

Charles J. Miller had a dream. It all started in the summer of 1969 during a conversation with the Executive Director of the Woodhaven Learning Center, a school for children with disabilities in Columbia, Missouri.

His dream was of a residential summer camp on property he and his brother-in-law, Harry Brown, owned, located on the Lake of the Ozarks, a camp for everyone whatever their ability level. Their goal was to create a place for people and campers with disabilities to experience the exhilaration of outdoor play. A camp designed to match their special medical needs and provide them with the maximum safety with freedom to enjoy nature.

Meetings and discussions with concerned groups including the Missouri State Division of Mental Health, United Cerebral Palsy of Missouri, and Woodhaven Learning Center, led to a meeting with the Missouri Jaycees Executive Committee.

Mr. Miller told the Jaycees of his dream, and on May 17, 1970, the Missouri Jaycees voted to adopt the camp project. Mr. Miller and Mr. Brown donated their land; 35 undeveloped acres adjoining the Lake of the Ozarks with an additional 200 acres for nature trails and out camping.

They named it Wonderland Camp and it was incorporated as a not-for-profit foundation by the State of Missouri.

Jaycee chapters throughout the state came forward to contribute. The Kansas City Jaycees provided the professional architectural and planning services. The Southern Platte Chapter took on half the cost and labor involved in the installation of a well and pump. And Missouri Jaycee Chapters throughout the state gave liberally of their labor to build the facilities.

Although only a few buildings were completed, the camp was functionally sound and usable enough to welcome its first campers in the spring of 1972. By the August closing date, 157 children and 83 counselors and staff had used and thoroughly enjoyed the new Wonderland Camp.

Since the first small start, construction has gone forward. Facilities have been expanded to provide an outdoor camping experience for over 1,000 campers each summer. The camp is still growing. Click here to take a visual tour of the facilities at Wonderland Camp.

#### **Chamois Lions Club News**

The Chamois Lions Club met for their regular monthly meeting on Monday evening, June 9, 2025 at the Chamois Community Center. Sixteen Lions and one potential new member, Melinda Kirsch, were present for the dinner and business meeting.

Prior to the dinner, Lion Third Vice President Randy Thoenen led the Chamois Lions in the Pledge of Allegiance and Lion Sabra Paulsmeyer offered the table prayer. The Ladies of St. Mary's Catholic Church served the traditional June meeting salad supper with a variety of salads, fruit cocktail, and cake for dessert.

Following the dinner and prior to the business meeting, Lion Third Vice President Thoenen called on Lion Steve Duncan to induct a new member, Melinda Kirsch, into the Chamois Lions Club. Lion Duncan briefly explained the history of Lions Clubs International (LCI) and described the primary service projects of LCI, the State of Missouri Lions, Lions District 26-M7, and the Chamois Lions Club. Lion Duncan then conducted a brief induction ceremony and presented Lion Kirsch with a membership packet to include the Lions lapel pin. Lion Kirsch was sponsored by Lion Duncan.

In the absence of Lion President Robin Lieneke, Lion Third Vice President Thoenen presided at the business meeting and requested that the meeting agenda be approved. With no objections voiced, the agenda was approved. Copies of the minutes of the May 12, 2025 meeting had previously been distributed electronically by Lion Secretary Beth Sieg and paper copies were available for those Lions who prefer paper. With no objection voiced, Lion Third Vice President Thoenen declared the minutes approved. Lion Treasurer Nelson Sieg presented a detailed written financial report for the Chamois Lions general account and Building Co-Chairperson Lion Randy Thoenen presented a detailed written financial report for the Community Center.

Lion Third Vice President Thoenen called on Chamois Lions Club liaisons to other Chamois and Morrison civic groups for reports on the activities of those groups. Lion Melissa Arlen, who is the Mayor of the City of Morrison, was absent and there is no Lion who is a member of the City of Chamois government so there were no reports for those organizations. Lion Susan Sundermeyer, who is a member of the Chamois Historic Preservation Commission (CHPC), was present but had no new news to report. Lion Jeff Kormann next reported on behalf of the Chamois Industrial Development Corporation (CIDC). The CIDC met on May 21, 2025 and voted to sell the old Lucy's Bar/Stonner's Meat Market building on Main Street. The CIDC also discussed the need for the development of single family housing in Chamois. The next meeting of the CIDC will be in early August 2025 and Lions were encouraged to attend as the CIDC is focused on economic development and the revitalization of downtown. The meeting location and a tentative agenda for the meeting will be communicated. Lions Scott Mertz and Sean Hackmann, who are members of the Chamois Fire Department, reported that there were two calls during the past month. Lions Mertz and Hackmann then presented two options for a Fire Department fundraiser with one of the options to be for the Chamois Lions Club to host a fundraiser on behalf of and for the benefit of the Fire Department. Much discussion ensued. Tentative plans are for a food and fun games event to be held on July 19, 2025. The Chamois Lions voted unanimously to pursue this important fundraiser and to work with the Fire Department. Lions Steve Duncan, Jeff Kormann, and Susan Sundermeyer, who are members of the Osage County Agritourism Council (OCAC), reported on upcoming events for that organization. A Taste of Osage County will be held on Saturday, September 13, 2025, the Farm to Table Dinner will be held on Saturday, September 27, 2025, and the Christmas Church Cookie Tour will be held on Friday, December 12, 2025.

Three items of old business, special project updates, and ad hoc committee reports were addressed.

Lion Third Vice President Thoenen addressed the issue of City Park repair projects and called on other Lions to report on the status of repairs. Lion Steve Duncan reported that contractors are soon to begin repairs on the ballpark to include the replacement of a light pole, repairs to the lights, and repairs to a damaged fence. In regards to the proposed rebuild of the second story of the Old Bandstand and to remodel the lower level, Lions

Susan Sundermeyer and Jeff Kormann reported that efforts continue to develop a construction plan, to find a building contractor, and to raise funds.

Due to the absence of Lion Mark Mehmert, there was nothing new to report on the project to install wi-fi in the Chamois Community Center. After some delay, Lion Mehmert will coordinate with the vendor T-Mobile to complete this project.

Some discussion focused on a proposed community dinner. This dinner would be an opportunity for the Chamois Lions Club to give back to the community and to share information about Lions Club and Lions community projects. Tentative plans are to hold a free community dinner on October 31, 2025 in conjunction with the Halloween Truck or Treat festivities held on Main Street. This dinner would probably include hot dogs, chili, and desserts. The committee working on this event includes Lions Robin Lieneke, Beth Sieg, Michael Edwards, Steve Cramer, Scott Mertz, and Sean Hackmann.

Two items of new business were presented and discussed.

Lions Jeff Kormann, Duane Paulsmeyer, and Steve Duncan reported on the latest Food Box Distribution event held in Chamois on Friday, May 30, 2025. In cooperation with Central Missouri Community Action, 150 boxes of produce were distributed to residents of Chamois, Morrison, and Gasconade. The boxes contained a nice variety of vegetable produce items along with one pound of ground sausage.

The Chamois Lions Club Scholarship Committee reported that the \$500.00 E. E. Turner Scholarship was awarded to Landen Northway and the \$500.00 Chamois Lions Club Scholarship was awarded to Bill Kirsch at the recent Osage County R-1 High School graduation ceremony held on May 23, 2025. Scholarship Committee members include Lions Susan Sundermeyer, Nelson Sieg, Lana Hackmann, and Randy Thoenen.

Following the completion of all new business, Lion Secretary Sieg shared one item of correspondence, a thank-you letter from Bill Kirsch, recipient of the Chamois Lions Club Scholarship.



Over a





In 1917, Melvin Jones, a 38-year-old Chicago business leader, told members of his local business club they should reach beyond business issues and address the betterment of their communities and the world. Jones' group, the Business Circle of Chicago, agreed.

After contacting similar groups around the United States, an organizational meeting was held on June 7, 1917, in Chicago, Illinois, USA. The only point of

contention was the selection of a name for the new organization. Melvin Jones researched the idea of calling the new organization Lions. He was convinced that the lion stood for strength, courage, fidelity and vital action. On a secret ballot the name Lions was chosen over several others.

The new group took the name of one of the invited groups, the "Association of Lions Clubs," and thus began the rich tradition of service that Lions Clubs are known for around the world.

RX Sunglasses -


Other Frames - Most prescription eyeglasses will go here
