

For many of us, the summer holidays have flown by and it's time to make our return to school and regular routines. Many children will be excited to return to class and their friends. But for others, September can be a time of worry and concerns about what comes next.



Children and young people reach out to our counsellors at Childline every day about their worries, and for many of them school is the topic of conversation for all sorts of reasons.

Some young people also spoke to our counsellors about feeling overwhelmed about the challenge of starting a new school or college. Others feel overwhelmed about what the new term will bring and that they were worried about the future.

Young people have also told us how they worry about the demands of getting good grades and that the weight of exams and revision would cause them stress. And others say they were concerned about teachers and school staff.

As parents and carers, we need to do everything we can to make sure our children feel supported no matter what their worries might be.

Encourage them to write down their feelings, including everything they look forward to at school, and everything they are worried about. Chat through the list together so there's time to speak about their concerns, help them cope with their worries, and look at the positives.

It is important to listen to their concerns and give them time to speak before offering advice or your opinion. Once your child has shared any concerns or anxieties they might have about going back to school, you could try talking through some practical solutions. You could start by asking them what they think might help them to feel better about the situations that worry them.

Remind them that adjustment can take time. It's okay if it doesn't feel comfortable at first, that's to be expected and others will feel the same way, and they can always speak to you or another safe adult about whatever is worrying them.

This could be a relative, teacher or one of our Childline counsellors. It's vital they know they can speak to someone about their concerns.

Encourage them to ask questions about anything they're not sure about. They could ask teachers, parents or carers about things they'll need at school, who will be in their lessons or anything else that's on their mind. It is also important to ensure they find time to do things they enjoy outside of school hours too, whether that's a sport, club or other activity that brings them joy.

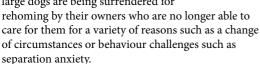

Rise in large-breed dogs being abandoned or surrendered to UK animal rescue charities.

The number of large-breed dogs in UK rescue centres has risen in recent years. Local animal rescue charity, Bath Cats and Dogs Home saw a 16% increase in high cost of living is putting a financial strain on petter number of large dogs they took into their care owners, and larger dogs are bearing the brunt of the

between August 2023 and August 2025. Currently, around half of the dogs at the rescue centre are larger breeds. Bigger dogs are increasingly being abandoned as strays and brought into the animal rescue centre by council dog wardens, local vets or members of the public. Other large dogs are being surrendered for



Rachel Jones, CEO at Bath Cats and Dogs Home, said: "We'd ask for the public to help our larger dogs in three ways this Autumn. If you are considering bringing a dog into your home, please keep an open mind about adopting a larger rescue dog of any size or breed; they can make the most loving companions with the right training. Secondly, please talk to us if you are struggling to cope with your large dog, as we may be able to offer some guidance, and they are easier to rehome if we know their history. Finally, if you can't adopt yourself, please spread the word or consider supporting the care of our larger dogs with a donation so we can continue our vital rehabilitation and rehoming work."

Abi Sutton, who adopted Mack, a German Shepherd Dog from Bath Cats and Dogs Home last year, said: "My partner and I decided to adopt a dog,

and he wanted a young, small breed, and I wanted a large-breed older dog, so we compromised with an enormous puppy called Mack. Although a stray, Mack quickly settled into our home and routine, helped by puppy training classes. He has grown into a very large boy, but is gentle, loving and loyal. It's hard to imagine our lives before Mack came along. I could go on forever about how wonderful it is to have a larger dog. Choosing him to be part of our family was one of the best decisions we have ever made."

There are several reasons for the increase in bigger dogs in rescue centres across the UK. The current high cost of living is putting a financial strain on pet owners, and larger dogs are bearing the brunt of this rise in costs as they are more likely to be abandoned or rehomed due to higher food, vet bills, insurance and other costs compared to smaller dogs. The RSPCA's Pet Cost Calculator shows that big dogs cost from £93 per month, whereas small dogs cost from £62 per month to care for.

Another factor is the rise in popularity of certain large breed dogs shown in social media videos as highly trained, working dogs like Malinois, Huskies or German Shepherds. This has increased public demand for breeds which often require a lot of training, exercise or mental stimulation, but can lead to bigger dogs being abandoned or handed over to rescue centres when the reality of their day-to-day care sets in.



Bath Cats and Dogs Home's rehoming team carefully matches each dog with an owner who can meet their needs and vice versa. Potential adopters are encouraged to research the needs and traits of different breeds, consider their family's working hours and lifestyle, and remain open to dogs of

all sizes and breeds. Big dog's thrive on routine, make active companions, and have big personalities to match their size.

The charity ensures that all dogs available for adoption are neutered, microchipped, vaccinated, and treated for fleas and worms. Each dog is fully assessed by the Centre's animal behaviour team, and adopters receive expert advice on grooming, training, and settling in their new pet.

The Holburne unveils two new galleries and an elegant new look after £2.5 million redevelopment

The Schroder Gallery and The Dutch Gallery are now open to the public.



The Holburne Museum, Bath's first art museum at the top of historic Great Pulteney Street, has opened two brand new galleries. Thanks to generous funding from the Bruno Schroder Trust totalling £2.5 million, a new gallery has been created on the lower ground floor to display Renaissance treasures, while a new gallery on the first floor will exhibit Dutch paintings, all on permanent loan from the Schroder family collection.

About the Schroder collection - The Schroder family have led what is now Schroders plc since it was founded in London in 1804. The family collection was built up by the late Bruno Schroder and his forebears during the course of the last century, becoming one of the finest private collections of silverware in the country, as well as paintings, bronzes, maiolica and gems.

Items from the collection have very rarely been seen in public and never all together. We are very proud to be able to share them with audiences for the long-term future.

World class art displays - The new Schroder Gallery on the lower ground floor has been created by converting archive and picture stores underneath the Café. Taking inspiration from the great treasury displays of the past, with sumptuous dark blue walls and oak panelling, it houses one of the finest collections of silverware in the country, as well as paintings, bronzes, maiolica and gems from the Renaissance period.

At the same time, the Museum is also opening a new gallery on the first floor, next to the grand Ballroom overlooking Great Pulteney Street. Used most recently as an office, the new Dutch Gallery will house the Schroder family's collection of 17th century painting, mostly Netherlandish but including a major work by Claude Lorraine, the grandfather of the pastoral landscape. Shown on a rotating basis, the Schroder Collection of 17th century paintings extends and enhances the Holburne's own collection.

Director of the Holburne, Dr Chris Stephens, said: "I could not be more thrilled or grateful that the Schroder family have chosen the Holburne as the home for their extraordinary collection of Renaissance fine and decorative art. The addition of so many works of such high quality will greatly enhance the Holburne's offer to its audiences and its standing more widely."

A refreshed visual identity - To mark this important new chapter, the Holburne is also unveiling an elegant new brand identity. Taking inspiration from the columns and pediment on the front of the iconic building, a striking 'H' icon is supported by a bolder colour palette and stylish typefaces, reflecting both the heritage and contemporary ambition of the museum.

To help break down any pre-conceptions of the historical façade, an alternative version of the logo will appear to 'dance' on occasion, capturing the more playful side of the museum which offers engaging activities for families, and provides supportive creative health programmes for adults with experience of mental health issues.

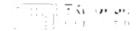

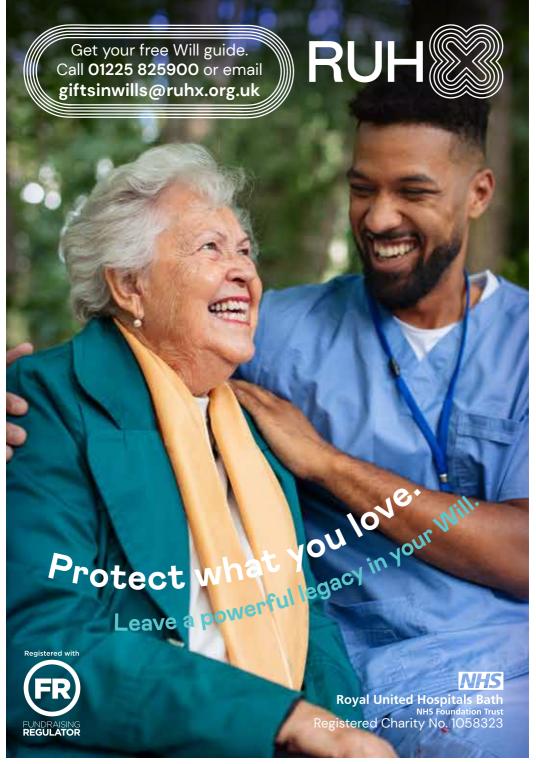

Programme to bring an end to domestic abuse arrives in Bath and North East Somerset

An innovative one-to-one programme to prevent domestic abuse is now being rolled out in Bath and North East Somerset thanks to an integrated approach between Avon and Somerset Police, B&NES Council and charity Society Without Abuse (SWA).

SWA's Open2Change programme works with those who use harmful behaviours in their relationships and supports them on a one-to-one basis to see the harm they are causing, identify the roots and support to change their behaviour.

Open2Change will be co-located with police in three areas; Bath, Radstock and Keynsham to provide the support of a Behaviour Change Worker, who will identify and work with those referred into the service by police and other partners due to current and historical domestic abuse.

The programme, which is open to men and women, has been running successfully in Swindon since 2021 and was recently independently evaluated by the University of Worcester who has recognised its unique impact in reducing abusive behaviours and improving participants' overall wellbeing. The findings showed its potential to be a key tool in breaking the cycle of abuse, which is an important step in one day seeing an end to domestic abuse.

Manager of Open2Change, Louisa Wrighton, explained: "Open2Change targets the root cause of domestic abuse, the people who are carrying out the harmful behaviour. By reducing and removing this behaviour, we can put a stop to the cycle of abuse; reducing the harm to victims and children, reducing the number of new and repeated incidents and bringing safety to families in the B&NES area."

"Domestic abuse accounts for around 20 per cent of Avon and Somerset Police incidents, hugely impacting victims/survivors, children, families and communities." said Chief Inspector Scott Hill, Area Commander for B&NES

"Through an initiative called Project Bright Light our police service is committed to ensuring victims/ survivors are at the heart of everything we do. Many domestic abusers are repeat perpetrators, so we see intervening to stop their patterns of behaviour as paramount to protecting those affected. Everyone deserves to live their lives in safety and free from abuse."

Councillor Manda Rigby, B&NES Cabinet Member for Communications and Communities, said: "It is essential that victims/survivors remain at the very centre of any support to prevent and reduce domestic abuse. I welcome this programme and look forward to hearing about reductions in the number of cases in our area as has been demonstrated in Swindon."

SWA has been providing support and recovery for those affected by domestic abuse since 1974. The charity's aims are to bring an end to domestic abuse through education, prevention and early intervention. Through Open2Change, specialist workers address harmful behaviours in order to prevent abuse occurring; and the charity's HOPE team works with children and young people in schools and in the community to teach them about healthy relationships and provide trauma support to aid recovery.

The charity also has a specialist business-focussed arm, working with employers to ensure that they have the right understanding and support in place for victims of domestic abuse, and train Ambassadors across the region to help signpost victims to where they can receive help.

Even better sessions end in time for anyone who has worked up an appetite to join the lunch club at the church!

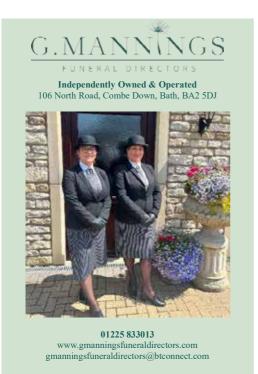

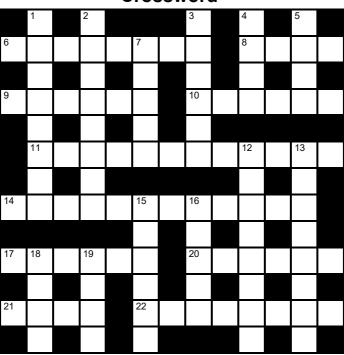

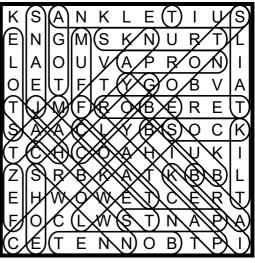

Potato curry



Ingredients:

1 tablespoon oil
Half teaspoon mustard seeds
1 red chilli cut lengthways, seeds removed
A few curry leaves, chopped
1 chopped onion
Quarter teaspoon each of ground coriander, garam masala, turmeric.
Large pinch of chilli powder
1 tomato quartered
200g potatoes
50ml coconut milk

Method:

Heat the oil and add mustard seeds, chilli and curry leaves. As the mustard seeds begin to pop add onions and stir fry until lightly browned.

Stir in the spices, tomato and cook for a further minute.

Peel the potatoes and cut into cubes. Add to the pan and cook gently for 5 minutes stirring occasionally.

Pour in coconut milk and 50ml water. Cook for 15 - 20 minutes until potatoes are tender.
