The Butterfly Effect of Being a Lion



This is based on the idea that the fluttering of a butterfly's wings may set off currents that will ripple out and grow into a strong wind. So, what is a Lions example of the butterfly effect?

One of our district clubs had a new member who was playing cards at a senior center. He went into cardiac arrest. Fortunately, there was a retired

nurse who knew CPR, and saved his life. The senior

center did not have an AED device.





available funds. There was enough money to purchase AED devices for

all of their more than 30 senior centers in their service area. At the time, only one center had this lifesaving device.

Working with the parent organization, we supplied them with information about how to obtain the devices. We also offered to find someone who could provide training, at least at the local level.

The parent agency was able to obtain AEDs for all their senior centers. We were told by one of the members of the organization this would not have happened without the input

from our club. And all of this was because a Lion went into cardiac arrest. His misfortune started the ripples that led to providing a much-needed benefit. If he hadn't been a Lion, who knows what would have happened?





So, ask yourself, "As just one Lion, can I really make a difference?" The answer is a resounding "Yes!" Sometimes we don't realize the impact we have.

Director Marcinkowski is a retired Army aviator and a government civil servant. During his 42 years of service in the United States Army he flew numerous types of helicopters and was the commander of Fort Greely, Alaska. He is currently the director of plans and operations at the Logistics Readiness Center, where he serves as deputy for all installation logistics at Fort Wainwright in Alaska.

Director Marcinkowski is a charter member of the Interior Baseball Lions Club, where he served the baseball community since 2003. He held several offices within the association including club president, club secretary, zone chairperson, district governor, first and

second vice district governor, club, district, and multiple district LCIF coordinator and council chairperson, among many other positions.

He is also a Melvin Jones Fellow and a Lions Legacy Society member. In addition to his Lion activities, Director Marcinkowski served on the Alaska State Veterans Advisory Board, local school board, and local platting board. He is also a member of the Army Aviation Association of America, Veterans of Foreign Wars and coached high school and American Legion baseball teams for 13 years.

CHAMOIS LIONS

The Chamois Lions Club met for their regular monthly meeting on Monday evening, January 13, 2025 at the Chamois Community Center. Sixteen Lions and one guest, Grayson Gerloff, were present for the dinner and business meeting.

Prior to the dinner, Lion Secretary Beth Sieg led the Chamois Lions in the Pledge of Allegiance and Lion President Robin Lieneke offered the table prayer. The Ladies of St. Mary's Catholic Church served a delicious dinner of homemade potato soup, veggie tray, homemade dinner rolls, and cake for dessert.

Lion President Robin Lieneke presided at the business meeting.

Lion President Lieneke requested that the meeting agenda be approved and with no objections voiced, Lion President Lieneke declared the agenda approved. Copies of the minutes of the December 9, 2024 meeting had previously been distributed electronically by Lion Secretary Beth Sieg and paper copies were available for those Lions who prefer paper. With no objection voiced, Lion President Lieneke declared the minutes approved. Lion Treasurer Nelson Sieg presented a detailed written financial report for the Chamois Lions general account. Lion Building Co-Chairperson Randy Thoenen did not have a financial report for the Community Center.

Lion President Lieneke called on Chamois Lions Club liaisons to other Chamois and Morrison civic groups for reports on the activities of those groups. Lion Melissa Arlen, who is the Mayor of the City of Morrison, was absent so there was no report for that organization. At present, there is no Lion who is a member of the City of Chamois government so there was no information for that organization. Lion Jeff Kormann, who is a member of the Chamois Historic Preservation Commission (CHPC) and also a member of the Chamois Industrial Development Corporation (CIDC), had no news to report but did announce that the CHPC would meet on January 15, 2025 and the CIDC would meet on Monday, January 20, 2025 in the Heritage Community Bank board room. This meeting will be an organizational meeting to include the election of officers and there will be discussion on a possible real estate transaction. Lion Vice President Scott Mertz, who is the liaison to the Chamois Fire Department, presented a detailed report on Fire Department activities. The Fire Department responded to seven calls during the past month. These calls included one structure fire, one missing person situation, one assistance to another fire department, two medical emergencies, and three vehicle accidents. Lions Steve Duncan and Jeff Kormann, who are members of the Osage County Agritourism Council (OCAC), had nothing to report other than 2025 memberships in OCAC are for sale at a cost of \$30.00 for individual or family memberships and \$75.00 for business memberships. To conclude the reports on activities of other civic groups, Lion Jeff Kormann, who is a member of the Missouri Community Betterment Association (MCB) Board of Directors, reported that the next MCB Lunch & Learn presentation will be on Wednesday, January 15, 2025 and will focus on Modern Woodman Community Support Programs.

Five items of old business, special project updates, and ad hoc committee reports were listed on the meeting agenda.

Two Chamois Lions Club projects pertain to work at the Chamois City Park. One project involves physical repairs to park structures. There is a need to install a new door on the Chamois City Park ballpark storage shed and to make some minor repairs to ballpark fences. The weather has not cooperated so these projects remain on hold. Likewise, the project to rebuild the second story of the Old Bandstand and to remodel the lower level remains a high priority but there are still questions as to flood plain regulations and the availability of a building contractor.

There was no new information to report on the flagpole project at the Chamois City Park. The plan is for a 40-foot flagpole that is visible both from inside the park and from the Missouri River to be installed. The flagpole

has been purchased and received. Volunteer assistance to pour concrete for the base of the flagpole, to set the flagpole, and to eventually light the flagpole has been arranged for. The City of Chamois has approved the project.

In regards to Chamois Day and whether or not to continue with the event, there was no new discussion. Consensus of Lions Club members is to hopefully be able to continue this important community event, but there is need to organize a new Chamois Day Committee and to find more volunteers. Lion President Lieneke will schedule a meeting that involves representatives from the Chamois Lions Club, the City of Chamois, and the Osage County R-1 School PTO to address the issues of whether or not to continue with Chamois Day and if the decision is to continue organize a Chamois Day Committee to oversee the event. This meeting hopefully will occur in late January 2025.

The Chamois Lions Club has been involved with Central Missouri Community Action to provide food distribution events. The next such food distribution event is scheduled for Tuesday, January 21, 2025 at 3:30 p.m. at the Most Pure Heart of Mary Catholic Church Parish Hall with distribution to take place from the exterior kitchen door on the west side of the building.

Only one item of new business was presented and discussed.

Lion Steve Cramer, who is a member of the Osage County R-1 School Board, reported on a possible school bond issue that would address the need for a new HVAC system and possible new preschool classrooms. Lion Cramer outlined the issues with the current boiler system, which is over fifty years old and very expensive to maintain, and the need to upgrade the electrical system in order to support a new HVAC system. The Chamois Lions Club is extremely supportive of projects that benefit the school. Lion President Lieneke suggested that a school report become a regular report along with the monthly reports from other civic groups.

Lion President Lieneke shared two items of correspondence. One item was a request from KidsSight for a donation. KidsSight is a Missouri Lions project that involves vision screenings in schools and day care centers and is critical in the early detection of eye issues that may require a child to be referred to an optometrist. The Chamois Lions Club voted to donate \$200.00 to this most important sight conservation project. The second item of correspondence was a thank-you note from Ben Massey for assistance provided by Lions Club members in his move into a new apartment.

Lion Secretary Beth Sieg made one announcement. The Lions District 26-M7 Convention will be held on March 7-8, 2025 in Holts Summit, MO. Registration is \$40.00 per Lion. Chamois Lions Club members were encouraged to attend the annual convention.

January birthday wishes were extended to Lions Robin Lieneke, Brandy Ruegge, Randy Thoenen, Susan Sundermeyer, and Lana Hackmann. Prayer concerns were expressed for those community members who have health issues to include Lions Susan Sundermeyer, Mark Lieneke, and Michael Edwards. Lions Lieneke and Edwards were both present for the meeting.

To conclude the meeting on a humorous note, Lion Steve Duncan shared several short New Year's Day jokes. Two such jokes were "My New Year's resolution was to drop my bad habits, but no one likes a quitter" and "I made a New Year's resolution to stop procrastinating, but I am going to wait until next year to start".

The next meeting of the Chamois Lions Club will be on Monday, February 10, 2025 at the Chamois Community Center. Dinner will be at 6:30 p.m. with the meeting at 7:00 p.m.






