Reporting Club Officers

1. From LCI Main page (www.lionsclubs.org), click on **Lion Portal**.
2. Log on to your Club's Portal site.
3. Select "Member Actions", which is to the right of your screen.
4. Click on 'Manage Club Officers'
5. A small pop-up box will appear. Click on 'Create New Assignment'
6. The next pop-up box will ask "When should this assignment begin?" Select 'the upcoming year'. Then hit the NEXT button.
7. On the next pop-up box, you will be asked "What is the Officer and Title Type for this title?". Under Officer Type, click on the small arrows on the right and select either Officer or Administrator. Do the same for the next item, Title Type, (Official or Local). Click on the NEXT button.
8. A list of your club membership will be shown and at the top you select the officer type. Once done selecting member to fill office, click on the next button. You may need to use the grey bar on the right side to slide down to find the NEXT button.
9. Always select **YES** for adding officer address.
10. Make sure the officer's information is correct, if not make necessary updates.
11. You will follow the same procedure for each of your elected officers.

Lions International Convention

Hong Kong • July 1–7, 2026

More than 17,000 Lions from six continents gathered in Hong Kong for the 2026 Lions International Convention. Throughout the week, attendees heard inspiring stories of service, leadership, and innovation from Lions around the world. Below are some of the highlights from the

convention.

Mokane Lions Club Earns Platinum Recognition

The Mokane Lions Club was recognized as one of approximately 200 clubs worldwide—less than one-half of one percent of all Lions clubs—to receive the prestigious MISSION 1.5 Platinum Club Award for outstanding membership growth. Platinum Club Award Criteria

To earn Platinum status, a club must:

- Retain 100% of its existing membership (excluding members lost due to death).
- Double its club size by adding at least 20 new members.

This recognition represents one of the highest achievements in Lions International's MISSION 1.5 membership initiative.

International President Mark Lyon's Theme

International President Mark Lyon introduced his 2026–2027 theme: "Rooted in Service."

He emphasized four priorities that will guide Lions around the world:

1. Get back to our roots by focusing on meaningful service.
2. Plant seeds of growth by inviting new members.
3. Let leadership shine by advocating for others.
4. Support LCIF and let it support you.

International Constitution Changes

Delegates approved several constitutional changes, including:

- Reducing the number of U.S. international directors from 11 to 9, while increasing
- representation for South America and India.

- Increasing international dues by \$2.00 per year for five years, beginning in July 2028.
- Clarifying the eligibility of Past District Governors to vote at all levels of Lions conventions.

Convention Highlights

The convention showcased remarkable examples of Lions service from around the globe, including:

- A moving performance by the China Disabled People's Performing Art Troupe, featuring talented deaf and visually impaired artists.
- A large-scale CPR education initiative in Beijing aimed at teaching lifesaving skills to thousands of people.
- A childhood cancer support project in Ghana, similar in concept to the Ronald McDonald House.
- Service Tourism, an initiative encouraging Lions to visit clubs while traveling internationally.
- The Lions Humanitarian Award, presented to the non-Lions organization Khalsa Aid
- International for its outstanding disaster relief efforts. One of the most memorable quotes of the convention was: "Humanity has no borders. Humans do."
- A Lion who raised funds by running a marathon at Everest Base Camp.
- India's "Dump or Donate" electronic recycling program, where usable electronics are refurbished and donated to those in need while unusable items are responsibly recycled.
- The ever-popular tradition of pin trading, which continues to be one of the convention's favorite activities and a fun way for Lions from around the world to connect.

Other Activities

Even with a full schedule at the convention, there was still time to explore. Several Lions visited Hong Kong Disneyland. LCI also offered some tours of Hong Kong, including one of Kowloon with a traditional Chinese dinner, and shopping at the Ladies Market. Some Lions also visited a fishing village, where white dolphins can be spotted from a boat ride.

Looking Ahead

The 2026 International Convention served as a powerful reminder that, regardless of where we live or what language we speak, Lions share a common purpose: serving our communities and making the world a better place. The friendships, ideas, and inspiration gained in Hong Kong will continue to strengthen our service here at home and around the globe.

Rooted in Service... Ready to Grow

As I begin my journey as your First Vice District Governor, one thing has already become very clear to me: every club in District M7 has something valuable to offer.

- Some clubs are growing.
- Some are rebuilding.
- Some have long traditions.
- Others are trying new ideas.

None of those paths are wrong – they simply reflect the unique communities we serve.



This year, as we embrace International President Mark Lyons' theme, **Rooted in Service**, I hope we also remember that healthy things don't stay still—they grow. Strong roots don't keep a tree from reaching higher. They give it the strength to do so.

The same is true for our clubs. The traditions we've built, the friendships we've formed, and the service we've provided are our roots. They are the foundation that allows us to welcome new members, embrace new ideas, and continue meeting the changing needs of our communities.

One opportunity I've already had this Lions year has been working to secure sponsors and donations for our Camden County Lions Club fundraiser. Every time I walked into a business wearing Lions gear, someone asked me about Lions:

- "What do you do?"
- "What is Lions?"

Those simple questions opened the door to tell our story—to talk about **vision programs, eyeglass recycling, scholarships, food drives, and neighbors helping neighbors**. It reminded me that we don't have to wait for a membership drive or a special event to talk about Lions. **Every conversation is an opportunity to tell our story.**

When someone shows interest, I don't want the conversation to end there. Many of you know that PDG Lion Missy created the **"You're Invited"** cards. I keep a stack with me, and when someone expresses interest, I hand them a card and invite them to visit a meeting. If they're not from my area, I try to help them connect with a Lions club closer to home. Sometimes all people need is a personal invitation.

I also learned something unexpected after the July 4th storm that many people have jokingly called the "Lake of the Ozarks Hurricane." If you saw some of the videos from those caught on the water that day, you probably understand why. As our community began recovering, I found myself asking a simple question: **Could our club have done more?** As I started looking for answers, I realized there is more for me to learn about Lions disaster preparedness and how we can be ready before disaster strikes.

Because disasters don't happen when we're ready. If they did, they probably wouldn't become disasters. They happen on weekends. On holidays. In the middle of the night. On the



hottest days of summer and the coldest days of winter. That's why preparedness matters. Our Camden County Lions Club has already started discussing what a response plan could look like:

- Who do we call?
- What resources are available?
- How can we be ready to serve our community when the unexpected happens?

Because service doesn't begin after the storm. It begins before it.

As I begin visiting clubs across our district this year, I'm looking forward to learning from each of you. Every club has its own strengths, its own challenges, and its own story. I hope to bring those ideas back so we can continue learning from one another.

One thing I already know is that there isn't just one way to be a great Lion:

- Some faithfully attend every meeting.
- Some are the first to volunteer.
- Some quietly make financial contributions that make service possible.
- Some mentor and encourage others through years of experience.

Every one of those Lions matters.

As we begin this new Lions year, I'd like to leave you with one simple challenge: **Tell our story.**

- Look for opportunities to share what Lions do in your community.
- Invite someone to attend a meeting.
- Ask one person to become a Lion. Just one.

Imagine the impact on our clubs, our communities, and our district if every Lion accepted that challenge.

I look forward to serving, learning, and growing alongside each of you this year.

CHAMOIS



The Chamois Lions Club met for their regular monthly meeting on Monday evening, July 13, 2026 at the Chamois Community Center. Seventeen Lions and five visitors were present for the dinner and business meeting. Visitors included Rhonda Mitchem, Emma Bathke, Elise Brochu, Misty Hilkerbaumer, and City of Chamois Mayor Shawn Mitchem.

Prior to the dinner, Lion President Jason Hilkerbaumer led the Chamois Lions in the Pledge of Allegiance and offered the table prayer. The Ladies of St. Mary's Catholic Church served a delicious dinner of pulled pork, baked beans, potato salad, cucumber salad, slaw, dinner rolls, and for dessert apple crisp and cake.

Prior to the business meeting, Lion President Jason Hilkerbaumer introduced Rhonda Mitchem, who was present to represent the Chamois Community in Action (CIA) group. The CIA has assumed responsibility for Chamois Day, which will be held on Saturday, September 15, 2026. As always, volunteers are needed to staff the various activities at Chamois Day. In particular, volunteers are needed to drive tractors for the hay rides, to sell raffle tickets, and to supervise the inflatables. Chamois Day T-shirts will be available through pre-sale only with kid's shirts to cost \$15 and adult shirts to cost \$18. The CIA will meet next on Tuesday, August 4, 2026 at 6:30 p.m. at the Chamois United Methodist Church. Volunteers are welcome to attend this meeting. In addition to organizing Chamois Day, the CIA plans to replace or board up some broken second story windows on Main Street. Materials, labor, and the use of a boom truck are needed. Lions Sean Hackmann and Jay Bathke, who are members of the Chamois Fire Department, indicated that the Fire Department may be able to assist with this project.

Lion President Hilkerbaumer presided at the business meeting and requested that the meeting agenda be approved. The Chamois Lions voted to approve the agenda. Copies of the minutes of the June 8, 2026 meeting had previously been distributed electronically by Lion Secretary Beth Sieg and paper copies were available for those Lions who prefer paper. The Chamois Lions voted to approve the minutes. Lion Treasurer Nelson Sieg presented the financial report for the Chamois Lions general account and Lion Building Co-Chairperson Randy Thoenen reported that he did not have an up-to-date financial report for the month for the Community Center, but would provide a two-month report in August. The Chamois Lions voted to approve the financial report for the Lions general account.

Lion Building Co-Chairperson Dale Hackmann and Lion Lana Hackmann reported on several maintenance projects recently completed at the Community Center. The wall behind the stage has been painted in anticipation of the installation of the big-screen TV, the air vents have been cleaned, and the batteries in the thermostats have been replaced. In addition, the north side of the roof has been checked and screws tightened to prevent roof leaks. Lion Randy Thoenen plans to have a work-day to check the south side of the roof and tightened any loose screws there. Plans for future maintenance projects include to clean out cabinets in the kitchen and to paint the exterior wall on the west side of the Community Center.

While discussing Community Center maintenance issues, Lion Building Co-Chairpersons Hackmann and Thoenen reminded Lions that the Community Center is on Three Rivers Electric Cooperative for power and not Ameren. During the power outage on July 4-6, 2026, the Community Center had power and was used as a cooling center. Thanks were extended to visitor Elise Brochu, who hosted community members who used the Community Center during the power outage. In addition to the volunteer efforts of Ms. Brochu to assist persons affected by the power outage, mention was made to recognize Kayla Minor, who owns Sweet Bee's Shaved Ice,

for providing hot dogs and Mike Nolting, who owns Jerry's Convenience Store, for opening the store even though the store did not have power.

Lion President Hilkerbaumer called on Chamois Lions Club liaisons to other Chamois and Morrison civic groups for reports on the activities of those groups. Lion Jeff Kormann, who is President of the Chamois Industrial Development Corporation (CIDC), reported that the CIDC met on July 9, 2026 with a continued focus on the development of a Business & Services Directory, with hopes to have this directory complete by Chamois Day. In addition to this project, the CIDC hopes to erect a sign at the Highways 89 and 100 four-way stop to point to the business district, to provide building owners on Main Street with dusk-to-dawn lights to better light Main Street, and to again sponsor the "Back-to-School Supplies" Program. Lion Susan Sundermeyer, who is a board member of the Chamois Historic Preservation Commission (CHPC), reported that the CHPC is finalizing plans for Chamois Day and will again have the Townley House open, will serve honey ice cream, and hopes to feature the Rost Family Singers. Lion Jay Bathke, who is a City of Chamois Councilperson, Lion Meghan Birmingham, who is the City Clerk, and Mayor Shawn Mitchem reported on City activities. Construction is to begin soon to rebuild the portion of the ballpark grandstand that was destroyed in a windstorm and the City would like to use the fence and posts from the old ballpark batting cage that is to be dismantled and repurpose those materials to secure the City's generator that is used at the water tower. Lion Sean Hackmann, who is a member of the Chamois Fire Department, reported that the Fire Department had one call during the month and that call was in response to an anhydrous ammonia leak. The Fire Department plans to be involved with Chamois Day activities. Lions Kormann, Sundermeyer, and Steve Duncan, who are members of the Osage County Agritourism Council, reported on upcoming events to include a Taste of Osage County on September 12, 2026, the Farm-to-Table Dinner on September 26, 2026, and the Christmas Church/Cookie Tour on December 11, 2026.

Six items of old business, special project updates, and ad hoc committee reports were addressed.

Some discussion focused on five projects within the Chamois City Park and the Community Center. There is a need for ballpark fence repairs, repairs to the shed door, and the removal of the batting cage. Lion Randy Thoenen will lead efforts to assess what materials and labor are needed and then schedule a work-day. Second, efforts continue to find a contractor to work on the Old Bandstand and Lion Susan Sundermeyer shared with City of Chamois Mayor Shawn Mitchem, who has offered to reach out to potential contractors, copies of pictures of the original Old Bandstand and drawings of possible repairs to the structure. Lion Sundermeyer will attend the Chamois City Council meeting on July 22, 2026 at 6:30 p.m. to discuss the Old Bandstand restoration project with the City Council. Third, Lion Mark Mehmert will continue to look into an enclosure for the Internet router located in the Community Center. Now that the wall behind the stage in the Community Center has been painted, there is a need to hang the new 65-inch TCL television. This TV could be used by renters to stream programs such as the Super Bowl or to show family or group videos and photographs and thus make the Community Center a more attractive venue for potential renters. Finally, plans were finalized by Lions Dawna Keilholz, Nelson Sieg, and Beth Sieg to take delivery on twelve new 60-inch round tables for the Community Center to replace older tables. The older tables will be offered for sale.

Brief discussion focused on the Chamois Lions Community Breakfast to be held on Saturday, August 22, 2026 from 7:30 a.m. until 10:00 a.m. The breakfast will feature pancakes and sausage, eggs, biscuits and gravy, coffee, juice, and milk. A free-will offering will be accepted as payment with the proceeds used to help pay for the Community Center improvements of the big-screen TV and new tables.

Three items of new business were presented and discussed.

The annual Chamois Day city-wide clean-up day was discussed in detail. The CIA hopes to have a clean-up day on Saturday, September 12, 2026 at 9:00 a.m. with local volunteers and volunteers from Linn First Church involved. Chamois Lions were encouraged to assist on this day. The Chamois Lions Club had scheduled a

clean-up day on Sunday, September 13, 2026 at 1:00 p.m. This clean-up day will take place if additional work is still needed after the September 12 clean-up day or in the event the September 12 day is rained out.

July 1, 2026 marks the beginning of the 2026-2027 Lions Clubs International (LCI) year. Chamois Lions Club officers for the new year were declared installed. These Lions include Lion Jason Hilkerbaumer as President, Lion Scott Mertz as First Vice President, Lion Randy Thoenen as Second Vice President, Lion Jeff Kormann as Third Vice President, Lion Beth Sieg as Secretary, Lion Nelson Sieg as Treasurer, Lion Susan Sundermeyer as Tail Twister, Lion Connie Smith as Lion Tamer, Lion Meghan Birmingham as LCIF Chairperson, Lions Michael Edwards and Steve Duncan as Club Service Chairpersons, Lion Mark Mehmert as Marketing/Communications Chairperson, Lion Steve Cramer as Membership Chairperson, and Lions Susan Sundermeyer, Randy Thoenen, Sean Hackmann, and Duane Paulsmeyer as Directors.

To conclude new business, discussion focused on the CIDC's "Back-to-School Supplies" Program. Lions were encouraged to make individual donations to this important program. Donations may be mailed to Lion Susan Sundermeyer at 207 East Third Street, Chamois, MO 65024.

Three announcements were made. Central Missouri Community Action will host a "Senior Connections" event at the Chamois Community Center on Tuesday, July 14, 2026 from 10:30 a.m. until 1:00 p.m. Several Chamois Lions volunteered to assist. Linn First Church will host a praise worship service, BBQ, and food distribution on Main Street on Friday, August 7, 2026 at 6:00 p.m. The community is invited. The Friends of Chamois Cemeteries will host a Cemetery Walk on Saturday, October 3, 2026 at 1:00 p.m. Six families will be featured during this event.

July birthday wishes were extended to Lions Nelson Ruegger, Melinda Kirsch, and Sabra Paulsmeyer. Prayer concerns were expressed for several community members to include Lion Connie Smith.

To conclude the meeting on a humorous note, Lion Steve Duncan shared three jokes entitled "Tit for Tat", "Father Knows Best", and "Taking Wealth with You After Death" that were provided by Lion Duane Paulsmeyer.

The next meeting of the Chamois Lions Club will be on Monday, August 10, 2026 at the Chamois Community Center. Dinner will be at 6:30 p.m. with the meeting at 7:00 p.m.

Other Frames – Most prescription eyeglasses will go here
Gold Plated – old thin frames

Broken Plastic Frames – Throw Away
Eyeglass Cases – See if a resale center will take them or throw away.

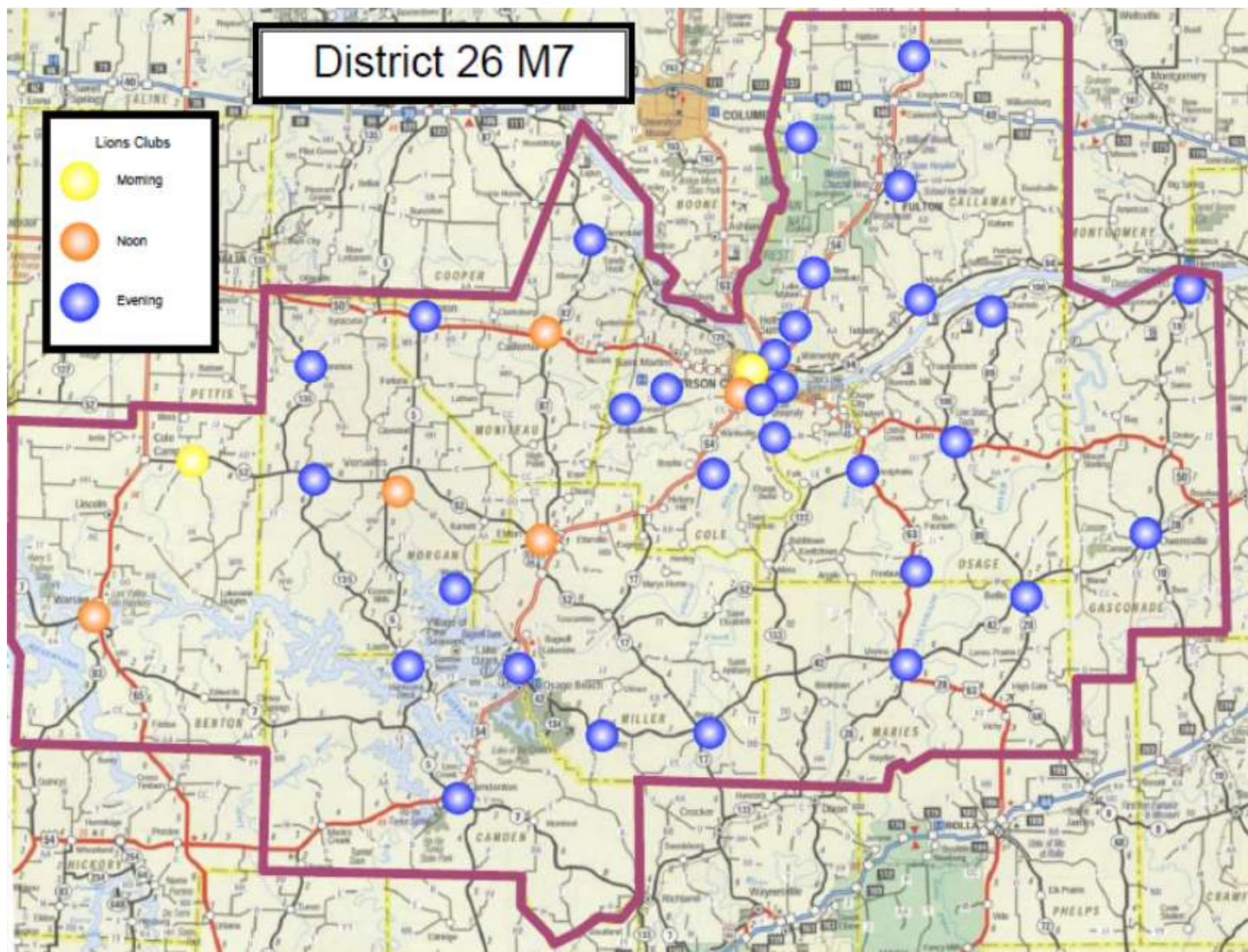
