2nd VDG Bruce Berger Remarks at Cabinet Meeting August 17, 2024

Saving Sight wrapped up its fiscal year in June, providing the gift of sight to 3,533 individuals. That's providing renewed vision to a little more than 9 individuals each day! Of the tissues provided for transplant, 38 percent were transplanted to those in our local service area of Missouri, Kansas, and Illinois. One of those transplant recipients was Kathy, who received two corneal transplants after losing vision to Fuchs corneal dystrophy. 

CHAMOIS LIONS

The Chamois Lions Club met for their regular monthly meeting on Monday evening, August 19, 2024 at the Chamois Community Center. Fifteen Lions were present for the dinner and business meeting.

Prior to the dinner, Lion President Robin Lieneke led the Chamois Lions in the Pledge of Allegiance and Lion Steve Duncan offered the table prayer. The Ladies of St. Mary's Catholic Church served a delicious dinner of spaghetti and meat sauce, green beans, cucumber salad, fruit cocktail, garlic bread, and cake for dessert.

Lion President Robin Lieneke presided at the business meeting.

Lion President Lieneke requested that the meeting agenda be approved and the Chamois Lions voted to approve the agenda. Copies of the minutes of the July 9, 2024 meeting had previously been distributed electronically by Lion Secretary Beth Sieg and paper copies were available for those Lions who prefer paper. With no objection voiced, Lion President Lieneke declared the minutes approved. Lion Treasurer Nelson Sieg presented a detailed written financial report. Lion Building Co-Chairpersons Dale Hackmann and Randy Thoenen were both present. Lion Thoenen presented a Chamois Community Center financial report and Lion Hackmann reported that all four air conditioner units are working and that new filters have installed.

Lion President Lieneke called on Chamois Lions Club liaisons to other Chamois and Morrison civic groups for reports on the activities of those groups. Lion Melissa Arlen, who is the Mayor of the City of Morrison, and Lion Scott Mertz, who is a member of the Chamois Fire Department, were absent so there were no reports for those organizations. At present, there is no Lion who is a member of the City of Chamois government. It was noted that repairs to the City Park pavilion are under way. The Chamois Lions Club can provide some volunteer labor to assist with repairs to the grandstand, pavilion, and ballpark fences. Lions Susan Sundermeyer and Jeff Kormann, who are members of the Chamois Historic Preservation Commission (CHPC), reported on behalf of the CHPC. The CHPC board will meet on August 21 with a focus on Chamois Day plans. On Chamois Day, the Townley House will be open, there will be display of pictures that depict life in the Chamois and Morrison area during the time period 1917-1940, the Keilholz covered wagon will be on display, the Rost Family Singers will entertain, and honey ice cream will again be sold. Lion Kormann, who is also a member of the Chamois Industrial Development Corporation (CIDC), reported on behalf of Lion Debbie Huff, who is President of the CIDC. The Annual Registration Report, a required report that is filed with the Missouri Secretary of State's Office, has been filed for 2024 and the "Back-to-School Supplies" program that provides school supplies to students at Osage County R-1 School is still under way. Lions were encouraged to make individual contributions to this program and the Chamois Lions Club will make a donation if individual donations are not sufficient. Personal donations to this important program can be mailed to the Chamois Industrial Development Corporation in care of the Old Schoolhouse on the Hill B & B at 402 S. Main Steet in Chamois, MO 65024. Lions Steve Duncan, Susan Sundermeyer, and Jeff Kormann, who are members of the Osage County Agritourism Council (OCAC), reported on upcoming OCAC events. A Christmas Country Church & Cookies Trail tour is planned for Friday, December 13, 2024 and will feature local churches to include St. James UCC Church in Morrison, St. Johns UCC Church in Chamois, St. Peters UCC Church at Deer Creek, and Most Pure Heart of Mary Catholic Church in Chamois with each tour participant receiving a dozen cookies at each church and enjoying a dinner at Most Pure Heart of Mary Catholic Church. Two other OCAC events will be the annual "Taste of Osage County" event scheduled for September 14, 2014 and a "Farm to Table" dinner scheduled for September 28, 2024 at Prairie Star Farms in Bland, Mo. Lion Jeff Kormann, who is a member of the Missouri Community Betterment Association (MCB) Board of Directors, again reported on the 60th Annual MCB Fall Conference to be held on October 21, 2024 at the Missouri Farm Bureau in Jefferson City. The theme of the conference is "Honoring the Past, Embracing the Future" and featured speakers will include Dr. Sean Siebert the creator of "Invent Yourself" LLC, Jacob King who has been heavily involved with Missouri FFA and will engage youth attendees by using a steel guitar, and national speaker and entrepreneur Jaclyn Rowe who will speak on "The Power of Personalities".

Nine items of old business, special project updates, and ad hoc committee reports were listed on the meeting agenda.

Four of the projects pertain to work at the Chamois City Park. There is a need to install a new door on the Chamois City Park ballpark storage shed, make some minor repairs to ballpark fences, and possibly provide volunteer assistance with repairs to the roof over the ballpark grandstand. Lion President Lieneke suggested that these projects be combined under one big project in order to better track progress. There remains a need to install wifi at the Chamois Community Center. Discussion did focus on the wifi installation project and Lion President Lieneke and Lion Dawna Keilholz have contacted vendors RadioWire and Wave Internet in an effort to select a vendor and complete the installation and Lion Mark Mehmert suggested T-Mobile as a possible provider. There may be a need for an external antenna to provide better reception. Consensus of the Chamois Lions was to evaluate the three vendors as to bandwidth speed and cost and to make a decision at the September 9, 2024 regular meeting.

There was no new information to report on the flagpole project at the Chamois City Park. The plan is for a 40-foot flagpole that is visible both from inside the park and from the Missouri River to be installed. The flagpole has been purchased and received. Volunteer assistance to pour concrete for the base of the flagpole, to set the flagpole, and to eventually light the flagpole has been arranged for. The City of Chamois has approved the project.

The project to rebuild the second story of the Old Bandstand remains a high priority. Lions Susan Sundermeyer and Jeff Kormann reported that CHPC board member Judy Maxey has been attempting to identify potential contractors and that two contractor visits to view the bandstand have been scheduled.

Lion Steve Duncan reported that the joint project with Central Missouri Community Action and University of Missouri Extension staff for a mobile food pantry in Chamois utilizing a program under the direction of the Local Food Purchase Assistance Cooperative Agreement Program has been a huge success. The latest food distribution was held on August 8, 2024 with 150 produce boxes and one-pound packages of hamburger distributed. Plans are to continue the monthly food distributions with perhaps cooking and canning classes added.

The annual Chamois city-wide clean-up day, which is typically scheduled for the weekend before Chamois Day, was discussed and scheduled for Sunday, September 15, 2024 at 1:00 p.m. Lions and hopefully many school and community volunteers will meet at the Most Pure Heart of Mary Catholic Church parking lot to undertake efforts to pick up trash all over town and at the City park, clean street gutters along Main Street, and cut weeds on vacant lots and street ditches. Volunteers are encouraged to bring trash bags, shovels, rakes, weed eaters, and perhaps a tractor and scoop to undertake the clean-up efforts.

To conclude old business, much discussion focused on Chamois Day, which is scheduled for Saturday, September 21, 2024. Lions Dawna Keilholz and Becca Mehmert reported on planning efforts. The theme this year is "One Town, Many Friends". Flyers to promote the event have been designed and have been posted at local businesses and churches. A T-shirt design has been created with shirts to be screen-printed by local T-shirt vendor Matt Shockley. Broken Arrow will again provide main stage entertainment and activities will include food and craft vendors, hayrides, washer and cornhole tournaments, a pulled pork contest, and activities for children to include a bubble machine, free carnival games, and a scavenger hunt. The traditional Osage County R-1 School parade will begin at 10:00 a.m. There will again be a raffle with three different raffle opportunities—a larger in value prizes raffle, the adult raffle, and a children's raffle. The raffle is the primary fundraiser to offset the costs of Chamois Day. As always, there is a need for more volunteers to help with the fundraising raffle and the labor required for many of the activities. The Chamois Lions Club does not have the membership to fill the many required volunteer time slots so community members are urged to please volunteer. Everyone is welcome to become involved in helping with Chamois Day.

Three items of new business were introduced and addressed.

The lease on the Lions Club farm ground expires this year and thus will be due for renewal. The lease is generally for a three-year time period. Lion Third Vice President Randy Thoenen will solicit bids for the 39-arce track of ground just east of Chamois on Highway 100 sometime prior to year-end.

Lion Steve Duncan reported that he had filed for the Chamois Lions Club the 2024 Annual Registration Report with the Missouri Secretary of State. The Chamois Lions Club is incorporated as a non-profit corporation and the Annual Registration Report is required in order to report corporation officers and directors.

Lion Steve Duncan reported on the Lions District 26-M7 Cabinet meeting hosted by the Holts Summit Lions Club on Saturday, August 17, 2024. Past District Governor (PDG) Lion Melissa Anderson of the Holts Summit Lions Club will serve as District Governor, PDG Lion Rev. Bill Foglesong of the Eldon Lions Club will serve as Second Vice District Governor, and Lion Bruce Berger of the Jefferson City Host Lions Club will serve as Third Vice District Governor. District Governor Lion Anderson has set as a theme this year "Nothing Changes if Nothing Changes". Major focuses will be on recruiting new Lions, the retention of existing Lions, and for local Lions Clubs to report their service projects to Lions Clubs International (LCI). Many committee reports were shared at the meeting. There were very encouraging reports on three major state-wide Lions eye conservation projects. Saving Sight averages 9 cornea transplants per day. During 2023-2024, KidSight screened 44,763 children at 725 screening events with Osage County R-1 School being one of those events. 4,036 children were identified who needed to be referred to an eye doctor with 1,014 of those children at risk for vision loss. The Missouri Lions Eyeglasses Recycling Program distributed over 50,000 pairs of eyeglasses during mission trips.

There was no correspondence received and no announcements.

August birthday wishes were extended to Lions Mark Mehmert, Betty Linhardt, and Scott Mertz. Prayer concerns were expressed for those community members who have health issues to include Lion Mark Lieneke.

To conclude the meeting on a humorous note, Lion Steve Duncan shared two jokes, "An art dealer's good news and bad news" and "A 65-year old woman's near death experience".

The next meeting of the Chamois Lions Club will be on Monday, September 9, 2024 at the Chamois Community Center. Dinner will be at 6:30 p.m. with the meeting at 7:00 p.m.

to watch them. I always come to support them," she said.






SHOW ME LIONS EYEGLASS RECYCLING





