Chamois Lions Club News

The Chamois Lions Club met for their regular monthly meeting on Monday evening, March 10, 2025 at the Chamois Community Center. Thirteen Lions and one visitor, Sean Hackmann, were present for the dinner and business meeting.

Prior to the dinner, Lion Michael Edwards led the Chamois Lions in the Pledge of Allegiance and Lion Steve Duncan offered the table prayer. The Ladies of St. Mary's Catholic Church served a delicious dinner of Irish Dublin coddle, glazed carrots, Watergate salad, homemade beer bread, and two different kinds of cake for dessert.

Lion President Robin Lieneke presided at the business meeting.

Lion President Lieneke requested that the meeting agenda be approved and with no objections voiced, Lion President Lieneke declared the agenda approved. Copies of the minutes of the February 10, 2025 meeting had previously been distributed electronically by Lion Secretary Beth Sieg and paper copies were available for those Lions who prefer paper. With no objection voiced, Lion President Lieneke declared the minutes approved. Lion Treasurer Nelson Sieg presented a detailed written financial report for the Chamois Lions general account and Lion Building Co-Chairperson Randy Thoenen presented a financial report for the Community Center.

Lion President Lieneke called on Chamois Lions Club liaisons to other Chamois and Morrison civic groups for reports on the activities of those groups. Lion Melissa Arlen, who is the Mayor of the City of Morrison, was absent and there is no Lion who is a member of the City of Chamois government so there were no reports for those organizations. Lion Jeff Kormann, who is a member of both the Chamois Historic Preservation Commission (CHPC) and the Chamois Industrial Development Corporation (CIDC), reported for both organizations. The CHPC is planning a Spring Fling on May 1, 2025 with a plant sale, pottery sale, and demonstrations by artisans to include spinning, weaving, and rag rugs. The event will begin at 10:00 a.m. with lunch available at 12:00 noon. The Chamois Lions Club voted to allow the CHPC free use of the Chamois Community Center for this fundraiser to benefit the Townley House preservation and other activities. The CIDC board of directors has been meeting but has nothing to report at this time. Chamois Lions were encouraged to attend meetings of the CIDC. Lion Scott Mertz and guest Sean Hackmann, who are members of the Chamois Fire Department presented a detailed report on recent Fire Department activities. During the past month, the Fire Department responded to six calls. There have been lots of improvements in the Fire Department with new members and now a total of 24-25 volunteer fire fighters, much training to include a recent CPR class where 15 members were trained, and additional training planned. The Chamois Lions Club voted to allow free use of the Chamois Community Center for an upcoming CPR class. Lion Steve Cramer, who is a member of the Osage County R-1 School Board, provided an update on the school bond issue that will appear on the April 8, 2025 ballot and reported that two seats are open on the school board. There will be a Town Hall meeting on March 25, 2025 to provide information on the bond issue and "Proposition Kids" brochures will be made available at that meeting. Lions Steve Duncan and Jeff Kormann, who are members of the Osage County Agritourism Council (OCAC), reported on a planned bus tour of Hope, MO on May 7, 2025 that will visit the General Store, the old Grist Mill, the one-room school, the Salem Hope Presbyterian Church where lunch will be served, the Hope Creek Longhorn Cattle Ranch, and Bob Campbell's collection of Allis Chambers tractors. Cost of the tour is \$75 per person and includes a wonderful lunch. The Chamois Lions Club is a non-profit organization member of OCAC. To conclude the reports on activities of other civic groups, Lion Kormann, who is a member of the Missouri Community Betterment (MCB) Board of Directors, reported that MCB is renewing memberships for 2025. The Chamois Lions Club sponsors a membership in MCB for the Chamois/Morrison Community Betterment organization.

Two items of old business, special project updates, and ad hoc committee reports were listed on the meeting agenda.

Due to Winter weather issues, all of the City Park improvement projects are on hold. These projects include the installation of a new door on the Chamois City Park ballpark storage shed, to make some minor repairs to ballpark fences, to hopefully rebuild the second story of the Old Bandstand and to remodel the lower level, and the cooperative project with American Legion Post 506 and Chamois Masonic Lodge #185 to erect a 40-foot flagpole that is visible both from inside the park and from the Missouri River. Some discussion did focus on the flagpole project as there is much interest in getting this project completed as the flagpole site has been identified and staked out and the flagpole has been purchased. Some discussion also focused on the need to complete the rebuild of a second section of the ballpark grandstand. Two different wind storms damaged the grandstand. One section damaged has been rebuilt but there is a need to rebuild the eastern part of the grandstand.

Much discussion next focused on Chamois Day. Lion President Lieneke and Lion Scott Mertz reported on the recent meeting of the Chamois Day Advisory Committee. The committee is comprised of representatives from the City of Chamois, the Chamois Lions Club, the Osage County R-1 PTO, the Chamois Fire Department, Chamois Masonic Lodge #185, and hopefully other civic groups and churches. The City of Chamois will take the lead on Chamois Day. As always, an issue is the need for more volunteers to help with planning, the raffle, staffing all the various activities, and set-up and clean-up on the actual day of Chamois Day. To date, new ideas have been proposed to possibly hold the Osage County R-1 School Carnival in the afternoon and to have live music and a beer garden in the evening at the Chamois City Park. The next meeting of the Chamois Day Advisory Committee will be on Wednesday, March 19, 2025 at 6:30 p.m. at the St. John's UCC Church Educational Building.

Four items of new business were presented and discussed.

Lions Nelson Sieg, Beth Sieg, and Steve Duncan reported on the Lions District 26-M7 Convention that was held at Red Rock Acres in Holts Summit, MO on Saturday, March 8, 2025. The convention was a huge success with much information shared and a new slate of district officers elected for the 2025-2026 Lions year. The keynote speaker for the convention was International Director Lion Robert "Ski" Marcinkowski of Fairbanks, Alaska. Lion Marcinkowski is a 42-year U. S. Army veteran where he flew helicopters. He is a member of the Interior Baseball Lions Club, a specialty Lions Club. Specialty Lions Clubs are organized by a group of Lions who hold a common interest or focus on a particular activity that benefits the local community. Lion Marcinkowski reported that there are 49,000 Lions Clubs worldwide with a total membership of approximately 1.3 million Lions. Mission 1.5 is a Lions Clubs International (LCI) goal to have 1.5 million members by June 2027. Following Lion Marcinkowski's presentation, reports were given on various Lions District, State, and International projects to include KidSight, Saving Sight, Show-Me Lions Eyeglasses Recycling, the MO Lions Eye Mission Foundation, and Missouri Business Opportunities for the Missouri Blind (LBOMB). For the 2025-2026 Lions year, Lion Bruce Berger of the Jefferson City Host Lions Club was elected First Vice District Governor and Lion April Underwood of the Holts Summit Lions Club was elected Second Vice District Governor. A special election will be held in the near future to elect Lion Bill Foglesong as District Governor.

Lion President Lieneke and Lion Secretary Beth Sieg suggested that the Chamois Lions Club revisit the idea of a community dinner for Chamois and Morrison residents. This dinner would be an opportunity for the Chamois Lions Club to give back to the community and to share information about Lions Club and Lions community projects. A tentative date of July 2025 was proposed with the menu to perhaps be a fish fry or chili supper.

Discussion focused on the good works of the Osage County Agritourism Council. The Chamois Lions Club voted to renew their membership in OCAC for 2025 as a non-profit organization.

Tentative plans were made for the annual Chamois Lions Club Easter Egg Hunt to be held on Saturday, April 19, 2025 at 1:00 p.m. at the Chamois City Park. Lion Connie Smith will again procure candy and Lions Beth and

Nelson Sieg reported that they have an additional 100 plastic eggs to be used for the egg hunt. Several Lions volunteered to help hide eggs and oversee the event.

One announcement was made. Lion Steve Duncan reported that Chamois Masonic Lodge #185 is having a gun raffle and spaghetti supper on Saturday, March 29, 2025. This fundraiser is a "Create A Partnership" fundraiser whereby the Lodge partners with the Osage County R-1 School to assist with a school project. Funds raised will be used for technology needs at the school and for every dollar raised from the gun raffle, supper, and donations the Masonic Home of Missouri will match an additional two dollars. Because of the opportunity to assist the school and to secure additional funds through the Masonic Home of Missouri match, the Chamois Lions voted to make a cash donation to this very special fundraiser.

There were no March birthdays. Prayer concerns were expressed for those community members who have health issues to include Lions Becca Mehmert, Mark Lieneke, and Michael Edwards.

To conclude the meeting on a humorous note, Lion Steve Duncan shared several "Some deep thoughts.....". Two such thoughts included "Remember, if you lose a sock in the dryer, it comes back as a Tupperware lid that doesn't fit any of your containers" and "If you are sitting in public and a stranger takes the seat next to you, just stare straight ahead and say 'Did you bring the money?'"

The next meeting of the Chamois Lions Club will be on Monday, April 14, 2025 at the Chamois Community Center. Dinner will be at 6:30 p.m. with the meeting at 7:00 p.m.

Please provide me with emails and I will get the youth's information to them for choosing.



Hosting an exchange youth is guaranteed to be a rewarding experience because:

- You experience the joy of sharing your culture and customs.
- You learn about the exchange youth's customs and culture.
- You open a new world of thinking to the exchange youth.
- You make a new friend maybe a friend for life.

Expectations of a Host Family

Room and Board - You are expected to provide room and board for the youth. It is recommended that youth be roomed with youth of similar ages and similar genders. Meals should be balanced and healthy.

Transportation - Typically, you are responsible for all the youth's transportation during the exchange. Travel may include but is not limited to, transfers to and from the airport or train station, transfers to other Host Families or International Camp, transportation to and from any planned activities by you and/or the Host Club.

Financial responsibilities - Payment for cultural activities is dependent on the agreement made between you, the youth, and the Host Club. Some programs offer stipends or scholarships for participating Host Families.

Selecting an Exchange Youth - Hosting a youth is dependent upon desired age, gender, interests, and nationality and upon the availability of the youth meeting those requirements. Your local YCE Chairperson will advise you of available youth. You can learn more about the roles and expectations of a YCE Host Family by checking out the <u>YCE Host Family Handbook!</u> Potential Host Families must be screened by the Host Lions Club and YCE Chairperson. Availability: It is important that you make sure your family's schedule allows accommodation to spend enough quality time with the youth.


