Annual Conference to be held at Capitol Plaza Hotel in Jefferson City on November 17, 2025. The Chamois/Morrison Area Community Betterment Organization is a member of MCB.

Two items of old business, special project updates, and ad hoc committee reports were addressed.

Lion President Hilkerbaumer addressed the issue of City Park repair projects and called on other Lions to report on the status of repairs. Lion Steve Duncan reported that volunteer Guy Slusser has made the needed repairs to the ballpark fence along the third base line that was damaged earlier in the year when a light pole was blown down. Chamois City Clerk Meghan Birmingham reported that the City has received a bid to rebuild a section of the grandstand damaged in a windstorm last year. In regards to the proposed rebuild of the second story of the Old Bandstand and to remodel the lower level, there was nothing new to report.

Internet capabilities have been installed at the Chamois Community Center. Some discussion has focused on the need to build a cabinet or devise an alternative secure way to house the router and other equipment needed for the Internet connection. No new information was available for this project.

Two items of new business were presented and discussed.

Chamois City Clerk Meghan Birmingham reported that the City of Chamois is working with the Meramec Regional Planning Commission staff to apply for a Land Water Conservation Fund (LWCF) grant to use for improvements to the City Park. Possible park projects include repairs and upgrades to the restrooms and

enhanced lighting in the park. Longer term projects may include an outdoor basketball court and a walking trail. At this time, the City needs to finalize a plan and obtain cost estimates for the grant application. There will be a need for matching funds. Matching funds can include donated in-kind labor and use of equipment. There is also a need for letters of support for the grant application from the school, civic groups, churches, other organizations, and individuals.

Lion President Hilkerbaumer reported on his attendance at the recent Lions District 26-M7 Officer Training Session that was held at the Holts Summit Lions Club on Saturday, September 27, 2025. The training was outstanding and most beneficial for new officers. The duties of each Lions Club office were detailed and attendees were able to ask questions.



Her passion and kindness make her a true ambassador for KidSight's mission, reminding us that every clear view starts with a caring volunteer. Thank you, Janice!






