REVISED Tuesday, July 20th: Day Trip to Lancaster for the Amish Experience: This trip has been revised from last month. Lunch is no longer included in the price and it will be on your own. Thursday July 22nd: Train Trip - North Central Railway of York / Amish Market

It's an authentic experience where you might meet presidents and generals, experience the Wild West, and literally ride along the very rails that helped build and save our nation. After the train ride, we will visit a traditional local Amish farmers market. Friday July 23rd: Eisenhower National Historic Site / Hickory Bridge Farm Lunch / Winery Tour

The Eisenhower National Historic Site preserves the farm of General and 34th President Dwight D. Eisenhower. Adjacent to the Gettysburg battlefield, the farm served the president and first lady as a weekend retreat and as a meeting place for world leaders. With its peaceful setting and view of South Mountain, it was a respite from Washington, DC, and a backdrop for efforts to reduce Cold War tensions.

Hickory Bridge Farm: next, we will stop for lunch at Hickory Bridge Farm and Restaurant which dates back into history as far as the late 1600s when the King of England granted the land to Charles Carroll the father of the signer of the Declaration of Independence Here we will enjoy a full family style meal for lunch. The menu may include, a house salad with a warm sweet and sour dressing, warm baked bread with apple butter, two or three entrees passed family style complimented with several vegetables, corn fritters, stewed apples and a choice of homemade dessert.

After an abundant meal, you are welcome to visit the farm museum, old time country store or the bed and breakfast at no additional cost (Please no hanky-panky in any of the guest rooms!).

Lastly, to cap off a great meal (and a very busy week), we will stop at the Adams County Winery. The winery offers an inviting, comfortable, and casual atmosphere where anyone can relax and taste wine. Enjoy the beautiful gardens, pet-friendly grounds, and the historic tasting room built in an 1860's era bank barn.

Whether you are a wine connoisseur or a complete newcomer, you are invited to visit, make yourself at home, and let the knowledgeable staff guide your experience here at the winery. Note: The cost of any beverages / refreshments at the winery are NOT included in the cost of the trip.

Although we expect that all trips will be provided as described, they are tentative and subject to change. In addition, the committee reserves the right to cancel or modify any trip if minimum participation is not met or availability changes.

Camping Reservations: The cost for a full hook up site (water, electric, sewer and cable TV) for the week will be \$575.00. Extra Family in a rig will be \$100 and extra adults will be \$50 each. **Cabins:** There are several types of cabins available that range in price from \$ 778.60 to \$1,593.42 for the week. You will need to make your own reservations for a cabin by calling Kelsey Nelson at 844-289-6234. Some of these cabins will be near the rest of the group and some will not be. For reference, the cabins nearest our group are on Picket's **Thicket road**. Please mention that you are with NAFCA when making the reservation to receive the discount. If you will be renting a cabin, you will still need to fill out a reservation form and pay the \$50 Admin fee to cover NAFCAree costs (the same that everyone else is paying). SYMBOLISM OF THE NAFCA EMBLEM

OVERALL IMPRESSION: It is simple and forceful with a pleasing and unique shape. It clearly and plainly announces the name of the organization so that the emblem can't be confused with that of any other association. The shape, colors and design are meaningful as explained here.

SHAPE: The clean symmetrical outside line of the emblem with its opposing points, represents the compass and the far-flung spread of Association membership.

The four outer points have a second and important meaning. NAFCA's action program for better camping follows four avenues. 1.

Camper education 2. Campground development 3. Conservation concern 4. Legislative alertness.

The inner oval symbolizes the unity of family campers regardless of race, creed or color, from all walks of life, employing many kinds of equipment, but who join together for mutual benefit. Our very differences weld a stronger more effective organization to work for better camping.

COLOR: The simple but striking color combination of green and white is most meaningful. The white background expresses honesty, square dealing and purity of purpose. The green design stands for the verdant color of the out-of-doors where we pursue our recreation but also symbolizes growth and life itself.

DESIGN: The elements of the design include the name of the association, an open fire, the frame supporting a coffee pot, pine needles and cones. Each has a very special symbolism for campers.

The fire is perhaps the most universal symbol of camping- the flame denoting fellowship, the smoke memories of past camping experiences.

The seven logs in the fire are for the seven-fold NAFCA purposes and NAFCA's 7Cs Campers Code.

While the wooden cooking fire supports and stretcher are

uncommon to family camping today, they remind us of our pioneering forefathers who conquered a continent by resourcefulness and perseverance and left us a proud heritage.

The coffeepot is characteristic of a camper's friendliness and unfailing good humor. It typifies the old-fashioned virtues of sharing and neighborliness.

Pine needles and cones recall the northeastern origin of the Association and the campers driving urge to enjoy the beauty of nature.

MEANING: Despite the symbolism described here, the true meaning of the emblem lies not in its physical elements but in the attitudes, manners, and spirit of its members. The heart and soul of an organization are determined by its member's interest and enthusiasm and NAFCA has always had these in large measure. May the NAFCA emblem continue to stand for the very best in family camping!

WHAT'S COOKING?

BEEFY CORN CASSEROLE

Submitted by Dena Rickson

1 lb ground beef

1 small onion, chopped

2-3 jalapeno peppers, seeded and chopped

1 (8 ½ oz) corn bread/muffin mix

34 tsp salt

½ tsp baking soda

1 (14 ¾ can) cream-style corn

1 cup milk

½ cup vegetable oil

2 eggs, beaten

3 cups (12 oz) shredded cheddar cheese, divided

In a large skillet, cook the beef, onion and peppers over medium heat until meat is no longer pink; drain and set aside. In a small bowl, combine the corn bread mix, salt, baking soda, corn, milk, oil and eggs. Pour half the ingredients in a greased $13 \times 9 \times 2$ inch baking dish. Layer with half of the cheese and all of the beef mixture. Top with remaining cheese. Carefully spread remaining batter over top. Bake, uncovered, at 350° for 40-45 minutes or until a toothpick inserted near the center comes out clean. 8-12 servings.

CHERRY MACAROONS

½ cup butter, softened

½ cup shortening

1 cup sugar

2 eggs

1 tsp almond extract

2 ½ cups flour

1 tsp baking powder

1 tsp salt

½ cup chopped maraschino cherries, plus more for garnish

2 cups shredded coconut

1 cup chopped pecans or walnuts

Preheat oven to 350°. Cream together butter and shortening. Gradually add sugar, mixing well. Blend in flour, baking powder, and salt. Stir in cherries, coconut and nuts. Drop by rounded teaspoon onto lightly greased baking sheets. Garnish each cookie with one quarter of a cherry. Bake 10 -12 minutes or until lightly browned. Yield 5-6 dozen.

LEMON BARS

2 sticks butter or margarine, softened

½ cup brown sugar

2 cups flour

1 tsp salt

Bake 15 minutes. Cool. Then mix and pour over cooled crust.

4 eggs

2 cups sugar

6 tbsp flour

½ cup fresh or bottled lemon juice

Bake 25 more minutes. Dust with powdered sugar while still warm

DEPRESSION-ERA CAKE

1 cup brown sugar-firm pack

1 ½ cup water

1/3 cup vegetable oil

2 cups dark raisins

2 tsp cinnamon

½ tsp ground cloves

½ tsp ground nutmeg

1 tsp baking soda

1 tsp salt

2 tsp water

2 cups flour

1 tsp baking powder

Preheat oven to 325°. Combine sugar, water, oil, raisins and spices in a saucepan, and boil to 3 minutes, stirring frequently. Take pan off heat and let cool for ten minutes. Dissolve baking soda and salt in 2 teaspoons of water and add to raisin mixture. (it will foam). Blend in the flour and baking powder. Mix well. Pour batter into a greased 9 x 9 inch square pan, and bake for 55 minutes or until toothpick inserted in center comes out clean. Let cake cook for about 10 minutes before serving

Yield 10-12 servings
