Celebrating a Year of Impact with KidSight

We're proud to share KidSight's 2024-2025 Annual Report! With the incredible support of our volunteers, partners, and donors, we **screened 48,898 children across Missouri last year**. More than 4,000 of those children were referred for potential vision issues—kids who may not have otherwise received the early help they need.

This year also marked an exciting milestone: **KidSight expanded to reach 101 Missouri counties**, serving nearly 4,000 more children than the year before. We also launched 6 mobile clinics at 4 partner schools, providing 53 free eye exams to children in need. Thanks to the dedication of our care coordination team, 238 KidSight referrals received enhanced follow-up, ensuring families had the support they needed to get children into care.

Our annual report highlights these accomplishments, shares stories from families we've served, and offers a look at what's ahead for KidSight.

Dear Leader Dog Community,

On September 5, the U.S. Department of Education eliminated all three national Braille Training Grants under the 235E Demonstration Program. This decision directly affects Leader Dog clients and the future of braille literacy and the independence of people who are blind, DeafBlind or low vision — including many individuals we serve.

- Fewer professionals will be trained to teach braille.
- Adults and children will lose access to essential literacy tools.

CATARACT-A-THON (CAT) COMES TO KANSAS CITY!

Fellow Lions and Friends, what wonderful news out of Kansas City. Many Lions (particularly PDG Mickey Beach) there have been encouraging UMKC residents to organize a Cataract-A-Thon like we have in Memphis. This is where many patients come to a location and receive free cataract surgery, basically, at no cost to patients and very little cost to Lions.

We have conducted CAT since 2017 and have provided over 150 patients with the miracle of restored sight.

What we need from you, especially all of you Lions in west Missouri, is to beat the bushes and find enough patients to make this first Missouri Cataract-A-Thon a huge success. These doctors cannot make the contacts and write up the applications...we need YOU to help with that. To that end I am attaching a Mid-South Lions sight application for you to copy and use.

Our financial guidelines are only 100% of poverty income, but this effort allows patients to make up to 200% of poverty income thus increasing the applicant pool significantly.

BUT WE CAN'T DO IT WITHOUT YOU!!!

Please make this a high priority in your community and let's make this work for everyone. And then maybe we can make this an annual event to help those in need on an even larger scale.

Now, please read the email below for all the details on what is needed. And if you can make time to come and volunteer on the CAT date (January 16 or 23, 2026), the more the better. It will change your life too.

From what I understand, Operation Sight's requirements include:

Household income at or below 200% of the Federal Poverty Level

Being uninsured or underinsured (Medicare Part B recipients are ineligible)

A recent, medically necessary cataract diagnosis

Permanent U.S. residency

CHAMOIS

The Chamois Lions Club met for their regular monthly meeting on Monday evening, September 8, 2025 at the Chamois Community Center. Seventeen Lions were present for the dinner and business meeting.

Prior to the dinner, Lion President Jason Hilkerbaumer led the Chamois Lions in the Pledge of Allegiance. Lion Sabra Paulsmeyer offered the table prayer. The Ladies of St. Mary's Catholic Church served a delicious dinner of beef stew, biscuits, veggie tray, fruit, and cake for dessert.

Prior to the start of the business meeting, Lion President Hilkerbaumer called on Tail Twister Lion Susan Sundermeyer to lead a Lions activity. Lion Sundermeyer began the activity with a LIONS CLUB cheer, similar to the M I Z—Z O U cheer with half of the Lions doing LIONS and the other half doing CLUB and with the cheer ending in a loud Lions growl. Then Lion Sundermeyer led a song that she had written entitled "We Are Members of a Lions Club" that was set to the music of an old country song "I Am a Member of a Country Club". This activity was great fun and created energy for the business meeting.

Lion President Hilkerbaumer presided at the business meeting and requested that the meeting agenda be approved. The Chamois Lions voted to approve the agenda. Copies of the minutes of the August 11, 2025 meeting had previously been distributed electronically by Lion Secretary Beth Sieg and paper copies were

available for those Lions who prefer paper. The Chamois Lions voted to approve the minutes. Lion Treasurer Nelson Sieg presented a detailed written financial report for the Chamois Lions general account and Building Co-Chairperson Lion Randy Thoenen presented an oral financial report for the Community Center. The Chamois Lions voted to approve the financial reports.

Lion First Vice President Hilkerbaumer called on Chamois Lions Club liaisons to other Chamois and Morrison civic groups for reports on the activities of those groups. Lion Melissa Arlen, who is the Mayor of the City of Morrison, was absent and there is no Lion who is a member of the City of Chamois government so there were no reports for those organizations. Lion Susan Sundermeyer, who is a member of the Chamois Historic Preservation Commission (CHPC), reported on detailed plans for Chamois Day. The CHPC will again open the Townley House, will have books for sale, will host the Rost Family Singers, and will serve honey ice cream. Lion Jeff Kormann next reported on behalf of the Chamois Industrial Development Corporation (CIDC). Lion Kormann represented the CIDC in a recent meeting with the Osage County Commission and Bonnie Prigge of the Meramec Regional Planning Commission and the Gasconade Valley Enterprise Zone to report on CIDC economic development efforts. Lions Scott Mertz and Sean Hackmann, who are members of the Chamois Fire Department, reported that there were four calls during the past month. Lions Mertz and Hackmann also reported on the Chamois Lions Club and Fire Department Poker Run fundraiser that was held on Saturday, August 19, 2025. The Poker Run, chicken poop bingo, gun raffle, and T-shirt sales fundraiser was a huge success financially and in terms of number of participants. Funds raised will benefit the Fire Department. Lions Steve Duncan, Jeff Kormann, and Susan Sundermeyer, who are members of the Osage County Agritourism Council (OCAC), reported on upcoming events for that organization. A Taste of Osage County will be held on Saturday, September 13, 2025, the Farm to Table Dinner will be held on Saturday, September 27, 2025, and the Christmas Church Cookie Tour will be held on Friday, December 12, 2025.

Six items of old business, special project updates, and ad hoc committee reports were addressed.

Lion President Hilkerbaumer addressed the issue of City Park repair projects and called on other Lions to report on the status of repairs. Lion Steve Duncan reported that with the leadership of volunteer Joe Schaperclaus and other volunteers from American Legion Post 506 and Chamois Masonic Lodge #185 the 40-foot flagpole has been erected beyond the centerfield fence at the ballpark. Three Rivers Electric Cooperative workers installed the flagpole after volunteers poured the concrete base for the flagpole. A formal dedication service for the flagpole will be scheduled. Lion Randy Thoenen reported that he thinks Lions Club volunteers can make the needed repairs to the ballpark fences. No information was available on the need to rebuild a section of the grandstand damaged in a windstorm last year. In regards to the proposed rebuild of the second story of the Old Bandstand and to remodel the lower level, Lion Susan Sundermeyer had nothing new to report.

Internet capabilities have been installed at the Chamois Community Center. Some discussion focused on the need to build a cabinet or devise an alternative secure way to house the router and other equipment needed for the Internet connection.

Some discussion focused on a proposed community dinner that had tentatively been scheduled for October 31, 2025 in conjunction with the Halloween Truck or Treat festivities held on Main Street. This dinner would be an opportunity for the Lions Club to give back to the community. Given the hectic schedule of community and school events at that time and some schedule conflicts for members of the committee working on this event, a decision was made to postpone this dinner until later in the year.

Some discussion also focused on Chamois Day. The Chamois Lions Club is no longer directly involved, but has many members who volunteer for the event. Previous Chamois Day Committee members have provided the new Chamois Day Advisory Committee with plans and timelines for all activities associated with Chamois Day. The Chamois Lions Club voted to turn over funds that had accumulated in a Chamois Day checking account to the Chamois Day Advisory Committee.

Lion Susan Sundermeyer reported on the CIDC's "Back to School Supplies" Program which accepts individual donations to be used to purchase school supplies for Osage County R-1 students. Approximately \$400.00 was raised, primarily from Lions Club members, and has been donated to the school. Lion Sundermeyer expressed her thanks for the donations.

Much discussion focused on the annual Chamois City-Wide Clean-Up Day scheduled for Sunday, September 14, 2025 at 1:00 p.m. Lions and other volunteers are encouraged to come with trash bags, shovels, rakes, brooms, weed-eaters, etc. to clean streets, clean up landscape areas, and pick up trash prior to Chamois Day.

Two items of new business were presented and discussed.

Lion Steve Duncan reported that the City of Chamois has reached out to the Lions Club for possible assistance in applying for a MO Parks Department grant for funds to enhance the restrooms and playground at the Chamois City Park. City staff will meet with Meramec Regional Planning Commission staff on Monday, September 15, 2025 at 2:00 p.m. at City Hall to discuss how to apply for grant funds. Lions were encouraged to attend this meeting if possible.

In a related matter, some discussion focused on applying for a Three Rivers Electric Cooperative "Helping Hands Foundation" grant for City Park enhancements. Lion Duane Paulsmeyer will research grant eligibility requirements and the application process.

There was no correspondence to be shared and only two announcements. Lions District 26-M7 will conduct training for all Lions Club officer positions on Saturday, September 27, 2025 from 9:00 a.m. until 12:00 noon at the Holts Summit Lions Club. All Lions officers and potential officers are encouraged to attend this wonderful training. Also on the evening of Saturday, September 27, 2025 the Auxvasse Lions Club will observe their 75th anniversary.

September birthday wishes were extended to Lions Jolie Brand, Dale Hackmann, and Nelson Sieg. Prayer concerns were expressed for many community members to include Lions Connie Smith and Robin Lieneke and former Chamois Lions Club member Gary Reynolds. Lion Lieneke was in attendance and announced that she is relocating to Ballwin, MO to open a new business "The Cake Lady" where she will have a storefront presence. She plans to transfer her Lions Club membership to the Baldwin Lions Club, but she will visit Chamois often. Chamois Lions Club members extended congratulations to Lion Lieneke and thanked her for her many years of service to the Chamois Lions Club.

To conclude the meeting on a humorous note, Lion Steve Duncan shared three jokes to include one entitled "Tough Teacher" that was provided by Lion Duane Paulsmeyer.

The next meeting of the Chamois Lions Club will be on Monday, October 13, 2025 at the Chamois Community Center. Dinner will be at 6:30 p.m. with the meeting at 7:00 p.m.

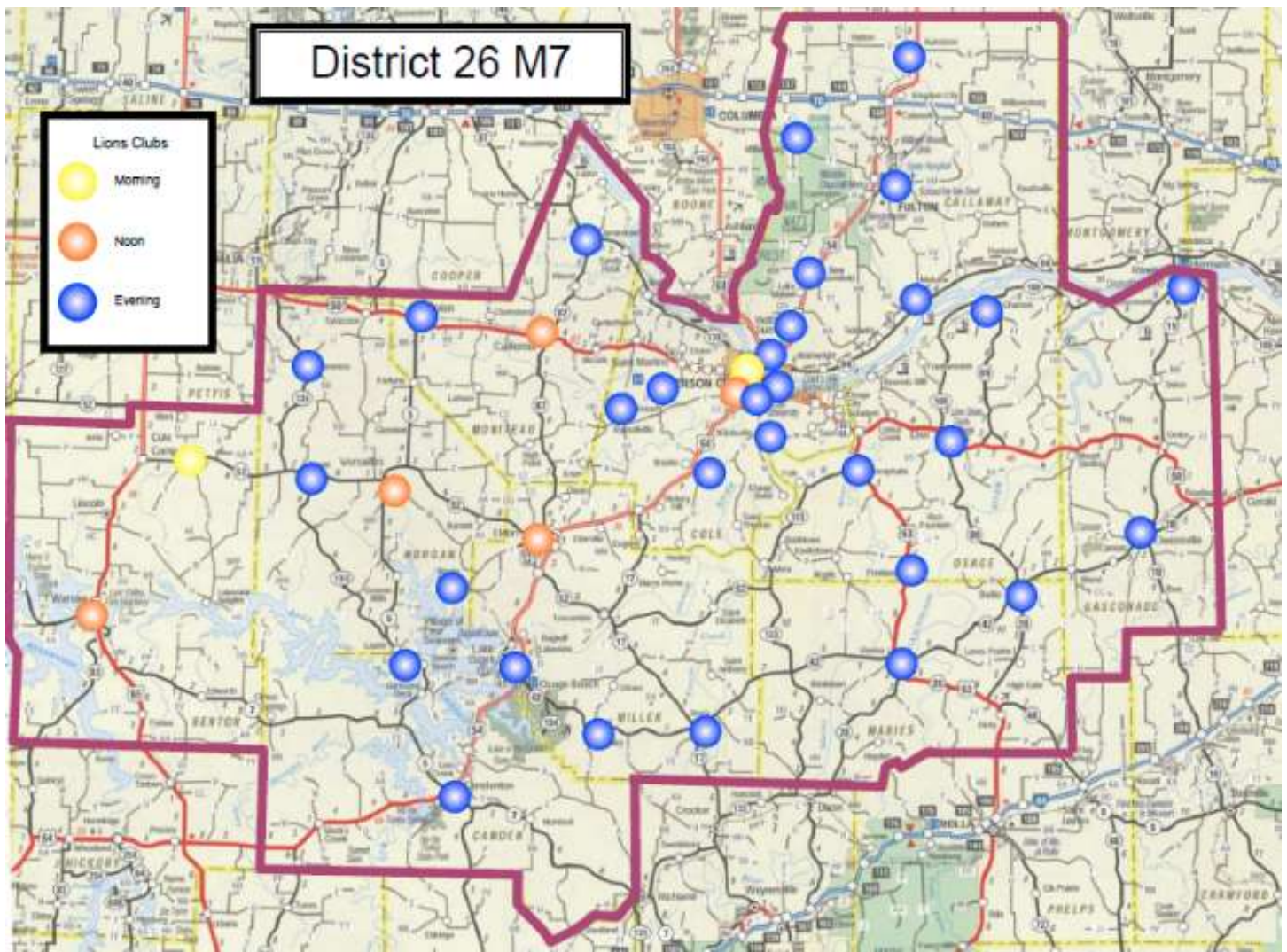
