

# KING, JOSEPH

KING, JOSEPH. Adm. pens. at QUEENS', Apr. 26, 1837. Of Buckinghamshire. Matric. Michs. 1837; B.A. 1841; M.A. 1844. Ord. deacon, 1841; priest, 1842. P.C. of Farnham, Suffolk, 1845-69. R. of St. Wenham, 1869-76. R. of St. Martin-by-Loose, Cornwall, 1876-89. Married and had issue. Died Oct. 24, 1889, aged 72. (Hosse, *Coll. Cornub.*, 455; *Crookford*; *The Guardian*, Oct. 30, 1889.)

KING, JOSEPH WILLIAM. Adm. at King's, Jan. 27, 1877. Matric. Lent, 1877. Left Midsummer, 1877. Clerk in the Public Record Office; retired from ill-health. Died 1901, in Giqueland West, S. Africa. (King's *Coll. Reg.* (parentage not given).)

KING, JOSHUA. Adm. sizar (age 18) at TRINITY, Sept. 26, 1814. [Elder] s. of David [of Lowick, Lancs.]. [B. Jan. 16, 1798], at Lowick Bridge. School, Hawkshead, Lancs. Matric. Michs. 1815. Migrated to Queens', Feb. 10, 1816; B.A. 1819. (Senior Wrangler and 1st Smith's prize) 1819; M.A. 1822; LL.D. (per *LM. Reg.*) 1838. Fellow of Queens', 1820-32; Tutor; President, 1832-37. Vice-Chancellor, 1833-4. Adm. at Lincoln's Inn, June 24, 1828. Lucasian Professor of Mathematics, 1839-49. President of the Cambridge Philosophical Society, 1833. Personally argued, in an appeal to the Crown (as Visitor), that the President of Queens' had no voice in the election of the Fellows, but Lord Lyndhurst gave judgement against him, Jan. 22, 1828. Married, 1833, Mary, dau. of the Rev. J. Brocklebank, of White Beck, Cumberland. Died Sept. 1, 1857, at Queens' Lodge. Father of the next and of John (1856). (Boase II, 226; *Inns of Court*; *G. KING, JOSHUA. Adm. pens. (age 18) at TRINITY HALL, Feb. 10, 1855. [Elder] s. of Joshua (above). [B. July 27, 1836. School, Repton.] Matric. Michs. 1855; Scholar, 1856; B.A. 1860; M.A. 1864. Appointed to I.C.S., 1859; served in Bombay as Assistant Collector and Magistrate and Under-Secretary to Government; Settlement Officer, 1874-6 and 1876-7; on special duty, Baroda, 1877-9; Junior Collector and Magistrate, Ahmadnagar, 1879; Senior Collector and Magistrate and Political Agent at Satara, 1884; retired, 1886. Resided at Bath, where he died Apr. 29, 1927, aged 90. Brother of John (1856). (*Repton Sch. Reg.*; *I.C.S. Lists*; *The Times*, Apr. 30, 1927.)

KING, KNOWLES. Adm. pens. at CAIUS, June 28, 1851. [Elder] s. of Knowles, solicitor, of Maidstone. B. there, July 13, 1834. School, Tunbridge. Matric. Michs. 1851. Resided three terms. M.R.C.S. Went to New Zealand, 1858. Married, 1858, Margaret, dau. of H. T. Fazakerly. Drowned at Poverty Bay, New Zealand, March, 1861. M.I. at Waterbury Church, Kent. (Penn, II, 304, and note, from family pedigree published, see Catalogue of British Museum; *G. Mag.*, 1861, II, 333.)

KING, LEONARD AUGUSTUS LUCAS. Adm. sizar at St. John's, Sept. 21, 1865. S. of Samuel, Minister in the Norwegian Church (Unitas Fratrum), of Bradford [and Eliza Louisa Busby]. B. Jan. 4, 1879, at Bath. School, Bradford Grammar (Rev. W. H. Keeling). Matric. Michs. 1898; B.A. (Nat. Sci. Trip., Pt. I, 1st Class) 1901; M.A. 1906. Served in the Great War, 1914-19 (Lieut., R.F.A. (I.F.)). Of 14, Bank Street, Glasgow, in 1945. (*Univ. War List*; *C.U. Parl. Reg.*)

KING, LEONARD WILLIAM. Adm. at King's, Jan. 19, 1889. [5th s. of Robert. B. Dec. 8, 1869, in London. School, Rugby.] Matric. Lent, 1889; Scholar; B.A. (Theol. Trip., Pt. I, 1st Class) 1891; M.A. 1895; Litt.D. 1914. A distinguished Assyriologist; re-opened the diggings on the site of Nineveh (Nimveh), working there for more than a year, 1903-4, until ill-health obliged him to return home. Made an expedition into Persia to re-copy the great Inscription of Darius on the rock-face at Behistun. F.S.A.; F.R.G.S. 1905. Lecturer in Assyrian, King's College, London, 1910-15. Professor of Assyrian and Babylonian Archaeology there 1915-19. Assistant Keeper in the department of Egyptian and Assyrian Antiquities at the British Museum, 1913-19. Author, works on Assyriology and Archaeology. Died Aug. 20, 1919. (King's *Coll. Reg.*; *Who was Who*, 1916-28.)

KING, LEWIS HENRY. Adm. pens. (age 18) at TRINITY, June 24, 1807. S. of Joseph, of [Broad Street, London, and] Taplow, Bucks. [and Mary, dau. of David Giles, of Younesbury, Herts.]. [B. July 23, 1787.] School, Eton. Matric. Easter, 1806; B.A. 1810. Ord. deacon, 1813; C. of Minister-in-Thanel, Kent, 1812-. Died before 1817. (*Can. Act Bk.*; *Eton Sch. Lists*; *Eton Coll. Reg.*)

KING, MARMADUKE JAMES GILBERT. Adm. (age 20) at PEMBROKE, Oct. 1, 1889. Elder s. of James, Esq., of Monkstown, Co. Dublin. B. at Dungannon, Co. Tyrone. [School,

Monkton Combe.] Matric. Michs. 1890; B.A. 1893; M.A. 1897. Ord. deacon (Durham) 1894; priest, 1895; C. of Stock on-on-Tees, Durham, 1894. C.-in-charge of St. Gabriel's, Bishop Wearmouth, 1901-5; P.C. there 1905-10. V. of St. Ann with St. Jude, Nottingham, 1910-25. R. of Arley, Warw., 1925-47-. Hon. Canon of Coventry, 1929-47-. Edited *Coventry Dioc. Calendar*, 1929-47-. (*The Old Monktonian*; *Crookford*.)

KING, NEVILLE. Adm. pens. (age 19) at TRINITY, June 17, 1772. [Elder] s. of John (Capt., 5th Guards, and Millicent Mary, dau. of John Fox, of Rowston, Lincs.), of Ashby [de-la-Launde], Lincs. School, Westminster. Scholar, 1773; matric. Michs. 1775; B.A. 1776. Adm. at Lincoln's Inn, May 27, 1772. High Sheriff of Lincs., 1816. Col., 3rd Lincoln Militia. Owner of a racing stud, which included several well-known horses. Married, May 22, 1786, Sarah, dau. of Thomas Gildart, of Finchley, London, and Norton Hall, Staffs. Died at his lodgings in Hull, aged 60. Buried June 25, 1833. Father of Clifford (1803). (*Record of Old Westminsters*; *Inns of Court*; *G. Mag.*, 1833, I, 574-.)

KING, NORMAN. Adm. pens. at SIDNEY, Oct. 1, 1900. S. of the Rev. Norman (Queen's College, Birmingham, 1888), R. of Monksilver, Somerset. B. Dec. 6, 1880, at Bournemouth. School, Worcester Cathedral School (Mr H. Chappell). Matric. Michs. 1900; Scholar; B.A. 1903. Entered the Consular Service, 1907; Vice-Consul, German East Africa, 1912. Served in the Great War, 1914-19 (Major, E. African Force). Consul-General at Mexico City, 1920-6; at Barcelona, 1926-38; at Marseilles, 1938-40; retired, 1940. C.M.G., 1926; K.C.M.G., 1937. Of East Grinstead, Sussex, in 1944. (Burke, P. and B.; *Univ. War List*; *Who's Who*; Kelly, *Handbook*.)

KING, PETER. Adm. Fell.-Com. (age 17) at TRINITY, Dec. 2, 1754. S. of the Hon. Thomas, of London [and Wilhelmina Catherine, dau. of John Troye, one of the Sovereign Council of Brabant]. [B. Oct. 6, 1736, at The Hague.] School, Eton. Matric. Easter, 1756. Married, Nov. 24, 1774, Charlotte, dau. of Edward Tredcroft, of Horsham. Of Ockham, Surrey; also possessed another estate at Long Ditton. An active magistrate and 'a scourge of the poachers.' Lived mostly in the country, where he paid great attention to the care of his estates and the workpeople in his mills. Succeeded as 6th Baron King of Ockham, 1779. Died of gout, Nov. 20, 1793. Brother of Thomas (1758); father of the next and of William (1797). (Burke, P. and B. (sub Lovelace); *G.E.C.* (both of which give 'died Nov. 23'); *Eton Coll. Reg.*; *D.N.B.*; *G. Mag.*, 1793, II, 1061.)

KING, The Hon. PETER. Adm. nobleman (age 17) at TRINITY, Oct. 29, 1793. [Elder] s. of Peter, Baron King of Ockham (above), of Denbighs, Surrey. [B. Aug. 31, 1776, at Dorking, Surrey.] School, Eton. Succeeded his father as 7th Baron Ockham, Nov. 20, 1793. Married, May 26, 1804, Lady Hester, dau. of Hugh, 1st Earl Fortescue. A student of currency questions. Author, *Life of John Locke* and pamphlets on money. A strong opponent of the corn laws, which he denounced as 'jobs or jobs.' Died suddenly June 4, 1833. Father of the next and of William (1833); brother of William (1797). (*Eton Coll. Reg.*; Burke, P. and B. (sub Lovelace); *G.E.C.*; *D.N.B.*)

KING, The Hon. PETER JOHN LOCKE. Adm. pens. (age 19) at TRINITY, Apr. 12, 1830. [2nd] s. of Peter, Baron King of Ockham (above). B. [Jan. 25, 1811], at Ockham, Surrey. School, Harrow. Matric. Michs. 1830; M.A. 1833. M.P. for East Surrey, 1847-74. Promoted the passing of the Real Estate charges Act, 1854; also of the Act (known as Locke King's Act) to abolish property qualifications of M.P.s, 1858. Advocated ballot and abolition of Church rates; defeated and caused resignation of the Russell Ministry on a motion to reduce franchise in Counties to 10. Married, Mar. 22, 1836, Louisa Elizabeth, dau. of William Henry Hoare, of Mitcham Grove, Surrey, and had issue. J.P. and D.L. for Surrey; High Sheriff, 1840. Author, *Injustice of Law of Succession to the Real Property of Intestates*, 1854 (three editions); and other works on legal reform. Died Nov. 12, 1885, at Brooklands, Weybridge. Brother of William (1823). (*Harrow Sch. Reg.*; Burke, P. and B. (sub Lovelace); Boase, II, 227; *D.N.B.*)

KING, PRESTON. Adm. at CAVENDISH H. Jan. 1881. [5th s. of W. Norman, of Gt Barton Place, Bury St Edmunds. School, Bury St Edmunds Grammar.] Matric. Lent, 1881; B.A. 1884; M.B. and B.C. 1888; M.D. 1892. At St Thomas's Hospital. M.R.C.S. and L.S.A., 1887. Resident Medical Officer, Royal Mineral Water Hospital, Bath. Practised at Bath. Author, articles on the waters of Bath. Of 19, Circus, Bath, where he died Jan. 29, 1943, aged 80. Brother of George L. (1879) and Alfred E. (1876). (*Bury Gr. Sch. Reg.*, which gives '4th s. of W.N.'; *Medical Directories*; *The Times*, Feb. 1, 1943.)

KING, RICHARD (1823), see SAMPSON, R. K.

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KING, JOHN. b. Stirling 1789; ed. Stirling gram. sch.; manager of Hurlet and Campsie alum co.'s works at Campsie; manager of G. Macintosh and co.'s Cudbear dye works at Dunchattan 1825, a partner 1825, became sole owner 1848, closed the works 1851; partner in Hurlet and Campsie alum co. 1851 to death. d. Levernholme, parish of Eastwood 31 Oct. 1875. *Memoirs of One hundred Glasgow men*, ii 169-70 (1886), portrait.

NOTE.—The staple articles in the dye works were cudbear and archil, extracted from seaweed imported from Sweden and Peru, used in colouring woollens and silks crimson and purple, the new modern brilliant dyes ruined this business.

KING, JOHN CROOKSHANKS. b. Kilwinning, Ayrshire 11 Oct. 1806; went to U.S. America 1829, a superintendent of factories; in Cincinnati and Louisville several years; made a clay model of his wife's head 1834; resided in New Orleans modelling busts and making cameo likenesses 1837-40; removed to Boston, Massachusetts; made busts of D. Webster, J. Q. Adams, Louis Agassiz and R. W. Emerson. d. Boston 21 April 1882.

KING, JOHN DUNCAN. b. 1789; ensign 71 foot 28 Aug. 1806; lieutenant 7 foot 13 June 1811, placed on h.p. 20 April 1820; lieutenant 75 foot 14 May 1829, placed on h.p. 28 Dec. 1830; served in the Walcheren expedition and in Peninsular war; military knight of Windsor 1850 to death; landscape painter, exhibited 18 pictures at R.A., 39 at B.I. and 2 at Suffolk st. 1824-58. d. Windsor Castle 21 Aug. 1863.

KING, JOHN HYNDE. Ensign 49 foot 6 Sep. 1844, major 2 Oct. 1855; wounded in the assault on the Redan 16 June 1855; captain grenadier guards 19 Dec. 1856 and major 29 May 1867 to death; C.B. 2 June 1869. d. Aldershot camp 9 July 1870.

KING, JOHN LANGLEY. Lecturer at Royal Polytechnic Institution, Regent st. London many years; F.G.S. d. 6 Eastfield villas, Church hill, Walthamstow 26 Jan. 1891.

KING, JOHN MYERS (2 son of Edward King of Askham, Westmoreland). b. 1804; ed. at Balliol coll. Oxf., scholar 1821-7; B.A. 1824, M.A. 1827; V. of Cutcombe, Somerset 8 Dec. 1832 to death; author of *The Georgics of Virgil translated into English verse* 1843, another ed. 1871; *The Aeneid of Virgil translated into English verse* 1847, another ed. 1875; *The Eclogues and Georgics of Virgil translated into English verse* 1882. d. 1887.

KING, JOHN WILLIAM (son of colonel Neville King of Ashby hall, Sleaford, Leics.) b. 1792; ed. at C.C. coll. Oxf., scholar 1810-20, fellow 1820-33; B.A. 1814, M.A. 1818, B.D.

KING, J. W. (Con.)

1827; V. of Ashby-de-la-Launde, co. Lincoln 15 Jan. 1822 to death; R. of Bassingham, co. Lincoln 15 May 1832 to 1874; assumed name of Mr. Launde on the turf 1861; won the One thousand guineas, Oaks and St. Leger with Apology ridden by John Osborne 1874. d. Ashby hall 9 May 1875. *I.L.N.* lxxi 475 (1875), lxxii 119 (1875).

KING, JOSEPH. b. 1802; solicitor in London, Jan. 1836 to Nov. 1874; contributed to *The Critic*; author of *Flights of Phædo* 1859, a poem in reply to Tennyson's *Maud*; and *The Guildford farce*, a satirical poem 1860 both anonymous. d. 16 North Buildings, Finsbury circus, London 1 April 1875. *Law Times*, lxx 17 (1875).

KING, JOSHUA (son of David King of Lowick Bridge, Ulverstone, Lancs.) b. 16 Jan. 1798; ed. at Hawkshead gram. sch. and Trinity coll. Camb. 1815, sizar of Queen's coll. Feb. 1816; senior wrangler and B.A. 1819, M.A. 1822, LL.D. 1838; fellow of Queen's coll. Jan. 1820, tutor 1820, elected president by a dispensation from the crown, for his not being in holy orders 1832, remained till death; vice chancellor 1833; F.R.S.; Lucasian professor of mathematics in univ. of Camb. 1839, resigned 1849; personally argued in an appeal to the Crown as visitor, that the president of Queen's had no voice in the election of the fellows, but lord Lyndhurst gave judgment against him 22 Jan. 1828. d. President's lodge, Queen's college 1 Sep. 1857. *The case of the president of Queen's college, containing the two petitions of J. King against the election of H. Godfrey* (1821); *Cambridge Chronicle* 5 Sep. 1857 p. 4, 12 Sep. p. 4.

KING, KATE (dau. of T. C. King, actor). b. Camden-town, London 1852; appeared with her brother Harry King (who d. 17 May 1870 aged 19) as Irish duettists and dancers with Dr. Corri's diorama of Ireland; played at the Alhambra and other music halls in London; member of Arthur Lloyd's concert party in his "Two hours fun" entertainment to 1870; played in burlesque at Vaudeville theatre; m. 31 July 1871 Arthur Lloyd comic singer; acted at Queen's theatre, Dublin during her husband's lease 1874-6, toured with his Ballyvogan company playing her original part of Norah O'Sullivan in his drama *Ballyvogan*, autumn seasons of 1887-90, a part she played upwards of 500 times; last appeared in London at Oxford music hall 20 March 1891; last appeared on the stage at Moss's Varieties, Edinburgh 7 April 1891. d. 3 Priory villas, Byrne road, Balham, Surrey 2 May 1891. bur. Abney park cemetery 7 May.

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
