

#### **CHAMOIS LIONS**

The Chamois Lions Club met for their regular monthly meeting on Monday evening, October 21, 2024 at the Chamois Community Center. Twelve Lions were present for the dinner and business meeting.

Prior to the dinner, Lion President Robin Lieneke led the Chamois Lions in the Pledge of Allegiance and Lion Steve Duncan offered the table prayer. The Ladies of St. Mary's Catholic Church served a delicious dinner of pizza casserole, salad, veggie tray, garlic bread, and as dessert either spice cake or pumpkin crunch dessert.

Lion President Robin Lieneke presided at the business meeting.

Lion President Lieneke requested that the meeting agenda be approved and the Chamois Lions voted to approve the agenda. Copies of the minutes of the September 9, 2024 meeting had previously been distributed electronically by Lion Secretary Beth Sieg and paper copies were available for those Lions who prefer paper. With no objection voiced, Lion President Lieneke declared the minutes approved. Lion Treasurer Nelson Sieg presented a detailed written financial report for the Chamois Lions general account. Lion Building Co-Chairperson Randy Thoenen presented a detailed financial report for the Community Center and addressed three Community Center finance issues. Lion Thoenen reported that he has paid the Community Center casualty and liability insurance premium. The premium has increased significantly. With Winter approaching, Lion Thoenen presented a bid for propane pre-buy and following discussion the Chamois Lions voted to purchase 400 gallons of propane at \$2.03 per gallon. Given the significant cost of casualty and liability insurance, discussion focused on prohibiting the use of alcohol inside the Community Center. This would reduce the cost of insurance by approximately half. Consensus of Chamois Lions Club members was to strongly consider the prohibition of alcohol consumption inside the Community Center and this would require that the Community Center rental agreement be updated to document no use of alcohol. A final decision on this issue will be made at the November 11, 2024 Chamois Lions Club meeting.

Lion President Lieneke called on Chamois Lions Club liaisons to other Chamois and Morrison civic groups for reports on the activities of those groups. Lion Melissa Arlen, who is the Mayor of the City of Morrison, and Lion Scott Mertz, who is the Chamois Lions Club liaison with the Fire Department, were absent so there were no reports for those organizations. At present, there is no Lion who is a member of the City of Chamois government. Lion Jeff Kormann, who is a member of the Chamois Historic Preservation Commission (CHPC), had no new news to report but did comment on the success of the Chamois Day ice cream sales and the significant number of persons who toured the Townley House and enjoyed visiting on the Townley House grounds while listening to the Rost Family Singers. Lion Kormann, who is also a member of the Chamois Industrial Development Corporation (CIDC), reported on behalf of the CIDC. The CIDC will meet soon to elect new officers and to reassess the mission of the CIDC. Brief discussion focused on the CIDC building on Main Street (the old Stonner's Meat Market Building) and concerns over the structural integrity of the building. Lions Steve Duncan and Jeff Kormann, who are members of the Osage County Agritourism Council (OCAC), reported on the recent "Farm to Table" dinner held on September 28, 2024 at Prairie Star Farms in Bland, MO. The dinner was a huge success with approximately 100 attendees who enjoyed a delicious dinner of Osage County pork and produce. Lion Randy Thoenen and wife Laura attended the dinner. Lions Kormann and Duncan also reported on the Christmas Country Church & Cookies Trail tour that is planned for Friday, December 13, 2024 and will feature local churches to include St. James UCC Church in Morrison, St. Johns UCC Church in Chamois, St. Peters UCC Church at Deer Creek, and Most Pure Heart of Mary Catholic Church in Chamois with each tour participant receiving a dozen cookies at each church and enjoying a dinner at Most Pure Heart of Mary Catholic Church. To conclude the reports on activities of other civic groups, Lion Jeff Kormann, who is a member of the Missouri Community Betterment Association (MCB) Board of Directors, reported on the 60<sup>th</sup> Annual MCB Fall Conference that was held earlier in the day on October 21, 2024 at the Missouri Farm Bureau in Jefferson City. The theme of the conference was "Honoring the Past, Embracing the Future" and featured speakers included Dr. Sean Siebert the creator of "Invent Yourself" LLC, Jacob King who

has been heavily involved with Missouri FFA and who engaged youth attendees by using a steel guitar, and national speaker and entrepreneur Jaclyn Rowe who spoke on "The Power of Personalities". The Chamois-Morrison Area MCB organization, which is sponsored by the Chamois Lions Club, was presented a plaque at the conference for the organization's membership in MCB. At the conference, Lion Steve Duncan accepted the plaque on behalf of the Chamois-Morrison Area MCB organization and in turn Lion Jeff Kormann presented the plaque to Chamois Lions Club President Robin Lieneke during the Lions Club meeting.

Five items of old business, special project updates, and ad hoc committee reports were listed on the meeting agenda.

Two Chamois Lions Club projects pertain to work at the Chamois City Park. One project involves physical repairs to park structures. There is a need to install a new door on the Chamois City Park ballpark storage shed and to make some minor repairs to ballpark fences. Lion Randy Thoenen hopes to schedule this work in November 2024. The other project involves installation of wifi service at the Chamois Community Center. Three vendors were under consideration for this service. Lion Mark Mehmert reported that after serious evaluation of the three vendors as to bandwidth speed and cost, T-Mobile emerged as the best option and the Chamois Lions then voted to install T-Mobile wifi service. This wifi service will enable the use of more security cameras inside the City Park and also provide for enhanced wifi connectivity inside the Community Center.

There was no new information to report on the flagpole project at the Chamois City Park. The plan is for a 40-foot flagpole that is visible both from inside the park and from the Missouri River to be installed. The flagpole has been purchased and received. Volunteer assistance to pour concrete for the base of the flagpole, to set the flagpole, and to eventually light the flagpole has been arranged for. The City of Chamois has approved the project.

The project to rebuild the second story of the Old Bandstand remains a high priority. In the absence of Lion Susan Sundermeyer, Lions Jeff Kormann and Steve Duncan reported on recent developments in regards to this project. One contractor, Classic Builders, has inspected the Old Bandstand, met with CHPC board members, and presented a proposal that would essentially call for the demolition of the current structure and then rebuild a very similar structure using all new materials and raising the roof to make the structure appear to have a second story. A second contractor, who is local, has likewise inspected the Old Bandstand and presented a proposal to remodel the Old Bandstand using new structural support posts and a new roof while also making the structure appear to have a second story. Both bids seem fair in regards to proposed costs, but both bids are also for more than the current balance of funds on hand for the project. Both bids have some incomplete information and have raised questions as to what State Emergency Management Agency (SEMA) flood plain regulations will permit. Lion Jeff Kormann has agreed to contact SEMA in an effort to gain a better understanding of what type of new construction or remodel of an existing structure is permitted.

To conclude old business, much discussion focused on Chamois Day, which was held on Saturday, September 21, 2024. Lion Dawna Keilholz reported on behalf of the Chamois Day Committee that the day was a huge success. The traditional Osage County R-1 School PTO parade began the day's festivities. All vendors were pleased with the crowd size and business generated, the raffle was a huge success financially, the pulled pork contest went well, the bubble machine was a huge hit, the toys given out at the carnival games were well-received, Chamois Day cups and ink pens given away were very popular, the Broken Arrow musical entertainment on the Main Stage was most popular, the Townley House tours and Rost Family Singers drew large crowds, the washer tournament held behind Roomerz was well-attended, and most importantly the rain held off and the weather was great. Lions Mark Mehmert and Randy Thoenen reported that the hayrides went well with no issues or concerns and that despite the usual shortage of volunteers, the end-of-day clean-up went better than expected and that all clean-up efforts were completed earlier than usual.

Six items of new business were introduced and addressed.

Much discussion focused on if possible to continue Chamois Day and if Chamois Day is to remain an event, how best to structure a Chamois Day Committee and then implement possible changes for the future. While the 2024 Chamois Day was a huge success and while everyone realizes the importance of having a day for former residents and visitors to return, there is a need to involve a larger committee and most importantly gain new volunteers to assist with the many tasks that occur during the year to plan and organize the event and to then assist with set-up on Chamois Day, staff all the various activities throughout the day, and clean-up at the end of the day. Consensus of the Lions Club members was to host a meeting with representatives of the Chamois Lions Club, the City of Chamois, and the Osage County R-1 School PTO to address the issues of whether or not to continue with Chamois Day and if the decision is to continue organize a Chamois Day Committee to oversee the event. This meeting hopefully will occur in early January 2025 with decisions to be made by January 31, 2025.

Three issues pertaining to Christmas were introduced and discussed. First, the Chamois Lions Club has purchased new Christmas decorations for the City of Chamois. These decorations were purchased from the City of Boonville. The decorations will require a different method of attachment to the power poles lining Main Street so Lions members will need to examine the decorations and determine how best to install or attach the decorations to the power poles. The other two issues pertain to Christmas events. The annual Santa Claus visit to Chamois will take place on Saturday, December 7. Instead of a Saturday morning visit, Santa's visit will be coordinated by the Osage County R-1 School PTO and will be an evening event with food and an actual lighting of the Christmas tree on the Old Town Square. The Chamois Lions Club will again provide bags of candy for the children in attendance. The other Christmas event will be the annual Chamois Lions Club Christmas party held as part of the December regular Lions Club meeting. The meeting and Christmas party will be on Monday evening, December 9, 2024 with spouses invited for the dinner and then the traditional white elephant gift exchange. A maximum of \$20 was set as the cost of gifts to be exchanged.

Lion Randy Thoenen reported that the three-year lease agreement on the Chamois Lions Club farm ground expires after this year. The ground includes 39 acres on the south side of Highway 100 just east of Chamois and across from the old power plant site. Lion Thoenen will solicit bids to rent the ground for years 2025-2027. The bids will be sealed bids and will be received at Heritage Community Bank.

Lion Thoenen also reported that the Chamois Lions Club has a certificate of deposit that will mature on November 12, 2024. New CD rate and maturity terms information will be available for the November 11, 2024 regular Lions Club meeting and a decision on what terms to accept made at that meeting.

There was one item of correspondence. A thank-you letter was received from Osage County R-1 School for the CIDC and Chamois Lions Club's "Back to School Supplies" program to provide backpacks and school supplies for students.

October birthday wishes were extended to Lions Jason Hilkerbaumer, Dawna Keilholz, Becca Mehmert, and Beth Sieg. Prayer concerns were expressed for those community members who have health issues to include Lion Mark Lieneke.

To conclude the meeting on a humorous note, Lion Steve Duncan shared two moral of the story jokes, "If you share critical information pertaining to credit and risk, you may be in a position to prevent avoidable exposure" and "Always let your boss have the first say".

The next meeting of the Chamois Lions Club will be on Monday, November 11, 2024 at the Chamois Community Center. Dinner will be at 6:30 p.m. with the meeting at 7:00 p.m.
