

Leader Dogs for the Blind

Each year, First Vice District Governors from around the US are invited to visit Leader Dogs for the Blind in Michigan. During the visit, they learn about the incredible work of the organization and enjoy the traditional lunch of chili and doughnuts.

This year's trip reminded me of a remarkable—and true—Leader Dog story involving my daughter, her husband, and a very special puppy named Percy.



Over the years, my daughter and her husband raised ten puppies for Leader Dog. Percy was one of them, and his journey turned out to be unlike any other. He thrived in his early home training, then excelled at formal training in Michigan. Eventually, he was paired with a client and the two began working together. But when the client returned home for medical treatment, his vision was unexpectedly restored. No longer needing a guide dog, he was unable to keep Percy.



Because of Percy's outstanding ability, Leader Dog placed him in the specialized DeafBlind program, designed for individuals who are both visually and hearing impaired. Percy completed this additional training successfully and was nearly matched with a client when tragedy struck—some of his littermates developed a genetic liver disease, and at least one passed away. Although Percy showed no symptoms, Leader Dog could not risk placing him.

When a dog can no longer be placed, the puppy raiser is given the option to adopt. My daughter and her husband, already caring for two pets and another

Leader Dog puppy, couldn't take Percy. They asked if my wife and I might want him. After some discussion, we agreed.

The very next day, while volunteering at an Earth Day event at the Capitol, I noticed a man wearing a Leader Dog jacket. Curious, I asked about his connection. He told me he had once been paired with a Leader Dog—

until his vision was restored. I asked if his dog's name was Percy. Stunned, he stepped back and asked how I could possibly know that. I explained the situation, and his face lit up. He still longed to make Percy his permanent companion. I shared my daughter's contact information, and before long, Percy was reunited with the very first client he had served.

Percy's story is a powerful reminder of the impact that Leader Dog—and the Lions who support them—can have on countless lives.

CHAMOIS

After not meeting in July 2025, the Chamois Lions Club met for their regular monthly meeting on Monday evening, August 11, 2025 at the Chamois Community Center. Twenty-one Lions were present for the dinner and business meeting.

Prior to the dinner, Lion First Vice President Jason Hilkerbaumer led the Chamois Lions in the Pledge of Allegiance and offered the table prayer. The Ladies of St. Mary's Catholic Church served a delicious dinner of BBQ beef, baked beans, potato salad, slaw, fruit, rolls, and cake for dessert.

Following dinner, members of the Chamois Lions Club observed a moment of silence in remembrance of Lion Mark Lieneke, who passed away recently. Lion Lieneke was a long-time dedicated member of the Chamois Lions Club and at the time of his death was serving as a Director.

Prior to the start of the business meeting, Lion First Vice President Hilkerbaumer called on Lion Steve Duncan to make some presentations. Lion Duncan presented Milestone Chevron Awards to several Lions. The Milestone Chevron Award is aptly named after the chevron symbol in reference to a badge or insignia indicating rank or length of service. Lions who received this award included Lion Betty Linhardt for 15 years

of service, Lion Susan Sundermeyer for 20 years of service, Lion Lana Hackmann for 25 years of service, and Lion Connie Smith for 25 years of service.

In the absence of Lion President Robin Lieneke, Lion First Vice President Hilkerbaumer presided at the business meeting and requested that the meeting agenda be approved. With no objections voiced, the agenda was approved. Copies of the minutes of the June 9, 2025 meeting had previously been distributed electronically by Lion Secretary Beth Sieg and paper copies were available for those Lions who prefer paper. The Chamois Lions voted to approve the minutes. Lion Treasurer Nelson Sieg presented a detailed written financial report for the Chamois Lions general account and Building Co-Chairperson Lion Randy Thoenen presented an oral financial report for the Community Center. The Chamois Lions voted to approve the financial reports.

Lion First Vice President Hilkerbaumer called on Chamois Lions Club liaisons to other Chamois and Morrison civic groups for reports on the activities of those groups. Lion Melissa Arlen, who is the Mayor of the City of Morrison, was absent and there is no Lion who is a member of the City of Chamois government so there were no reports for those organizations. Lion Michael Edwards did report that he has voluntarily been cutting grass at the City Park, in an effort to help catch up on grass cutting at City of Chamois properties. Thanks were extended to Lion Edwards for his service to the community. Lion Susan Sundermeyer, who is a member of the Chamois Historic Preservation Commission (CHPC), reported on a very successful Spring Fling/Craft Show and detailed plans for Chamois Day. The CHPC will again open the Townley House, will have books for sale, will have Joe Keilholz's covered wagon on display, will host the Rost Family Singers, and will serve honey ice cream. Lion Jeff Kormann next reported on behalf of the Chamois Industrial Development Corporation (CIDC). The CIDC met on August 5, 2025 and then closed on the sale of the old Lucy's Bar/Stonner's Meat Market building on Main Street to M & T Holdings on August 8, 2025. The CIDC is focused on economic development and the revitalization of downtown. Lions Scott Mertz and Sean Hackmann, who are members of the Chamois Fire Department, reported that there were nine calls during the past month. Lions Mertz and Hackmann also reported that the Fire Department has smoke detectors available if a family would like smoke alarms for their home and can assist in the installation of those smoke alarms. Lions Mertz and Hackmann next detailed plans for a Poker Run fundraiser to be held on Saturday, August 19, 2025 beginning at 11:00 a.m. that the Chamois Lions Club will serve as a sponsor for. The Poker Run will include stops at Ben Branch Lake, the Fredericksburg River Access, and the Morrison City Park. This fun event will include other activities such as chicken poop bingo at the Chamois City Park at 6:00 p.m., an archery contest, a golf contest, a food stand that will serve pork burgers at 11:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m., and sales of T-shirts. Funds raised will benefit the Fire Department. Lions Steve Duncan, Jeff Kormann, and Susan Sundermeyer, who are members of the Osage County Agritourism Council (OCAC), reported on upcoming events for that organization. A Taste of Osage County will be held on Saturday, September 13, 2025, the Farm to Table Dinner will be held on Saturday, September 27, 2025, and the Christmas Church Cookie Tour will be held on Friday, December 12, 2025.

Five items of old business, special project updates, and ad hoc committee reports were addressed.

Lion First Vice President Hilkerbaumer addressed the issue of City Park repair projects and called on other Lions to report on the status of repairs. Lion Steve Duncan reported that contractors have completed the replacement of a light pole and repairs to the ballpark lights. Lion Michael Edwards reported that repairs to a damaged fence that occurred when the light pole fell have not been made. Lion Randy Thoenen reported that he has replaced a door in the ballpark storage shed but has to replace a door handle and that there are other fence repairs to make. No information was available on the need to rebuild a section of the grandstand damaged in a windstorm last year. In regards to the proposed rebuild of the second story of the Old Bandstand and to remodel the lower level, Lion Susan Sundermeyer had nothing new to report.

Lion Mark Mehmert reported that the installation of wi-fi in the Chamois Community Center is complete and that security cameras in the Community Center and City Park are functional. Much discussion ensued on whether or not to make the wi-fi password available and if available the feasibility of separate gateways to ensure that some wi-fi accesses are secure.

Lion Steve Duncan reported that the project to install a 40-foot flagpole beyond the centerfield fence at the City Park ballfield is underway. The hole has been dug, the concrete for the project has been purchased by Chamois American Legion Post 506, and Chamois Masonic Lodge #185 members Joe Schaperclaus and Ralph Cramer hope to have that concrete poured within the next week.

Some discussion focused on a proposed community dinner. This dinner would be an opportunity for the Chamois Lions Club to give back to the community and to share information about Lions Club and Lions community projects. Tentative plans are to hold a free community dinner on October 31, 2025 in conjunction with the Halloween Truck or Treat festivities held on Main Street. This dinner would probably include hot dogs, chili, and desserts. The committee working on this event includes Lions Robin Lieneke, Beth Sieg, Michael Edwards, Steve Cramer, Scott Mertz, and Sean Hackmann.

Some discussion also focused on Chamois Day. The Chamois Lions Club is no longer directly involved, but has many members who volunteer for the event. Previous Chamois Day Committee members have provided the new Chamois Day Advisory Committee with plans and timelines for all activities associated with Chamois Day. Three members of the Chamois Lions Club plan to attend the next meeting of the Chamois Day Advisory Committee to assist with planning efforts.

Five items of new business were presented and discussed.

The July meeting of the Chamois Lions Club is historically the month that Lions Club officers are installed as the Lions year runs from July 1 until June 30 of the following year. Since the Chamois Lions Club was unable to meet in July, installation of officers was held at this meeting. Not needing a formal installation program, the Chamois Lions voted to merely declare all officers as installed for the 2025-2026 Lions year. These officers include President Jason Hilkerbaumer, First Vice President Scott Mertz, Second Vice President Randy Thoenen, Third Vice President Jeff Kormann, Secretary Beth Sieg, Treasurer Nelson Sieg, Tail Twister Susan Sundermeyer, Lion Tamer Connie Smith, LCIF Chairperson Robin Lieneke, Club Service Chairpersons Michael Edwards and Steve Duncan, Marketing/Communications Director Mark Mehmert, Membership Chairperson Steve Cramer, and Directors Susan Sundermeyer, Randy Thoenen, Sean Hackmann, and Duane Paulsmeyer.

Lion Steve Duncan reported in detail on the Lions District 26-M7 Cabinet meeting held at the Eldon Lions Club on Saturday, August 9, 2025. Much information on Lions International and State of Missouri service projects was disseminated at that meeting. Lions Business Opportunities for the Missouri Blind (LBOMB) continues to offer opportunities for blind business operators to manage cafeterias and coffee shops in public buildings across the State of Missouri. Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF) received \$81,579,545 in donations from Lions Clubs worldwide in 2024-2025 and of that amount the United States was awarded 1,809 grants totaling \$44.5 million to assist with recovery efforts from disasters. The Show-Me Lions Eyeglasses Recycling Program, operated by the Lions of District 26-M7, has distributed 110,962 pairs of eyeglasses through mission trips since January 2025. KidSight is a program where Missouri children are vision screened. In 2024-2025, 48,648 children were screened at 768 events statewide. 4,317 children were found to need a comprehensive eye exam and of those children 1,042 were at risk for vision loss. Saving Sight provided cornea tissue for cornea transplants for 1,699 persons in the U.S. and 692 persons internationally.

Lions Jeff Kormann and Susan Sundermeyer reported on the CIDC's annual "Back to School Supplies" Program which accepts donations to be used to purchase school supplies for Osage County R-1 School students. Individual donations may be mailed to Susan Sundermeyer at 207 East Third Street in Chamois, MO 65024. Chamois Lions were urged to donate to this important project.

Lion Steve Duncan reported that he had filed the 2025 Annual Registration Report for the Chamois Lions Club with the Missouri Secretary of State. This is a required filing for Missouri corporations. The Chamois Lions Club is a non-for-profit corporation.

To conclude new business items on the agenda, discussion focused on the annual Chamois City-Wide Clean-Up which usually occurs before Chamois Day. This work-day was scheduled for Sunday, September 14, 2025 at

1:00 p.m. Lions and other volunteers are encouraged to come with trash bags, shovels, rakes, brooms, weedeaters, etc. to clean streets, clean up landscape areas, and pick up trash prior to Chamois Day.

There was no correspondence to be shared and only one announcement. Lions District 26-M7 will conduct training for all Lions Club officer positions on Saturday, September 27, 2025 from 9:00 a.m. until 12:00 noon at the Holts Summit Lions Club. All Lions officers and potential officers are encouraged to attend this wonderful training.

August birthday wishes were extended to Lions Sabra Paulsmeyer, Robin Lieneke, and Scott Mertz. Prayer concerns were expressed for many community members to include Lions Connie Smith and Robin Lieneke.

To conclude the meeting on a humorous note, Lion Steve Duncan shared several puns provided by former Lions Club member Gary Reynolds. Examples of these puns were "I am reading a book about anti-gravity. It's impossible to put down."; "What's the difference between ignorance and indifference? I don't know and I don't care!"; and "A friend said she did not understand cloning. I told her that makes two of us."

The next meeting of the Chamois Lions Club will be on Monday, Septmber 8, 2025 at the Chamois Community Center. Dinner will be at 6:30 p.m. with the meeting at 7:00 p.m.



How To Sort Used Eyeglasses For the Jeff City Eyeglass Recycle Center

Scrap Metal – metal frames that are broken


