



# CHAMOIS LIONS

The Chamois Lions Club met for their regular monthly meeting on Monday evening, September 9, 2024 at the Chamois Community Center. Seventeen Lions and two prospective new members, Steve Cramer and Sabra Paulsmeyer, were present for the dinner and business meeting.

Prior to the dinner, Lion President Robin Lieneke led the Chamois Lions in the Pledge of Allegiance and guest Sabra Paulsmeyer offered the table prayer. The Ladies of St. Mary's Catholic Church served a delicious dinner of chicken pot pie, Texas potatoes, slaw, tomatoes, apple sauce, homemade bread, and a choice of two different cakes for dessert.

Lion President Robin Lieneke presided at the business meeting.

Lion President Lieneke requested that the meeting agenda be approved and the Chamois Lions voted to approve the agenda. Copies of the minutes of the August 12, 2024 meeting had previously been distributed electronically by Lion Secretary Beth Sieg and paper copies were available for those Lions who prefer paper. With no objection voiced, Lion President Lieneke declared the minutes approved. Lion Treasurer Nelson Sieg presented a detailed written financial report. Lion Building Co-Chairpersons Dale Hackmann and Randy Thoenen were both absent, but Lion Thoenen had sent a written financial report for Lion President Lieneke to present.

Lion President Lieneke called on Chamois Lions Club liaisons to other Chamois and Morrison civic groups for reports on the activities of those groups. Lion Melissa Arlen, who is the Mayor of the City of Morrison, was absent so there was no report. At present, there is no Lion who is a member of the City of Chamois government. Lions Susan Sundermeyer and Jeff Kormann, who are members of the Chamois Historic Preservation Commission (CHPC), reported on behalf of the CHPC. The CHPC is focused on Chamois Day plans. On Chamois Day, the Townley House will be open, there will be display of pictures that depict life in the Chamois and Morrison area during the time period 1917-1940, the Keilholz covered wagon will be on display, the Rost Family Singers will entertain, and honey ice cream will again be sold. Lion Kormann, who is also a member of the Chamois Industrial Development Corporation (CIDC), reported on behalf of the CIDC. Lion Debbie Huff, who has been president of the organization, has resigned. There is a need to elect a new president. The CIDC's "Back-to-School Supplies" program that provides school supplies to students at Osage County R-1 School was a huge success with \$575.00 in individual donations collected for this important project. Lion Scott Mertz, who is a member of the Chamois Fire Department, provided a detailed update on Fire Department activities. The Fire Department has responded to seven calls in the past few months, has acquired a new rescue truck, is planning to sell a tanker truck and an old ambulance, and has gained two new members. Lions Steve Duncan, Susan Sundermeyer, and Jeff Kormann, who are members of the Osage County Agritourism Council (OCAC), reported on upcoming OCAC events. A Christmas Country Church & Cookies Trail tour is planned for Friday, December 13, 2024 and will feature local churches to include St. James UCC Church in Morrison, St. Johns UCC Church in Chamois, St. Peters UCC Church at Deer Creek, and Most Pure Heart of Mary Catholic Church in Chamois with each tour participant receiving a dozen cookies at each church and enjoying a dinner at Most Pure Heart of Mary Catholic Church. Two other OCAC events will be the annual "Taste of Osage County" event scheduled for September 14, 2014 and a "Farm to Table" dinner scheduled for September 28, 2024 at Prairie Star Farms in Bland, Mo. Lion Jeff Kormann, who is a member of the Missouri Community Betterment Association (MCB) Board of Directors, again reported on the 60<sup>th</sup> Annual MCB Fall Conference to be held on October 21, 2024 at the Missouri Farm Bureau in Jefferson City. The theme of the conference is "Honoring the Past, Embracing the Future" and featured speakers will include Dr. Sean Siebert the creator of "Invent Yourself" LLC, Jacob King who has been heavily involved with Missouri FFA and will engage youth attendees by using a steel guitar, and national speaker and entrepreneur Jaclyn Rowe who will speak on "The Power of Personalities".

Five items of old business, special project updates, and ad hoc committee reports were listed on the meeting agenda.

Two Chamois Lions Club projects pertain to work at the Chamois City Park. One project involves physical repairs to park structures. There is a need to install a new door on the Chamois City Park ballpark storage shed and to make some minor repairs to ballpark fences. While the Lions Club has volunteered to possibly provide volunteer assistance with repairs to the roof over the ballpark grandstand, contractor Grayson Light is making progress on the rebuild of the grandstand roof and to date there has not been a need for assistance. The other project involves installation of wifi service at the Chamois Community Center. Three vendors are under consideration for this service. Lion President Lieneke and Lion Dawna Keilholz have contacted vendors RadioWire and Wave Internet and Lion Mark Mehmert has suggested T-Mobile as a possible provider. There may be a need for an external antenna to provide better reception. Evaluation of the three vendors as to bandwidth speed and cost continues and hopefully the Lions Club can make a decision at the October 14, 2024 regular meeting.

There was no new information to report on the flagpole project at the Chamois City Park. The plan is for a 40-foot flagpole that is visible both from inside the park and from the Missouri River to be installed. The flagpole has been purchased and received. Volunteer assistance to pour concrete for the base of the flagpole, to set the flagpole, and to eventually light the flagpole has been arranged for. The City of Chamois has approved the project.

The project to rebuild the second story of the Old Bandstand remains a high priority. One contractor, Classic Builders, has inspected the Old Bandstand, met with CHPC board members, and is working on a cost proposal. A second contractor is scheduled to inspect the Old Bandstand and meet with CHPC board members on Friday, September 13, 2024.

The annual Chamois city-wide clean-up day, which is typically scheduled for the weekend before Chamois Day, was discussed and scheduled for Sunday, September 15, 2024 at 1:00 p.m. Lions and hopefully many school and community volunteers will meet at the Most Pure Heart of Mary Catholic Church parking lot to undertake efforts to pick up trash all over town and at the City park, clean street gutters along Main Street, and cut weeds on vacant lots and street ditches. Volunteers are encouraged to bring trash bags, shovels, rakes, weed eaters, and perhaps a tractor and scoop to undertake the clean-up efforts.

To conclude old business, much discussion focused on Chamois Day, which is scheduled for Saturday, September 21, 2024. Lions Dawna Keilholz and Becca Mehmert reported on planning efforts. The theme this year is "One Town, Many Friends". Flyers to promote the event have been designed and have been posted at local businesses and churches. A T-shirt design has been created with shirts to be screen-printed by local T-shirt vendor Matt Shockley. Broken Arrow will again provide main stage entertainment and activities will include seventeen food and craft vendors, hayrides, washer and cornhole tournaments, a pulled pork contest, and activities for children to include a bubble machine, free carnival games such as a relay race and egg toss, and a scavenger hunt. The traditional Osage County R-1 School parade will begin at 10:00 a.m. There will again be a raffle with three different raffle opportunities—a larger in value prizes raffle, the adult raffle, and a children's raffle. The raffle is the primary fundraiser to offset the costs of Chamois Day. As always, there is a need for more volunteers to help with the fundraising raffle and the labor required for many of the activities. The Chamois Lions Club does not have the membership to fill the many required volunteer time slots so community members are urged to please volunteer. Everyone is welcome to become involved in helping with Chamois Day.

Two items of new business were introduced and addressed.

Brief discussion focused on how best to structure a Chamois Day Committee and possible changes for the future. There is a need to address funding issues, what types of activities to have at Chamois Day, and most

importantly how to gain more volunteers. This topic will be addressed at the October 14, 2024 regular meeting.

As a follow-up to the recent Lions District 26-M7 Cabinet meeting hosted by the Holts Summit Lions Club on Saturday, August 17, 2024, Lion Steve Duncan reported on District Governor Lion Melissa Anderson's focus on recruiting new Lions and retaining existing Lions. Membership growth is needed in all Lions Clubs. To that end, Lion Duncan shared copies of the Lions Mission Statement which is "To empower volunteers to serve their communities, meet humanitarian needs, encourage peace, and promote international understanding through Lions Clubs". In an effort to help local Lions Clubs to invite prospective new members to a Lions Club meeting, District Governor Lion Anderson has printed business cards that individual Lions can hand out to prospective new members that state the date, time, and location of club meetings. These business cards were distributed to Lions in attendance and those Lions were encouraged to invite at least one prospective new member to a meeting.

There was no correspondence received and no announcements.

September birthday wishes were extended to Lions Jolie Brand, Dale Hackmann, and Nelson Sieg. Prayer concerns were expressed for those community members who have health issues to include Lion Mark Lieneke.

To conclude the meeting on a humorous note, Lion Steve Duncan shared two jokes, "Husband's Doctor Appointment" and "Be a Humanitarian".

The next meeting of the Chamois Lions Club will be on Monday, October 14, 2024 at the Chamois Community Center. Dinner will be at 6:30 p.m. with the meeting at 7:00 p.m.

## Jack-of-all-trades helps foster Russellville pride

Dana Frisby wants people to be proud of Russellville.

That's why the 70-year-old Navy veteran has been so involved with the community of less than 1,000 since he moved there more than two decades ago.

Frisby has worn many hats over the course of his time in Russellville, including running multiple restaurants, assistant-managing the mini mart and volunteering for the local Lions Club.

When he had to step away from working due to a heart condition, he said he found himself drawn to use his newfound spare time to give back to the community that had embraced him as one of their own.

While recovering from open-heart surgery, Frisby was staying with a neighbor who encouraged him to attend service with her

at the nearby Lutheran church. That day, Frisby said the pastor came to talk to him.

"He talked for a good two hours, but not one time did he say, 'Hey, you should think about coming to our church.' That impressed me so much that I started going on a regular basis," Frisby said. "I ended up getting more involved, and now I'm on their vitality committee, evangelism committee, I help with videos for livestreaming, and other things."

His experience as a restaurant owner and cook — and as a popular local barbecuer — meant that Frisby quickly became the church's go-to cook and an "unofficial member of the Women of the ELCA (Evangelical Lutheran Church in America)." As part of his duties, he runs the church's kitchen and cooks meals for funeral dinners, rummage sales and other events.

Frisby's cooking skills are not limited to the church, however;

as he became more involved in the community, he was approached by the Lions Club about barbecuing for an event. He had served on the organization's leadership for several years before stepping back to focus on his restaurant, and he was initially hesitant to get involved again.

"They asked me if I would come up and barbecue for them for the Fourth of July. I said I would come up, but that I didn't want to do the ball games and the meetings," he said. "Now I'm vice president."

He now works ball games and hosts member meetings, on top of maintaining the club's baseball fields and helping to run youth ATV rodeos, among his myriad other responsibilities.

Around that same time, Frisby was asked to run for one of Russellville's West Ward alderman seats after a lack of interest left the position open. Although

he "didn't really want to get into government," he agreed to run, and since then, he's seen the power local government can have to make a positive impact on the community.

"We've built a new sewer plant, we've done stormwater work along the roads, we've redone some streets, and just now we got a grant for our city park to put in a pickleball court and redo our basketball court and concrete our driveway," Frisby said.

While he's been proud to help improve the city through official government channels, he still spends more of his time finding more personal ways to make people smile.

One way in which he strives to bring Russellville together is through Rosey Reindeer, a painted wooden cutout of a reindeer that mysteriously appeared on his front porch several years ago.

Unsure what to do with it, he asked another member of the city council whether they could send it around town to spread holiday cheer.

"So I did, and I put a little

book on the back of it and I wrote a little comment: 'The holidays can be a really trying time for people who struggle because of a death in the family or different things. I'm sending Rosey Reindeer out to bring a smile to your face,'" Frisby said.

"The whole idea is that you read the book, put some nice comment in there to your friend or your past family members, and take that and put it in someone else's yard and keep it going," he added.

Frisby said his biggest motivation for all of this is supporting Russellville's youngest residents.

"I do it because of the kids," he said. "My biggest regret in life is that I didn't settle down and have kids of my own, but I can fill that void by doing what I do with kids now."

"It's a little town, and there's not much to do," he added. "I grew up in a little town, and I know how easy it is to get into mischief. If you do it enough, it becomes a way of life, and I don't want to see that for these kids."

Frisby said his desire to sup-

port and serve his community is, in part, driven by his faith.

"I had my heart surgery eight years ago, and I came to realize that God has some kind of plan for me," he said. "I don't know what it is, but he's got a plan for me. I'm sticking around until I figure out what it is."

To figure it out, he said, he's been following the advice of the women he works with at his church.

"These ladies, they're in their 80s and 90s. I asked them, 'What's the secret?' They said, 'Don't slow down.' So I don't," he said. "I work harder now as a retired man than I did when I worked a full-time job, but I enjoy it. There are times it gets trying and frustrating, but in the long run, it's all worth it."

Frisby said he's been amazed by how much the small, tight-knit Russellville community has accepted and embraced him, so much so that when his family routinely asks him to move closer to them because of his heart condition, he tells them, "I've got family here."






