#### **CELEBRATING 100 YEARS OF SERVICE**

The Jefferson City Host Lion Club will be celebrating their 100th anniversary on June 13-14, 2025. The club was chartered on June 11, 1925, with 30 members. Today, the club consists of over 125 men and women who are committed to helping their community. Their main focus has always been to serve the youth in the community. They have succeeded in this goal over the past 100 years by providing playground equipment and wading pools for city parks, sponsoring baseball teams, sponsoring Easter Egg Hunts and Soap Box Derby's, sponsoring the School Safety Patrol since its inception, assembling food for the Buddy Pack School Program, and the list goes on. In the past 25 years, the club has screened over 40,000 school children for vision issues; ensuring that all children have a good start in life by having good vision.

You can drive around Jefferson City and easily see the presence of the Jefferson City Host Lions Club. The club built the restroom facility on West Edgewood greenway, had a bridge restored and installed to extend the greenway trails, installed a water station along the greenway, built the original shelter house at the Washington Park Ice Area and at

Hough Park, provided funds for the Jefferson City High School Stadium and track upgrade, electronic score boards for the middle schools, Miller Performing Arts Center, planted a flower garden at the Deborah Cooper Park for their 100th Anniversary Project, and again the list goes on.

Club members unselfishly volunteer their time and talent in helping other organizations in the community, such as Boys & Girls Club, Senior Nutrition Center, Samaritan Center, Salvation Army, National Federation of the Blind, Court Appointed Special Advocated, and again the list goes on.

The Host Lions also support their neighbors around the world by participating in the Mobility Worldwide program; they purchase, decorate, and donate a mobility cart to those in need in other countries. On a monthly basis, club members



collect, and process used eyeglasses which are recycled and used for mission trips around the world and in Missouri.

The Lions motto is "We Serve;" members of the Jefferson City Host Lions Club embrace each day fulfilling this motto. Members believe their club is here to stay and here to serve! The club meets each Wednesday at 12:05pm in the Hy-Vee Community Room, 3721 West Truman Blvd. Guests are always welcome to attend.

Members also volunteer with local nonprofits like the Boys & Girls Club, Salvation Army and the Samaritan Center, proving that service doesn't stop at Lions events — it's a way of life.



#### **Chamois Lions Club News**

The Chamois Lions Club met for their regular monthly meeting on Monday evening, May 12, 2025 at the Chamois Community Center. Seventeen Lions and one potential new member, Melinda Kirsch, were present for the dinner and business meeting.

Prior to the dinner, Lion Debbie Mehmert led the Chamois Lions in the Pledge of Allegiance and Lion Sabra Paulsmeyer offered the table prayer. The Ladies of St. Mary's Catholic Church served a wonderful Mexican dinner of a variety of enchiladas and burritos, nachos and cheese, fruit salad, and for dessert brownies and cake.

Lion President Robin Lieneke presided at the business meeting and requested that the meeting agenda be approved. With no objections voiced, the agenda was approved. Copies of the minutes of the April 14, 2025 meeting had previously been distributed electronically by Lion Secretary Beth Sieg and paper copies were available for those Lions who prefer paper. With no objection voiced, Lion President Lieneke declared the minutes approved. Lion Treasurer Nelson Sieg presented a detailed written financial report for the Chamois Lions general account. With Building Co-Chairpersons Lions Dale Hackmann and Randy Thoenen both absent, there was no financial report for the Community Center.

Lion President Lieneke called on Chamois Lions Club liaisons to other Chamois and Morrison civic groups for reports on the activities of those groups. Lion Melissa Arlen, who is the Mayor of the City of Morrison, was absent and there is no Lion who is a member of the City of Chamois government so there were no reports for those organizations. Lion Susan Sundermeyer, who is a member of the Chamois Historic Preservation Commission (CHPC), reported on the CHPC's Spring Fling, which was held at the Chamois Community Center on May 1, 2025. This fundraiser to benefit the Townley House Museum and the Old Bandstand restoration project was a huge success with demonstrations of spinning, weaving, rug making, and hand-carved spoons along with a plant sale of various house plants, lilies, hostess, and cana bulbs. Food and drinks to include homemade cinnamon rolls, pulled pork sandwiches, hot chicken sandwiches, various chips, an assortment of homemade desserts, and lemonade and water were served. Lion Jeff Kormann next reported on behalf of the Chamois Industrial Development Corporation (CIDC). The CIDC will next meet on Wednesday, May 21, 2025 and Lions were encouraged to attend as the CIDC is focused on economic development and the revitalization of downtown. The meeting location and a tentative agenda for the meeting will be communicated. Lions Scott Mertz and Sean Hackmann, who are members of the Chamois Fire Department presented a detailed report on recent Fire Department activities. The Fire Department is in the process of purchasing a new brush truck and two trucks are for sale. Several fire fighters participated in the Career Day held at Osage County R-1 School on Friday, May 9, 2025. The Chamois Fire Department will host the Four Rivers Fire Fighters Association for discussion and training on May 28, 2025. Lions Steve Duncan and Susan Sundermeyer, who are members of the Osage County Agritourism Council (OCAC), reported on a bus tour of Hope, MO that was held on May 7, 2025. The tour was a huge success with visits to the General Store, the old Grist Mill, the oneroom school, the Salem Hope Presbyterian Church where a delicious "Sunday dinner" style lunch was served, the Hope Creek Longhorn Cattle Ranch, and Bob Campbell's collection of Allis Chambers tractors. OCAC officers will make a presentation to the Osage County Commission on Tuesday morning, May 13, and the full OCAC board will hold their quarterly meeting on Tuesday evening, May 13, 2025. The Chamois Lions Club is a non-profit organization member of OCAC. To conclude the reports on activities of other civic groups, Lion Kormann, who is a member of the Missouri Community Betterment (MCB) Board of Directors, reported on behalf of that organization. MCB will hold their annual Fall Conference on November 17, 2025 at the Capitol Plaza Hotel in Jefferson City. Sadly, MCB will disband at year-end 2025.

Four items of old business, special project updates, and ad hoc committee reports were listed on the meeting agenda.

Lion President Lieneke addressed the issue of City Park repair projects and called on other Lions to report on the status of repairs. Lion Steve Duncan reported that Chamois Mayor Marie Slusser, who had planned to attend the meeting, was detained in traffic returning from work but had texted an update on needed repairs to the ballpark following recent wind damage. An insurance settlement has been reached to address the light pole that snapped and the damage to fences when the pole fell. Bids have been received from contractors to replace the light pole, repair the lights, and replace the damaged fence. In regards to the proposed rebuild of the second story of the Old Bandstand and to remodel the lower level, Lions Susan Sundermeyer and Jeff Kormann reported that efforts continue to develop a construction plan, to find a building contractor, and to raise funds. Lion Steve Duncan reported that American Legion Post 506 Adjutant Delmar Mitchem is attempting to coordinate the cooperative project with American Legion Post 506, Chamois Masonic Lodge #185, and the Chamois Lions Club to erect a 40-foot flagpole that is visible both from inside the park and from the Missouri River and has had conversations with a local building contractor to pour concrete for the flagpole base.

Lion Mark Mehmert reported on the project to install wi-fi in the Chamois Community Center. After some delay, Lion Mehmert will coordinate with the vendor T-Mobile to complete this project.

Lions Connie Smith, Nelson Sieg, and Beth Sieg reported on the annual Easter Egg Hunt that was to be held on Saturday, April 19, 2025 at 1:00 p.m. at the Chamois City Park. Rain caused the actual egg hunt to be cancelled but the Chamois Lions Club went ahead with the distribution of candy to those children who showed up. Approximately twenty children did attend and the rest of the candy was donated to Osage County R-1 School. Thanks to Lions Connie Smith and Nelson Sieg who coordinated the purchase of candy and prizes and to Lions Beth Sieg, Michael Edwards, and Steve Duncan who assisted with the distribution of candy.

Much discussion focused on a proposed community dinner. This dinner would be an opportunity for the Chamois Lions Club to give back to the community and to share information about Lions Club and Lions community projects. In addition to this dinner, there is a need for a Lions Club fundraiser dinner to help finance community betterment projects. Following much discussion, consensus of the Chamois Lions Club members was to hold a free community dinner on October 31, 2025 in conjunction with the Halloween Truck or Treat festivities held on Main Street. This dinner would probably include hot dogs, chili, and desserts. In addition to that event, the Chamois Lions would attempt to host either a dinner or breakfast as a fundraiser at the beginning of deer season to provide a meal for visiting deer hunters and local citizens. Lion President Lieneke appointed a committee of Lions Robin Lieneke, Beth Sieg, Michael Edwards, Steve Cramer, Scott Mertz, and Sean Hackmann to plan these events.

Four items of new business were presented and discussed.

Lion President Lieneke and Lion First Vice President Scott Mertz reported briefly on Chamois Day and the work of the Chamois Day Advisory Committee. The committee would like to have more kids' events during the day and some activity at the Chamois City Park, perhaps in the evening, for adults. There will still be the annual Osage County R-1 School PTO parade, main stage entertainment, vendor booths and concession stands during the day. The next meeting of the Chamois Day Advisory Committee will be on Thursday, May 22, 2025 at the Masonic Lodge Hall.

Next, discussion focused on the annual election of officers for the 2025-2026 Lions years. Lions Clubs International (LCI) and all local Lions Clubs elect officers to serve on a July 1 to June 30 fiscal year schedule. With several Lions volunteering to serve in an office and following some promotions for existing officers, the Chamois Lions Club did elect new officers. Officers for the 2025-2026 Lions year include President Rev. Jason Hilkerbaumer, First Vice President Scott Mertz, Second Vice President Randy Thoenen, Third Vice President Jeff Kormann, Secretary Beth Sieg, Treasurer Nelson Sieg, Tail Twister Susan Sundermeyer, Lion Tamer Connie

Smith, LCIF Chairperson Robin Lieneke, Club Service Chairpersons Michael Edwards and Steve Duncan, Marketing/Communications Director Mark Mehmert, Membership Chairperson Steve Cramer, and Directors Susan Sundermeyer, Randy Thoenen, Mark Lieneke, and Duane Paulsmeyer.

Lion Steve Duncan reported on the Missouri Lions 103<sup>rd</sup> Annual State Convention that was held on May 1-4, 2025 at the Double Tree Hotel-Westport in St. Louis, MO. The convention was hosted by the Lions of District 26-M2 and the convention theme was "Fun Happens at the Worlds Fair" with a focus on the 1904 World's Fair that was held in St. Louis.

Lion Secretary Beth Sieg submitted a request from Osage County R-1 School to use the restrooms in the Chamois Community Center during the schools' end of year picnics at the Chamois City Park on May 21-22, 2025. Consensus of the Lions Club members was to make the restrooms available at no charge.

Lion President Lieneke requested that the Chamois Lions Club Scholarship Committee meet after the meeting to select the recipients of the E. E. Turner Scholarship and the Chamois Lions Club Scholarship. Both scholarships are for \$500.00. Scholarship Committee members include Lions Susan Sundermeyer, Nelson Sieg, Lana Hackmann, and Randy Thoenen.

Following the completion of all new business, Lion Secretary Sieg shared one item of correspondence. KidSight will hold a Trivia Night on June 19, 2025 in Columbia, MO.

Several announcements were made. Sadly, Lion Betty Knipp of the Auxvasse Lions Club, wife of Past International Director Lion Donal Knipp, recently passed away. A copy of her obituary was circulated and a sympathy card was signed by all attendees to send to Lion Donal. Lion Steve Duncan reported that Past District Governor (PDG) Lion Bill Foglesong has been elected and approved by LCI to serve Lions District 26-M7 as District Governor for the 2025-2026 Lions year. Lion Duncan also reported that the Masonic Home of Missouri and Chamois Masonic Lodge #185 will present a check for \$16,164.00 to the Osage County R-1 School Board on Wednesday evening, May 14, 2025 at 6:45 p.m. These funds were raised as part of the Masonic Home's "Creating A Partnership" Program where the Masonic Home will match \$2 for every \$1 a local Masonic Lodge raises for projects to benefit local schools. The Chamois Lions Club had made a generous donation to Chamois Lodge #185's gun raffle/spaghetti supper because the fundraiser would benefit the school. The funds raised will be used for technology upgrades for students.

With no other business to be addressed, May birthday wishes were extended to Lions D J Keilholz and Pamela Kormann. Prayer concerns were expressed for those community members who have health issues to include Lions Becca Mehmert, Mark Lieneke, and Michael Edwards. Prayer concerns were also expressed for Lion Donal Knipp and his family.

To conclude the meeting on a humorous note, Lion Steve Duncan shared several "Some deep thoughts.....". Two such thoughts included "Life's short so make sure you spend as much time as possible on the Internet arguing with strangers about politics." and "Starting your day with an early morning run is a great way to make sure your day can't get any worse than it started."

The next meeting of the Chamois Lions Club will be on Monday, June 9, 2025 at the Chamois Community Center. Dinner will be at 6:30 p.m. with the meeting at 7:00 p.m.

#### **Expectations of a Host Family**

**Room and Board** - You are expected to provide room and board for the youth. It is recommended that youth be roomed with youth of similar ages and similar genders. Meals should be balanced and healthy.

**Transportation** - Typically, you are responsible for all the youth's transportation during the exchange. Travel may include but is not limited to, transfers to and from the airport or train station, transfers to other Host Families or International Camp, transportation to and from any planned activities by you and/or the Host Club.

**Financial responsibilities** - Payment for cultural activities is dependent on the agreement made between you, the youth, and the Host Club. Some programs offer stipends or scholarships for participating Host Families.

**Selecting an Exchange Youth -** Hosting a youth is dependent upon desired age, gender, interests, and nationality and upon the availability of the youth meeting those requirements. Your

local YCE Chairperson will advise you of available youth. You can learn more about the roles and expectations of a YCE Host Family by checking out the <a href="YCE Host Family Handbook">YCE Host Family Handbook</a>! Potential Host Families must be screened by the Host Lions Club and YCE Chairperson. Availability: It is important that you make sure your family's schedule allows accommodation to spend enough quality time with the youth.


