

### **Memorial Day and the Bible**

Of course, the Bible doesn't have any scripture to talk about Memorial Day - it was written before Memorial Day came about. Memorial Day began on May 30<sup>th</sup>, 1868, and was originally called Decoration Day. The Bible does, however, contain verses regarding days of remembrance that are ordained by God throughout Scripture.

### Here are just a few:

- ~Psalm 82:3-4 ESV Give justice to the weak and the fatherless; maintain the right of the afflicted and the destitute. Rescue the weak and the needy; deliver them from the hand of the wicked."
- ~ Colossians 2:8 ESV See to it that no one takes you captive by philosophy and empty deceit, according to human tradition, according to the elemental spirits of the world, and not according to Christ.
- ~Exodus 13:3 ESV Then Moses said to the people, "Remember this day in which you came out from Egypt, out of the house of slavery, for by a strong hand the LORD brought you out from this place. No leavened bread shall be eaten.
- ~John 3:16 ESV "For God so loved the world, that he gave his only Son, that whoever believes in him should not perish but have eternal life. ~John 10:18 ESV - No one takes it from me, but I lay it down of my own accord. I have authority to lay it down, and I have authority to take it up again. This charge I have received from my Father."

# 50 Days of

# Easter

Hopefully spring will truly be here soon, and the weather will moderate and warm, the farmers will be able to get out in the fields, and gardens, too, will be planted. The end of school is in sight, and summer plans are being made for camps, vacations, sporting events, and other usual summer activities.

But in the church, the "summer" season doesn't start quite yet! We are still in the Easter season, the 50 days after Jesus' resurrection. During those 50 days, Jesus was on earth, interacting with the disciples, continuing to teach and reassure them. Our gospel readings are again coming from the gospel of John, passages taken from Maundy Thursday, where Jesus is teaching the disciples after Judas has left the upper room to prepare to betray Jesus, and from the prayer Jesus prays for his disciples (and those who will come after them). Ascension comes on Thursday, May 18, 50 days after Easter. We don't often celebrate ascension, since it always comes on a Thursday, but that recognizes the day that Jesus left this world, rising up to heaven, after promising that he will return one day. Since then, Christians have been waiting for Christ's return. Lots of predictions of when that will be have been proposed throughout the years, but none have been correct. Lots of books have been written and movies filmed about what that day will be like, and what will lead up to it, but they, too, are just guessing at what things will be like. Again, nobody knows!

On May 28, we will celebrate Pentecost, the day when the Holy Spirit came upon the disciples and really jump-started their ministry. Acts says that tongues like flame came onto the heads of the disciples, and people heard the disciples speaking in their own native languages, which the Galilean disciples wouldn't have known. Jerusalem is thrown into an uproar, and the spreading of the gospel to the ends of the earth starts with a bang. Then on June 4th we celebrate Holy Trinity, when we celebrate the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit in all their uniqueness of attributes, while also celebrating that they are one God.

THEN, on June 11th, we can start the "summer" season, the "green" season (because the paraments are green) of the church year, which runs through November (with a few odd Sundays in there, for Reformation and All Saints Day). This long season of "ordinary time" is when we get Jesus' teachings. We are still in the year of Matthew, and we will hear many of Jesus' parables, as well as other stories.

Blessings as we continue through the Easter season, remembering that Christ is Risen – Christ is Risen Indeed, Alleluia!

### Remember

Memorial Day, as Americans have come to know it, began in the years immediately following the Civil War. But until World War II, most people knew it as "Decoration Day." It was a day to decorate with flowers and flags the graves of fallen soldiers and remember those who had given, as Lincoln beautifully said, "the last full measure of devotion" to defend their nation. It was a day to remember what the honored dead had died to defend.

A century and a half has passed since Lee surrendered to Grant at Appomattox, effectively ending a national nightmare that filled over 625,000 American graves with dead soldiers. Since then, other international nightmares have ravaged the world and put more than 650,000 additional Americans into war graves in Europe, North Africa, the Pacific Rim, Asia, and the Middle East.

### **Remembering Is for the Future**

Memorial Day is an important national moment. It is a day to do more than barbeque. It is right and wise to remember the great price some have paid to preserve the historically unprecedented civil and religious freedoms we Americans have the luxury to take largely for granted.

But the importance of Memorial Day is more for our future than it is for our past. It is crucial that we remember the nightmares and why they happened. We forget them at our own peril. The future of the United States depends in large amount on how well we collectively remember and cherish what liberty really is and the terror of tyranny. There is a high cost to forgetting. In the words of George Santayana's famous aphorism, "Those who cannot remember the past are condemned to repeat it."

#### A MEMORIAL PEOPLE

Christians, of all people, understand the crucial importance of remembering. Christians are "memorial people" because the whole of our faith depends upon remembering. Those who persevere into the glorious future are those who remember the gracious past.

That's why God has surrounded us with memorials. The entire Bible itself is a memorial. We meditate on it daily to remember. The Sabbath was a memorial to Israel's freedom from Egyptian slavery (<u>Deuteronomy 5:15</u>), and the church switched it to Sundays as a memorial to Christ's resurrection and our freedom from sin. Israel's great gathering feast days were memorials (<u>Exodus 13:3</u>). And now each time a local church gathers, each Lord's Supper celebration (<u>1 Corinthians 11:24–26</u>), each baptism, each Christmas celebration, and each Easter celebration is a memorial.

Remembering God's past grace is necessary to fuel our faith in God's future grace for us. † This makes the memory one of God's most profound, mysterious, and merciful gifts granted to us. God designed it to be a means of preserving (persevering) grace for his people. We neglect it at our own peril.

The future of the church, globally and locally, and of each Christian depends largely on how well we remember the gospel of Jesus, all his precious and very great promises, and the successes and failures of church history. Scripture warns us that if we fail to remember, we will be condemned to submit again to sin's and hell's enslavement (Hebrews 6:4–8). Such warnings are graces to help us remember.

So, as we commemorate Memorial Day as Americans, let us do it with profound gratitude for the extraordinary common grace given to us when men and women laid their lives down for the sake of America's survival. And let us remember the past evils that we may not repeat them in the future.

And as Christians, let us m	ake every day, as long as	it is called today,	a memorial o	day ( <i>Hebrews 3:13</i> )	. Let us	"take care
lest [we] forget the Lord"	(Deuteronomy 6:12).			•		

Let us "remember Jesus Christ" (2 Timothy 2:8).

### <u>First Lutheran Church Council Meeting Minutes</u> March 8, 2023

<u>Members Present:</u> Craig Thies, Pastor Ann, Kristy Henriksen, Thad Reinert, Cristy Appel, Ingrid Wielenberg, Mike Straw, Nicole Weber and Marah Lytle.

**Call to Order:** President, Craig Thies, called the meeting to order at 8:00 pm.

**Devotions:** Devotion was led by Cristy A. Next month Ingrid W. will lead devotion.

<u>Treasurer's Report:</u> Craig Thies discussed the bills payable explaining that we got the hood in the kitchen cleaned. Thad R is working on a better process with Lori to get the bills paid. The Kinner bill was explained. Net income dipped \$20,000 in February compared to January. Council discussed that this dip is most likely due to the bad weather in February and that January was high due to end/beginning of the year donations. Attendance is increasing. Parsonage expenses are paid. Ingrid made a motion to accept the treasure's report. Mike Straw 2<sup>nd</sup> the motion and it was approved.

<u>Secretary's Report:</u> The minutes from the February meeting were reviewed. Cristy A. made a motion to accept the Secretary's Report as written. Kristy H. 2<sup>nd</sup> the motion and it was approved.

### Pastor's Report:

- Pastor Ann handed out her report for February and this was reviewed. Pastor will be doing Continuing Ed for
  Festival of Homiletics, May 15-18, in Minneapolis. May 14 will be a travel day, will need pulpit supply, a
  communion Sunday. Pastor is taking vacation May 19-28, will need pulpit supply on May 21 and 28; neither are
  communion Sundays.
- Pastor Ann explained that Food for the Poor inquired about sending an ELCA pastor to speak to us about their
  organization. Cristy A. made a motion to reject the request from the Food for the Poor organization. Ingrid W.
  2<sup>nd</sup> the motion and it passed.
- Pastor Ann discussed the Sioux Falls Canaries are having Faith and Family Day on Wednesday, June 14<sup>th</sup>. Ingrid
   W. volunteered to get a group together to go. Sign up deadline May 31.
- Pastor Ann discussed that the Gideons approached her about doing a presentation on a Sunday. Council members agreed that they normally do this every year.
- The Council reviewed Pastor Ann's upcoming date list, from her February report.

### **President's Report:**

- Fair Stand Committee Have approval to build, next step is putting prices together for materials and labor.
- Sound system update The IT company was here and did an update, still not fixed, working progress.

#### Vice-President's Report: none

### **Committee Reports – Round Table:**

- <u>Congregational Life</u> Ingrid W. Family Day every 3<sup>rd</sup> Sunday, treats after church. Cynthia Portz and Linda Hollingsworth joined the committee.
- Worship Cristy A. working on getting Easter supplies.
- <u>Mission & Outreach</u> Kristy H. Noisy offering is going to the Food shelf. It is matched in the month of March.
- <u>Property Management</u> Mike S. Griebel came to look at the bell tower last week. He will need to take some measurements before knowing the expense. He is planning to do that once the snow melts. Griebel also looked at the leak in Pastors office. They are still looking at options to help with the icy North Church steps and choir entrance steps.
- Adult Ed none
- Youth Nicole Weber brainstorming ideas to involve youth, congregational, and high schoolers. Ex: Canaries game, Great Bear, bean bag chairs / hangout spot downstairs Craig T. will get guidelines to Nicole from insurance company for chaperones.
- <u>Sunday School</u> none

### **Old Business:**

- Committee Openings Positions filling, but still needing adult ed chair and vice president.
- Progress rate increase for 2023- Rates went from \$23 to \$25.
- Church Directory- Cristy A. made a motion to renew the online service for 3 years. Ingrid 2<sup>nd</sup> the motion and it was passed.
- ABC (Automatic Building Controls, Inc) alarms were checked on 2/26/2023. Next year's charge will be \$463.00.
- Paul Lorang at the Star reached out about having an ad placed in the Pipestone Community, Visitor's & New Resident guide. Cost is \$85. The Council discussed a design change. Cristy A. made a motion to place the ad. Kristy H. 2<sup>nd</sup> the motion and it was passed.
- Kinner Bill Breakdown: Quoted fees \$265/month for accounting and \$125/qtr for payroll tax returns. December billing was a little higher for the following:
  - Caught up on accounting bill October -December: \$795
  - 1099 forms needed (once a year): \$109
  - Quarter payroll tax returns: \$125
  - W-2 forms (once a year): \$88 (based on # of employees)
- Church's Giving and Obligations:
  - o First Fruits: Ingrid W. made a motion that payments be made quarterly to PAS programs (Ex: school lunches, tokens, and backpack program), payments be made quarterly to Shetek Camp to help run the camp, a one-time payment of \$300 be made to ministerial, and a one-time payment be made to the Food shelf of \$300 in March because it is matched. Cristy A. 2<sup>nd</sup> this motion and it was passed. First Fruits is 1.5% of the offering.
  - o Synod: Pastor Ann suggested to make these monthly and the Council agreed.
  - Shetek Conference: Council agreed to pay this in June. It is based on membership, \$0.25/baptized member.
  - Shetek Camp (building fund): Council agreed to make quarterly payments of \$550 for the next 2 years.

#### **New Business:**

Family Day – every 3<sup>rd</sup> Sunday: this was tabled until next month's meeting.

<u>Adjournment:</u> Cristy A. made a motion to adjourn the meeting and Craig T. 2<sup>nd</sup> the motion. The meeting was adjourned at 9:45pm.







- + **Find a hobby** that you love. Networking for business is important, but networking for life is essential. Take a rock-climbing class, learn to play golf, get your black belt, join a bike riding club, create pottery, or find a book club. Do something besides work, because someday you may have a family and real responsibilities, and your "passion" may be the only thing that keeps your sanity. Trust me.
- + **Go to the dentist**. Root canals ARE THE PITS! Take care of your teeth, and they will take care of you.
- + **Always say yes** when someone asks you to go for a cup of coffee or a meal. Building relationships can help your career, but it also helps you live a happier life. Connection is the key to fulfillment.
- + **Don't ever be afraid to start at the bottom and do the grunt work**. No matter what age you are. You learn the most by doing and you never know when you can pick up a valuable new skill. There is no job too menial and if/when you are the boss, your employees will appreciate you so much more if they know you are willing to get your hands dirty.
- + **Live frugally.** You will feel like you are making a ton of money, but that will not stop Visa from knocking on your door. Stuff will never fill a void caused by insecurity.
- + **Trust your gut.** Believe in that spidey-sense when something feels off and listen to your instincts when it comes to taking risks and chasing your dreams. You don't need anyone's permission to kick ass in this world.
- + **Travel. Go. Anywhere.** Vacation abroad, take a drive, go to a museum. Volunteer for the overseas assignment if it makes sense. Take the day trip to a different city. Explore every nook and cranny of where you live. Experience life and don't be scared of new places. It will change who you are as a person for the better. Because one day, you will be so busy that a three-day trip to your parents will seem like a small military maneuver.
- + **Find a mentor.** I don't care what your degree is in; you have no idea what you are doing. Find someone you admire and ask them to be available for your questions. Take them to lunch or coffee. Appreciate their knowledge even if you don't always agree with it. Then when you get some experience under your belt, do it for someone else.
- + **Be uncomfortable.** Sign up for new things that make you feel weird. Challenge yourself and your thinking. Read books from people you disagree with and volunteer for a cause you know nothing about. Step out of your comfort zone whenever you can. - + **Don't think you will be happy "one day" if only** you scored the perfect job, found the perfect partner, buy the perfect car. Happiness exists down almost any life path as long as you are grateful for the present and develop meaningful relationships.
- + Also, you **don't have to do something extraordinary to succeed or have a meaningful life.** Focus on doing something good for one person every day, and you will leave behind a powerful legacy.
- + If you feel like you are the smartest person in the room, you're in the wrong place. You will never grow if you aren't with people who can challenge you to think differently, expand your view, and show you how to approach problems from a different perspective.
- + Whenever possible, call your mom and dad. Often. They invested a lot in your upbringing, and you owe it to them. Ask their advice, even when you don't need it. But don't ask for money. Even though they'll give it to you anyway.
