May Day is a May 1 celebration with a long and varied history, dating back millennia. Throughout the years, there have been many different events and festivities worldwide, most with the express purpose of welcoming in a change of season (spring in the Northern Hemisphere). In the 19th century, May Day took on a new meaning, as an International Workers' Day grew out of the 19th-century labor movement for worker's rights and an eight-hour workday in the United States. May Day 2022 will be celebrated on Sunday, May 1, 2022.



Origins of May Day: Beltane

The Celts of the British Isles believed May 1 to be the most important day of the year, when the festival of Beltane was held.

This May Day festival was thought to divide the year in half, between the light and the dark. Symbolic fire was one of the main rituals of the festival, helping to celebrate the return of life and fertility to the world.

When the Romans took over the British Isles, they brought with them their five-day celebration known as Floralia, devoted to the worship of the goddess of flowers, Flora. Taking place between April 20 and May 2, the rituals of this celebration were eventually combined with Beltane.

May Day Maypole Dance

Another popular tradition of May Day involves the maypole. While the exact origins of the maypole remain unknown, the annual traditions surrounding it can be traced back to medieval times, and some are still celebrated today.

Villagers would enter the woods to find a maypole that was set up for the day in small towns (or sometimes permanently in larger cities). The day's festivities involved merriment, as people would dance around the pole clad with colorful streamers and ribbons.

Historians believe the first maypole dance originated as part of a fertility ritual, where the pole symbolized male fertility and baskets and wreaths symbolized female fertility.

The maypole never really took root in America, where May Day celebrations were discouraged by the Puritans. But other forms of celebrations did find their way to the New World.

During the 19th and 20th centuries, May Basket Day was celebrated across the country, where baskets were created with flowers, candies and other treats and hung on the doors of friends, neighbors and loved ones on May 1.

What does May Day have to do with the international distress call, "Mayday, Mayday, Mayday"? Nothing, as it turns out. The code was invented in 1923 by an airport radio officer in London. Challenged to come up with a word that would be easily understood by pilots and ground staff in case of an emergency, Frederick Mockford coined the word "mayday" because it sounded like "m'aider," a shortened version of the French term for "come and help me."





Lemon Dessert

INGREDIENTS:

1 1/4 c flour
3/4 c butter
1/4 cup pecans + extra for top
8 oz cream cheese, softened
16oz Fresh Whip
1 cup powdered sugar
4 small boxes (3.4 oz) instant lemon pudding
5 cups of milk

INSTRUCTIONS:

FIRST LAYER

Preheat the oven to 350° F. Cut the butter into flour. Mix well and add the pecans. Pat to bottom of a 9×13 pan & baking about 20 min . Let cool totally.

SECOND LAYER

Whisk together softened cream cheese and powdered sugar. Fold in half of the Cool Whip (about 8 oz). Spread over crust.

THIRD LAYER

Combine lemon pudding and milk. Beat until thickened. Spreading on cream cheese layer.

FOURTH LAYER

Pour and swirl the remaining fresh whip on top. Sprinkle with pecans.

Refrigerate until ready to serve.

Memorial Day is an American holiday, observed on the last Monday of May, honoring the men and women who died while serving in the U.S. military. Memorial Day 2022 will occur on Monday, Мау 30.

Originally known as Decoration Day, it wide day of remembrance later that originated in the years following the Civil War and became an official federal nated for the purpose of strewing with holiday in 1971. Many Americans observe Memorial Day by visiting cemeteries or memorials, holding family gatherings and participating in parades. Unofficially, it marks the beginning of the summer season. Early Observances of Memorial Day The Civil War, which ended in the

spring of 1865, claimed more lives than any conflict in U.S. history and required the establishment of the country's first national cemeteries.

By the late 1860s, Americans in various towns and cities had begun holding springtime tributes to these countless fallen soldiers, decorating their graves with flowers and reciting prayers.

Did you know? Each year on Memorial Day a national moment of remembrance takes place at 3:00 p.m. local time.

It is unclear where exactly this tradition originated; numerous different communities may have independently initiated the memorial gatherings. And some records show that one of the earliest Memorial Day commemorations was organized by a group of formerly enslaved people in Charleston, South Carolina less than a month after the Confederacy surrendered in 1865.

Nevertheless, in 1966 the federal government declared Waterloo, New York, the official birthplace of Memorial Day.

Decoration Day On May 5, 1868, General John A. Logan, leader of an organization for Northern Civil War veterans, called for a nationmonth. "The 30th of May, 1868, is desigflowers, or otherwise decorating the graves of comrades who died in defense of their country during the late rebellion, and whose bodies now lie in almost every city, village and hamlet churchyard in the land," he proclaimed.

The date of Decoration Day, as he called it, was chosen because it wasn't the anniversary of any particular battle. On the first Decoration Day, General James Garfield made a speech at Arlington National Cemetery, and 5,000 participants decorated the graves of the 20,000 Civil War soldiers buried there. Many Northern states held similar commemorative events and reprised the tradition in subsequent years; by 1890 each one had made Decoration Day an official state holiday. Southern states, on the other hand, continued to honor the dead on separate days until after World War I.

From one Kitchen to Another

Ingredients

16 ounces broccoli, fresh
1/2 onion, finely chopped
2 cloves garlic minced
3/4 cup bread crumbs
2 eggs, lightly beaten
1/2 cup Cheddar cheese, shredded
1/3 cup Parmesan cheese, grated
1-1/2 tbls avocado oil
Salt
Pepper



Cooking Instructions

Step 1: Heat oil and cook onion and garlic in a small skillet for about 7 minutes or until soft, set aside to cool. Blanch the fresh broccoli for about 2 minutes and chop into small pieces, then transfer to a large bowl.

Step 2: Add breadcrumbs, lightly beaten eggs, Parmesan cheese, Cheddar cheese, onion and garlic to the bowl, then season with salt and pepper to taste, and mix until it is combined.

Step 3: Preheat the oven to 400 degrees Fahrenheit. Line the baking sheet with parchment paper, and form the mixture into patties. Then cover the lid with plastic wrap and fill it with the mixture, lightly pressing it down. Flip the patty out and repeat with the rest of the mixture.

Step 4: Transfer patties to the prepared baking sheet and allow to bake in the preheated oven for 15 minutes. Flip and bake again for another 10 minutes. Remove and serve!


Tips: You can shape a perfect patties using a lid. Covering the lid with plastic wrap helps to remove the patty easily. If you notice that the eggs fall apart easily, add an extra egg to make the eggs firmer.




