State Fair 2022!

Volunteers are back at the State Fair Garden. SEWMG has taken over from Extension and entered into an agreement with the State Fair to run the garden during the Fair this August. The dates are August 4 through 14. Watch for an email notice to sign up for a shift.

You might remember that we started a garden renovation in 2019. That year we created a new center bed, started the container contest and used the dead maple tree to illustrate the role a dying tree plays in the ecosystem. Covid kept us off the grounds in 2020 except for a couple visits to remove an overwhelming weed patch.

In 2021 we worked the garden but were not allowed to work during the Fair. The dead maple The Fair has been a favorite with both MG was removed and our team of Margie Lowe, Jan Gradisnik and Mark Bahr created a charming gnome garden around the tree. We continued to improve the center bed and started renovation of the new sun garden created by removal of the maple. A border of grasses illustrates what grass can do for a perennial bed. We added late blooming daylilies for color during the fair. The cactus/succulent bed was renovated by Belinda Brocker and Krista Mozina.

This year brings additional change. A stand of invasive grass has been removed so the natives garden can have a new patch of flowering natives. Two vines have been moved to an arch in the sun bed. Trees have been labeled - finally. Two shagbark hickory volunteers are being tended to replace our aging trees. We hope to have an educational exhibit on buckthorn and our 30th (Pearl) anniversary will be highlighted throughout the garden. Our Lifetime Service Award plaque will be displayed. Lifelong Gardening will be represented with the elevated beds and friendly tools. And - drum roll - the container contest is BACK! Fairgoers will be able to vote on their favorite.

From the Board

What we learn from composting

In our training as Master Gardeners, we all learned about composting. Perhaps you've even shared information about composting with members of the public. I know I have done so many times, especially at our Wisconsin State Fair Garden with its working compost pile we use to educate our visitors. Two immediate values come to mind when I think about composting: it is a great way to utilize garden waste and table scraps and it is a notable way to improve our soil so the plants in our future gardens are lush and bountiful. We recall the need to incorporate "browns" and "greens" in the compost mix. Brown content is organic matter that is rich in carbon. Plant waste that is dry and fibrous is generally recognized as brown, and tends to be more resistant to decay. Green content is softer, with higher moisture content, and contains more nitrogen. Typical compost recipes call for two parts brown to one part green. Also needed to complete the process are a little moisture and air. We gardeners work hard to turn our compost piles to make sure that they are consistently moist, don't become compacted, and that bottom layers are brought to the top to get a breath of fresh air. Mother nature adds the heat which is a byproduct of the decay process and after a bit of time, we have the black gold we all covet.

With your help, SEWMG is making Master Gardener Compost. We are taking the remnants of our old "Approved Gardens and Programs" that are no longer directly partnered with Extension, and our old ways of volunteering, getting memoranda of understanding, filling out annual reports, and reporting under



Extension rules and structure and they become the Browns in our MG Compost. Just like the fall leaves we add to our compost pile, all of those valuable programs exist, but not in their prior form. They are not abandoned or to be mourned: they are necessary to our recipe. Our membership still studies, learns, and reaches out by volunteering to educate the public or grow food to share with the needy. You, our members, are the Greens in our MG compost. When we combine all the many changes in Extension's rules, requirements and relationship with SEWMG, and we mix it with our enthusiastic volunteers, something remarkable happens. Given a little time, a lot of hard work turning our pile (managing our changes), some moisture from the sweat and tears that result from our hard work, and what we ultimately get is a highly coveted, extremely valuable new resource, our Master Gardener Compost!

The reason I share this allegory my fellow MGVs is that I want to encourage you to move forward with the hard work needed to build our Compost and make our Association lush and bountiful. I give a nod to the old ways, because they got us here. And I give a salute to you, our members, because you're the catalyst that will get us to where we want and need to be in the future. With your help, our MG Compost will help us Cultivate Communities well into the future!

Thank you for all you do! Please consider adding your "greens" to our committees in need of additional volunteers or leadership, volunteering for a shift or two at the Wisconsin State Fair and enjoy your summer. Keep turning!



Working Together to Manage Invasive Plants

Spring is a favorite time in the garden. Everyday something new sprouts through the ground, blooms appear, and leaves begin filling empty branches. As you enjoy spring and summer unfolding, keep a lookout for unwelcome plants in gardens, waterways, and natural areas. The more people watching for and helping to manage invasive plants the better chance we have for controlling these invasive plants.

As active gardeners and influencers in the gardening world, we need your help not only monitoring and controlling invasive species but also informing others about this problem. The Wisconsin Invasive Species Calendar from the University of Wisconsin-Madison First Detector Network is a helpful tool alerting us to the appearance of various unwanted plants. Just click on the calendar to enlarge. This timely reminder can help us watch for, manage, and report invasive plants earlier in the season. Knowing when these plants emerge also narrows down the list of plants, helping with identification. Use this calendar, the links to Invasive Plant factsheets and videos on the right-hand column of the webpage and the invasive plant profiles on the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR) website for more information on identification and control of aquatic and terrestrial invasive plants.

As you hike, bike, or visit parks, green spaces, and natural areas this year, report invasive plant infestations to the Wisconsin DNR. If you think you have found a prohibited species, even on your own property, it's especially important to report it to help DNR understand the overall spread of the plants and they can sometimes help with managing it. Visit their web page for tips on documenting what you have found, reporting invasives, and the links to other resources. Provide photos and specific locations using GPS points, street addresses or road crossings.

Expand your efforts and be a part of the Citizen Science based Wisconsin First Detector program. You'll find helpful information in the Wisconsin First Detector and Dane County Parks Handbook on Monitoring Invasive Plants in Wisconsin.

Here are a few of the top aquatic invasive plants to watch for and remove on your property. Please watch for and report infestations of these and other invasive species in your landscape and other spaces.

Lesser Celandine

This plant's bright yellow flowers in April and May are often mistaken for our native marsh marigold. The plant spreads rapidly, crowding out nearby native plants but the leaves die back mid-season, resulting in soil erosion.

Yellow Iris

A beautiful, but invasive plant that easily spreads by seeds floating in water, rhizomes, and floating mats, infesting areas beyond the garden where they were planted. Watch for yellow flowers in May and June and strappy leaves throughout the growing season.

Yellow Floating Heart

This plant has yellow waterlily-like flowers held above heart-shaped leaves in May through October. This water plant forms dense patches that exclude native species and creates stagnant areas with low oxygen levels.

Water Hyacinth

Water hyacinth forms a dense mat of leaves over the water surface, making boating, fishing, and other water activities difficult. Its presence also degrades water quality. Watch for circular leaves to begin appearing in May and lavender blue flowers from June to September.

Purple Loosestrife

This plant seemed to have a banner year in 2021. It invades wetlands, disrupting the habitat and crowding out native plants that birds, insects, and waterfowl depend upon for food and shelter. Many homeowners spraying for mosquitoes may be inadvertently killing the beetles that are being used to manage this plant. Watch for the spikes of purplish pink flowers that open from the bottom up in July through September.

Japanese Knotweed

Look for the bamboo-like stems and plumes of creamy flowers that appear in September. It quickly spreads, creating an impenetrable thicket in gardens, natural spaces, and shorelines.

Water Lettuce

As its name implies, this plant resembles lettuce. The leaves appear from June through October and can form a dense covering, degrading water quality and reducing habitat diversity.

These plants and other aquatic invasive plants are covered in the Top Invasive Plants to Avoid video. If you have not visited the Wisconsin Horticulture Extension Website recently, I encourage you to check it out. This site lists upcoming continuing education opportunities with most of them being free. Click on the "Menu" for "Learning Opportunities." Most are on-line webinars and allow you to watch the recording if you are not able to view it live. Checkout the archived webinar videos. All count for CE. Go to: https://hort.extension.wisc.edu/mini-webinars-for-gardeners/ This is a great place to pick up a few CE hours. I think on-line (virtual) educational opportunities are here to stay!

Master Gardener On-line Reporting System (ORS) Tips

I am still getting questions about the on-line reporting systems (ORS) and how to input organizations and report hours.

Just a few reminders ...

- Before inputting a new organization in the ORS, check to see if the organization is already listed.
- You no longer report Projects. Organizations are listed instead.
- When inputting something new, list the "Who" the organization you are volunteering for,
- Contact person listed for the organization must be someone employed by or on the board of the organization
- There are distinct categories to input hours Gardening, Educating Others, Administration, and Citizen Science. Be sure to choose the right area to report hours. Each are explained in the MG Onboarding course.



- Be sure to record the MG Onboarding course into the ORS to claim your CE earned for taking this course. It does not automatically get recorded. If you are a brand-new MG and took the full MG Onboarding course, you earned 10 hours of CE after completing it. If you are a "seasoned" MG and took the MG Onboarding Lite 2022 version, you earned 5 hours of CE after completing it.
- As a back-up, record all volunteer hours and CE hours in a notebook or some place other than the ORS and make a note when you input it in the ORS. You will then have it in recorded in two places ORS and someplace else for your reference. At the time of writing this column I do not have access to the ORS so I cannot check anything for you.

MG FAQ

The MG FAQ should be your "go to" place for questions about the 2022 changes for the MG Program. It can be found on the state MG website at:

Using the Online System (ORS)

Some seasoned Master Gardeners remember the old system of reporting volunteer and continuing education hours: it was all done on paper and mailed to the Extension Office or dropped off. Then all the information was entered into a database. All in all, it wasn't an eco-friendly system. A few years ago, we began using our computers to provide the same volunteer and continuing education hours. That was a vast improvement for MGV s who were computer savvy. There was a learning curve.

Now we're facing another learning curve with the ORS system. ORS is a much larger database and certainly expedites information gathering. So let's look at it from that perspective.

Somewhat confusing is that ORS requires one username and a password, and Canvas requires another username (NetID) and password.

The university issues the username and NetID. MGVs need to remember the two usernames and passwords. In both cases the help desk (DoIt) can remind you of the usernames in case you forgot. You can phone them or complete an online form. But to access your passwords, you need to speak to a staff person directly.

Because of the new model the Extension adopted this year, more information needs to be entered into ORS. This in itself is a new learning curve.

Volunteer for the State Fair

As in the past SEWMG will staff our garden in Exploratory Park, just northwest of the Exposition Center and we are looking for volunteers to answer questions from the public who visit our area throughout the day. We ask for one shift captain and four volunteers in each time slot. There will be mandatory training/orientation session for Shift Captains, but all MGs volunteering at the event are welcome to attend. The orientation sessions will be Tuesday, August 2 at 6:30 p.m. and Wednesday, August 3 at 10:00 a.m., which are the days just prior to the start of the Fair. Parking will be limited with all the vendors setting up, so plan to arrive early to allow time to walk to the site. Even if you have been a Shift Captain in prior years or at prior events, attendance is mandatory due to the many changes the MG program and our site have undergone in the past year.

Both the orientation session and your shift hours count as volunteer hours in the ORS. Shift Captain responsibilities can be reviewed at (https://bit.ly/ShiftCaptain).

Priority shift registrations for SEWMG members who have paid 2022 dues will run from June 3 – June 17. Registration for other MGs not currently a member of SEWMG, or late-deciding SEWMG members will begin June 18 and run until all shifts are filled. We also need volunteers to be on stand-by for last minute shift cancellations due to unforeseen circumstances. If there are additional days that you can be on standby, please let us know when you register. You must have completed the Onboarding Lite course prior to attending orientation or volunteering at a shift.

Your volunteer hours should be loaded on the ORS under Southeast Wisconsin Master Gardeners (SEWMG), and in the comments say Wisconsin State Fair and estimate the number of contacts you engaged with during your shift.

Shifts are scheduled as follows, Tuesday August 4 – Sunday, August 14:

Morning: 9:00 a.m.- 1:00 p.m. Mid-Day: 12:30 p.m.- 4:30 p.m. Evening: 4:00 p.m. - 8:00 p.m.

Scheduling requests will be processed in the order they are received. Initially, we will offer a maximum of two shifts per individual until all requests are reviewed and scheduled. If any shifts remain, we will allow three or more shifts per person. Please list the shifts you are able to work, in order of preference.

As in past years, volunteers will receive an admission ticket to the Wisconsin State Fair so you can enjoy the Fair before or after your shift as a bonus perk. Parking is your responsibility. We encourage carpooling, drop-offs, or taking the bus (which drops off in the parking lot just outside our area).
