Men recognized for stopping attempted funeral home shooting

The two men who stopped an attempted shooting at an Eldon funeral home in 2021 accepted an international award for their bravery in Jefferson City this week.

Jeff Hilke, of Jefferson City, and Scott Duncan, of Kansas City, received the Carnegie Medal, an honor granted to people in the U.S. and Canada who risked serious injury or death to save or attempt to save others. They were presented the awards Monday morning at the Cole County Sheriff's Office.

Hilke, a funeral director with Millard Family Chapels, was helping to conduct a service for the Duncan family to mourn the loss of their father. Officials said 15 members of the family were at the funeral home when Scott Duncan's estranged brother, Bradley Duncan, of Chesterfield, entered the room where the family was gathered and displayed a .45-caliber gun in a threatening manner toward his ex-wife.

Hilke and Scott Duncan pinned him to the ground until Eldon Police Department officers arrived and secured him in handcuffs. A round went off during the scuffle, but no one was injured. Scott Duncan secured his brother's arm when the magazine fell out of the gun and he reached for another one.

Hilke said when the men fell to the ground his chest landed against concrete stepping stones, breaking his sternum and bruising a few ribs.

He said he initially thought he was having a heart attack, but the chest injuries just took a while to heal.

While the incident wasn't a pleasant ordeal, he said he was ultimately glad it was him working that day.

'Originally I was not supposed to be there. One of our other directors was supposed to be there, and at the last minute it got switched up," Hilke said. "I just feel I was there for a reason - I don't know what the reason was that that incident happened, sure, but I'm just thankful that I was

Hilke said he acted on instinct in the moment and fell back on his training as a reserve deputy for the Cole County Sheriff's Department. If he'd stopped to think, he said, things could have gone very differently.

Despite the heroic response, Hilke said he doesn't feel like he did anything that extraordinary

"That day, I saw something that needed to be done, and I reacted to it. I would hope that anybody in that position would do that," he said. "I appreciate the different awards that I've been given, but I don't know that I did anything special. I'm just glad that

Scott Duncan said he felt similarly. In the three years since, his brother was found guilty of first-degree assault, armed criminal action and unlawful use of a weapon in Moniteau County and sentenced to 34 years in prison. The case was transferred to Moniteau County as Miller County was not equipped to handle the associated publicity.

Scott Duncan said it was a situation he's tried to move on from.

"I've just tried to move forward with my family and my friends. It's just odd having to do that from my brother," he said. "It's nice having some recognition, not that I wanted it in any way, shape or form. I would be a lot happier if this had never happened, but it could have been a lot worse.

Cole County Sheriff John Wheeler introduced the men during the event, commending them for their bravery and quick action he said likely saved lives.

"This is a true testament character of both individuals involved for selfless acts of valor resulting in no loss of life," Wheeler said. "I'd also be remiss if I did not recognize Eldon PD staff for their swift action in responding to such a chaotic scene and taking the subject into custody without any further incident. So to you two gentlemen, I say thank you very





SHOW ME LIONS EYEGLASS RECYCLING


